## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill establishes a procedure and standards for the transfer of criminal cases from a circuit court to a veterans court, which is defined in the bill. The bill also requires that the county that had original jurisdiction over the veteran is responsible for the costs of jailing the veteran and for funding any community-based care, treatment or services that are ordered for the veteran.

This bill will have no fiscal impact on the court system, assuming the number of cases involved does not change.

There may be a fiscal impact on the county where the case involving the veteran originated. Any fiscal impact would depend on the length of jail stay or the type of community-based care, treatment or services that are ordered for the veteran. While much of the cost of that care, treatment or services would be borne by the federal government through the Veterans Administration, it is possible that some of those costs would require county funding.
