## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

SB-603 would aid many new businesses with not having to pay two full licenses fees in the first year of operation. License fees are not prorated. Business owners who apply for a new food establishment license shortly before the license expiration date are responsible for paying the total, non-prorated annual fee for the current license-year and then the renewal fee once the license expires.

This bill is a change where if a business receives their first food license within three months before the license's annual expiration date, the license is valid for the next year as well. In other words, the new license is valid for up to 15 months for the price of 12 months. This would be a one-time exemption for new licenses only. DATCP anticipates a few hundred new businesses will begin each year and because they vary in size from very small to larger, the fiscal impact is indeterminate as it depends on the number of new licensees in a given year and their size.
