This part does two things – mentions that we are creating an LMIS, and indicates that the info collected is available to the public free of charge. We don't want to be too detailed about when the info becomes available, so the department doesn't find itself constantly updating a website or something like that.

- Require consultation section 5, add something like "In consultation with WTCS and WEDC, the department shall…" Or at the end "The department shall consult with WTCS and WEDC when implementing this section." We may be able to remove the first paragraph of Section 6 then.

AB 14 - Wisconsin Fast Forward

Rep. Bernier

Summary of Bill (as amended):

Assembly Bill (AB) 14 creates a workforce training program to be administered by the Department of Workforce Development (DWD). Under that program, DWD is required to award grants to public and private organizations for the development and implementation of workforce training programs. An organization that is awarded a grant may use the grant for the training of both new and incumbent employees of businesses in this state. The bill permits DWD to require a public or private organization, as a condition of receiving a grant, to provide matching funds at a percentage to be determined by DWD.

Assembly Amendment 1 to AB14 requires the DWD to develop and maintain a labor market information system to collect, analyze and disseminate information on current and projected employment opportunities in this state. DWD must make this information available to the public free of charge including school districts, technical colleges, tribal colleges, institutions and college campuses within the UW system, local workforce development boards, employers, and job seekers.

The amendment allows grants to go to programs for underemployed, unemployed and incumbent workers.

The amendment requires DWD to consult with the Wisconsin Technical College System Board and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation for grant implementation.

The amendment also specifies statistical information required in the yearly DWD reports. [AA1 to AB14 adopted 15-0]

Fiscal Effect:

\$20 million total GPR over the next biennium, \$7.5 M annually for workforce training grants, and \$5 M for administrative costs, including bidding-out and implementing the LMIS. This funding has been set-aside in the Governor's proposed budget.

The bill would provide an ongoing basis funds for 4 FTE (positions), at a cost of \$237,300 salary and \$113,900 fringe costs per year, as well as software and database tools to identify and enroll workers into private and public training programs. The supplies and services costs to support the new positions are estimated to be \$83,300 annually. The balance of the administration allocation will be used for necessary Information Technology Services (BITS) to modify the current program tracking system with the necessary program data elements. In addition, new software will be purchased through the DOA master lease program through the funds DWD receives from this bill. DWD BITS and software costs are unknown at this time as proposal for the purchase of software have not been received by vendors at this time. Total annual administration costs for the workforce training program will be identified by July 1, 2013.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Current law requires the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) to

establish a statewide workforce investment system to meet the employment,

training, and educational needs of persons in this state; to plan, coordinate,

administer, and implement a youth apprenticeship program and such other

employment and education programs as the governor may assign to DWD; and to

make grants to persons providing employment and training activities to dislocated workers.

This bill creates a workforce training program to be administered by DWD.

Under that program, DWD is required to award grants to public and private

organizations for the development and implementation of workforce training

programs and an organization that is awarded a grant may use the grant for the

training of both new and incumbent employees of businesses in this state. In

addition, the bill permits DWD to require a public or private organization, as a

condition of receiving a grant, to provide matching funds at a percentage to be determined by DWD.

The bill appropriates \$7,500,000 in each of fiscal years 2013-14 and 2014-15

to DWD for grants under the program (grants appropriation), and \$180,000 in fiscal

year 2012-13, \$1,660,000 in fiscal year 2013-14, and \$3,160,000 in fiscal year

2014-15 to DWD for administration of the program (administration appropriation).

The bill, however, requires DWD to estimate the amount of moneys needed for the

administration of the program in fiscal year 2014-15 and, if the amount needed is

less than the amount appropriated, to submit to the Joint Committee on Finance a

proposal to transfer moneys from the administration appropriation to the grants

appropriation for the purpose of increasing funding for workforce training grants.

If a transfer is made, the bill requires DWD, in submitting information to the

Department of Administration for purposes of the 2015-17 biennial budget act, to

submit a dollar amount for the grants appropriation as though the amount

appropriated in fiscal year 2014-15 (base amount) is the amount shown in the

appropriation schedule plus the amount transferred and to submit a dollar amount

for the administration appropriation as though the base amount is the amount

shown in the appropriation schedule minus the amount transferred.

APPRENTICE AND EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS

- (c) Whether the program provides for labor organizations to participate in program planning.
- (d) Whether the program provides for coordination with other employment and training programs offered in the community in which the program will be offered.
- (6) RULE MAKING. The department shall promulgate rules to administer this section. The rules shall address eligible applicants and program providers, application requirements, criteria and procedures for awarding grants, reporting and auditing procedures and administrative operations.

