### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This is a preliminary draft. An analysis will be provided in a subsequent version of this draft.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 11 of the statutes is repealed and recreated to read:

CHAPTER 11

CAMPAIGN FINANCING

SUBCHAPTER I

GENERAL PROVISIONS

11,1000 Definitions. In this chapter:

(1) "Candidate" means an individual about whom any of the following applies:

(a) The individual takes any of the following affirmative actions to seek

1	1. Files nomination papers with the appropriate filing officer.
2	2. Is nominated as a candidate for state or local office by a caucus under s. 8.05
3	(1) or by a political party and the nomination is certified to the appropriate filing
4	officer.
(5)	3. (Subject to the registration requirements under s. 11.2003) receives a
6	contribution, makes a disbursement, or gives consent for another person to receive
7	a contribution or make a disbursement in order to bring about the individual's
8.	nomination or election to a state or local office.
	****Note: Do you want to permit an individual to accept contributions or make disbursements related to bringing about that individual's nomination to office before the individual has registered with the GAB? If not, it may make sense to eliminate reference to nomination in this particular provision.
9	(b) The individual holds a state or local office and is the subject of a recall
10	petition.
11	(c) The individual holds a state or local office, unless the individual is legally
12	prohibited from seeking reelection or files a declaration of noncandidacy.
13	(2) "Candidate committee" means a committee authorized by a candidate or a
14	candidate's agent to accept contributions or make expenditures in support of a
15	candidate's campaign.
16	(3) "Charitable organization" means any organization described in section 170
17	(c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code, and also includes the United States, any state,
18	territory or possession, and the District of Columbia; and any political subdivision
19	of any any state, territory, or possession; when a gift is made exclusively for public
20	purposes.
21	(4) "Candidate's agent" means an individual who acts under the direction of the

candidate regarding the conduct of the candidate's campaign and the operation of the

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1 .	candidate committee, but does not include an employee of a political party committee
2	or a legislative campaign committee that is not also an employee of the candidate.

- (5) "Committee" means a candidate committee, legislative campaign committee, political action committee, political party committee, recall committee, and referendum committee.
- (6) "Conduit" means a person other than an individual that receives a contribution of money, deposits the contribution in an account held by the conduit, and releases the contribution to a candidate committee, legislative campaign committee, or political party committee without exercising discretion as to the amount that is released and the committee to which the released contribution is made.
  - (7) (a) Except as provided in par. (b), "contribution" means any of the following:
  - 1. A gift, subscription, loan, advance, or transfer of money to a committee.
- 2. A transfer of tangible personal property or services to a committee valued at replacement value at the time of transfer.

\*\*\*\*Note: Following our meeting on April 6, this definition now uses "replacement value."

\*\*\*\*NOTE: I don't know that services described here are meaningfully distinguished from services that are not contributions, described in par. (b) 1. below. Is it a matter of the intent of the individual providing the services? If so, should that be made explicit?

- 3. A transfer of funds between committees.
- 4. The purchase of a ticket for a fundraising event for a committee regardless of whether the ticket is used to attend the event.
  - (b) "Contribution" does not include any of the following:
- 1. Services that an individual provides to a committee, if the individual is not specifically compensated for providing the services to the committee.

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2. Any unreimbursed travel expenses that an individual incurs to volunteer his 1 or her personal services to a committee. 2 3. The costs of preparing and transmitting personal correspondence. 3 4. Interest earned on an interest-bearing account. 4 5. Rebates or awards earned in connection with the use of a debit or credit card. 5 6. A loan from a commercial lending institution that the institution makes in 6 its ordinary course of business. 7 The reuse of surplus materials or the use of unused surplus materials 8 acquired in connection with a previous campaign for or against the same candidate, 9 political party, or recall if the materials were previously reported as a contribution 10 under s. 11.3000. 11 \*\*\*\*Note: This definition was modified in response to our discussion about "stakes". The version in the /P5 draft did not require the materials to have been reported as a contribution. Is this change appropriate? Also, did you intend that, in the case of a candidate's surplus materials, that only that same candidate could reuse or use the materials? Or, did you intend that the candidate could pass along the surplus materials to another candidate or to the candidate's political party? Under current law, the candidate or political party that reuses the materials must be the same as the candidate or party who first reported the materials as a contribution. 8. The cost of invitations, food, and beverages in connection with a fundraising 12 event held in a private residence on behalf of a candidate committee. 13 (8) "Corporation" includes a foreign limited liability company, as defined in s. 14 183.0102 (8) And a limited liability company, as defined in s. 183.0102 (10), if the 15 foreign limited liability company or the limited liability company elect to be treated 16 as a corporation by the federal internal revenue service, pursuant to 26 CFR 17

301.7701-3, or if the foreign limited liability company or the limited liability

(9) "Disbursement" means any of the following:

11	5. "Smith for (an elective office)".
12	6. "Vote against".

