Chairman Francis Ferguson called the February meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Present were Chair Francis Ferguson, Supervisors Lowell Boelk and Dave Whitty, Treasurer Lois Towne and Clerk Gloria Kelroy. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Chair Francis Ferguson read the agenda. A motion was made by Lowell Boelk and seconded by Dave Whitty to approve the agenda as read. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

A motion was made by Dave Whitty to approve the January minutes. Lowell Boelk seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

A motion was made by Lowell Boelk to approve the bills along with some additional bills as presented by Clerk Gloria Kelroy. Dave Whitty seconded the motion. Motion carried by a vote of 3 ayes.

Permits Issued was then read by Marlin Towne. No permits had been issued.

Memorial Committee Report: Tom Kelroy reported for the Veterans Committee. A possible bus trip to tour the High grounds Memorial Site is being coordinated. The cost would be approximately \$20 per person. The site honors World War II Veterans.

Also upcoming is the Corn Beef and Cabbage Dinner at the American Legion in Lomira on March 17.

Historical Society Report: Tim Hackbarth reminded everyone of the Annual meeting on March 16th.

Decisions of Planning Committee & Board of Appeals: Board of Appeals will meet on March 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the Sons of Zebedee St. John’s Church Hall to reconsider the application of Todd and Angie Cardinal of Hunter’s Point Hunt Club for a special use permit.

Public Comments: Kay Oestreich and Deb Boelk were present and introduced themselves. Both will be running for town clerk in the spring election.

- a) Review of Budget Balances: \$111,915.26 is the current balance in the town’s checkbook.

Town chair and town clerk. Survey Map for Luedtke was approved by Lowell Boelk and seconded by Dave Whitty. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes and signed by town clerk.

Applications for a variance for Greg Barber and a special use permit for Rademann Stone have been received and sent to the Board of Appeals Committee. No meeting dates at this time have been set.

c) Discussion and Setting Wages for those employed by town: Lowell Boelk made a motion and Francis Ferguson seconded the motion that maintenance clean up around the hall be \$12 per hour. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes.

Dave Whitty made a motion that election workers be paid \$11 per hour. They were being paid \$9 per hour. Lowell Boelk seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes.

Dave Whitty made a motion that Board of Appeals Committee and Planning Commission Committee wages be increased to \$30 (committee members) and \$40 (chair and secretary of committees). They were being paid \$25 (committee members) and \$35 (chair and secretary of committees). Lowell Boelk seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes.

Chairman Francis Ferguson called the March meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Present were Chair Francis Ferguson, Supervisors Lowell Boelk and Dave Whitty, Treasurer Lois Towne and Clerk Gloria Kelroy. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Chair Francis Ferguson read the agenda. A motion was made by Lowell Boelk to approve the agenda as read. Dave Whitty seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

A motion was made by Dave Whitty to approve the March minutes. Lowell Boelk seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

A motion was made by Dave Whitty to approve the bills along with one additional bill as presented by Clerk Gloria Kelroy. Lowell Boelk seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

Review of Budget Balances – The balance in the town’s checkbook at present is \$101,237.56.

Permits Issued was then read by Marlin Towne. Two permits had been issued for a pool with deck and a shed.

Memorial Committee Report: Francis Ferguson reported that the Corn Beef and Cabbage Dinner and raffle raised around \$2,400. The committee has 12 new names to add to the memorial. Francis is to check on when the company will be in the area to add these names.

Historical Society Report: Tim Hackbarth reported that the “Adopt a Highway” clean up will be held this Saturday April 18th. The committee would like the board’s input on where the poles could be placed, north and south of the town, for the signs honoring Steve Whitman. The signs will be dedicated on Memorial Day. The meeting with guest speaker Jim Casper who shared the life of Steve Whitman was well attended with 60-65 people.

Board of Appeals: Two items came before the Board of Appeals, the Hunters point request for sporting clays and the Barber variance for length of cul-de-sac, both were denied.

Public Comments: Tim Shafer questioned protocol for posting of the lawn mowing position at the Genesee Cemetery. He felt that the position should have been on the agenda at last months meeting. It was explained to him that the notice had been posted at the 3 designated places and a letter was sent to those persons who are in the business of doing lawn work.

