## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Senate Bill (SB) 660 proposes to modify current renewable portfolio standards that apply to electric providers including imposing biofuel requirements on electric providers and requiring electric utilities to make certain purchases of renewable energy. SB 660 also assigns specific duties to the Public Service Commission (PSC)regarding distributed generation facilities. Specifically, SB-660 would require the PSC to issue an order directed at each retail electric utility that requires the utility to offer to purchase the renewable energy generated at renewable facilities within the utility's service territory that are constructed after the effective date of the PSC's order. The bill also expands the PSC's rule-making authority as it relates distributed generation facilities.

SB-660 would have no fiscal effect on the PSC, as both the order-issuance and rule-making activities assigned to the Commission could be absorbed by current staff.