16	(b) Communications that are susceptible to no reasonable interpretation other
17	than as an appeal to vote for or against a clearly identified candidate for election or
18	nomination for election.
19	(11) "Filing officer" means the board or official as determined under s. 11.1001.
20	(12) "General election" means the election held in even-numbered years on the
21	Tuesday after the first Monday in November to elect United States senators,
22	representatives in congress, presidential electors, state senators, representatives to
23	the assembly, district attorneys, state officers other than the state superintendent
24	and judicial officers, and county officers other than supervisors and county

1	(13) "Independent expenditure" means an expenditure for express advocacy by
2	a person, if the expenditure is not made in coordination with a candidate, candidate
3	committee, candidate's agent, legislative campaign committee, or political party
4	committee, as prohibited under s. 11.10003.
5	(14) "Legislative campaign committee" means a committee organized in either
6	house of the legislature to support a candidate for legislative office.
	****NOTE: We eliminated "of a political party" from this definition; that phrase modified "candidates" in the /P8.
7	(15) "Major purpose" means a person's major purpose as specified in the
8	person's organizational documents or as indicated by the person.
9	(16) "Partisan primary" means the primary held the 2nd Tuesday in August
10	to nominate candidates to be voted for at the general election.
11	(17) "Partnership" means a partnership, as defined in s. 178.03, a foreign
12	limited partnership, as defined in s. 179.01 (4), and a limited partnership, as defined
13	in s. 179.01 (7).
14	(18) (a) Subject to par. (b), "political action committee" means an entity that
15	satisfies all of the following:
16	1. Has express advocacy as its major purpose.
17	2. Is organized by any person, other than an individual, or by any combination,
18	permanent or temporary, of 2 or more persons unrelated by marriage.
19	3. Makes or accepts contributions or makes expenditures to support or oppose
20	a candidate, a candidate committee, a legislative campaign committee, a political
21	party committee, or a recall committee.
22	(b) "Political action committee" does not include a candidate committee,

legislative campaign committee, political party committee, or recall committee.

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1	(19) "Political party committee" means a committee organized by a political
2	party that makes and accepts contributions and makes expenditures to support or
3	oppose a candidate for state or local office or to support or oppose a referendum held
4	in this state.
	****Note: In this /P9, we added "held in this state" to modify referendum.
5	(20) "Recall committee" means a means a committee formed for the purpose of
6	supporting or opposing the recall of an incumbent elective official.
	****NOTE: In this /P9, we added "holding a state or local office" to modify "elective official.
7	(21) "Referendum committee" means a committee that is organized by any
8	person, other than an individual, or by any combination, permanent or temporary,
9	of 2 or more persons unrelated by marriage that acts to support or oppose the
$\widehat{10}$	qualification passage or defeat of a referendum held in this state, but that does not
11	receive contributions or make expenditures or contributions for the purpose of
12	influencing or attempting to influence a candidate's nomination or election.
	****NOTE: In this /P9, we eliminated "referendum question" and replaced it with "referendum held in this state".
13	(22) "Special election" means any election, other than those described in subs.
14)	(12), $(16)$ , and $(22)$ , to fill vacancies or to conduct a referendum.
<b>15</b> .	(23) "Special primary" means the primary held 4 weeks before the special
16	election except when the special election is held on the same day as the general
17	election the special primary shall be held on the same day as the general primary or

if the special election is held concurrently with the spring election, the primary shall

be held concurrently with the spring primary.