Tim also noticed that a real estate business had an advertisement posted on the town bulletin board and was that allowed. The board is looking into a new display case with a lock which will be used for town business only.

Gerry Meyer noted that he did not see a payment from the wind turbines on the annual report. It was explained that this money is not payable until next year. He also questioned the payment of \$1,000 from

the Memorial Committee, which was explained as a loan repayment.

Betty Hungerford was questioning the payment that they made to the township for the Town Clerk's time to help them obtain township public records. She had a letter from Attorney St Peter stating that the town could charge for copies, not for the clerk's time as the clerk is salaried. It was also indicated that anything less than \$50.00 was not chargeable and they had been charged \$30.00. The Hungerford's also felt payment unnecessary because it wasn't their fault the town hadn't published the ordinance. It was explained that the town acted on the advice of attorney St Peter. Francis Ferguson explained that it is the clerk's job to keep the records and not to look up records and felt that the board would need to look into setting a policy. After much discussion, David Whitty moved to refund the Hungerford's the \$30.00 they had paid, seconded by Lowell Boelk. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes. Later in the meeting the Hungerford's asked that the check be made out to the Memorial Committee.

Old Business:

a) Chris Marcoe reported on the water problems that continue at her residence on Lost Arrow Road. She presented pictures of the water in the area and a letter from Matt at Excel Engineering. It is felt that some changes have occurred over the years that allow water to flow more quickly onto her property. No records exist of such a change. Mr. Ferguson will check with the county, who owned the road prior to the township, to see if they have any records of a change. It was mentioned that farms in the area are growing less hay than in the past, more waterways are being put in and fences have been removed that all add to an increase in water flow. The board agreed to meet with Chris at her home at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday April 22 to review the issue. Other persons asked to attend were John Laudolff and the Town Clerk. Others may also attend.

b) Revisit-Setting Wages for those employed by Town – Due to shortness of time, tabled until the next meeting.

New Business:

a) Francis Ferguson made a motion to charge \$5.00 per ¼ hour, or fraction thereof, for the clerk's time and copies charged at 25 cents per copy for searching of records by the clerk on behalf of others. Discussion followed on the wording of the motion. It was decided that the board should seek legal council on the matter. Mr. Ferguson withdrew his motion. Lowell Boelk moved, seconded by Francis Ferguson that at the May meeting the board would decide wages and wording, so much for minutes & so much for copies, and how to set it up. Motion carried with a vote of 3 ayes.

b) Oath of Office - Francis thanked Gloria Kelroy for her 12 years of service as Town Clerk. Gloria then presented the "Oath of Office for the following persons & positions, Francis Ferguson Town Board Chairperson, Lowell Boelk Supervisor 1, David Whitty Supervisor 2, Kay Oestreich Town Clerk, and Lois Towne Town Treasurer.

c) J.E. Arthur & Associates - A representative from J.E. Arthur & Associates was present to explain the newly proposed cul-de-sac on the Barber property. The first cul-de-sac proposal had been denied by the Board of Appeals. The new proposal has a temporary cul-de-sac that could be removed at a later date when the road would continue into the adjacent property. Francis is to call our attorney on the legality of a continuation road. It was noted that this would be similar to the Lonesome Oak subdivision in the township. J.E. Arthur & Associates can call Francis in two weeks.

d) Certified Survey Map for Buechel Stone - Mr. Buechel explained they had surveyed the building site from the quarry. The section line runs thru the building with half of the building zoned ag land and half

commercial. Francis to contact Sam Tobias to question if that will be a problem. Buechel Stone can contact Francis in two weeks.

e)Certified Survey Maps – The Board of Appeals will meet April 15th to act on a special use permit for Rademan Stone for a temporary cement plant.

f)Proposals for lawn mowing at Genesee Cemetery – The following persons submitted proposals for the mowing of the Genesee Cemetery; Kyle Hungerford \$45, Brian Meyer \$50 and Jerry Wendler \$35. Bob Geiger is not interested at this time. The fee includes equipment, trimming and a spring pick up. It was decided that they are considered employees of the township receiving a W-2 form and would be covered under the township insurance. This position is hired yearly. Lowell Boelk moved to choose the lowest proposal of Jerry Wendler at \$35 a cutting. Seconded by Francis Ferguson. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes.

