#### **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

The bill makes several changes to laws related to the intoxicated operation of all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles, motorboats, and motor vehicles, as well as for snowmobile safety instruction for persons under 16 years of age.

#### **Assumptions**

This bill will require programming changes to the Department's citations databases and the interfaces that are currently in use, which may cost up to \$15,000. Additional costs resulting from updating Department forms, pamphlets, websites and also training personnel will be incurred. These are all one-time costs that can be absorbed by the Department.

An indeterminate amount of revenue will be generated as a result of person operating a recreational vehicle while a person's recreational vehicle operating privileges have been suspended and operating a recreational vehicle while their motor vehicle privileges have been suspended/revoked due to a motor vehicle related OWI or second offense recreational vehicle OWI within a five year period. It is unknown how many violations will occur. Approximately 400-500 people are arrested each year for ATV, boat or snowmobile OWI which would result in a suspension of their recreational operating privileges under this bill. It is unknown how many of these people would operate a recreational vehicle after their operating privileges are suspended. Over 400,000 motor vehicle operators have their driver's licenses revoked or suspended for an OWI related offense each year. Under this bill, these people would also be prohibited from operating a recreational vehicle as long as their driver's licenses are revoked or suspended. It is unknown how many of these people would operate a recreational vehicle in violation of this bill.

Current law requires snowmobile operators at least age 12 and those born on or after January 1, 1985 to complete a Snowmobile Safety Education course to legally operate a snowmobile in areas open to the public. In addition, current law mandates that children under the age of 16 complete the Snowmobile Safety Education requirement in a classroom-type course only. By comparison, the bill removes the classroom instruction requirement, which would presumably allow children under age 16 to complete the requirement via an internet safety course approved by the Department. Since the Department currently collects between \$5-\$10 per classroom course student for snowmobile safety courses, it expects to experience an indeterminate reduction in safety education revenues as a result of the bill removing the classroom instruction requirement. To the extent that individuals under the age of 16 opt to fulfill their safety education requirement by means other than classroom instruction, staff time associated with processing classroom course-related paperwork will be significantly reduced.