1	(24) "Treasurer" means the individual who registers a committee with a filing
2	officer under subch. II and who makes reports on behalf of the committee under
3	subch. IV.
4	(25) "Spring election" means the election held on the first Tuesday in April to
5	elect judicial, educational, and municipal officers, nonpartisan county officers and
6	sewerage commissioners, and to express preferences for the person to be the
7	presidential candidate for each party in a year in which electors for president and
8 .	vice president are to be elected.
9	(26) "Spring primary" means the nonpartisan primary held on the 3rd Tuesday
10	in February to nominate nonpartisan candidates to be voted for at the spring

(2) (a) Except as provided in pars. (c) and (d), each committee that is required to register under this chapter shall annually pay a filing fee of \$100 to the board. The board may accept payment under this subsection by credit card, debit card, or other electronic payment mechanism, and may charge a surcharge to that committee to recover charges associated with the acceptance of that electronic payment.

\*\*\*\*Note: Do you want to limit the amount of the surcharge to the actual charges associated with the acceptance of the electronic payment?

- (b) Except as provided in s. 11.1003 (1), a committee that is subject to par. (a) shall pay the fee specified in par. (a) together with the report filed by that committee on the 15th day of the month of January in each year. If a committee that is subject to par. (a) registers under this chapter or changes status so that par. (a) becomes applicable to the committee during a calendar year, the committee shall pay the fee for that year with the filing of the committee's registration statement or at any time before the change in status becomes effective.
  - (c) Paragraph (a) does not apply to a candidate committee.
- (d) Paragraph (a) does not apply to any committee for any year during which the registrant does not make disbursements exceeding a total of \$2,500.
- 11.1002 Reporting; general. (1) REPORT MUST BE COMPLETE. (a) Each committee required to file a report under this chapter shall make a good faith effort to obtain all required information.
- (2) CONTRIBUTIONS; WHEN RECEIVED, WHEN REPORTED. (a) 1. A contribution is received by a candidate for purposes of this chapter when it is under the control of the candidate or the treasurer or agent of the candidate.

1	2. A contribution is received by a conduit or committee for purposes of this
2	chapter when it is under the control of the treasurer or agent of the conduit or
3	committee.
4	(b) Unless it is returned or donated within 30 days of receipt under par (a) a

- (b) Unless it is returned or donated within 30 days of receipt under par. (a), a contribution must be reported as received and accepted on the date received.
- (3) CONTENTS OF REPORT; FILING DATES; CERTIFICATION; SHORT FORM; CONTENTS. (a) The first report shall commence no later than the date that the first contribution is received and accepted. Reports filed under this chapter shall include all contributions received, disbursements and transactions made, and obligations incurred as of the end of:

\*\*\*\*Note: We added "disbursements and obligations" here.

- 1. The 15th day preceding the primary or election in the case of the preprimary and preelection report.
  - 2. The last day of the immediately preceding month in the case of a continuing report required under [multiple sections].
  - 3. Five days preceding the deadline for filing of the report in the case of the report required under [multiple sections].
  - 4. The 22nd day following the special election in the case of the postelection report required under [multiple sections].
  - (b) Each report shall be filed with the appropriate filing officer on the dates designated in this chapter.
    - (c) 1. Except as provided in subd. 2., the committee's treasurer shall certify to the correctness of each report filed under this chapter.
- 2. Either the candidate or the treasurer of the candidate's committee shall certify to the correctness of each report filed under this chapter.

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- (d) The board shall prescribe a simplified, short form for compliance with this section by a treasurer of a candidate, individual, or committee who has not engaged in any financial transaction since the last date included on the treasurer's preceding financial report.
- (4) PREPRIMARY AND PREELECTION REPORTS; TIMING; INACTIVITY. (a) 1. Preprimary and preelection reports required under this chapter shall be received by the appropriate filing officer no earlier than 14 days and no later than 8 days preceding the primary and the election.

\*\*\*\*Note: This subdivision duplicates current law.

2. In the event that any report is required to be filed under this section on a nonbusiness day, it may be filed on the next business day thereafter.

\*\*\*\*Note: This subdivision duplicates current law s. 11.20 (7).

(b) A contribution, disbursement, or obligation to support or oppose a candidate at a primary that is made, accepted, or incurred during the period covered by the preprimary report is considered to be made, accepted or incurred to support or oppose that candidate at the primary, regardless of whether the candidate is opposed at the primary.

\*\*\*\*NOTE: We added "disbursements and obligations" here.

\*\*\*\*NOTE: We removed "in support of or in opposition to" and replaced that phrase with "to support or oppose" here and in any other place this phrase appeared in the draft.

(c) A contribution, disbursement, or obligation to support or oppose a candidate at an election that is made, accepted, or incurred during the period covered by the preelection report is considered to be made, accepted, or incurred to support or oppose that candidate at the election, regardless of whether the candidate is opposed at the election.