g)Items for Annual Meeting – Wendy Giese from the Fond du Lac County Code Enforcement Office coming to the meeting to give an update on county water quality issues. There will be a follow up meeting May 19th at the Sons of Zebedee Church hall as time is limited at the annual meeting.

h)Web-Site Provider – Francis Ferguson reported on Web design he had seen at a Wisconsin Towns Association Convention provided by Town Web Design. They provide web sites for townships that are more cost effective than our current provider and more user friendly. The cost the first year would be \$609.00 and \$310.00 yearly after that. David Whitty moved we change to Town Web Design. Seconded by Lowell Boelk. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes. Kay Oestreich is to contact Dustin Overbeck of Town Web Design.

i)Progress Report – Francis Ferguson reported that the Ordinances and Comprehensive Plan Review Committee has completed working on subdivision ordinances which will now go to the lawyer. They hope to complete all ordinances by fall.

j)Computer – Kay Oestreich asked if the Town Board wanted her to use her personal computer while doing the clerks duties or if they preferred her to use a town computer. It was decided that she should purchase a laptop computer for her use.

k)Lowell Boelk reported that current pending state legislature if passed, would require all work done on roads to be paid at union scale, which could cause an increase for the township if passed.

l)A suggestion was made to list the requirements for garbage sorting in the next newsletter. Another newsletter suggestion was to publish the newsletter after the date for the Board of Revue was known so it could be included in the newsletter.

There being no further business a motion was made by Lowell Boelk to adjourn the meeting at 9:30 p.m. Dave Whitty seconded the motion. Motion carried with a vote of three ayes.

Francis Ferguson called the meeting to order at 7:20 p.m. He read the notice that had been posted for the meeting and the minutes from the Plan Commission Meeting held March 4th. The Plan Commission Committee recommended to the Board that the 2.12 acres being purchased by Ronald Boda be rezoned from Exclusive Ag to Residential. This acreage is owned by the Wisconsin Conference Board of Methodist Churches and is located on the north side of County Road F in the Southeast quarter of Section 20 of the town.

Ronald Boda presented the board with the survey and pictures of the property. Lowell Boelk reminded Mr. Boda that there currently are businesses adjacent to this property, Hunters Point and Park Cheese. These businesses were there prior to his purchase, and the town is not open to complaints about these businesses at a later date. Todd Cardinal went on record as being apposed to approving the rezoning without a complete business plan for the total acreage being in place. The Board felt the 2.12 acres could be rezoned with a business plan presented when a request is made to rezone the remainder of the property. Scott Swick, representing the United Methodist Campgrounds, reported that they have an agreement with Mr. Boda that his business plan be consistent with the spiritual values that have been carried out on this property in the past. Mr. Boda's plan to use the property as a convention center, restaurant and retreat is consistent with what the church had been doing.

Lowell Boelk moved to change the zoning of 2.12 acres as discussed from Exclusive Ag to Residential. The motion was seconded by David Whitty. Vote was taken by a roll call vote with 3 ayes. Mr. Boda presented the treasurer with a check for the transfer fee.

Francis Ferguson reported that the Memorial Day activities were well attended by over 100 persons. Rock of Ages Inc had the new memorial stone in place for this event. They replaced the old stone, at no cost to the town, because the names were fading.

Historical Committee: Bob Simon reported that the committee helped host the Memorial Day Event. They had many displays in the town hall depicting veterans and their stories.

Public Comments: Matt Parmentier reported that the agenda listed a closed session at the end of the meeting. Public comments would be welcome but some of the comments would not be addressed until later during the closed session.

Tom Kelroy reported that town residents had received a notice recently from the sheriff that a halfway house would be placed at N2962 Oaklane Road. An informational meeting was held in Oakfield where people were told that this was a done deal and that these residents have their rights. Tom questioned, what about the rights of the residents of the town? He questioned if any town ordinances were violated? Could the town put a stop or injunction against this? How many sexual predators can be housed at the site and how long can they remain? Matt Parmentier responded by saying that the zoning issue would be talked about later in closed session but the comments were appreciated.