106.16 Notification of position openings. (1) In this section:

- (a) "Company" means any business operated for profit.
- (b) "State agency" has the meaning given in s. 20.001 (1).
- (2) Any company that receives a loan or grant from a state agency or an authority under ch. 231 or 234 shall notify the department and the local workforce development board established under 29 USC 2832, of any position in the company that is related to the project for which the grant or loan is received to be filled in this state within one year after receipt of the loan or grant. The company shall provide this notice at least 2 weeks prior to advertising the position.
- (3) A state agency or an authority under ch. 231 or 234 shall notify the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation if it makes a loan or grant to a company.
- (4) (a) The department shall, upon complaint by any person or on its own motion, investigate any allegation that a company has violated sub. (2) if the complaint is filed with the department no more than 300 days after the alleged violation occurred.
- (b) If after investigation under par. (a) the department finds probable cause to believe that a company has violated sub. (2), the department shall notify the company of the department's finding of probable cause, of the actions specified under par. (d) that the department proposes to take and of the company's right to request a hearing regarding the alleged violation of sub. (2).
- (c) A company that receives a notice under par. (b) may, within 30 days after the date of the notice, request a contested case hearing under s. 227.42. If the department does not receive a request for a contested case hearing under s. 227.42 within 30 days after the date of the notice under par. (b), the department shall issue a final decision that the company has violated sub. (2) and take the actions specified under par. (d).
- (d) If the department receives a request under par. (c) for a hearing, the department shall hold a hearing as provided under s. 227.44. If, after hearing, the department finds that a company has violated sub. (2), the department shall issue a final decision under s. 227.47 that the company has violated sub. (2) and shall order the company to take any remedial action that the department considers appropriate based on the severity of the noncompliance with sub. (2).

- **106.19** Trade adjustment assistance overpayment waiver. (1) On or before October 8, 1989, the department shall establish a policy for waiving recovery of overpayments made under the federal adjustment assistance for workers program under 19 USC 2272 to 2318.
- (2) The waiver policy shall require the department to grant a waiver if all of the following apply:
- (a) The overpayment was not the fault of the person who received it.
- (b) Requiring repayment would be contrary to equity and good conscience.
 - (3) The department shall do all of the following:
- (a) Notify all of the following persons of the waiver policy and the person's right to request a waiver:
- 1. A person from whom the department attempts to recover an overpayment made under 19 USC 2272 to 2318.
- 2. A person from whom the department is in the process of recovering an overpayment made under 19 USC 2272 to 2318.
- (b) Comply with the guidelines issued by the U.S. secretary of labor under 19 USC 2315 in connection with the waiver policy.
- (c) Establish the waiver policy by rule, using the procedure under s. 227.24.



106.20 Pilot Wisconsin job opportunity business subsidy program. (1) DEFINITIONS. In this section:

- (a) "Business" means any person engaged in a business enterprise for profit in this state.
- (c) "Eligible job applicant" means an individual who the department determines meets the requirements of s. 101.35 (9), 1991 stats.
- (cm) "Eligible unit of government" means a county described in s. 101.35 (2) (a), 1991 stats., or designated under s. 101.35 (2) (b), 1991 stats., or a unit of government designated under s. 101.35 (2) (d), 1991 stats.
- (d) "Local service agency" means an organization designated under s. 101.35 (3), 1991 stats.
- (e) "Minority business" has the meaning given in s. 16.287 (1) (e).
- (f) "Small business" has the meaning given in s. 227.485 (2) (c).
- (g) "Urban county" means a county located in a federal standard metropolitan statistical area.
- (h) "Wisconsin job opportunity business subsidy program" means the program administered under this section.
- (11) REPAYMENT. (a) If an eligible job applicant leaves the employ of a business that received funds to subsidize the wages of the eligible job applicant under s. 101.35 (5), 1991 stats., the business shall repay the following percentage of the funds:
- 1. If the eligible job applicant leaves while the position is subsidized, 70%.
- 2. If the eligible job applicant leaves less than 12 months after the subsidy ended, a percentage between 70% and 0%, decreasing proportionally to 0% 12 months after the subsidy has ended.
- 3. If the eligible job applicant leaves 12 months or more after the subsidy ended, 0%.
- (b) A business need not repay funds under par. (a) if the business replaces the departing eligible job applicant with another eligible job applicant who remains employed with the business for at least 12 months after the subsidy paid to the departing eligible job applicant would have ended.







The Office of Skills Development will actively engage Academic and Technical College Liaisons and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation during the review and audit process of awarding and reviewing grants.
