In response to the request sent by Chris to Read To Lead Task Force Members, we submit the following wording for the educator test and for the early literacy screener. We believe the wording is consistent with what the task force recommended.

The educator test should assess an educator in:

NO # * Reading development and scientifically based reading instruction; integration of knowledge and understanding phonological and phonemic awareness; concepts of print and the alphabetic principles; the role of phonics in promoting reading development; word analysis skills and strategies; vocabulary development; how to apply reading comprehension skills and strategies to imaginative, literary, informational, and expository texts; formal and informal methods of assessing reading development; ~~and~~ multiple approaches to reading instruction; *development of reading curricula.*

The early literacy screener should:

1. Provide a comprehensive assessment of young children's knowledge of the literacy fundamentals that predict future reading success.
2. Be designed to identify students who need additional reading instruction beyond that provided to typically developing readers.
3. Provide teachers with explicit information about their students' knowledge of literacy fundamentals.

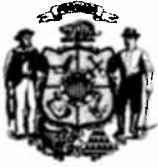

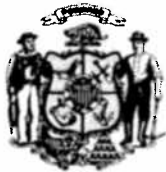