Unfinished Business:

- a) **Update on Hunters Point Hearing of June 3rd:** Hunters Point HC LLC filed a declaratory judgment contending that Hunters Point is a "sport shooting range" as that term is defined under Wis. Stat. 895.527 (1) and is exempt from town zoning. Matt Parmentier reported that their office had filed a submission of brief and met in Judge Grimm's Court on June 3 for oral argument. The decision of the Court was in favor

of the Town of Byron and withheld that the business does not qualify as a sport shooting range under the statutes and will continue to fall under the zoning of the town.

On the same day the judge decided the case a new piece of legislation was introduced as part of the budget bill which would change some of the rules regarding sport shooting ranges. The rule may or may not have impacted the case. Legislatures had heard from some of its constituents and it has been removed the proposed bill. Many people from the town e-mailed and phoned asking for the ability of town governments to govern such matters.

Joseph Tevaarwerk stated that a portion of the legislature was not withdrawn regarding releasing an unlimited number of birds.

Steve Hungerford questioned the current use of a clay thrower at Hunters Point. Matt reported that the town allowed for a clay thrower to be used for warm up prior to hunting. The judge didn't undo what the town had allowed, but to increase the number of clays would have to be approved by the Board of Appeals.

Ron Boda mentioned that Francis Ferguson should be thanked for alerting everyone about the new legislation and worked to get everyone involved in getting it removed. We need to continue to watch for future regulations.

- b) **Reminder of Bulky Waste Pickup June 17th:** All town residents should have items out for pick-up early in the day. More than one truck will be thru to pick up the various items.

BILL SUMMARY

AB 646: Regulating the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping of Wild Animals by Local Units of Government

Date: February 12, 1998

BACKGROUND

Under current law, ownership and protection of wild animals living in the wild is vested in the state for the purposes of regulating the enjoyment, use, disposition and conservation of these animals. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) administers and enforces laws regulating wildlife management. However, in certain cases, municipalities have authority to regulate hunting, possession and sale of certain wild animals.

The governing body of any county, city, village or town may, by ordinance, prohibit a person from possessing or selling any live game animal or fur-bearing animal. Additionally, a local government may prohibit possession or sale of any live wild or domestic skunk.

Counties also have authority to enact ordinances on the shining of wild animals. "Shining" means the casting of rays of light on a field, forest or other area for the purpose of illuminating, locating or attempting to illuminate or locate wild animals. County ordinances may not be less restrictive than state laws on shining.

SUMMARY OF ASSEMBLY BILL 646 (AS AMENDED BY ASA1)

Assembly Bill 646 creates a new provision granting municipalities authority to enact ordinances that have an incidental effect on hunting, fishing, trapping or management of wild animals, if their primary purpose is to further public health or safety. The bill also allows municipalities to enact an ordinance or adopt any regulation, resolution or other restriction that prohibits or restricts access for hunting, fishing or trapping on any land owned or leased by the municipality. Furthermore, the bill gives the DNR authority to issue an order declaring a municipal action void (following a notice of issuance) if the DNR finds the municipality exceeding its statutory authority. However, the bill states that the municipality may request an informal hearing on the matter first, if the municipality so requests within 30 days of the issuance.

FISCAL EFFECT

According to a fiscal report prepared by the Department of Natural Resources, it is estimated that there will be an average of 20 ordinances created or under review by the DNR annually. On average, each review/voidance procedure will take 40 hours per case or 800 hours per year. Under Assembly Bill 646, both local and state government legal costs may increase by \$35,200.

PROS

1. AB 646 provides more stability to the future of regulated hunting, fishing and trapping in Wisconsin.

2. AB 646 clarifies the DNR's authority in enforcing the laws regulating the hunting, fishing, trapping and management of wild animals without taking away a municipality's regulating authority in the process.
3. This bill will make it easier for the DNR to review local laws regulating wild animals.

