2011 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 57

2 Whereas, the U.S. Department of Labor has proposed new federal regulations 3 that would severely limit the work that youths may perform on farms; and 4 Whereas, among other things, the proposed regulations would prohibit youths 5 from operating most power-driven equipment, working at grain elevators, 6 stockyards, and livestock auctions, and storing, marketing, or transporting farm 7 product raw materials; and 8 Whereas, for generations in our country, teenagers have safely worked at farm 9 jobs that challenge them and instill a strong work ethic, but the proposed regulations 10 would largely end this practice; and 11 Whereas, Kurt and Kyle Weisensel of Edgerton, Wisconsin, are perfect

Whereas, while the children working on their own parents' farm would be exempted, the proposed regulations ignore the multigenerational tradition of family farming and would still prohibit children from working on their grandparents' or other relatives' farms; and

Resolved, That the members of the Wisconsin legislature stand opposed to the federal Department of Labor's proposed regulations.
