Regulation of ferrous metallic mining and related activities, procedures for obtaining approvals from the Department of Natural Resources for the construction of utility facilities, making an appropriation, and providing penalties

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill establishes a regulatory structure and process for ferrous metallic mining. The bill contains various enforcement and penalty provisions that may come before the circuit courts of Wisconsin. Additional court proceedings could be generated under the terms of this bill, but it is impossible to predict how frequently that may happen. Additional proceedings require additional judge, court reporter, and court staff time. These costs are borne by both the state and the county. An accurate estimate of the additional costs is impossible with the data available.