CONS

1. AB 646 may remove some municipal regulatory authority of wild animals and give it to the DNR.

Under current law, title to, and the protection of, wild animals living in the wild is vested in the state. The department of natural resources (DNR) administers and enforces the laws regulating the hunting, fishing, trapping and management of wild animals.

Currently, cities, villages, towns and counties are authorized to regulate the hunting, possession and sale of certain wild animals under certain circumstances. Counties are authorized to enact ordinances regarding the hunting of wild animals that are at least as restrictive as state law. Counties, cities, villages and towns are authorized to enact ordinances banning the sale of certain wild animals.

The bill grants counties, cities, villages and towns (political subdivisions) as well as special purpose districts and subunits of these political subdivisions and districts, the authority to enact ordinances that have an incidental effect on the hunting, fishing, trapping or management of wild animals if their primary purpose is to further public health, safety or welfare. The bill also grants these local entities the authority to enact ordinances that regulate or prohibit access for hunting, fishing and trapping in certain areas of land that the entities lease or own. Finally, the bill creates a procedure for DNR to issue orders declaring such ordinances void if local entities exceed this authority.

For further information see the state and local fiscal estimate, which will be printed as an appendix to this bill.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. 29.177 of the statutes is created to read:

29.177 Local regulation of wild animals. (1) In this section:

- (a) "Local governmental unit" has the meaning given in s. 16.97 (7).
- (b) "Political subdivision" means a city, village, town or county.

(2) No local governmental unit may enact any ordinance or adopt any regulation, resolution or other restriction for the purpose of regulating the hunting, fishing, trapping or management of wild animals, except as follows:

- (a) A local governmental unit may enact an ordinance that is authorized under this chapter.
- (b) A local governmental unit may enact an ordinance or adopt a regulation, resolution or other restriction that has an incidental effect on hunting, fishing or trapping, but only if the primary purpose is to further public health, safety or welfare.

(c) A local governmental unit may enact an ordinance restricting or prohibiting access for hunting, fishing or trapping in certain areas of land that it owns or leases.

(3) If the department determines that an ordinance, regulation, resolution or other restriction enacted or adopted by a local governmental unit exceeds the authority granted to local governmental units in this section, the department may issue a notice to the local governmental unit of the department's intent to issue an order under this subsection. If requested by the local governmental unit within 30 days after it receives the notice, the department shall hold an informal hearing on the matter. The informal hearing is not a contested case under ch. 227. Following the hearing or following the failure of the local governmental unit to request a hearing, the department may issue an order declaring the ordinance, regulation, resolution or other restriction void.

Section 2. 29.425 (2) (b) of the statutes is amended to read:

29.425 (2) (b) Local prohibition. The Notwithstanding par. (a), the governing body of any county, city, village or town may, by ordinance, prohibit a person from possessing any live game animal or fur-bearing animal.

Section 3. 29.425 (3) (c) of the statutes is amended to read:

29.425 (3) (c) Local prohibition. The Notwithstanding par. (a), the governing body of any county, city, village or town may, by ordinance, prohibit the sale of any live game animal or fur-bearing animal.

Section 4. 29.427 (2) (c) of the statutes is amended to read:

29.427 (2) (c) Local prohibition. The Notwithstanding par. (a), the governing body of any county, city, village or town may, by ordinance, prohibit a person from possessing any live wild or domestic skunk.



BILL SUMMARY

AB 308: Sport Shooting Range Immunity and Liability

Date: May 5, 1998

BACKGROUND

Under current law, certain liability limitations are made available to a land owner or occupant who uses a property for recreation purposes and does not receive payments (for recreational use) that exceed \$2,000 annually. Recreational activity is defined as any outdoor activity taken for the purpose of exercise, relaxation or pleasure, including the practice or instruction in any such activity. The owner is not required to:

- keep the property safe for recreational activities,
- inspect the property, or
- give warning of an unsafe condition, use or activity on the property.

Additionally, the owner or occupant of the land is immune from liability for damages that occur on the property relating to recreational activity.

SUMMARY OF AB 308 (AS AMENDED BY ASA 2)

Assembly Bill 308 creates a recreational definition for sport shooting and addresses noise control and other noise nuisances related to ownership and operation of a sport shooting facility.

Under the bill, a sport shooting range is defined as "an area designed and operated for the use and discharge of firearms." A person who owns or operates a sport shooting range is immune from civil liability in lawsuits related to noise, if:

- there was no statute, rule or ordinance related to noise control that applied at the time of construction or initial operation of the range; if a statute, rule or ordinance is adopted following construction, the range owner must comply with the new law only if the range owner expands the facility;
- there was a statute, rule or ordinance related to noise control at the time of construction, the owner must comply; if a statute, rule or ordinance is adopted following construction, the range owner must comply with the new law only if the range owner expands the facility.

Finally, the bill states a person who owns or operates a sport shooting range is not subject to an action for nuisance related to noise and a court may not enjoin or restrain the operation or use of a sport shooting range on the basis of noise if the above conditions apply.

AMENDMENTS

Assembly Substitute Amendment 2 to AB 308 (introduced by Assembly Committee on Natural Resources) creates a recreational definition for sport shooting and addresses noise control and other noise

nuisances related to ownership and operation of a sport shooting facility [adoption recommended by the committee, **6-3-1** (Reps. Brandemuehl, Black, and Bock voting "nay," Rep. Boyle absent)].

FISCAL EFFECT

No estimate of the fiscal effect of AB 308 has been performed.

PROS

1. According to the National Rifle Association, the number of states that have enacted shooting range protection legislation has more than doubled since 1994, jumping from eight to 28.
2. AB 308 offers protection to range owners against arbitrary actions filed by newcomers.
3. AB 308 ensures that Wisconsin gun owners have an outlet to shoot responsibly and safely.

CONS

1. Sport shooting ranges should not be allowed to operate where they create a noise nuisance.


HISTORY

Assembly Bill 308 was introduced on April 24, 1997, and referred to the Assembly Committee on Natural Resources. Two public hearings were held – April 30, 1997, and August 13, 1997. On January 28, 1998, the committee held an executive session and voted **9-0-1** (Rep. Boyle absent) to recommend AB 308 for passage, as amended by ASA 2.

SB 424 – Shooting Range Protection

Sen. Pat Kreitlow

Summary of Bill as amended:

Senate Bill 424 - Current law generally protects a shooting range from noise related civil actions and zoning ordinances. This bill allows the owner of an existing range to repair, remodel or reinforce any building on the range for the purpose of public safety or to ensure the building's continued use. It also allows owners to reconstruct, repair or rebuild a building on the range that is damaged by certain natural causes. Additionally, SB 424 authorizes shooting ranges to expand membership, public participation and their facilities.

This bill also prohibits a government body (state agency, political subdivision or court) from closing an existing range unless the body finds that the range is a public safety hazard and requires that the owner be given at least three opportunities to eliminate the hazard. The government body must also allow the range to relocate (to an area where a shooting range is permissible); should relocation be required the government body must acquire the property by condemnation (or by purchase if they do not have condemnation authority).

Senate Substitute Amendment 1- amends the law to provide that the operation of a sport shooting range in existence on June 18, 2010 may continue to operate as a sport shooting range at that location notwithstanding a zoning ordinance, if the sport shooting range is a lawful use or nonconforming use under the zoning ordinance then in effect. The operation of the sport shooting range continues to be a lawful use or legal nonconforming use notwithstanding any expansion of, or enhancement or improvement to, the sport shooting range.

Fiscal Effect:

A fiscal estimate prepared by the Wisconsin Court System indicates there will be an indeterminate fiscal effect for Senate Bill 424, but any increased costs could be absorbed within the Agency's budget. (Additional court proceedings could be generated under the terms of this bill, but it is impossible to predict how frequently that may happen.)

Supporters Message:

- Existing businesses that are safely operated should not be forced to close because the expectations of the neighbors changes.
- If Wisconsin wants to protect its hunting heritage, we must protect places that allow hunters to sharpen their skills.
- Ranges teach proper use of firearms.

Opponents Message:

- Government bodies may face increase costs if the relocation of the range is required.
- Some people don't like the noise associated with shooting ranges, and this bill provides ranges additional protection.