(d) 1. a. Except as provided in subd. 2., a committee that makes, accepts, or incurs a contribution, disbursement, or obligation to support or oppose a candidate at a primary during the period covered by the preelection report, but does not engage in such activity during the period covered by the preprimary report, is not required to file a preprimary report.

b. Except as provided in subd. 2., a committee that makes, accepts, or incurs a contribution, disbursement, or obligation to support or oppose a candidate at an election during the period covered by the report that follows the preelection report, but does not engage in such activity during the period covered by the preelection report, is not required to file a preelection report.

2. A candidate committee that makes, accepts, or incurs a contribution, disbursement, or obligation to support or oppose a candidate at a primary during the period covered by the preprimary report shall file both the preprimary and preelection reports, regardless of whether the candidate committee engages in such activity during the period covered by the preelection report.

and termination reports; suspension reports. (1) (a) Any committee that does not anticipate accepting contributions, making disbursements or incurring obligations in an aggregate amount in excess of \$1,000 in a calendar year and does not anticipate accepting any contribution or contributions from a single source, other than contributions made by a candidate to his or her own campaign, exceeding \$100 in that year may indicate on its registration statement that the committee will not accept contributions, incur obligations, or make disbursements in the aggregate in excess of \$1,000 in any calendar year and will not accept any contribution or contributions from a single source, other than contributions made by a candidate to

his or her own campaign, exceeding \$100 in that year. Any committee making an 1 indication under this paragraph is not subject to any reporting requirement under 2 3, this subchapter if the statement is true. 4 (b) A committee that makes an indication under par. (a) is not required to file a termination report under sub. (2). 5 6 (c) The indication under par. (a) may be revoked. If the committee revokes the -committee: indication under par. (a), the candidate is subject to the reporting requirements under this subchapter as of the date of revocation, or the date that aggregate contributions, disbursements, or obligations for the calendar year exceed \$1,000. If 9 the revocation is not timely, the committee violates s. 11.10000. 10 \*\*\*\*NOTE: This reporting exemption is taken from current law s. 11.05 (2r). That section requires the committee, group, or individual to indicate inactivity on the registration statement. We retained that language in this draft. That begs two questions: 1. This draft is not clear: do you intend committees to file a new registration statement each year? If so, we should make that point clear. 2. Either way, do you want to tie the indication of inactivity to the registration statement? Or do you want to require the committee to file a statement of inactivity? \*\*\*\*NOTE: In the /P8, each subchapter (for each committee) contained a "general reporting exemption" for inactivity. Because the language was (mostly) identical in each such section, and because we are including the section governing dissolution of committees and termination reports in this subchapter, I eliminated the duplicative material and created one section here in Subchapter I (general provisions). \*\*\*\*NOTE: This section seems duplicative, to some extent, of s. 11.1004 (2), governing suspension reports (this appears at current law s. 11.19 (2)). Do you want to retain both provisions? 11 (2) (a) Whenever any committee dissolves or determines that obligations will 12 no longer be incurred, and contributions will no longer be received nor disbursements made during a calendar year, and the committee has no outstanding incurred 13 obligations, the committee shall file with the appropriate filing officer a termination 14 report that indicates a cash balance of zero at the end of the reporting period. 15

\*\*\*\*NOTE: I substituted the word dissolves for disbands in the first sentence of this subsection. Is there a reason that dissolves is not an appropriate term to use here?

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(b) The committee shall certify the termination report in the manner require	$\operatorname{red}$

that committee on its periodic reports.	

\*\*\*\*Note: Do you want to cross-reference the specific statutory sections requiring periodic reports (see, for example, s. 11.2003)?

- (c) The committee shall include in the termination report filed under this subsection the manner in which residual funds were disposed. Residual funds may be used for any political purpose not prohibited by law, returned to the donors in an amount not exceeding the original contribution, or donated to a charitable organization or the common school fund.
- (d) A committee to which s. 11.1001 (3) applies shall pay the fee imposed under that subsection with a termination report filed under this subsection.

(e) This subsection does not apply to any committee making an indication of inactivity under s. 11.1003.

- (3) (a) Notwithstanding sub. (2), any committee which determines that obligations will no longer be incurred, contributions will no longer be made or received or disbursements made during a calendar year in an aggregate amount of more than \$1,000 may file a suspension report with the appropriate filing officer.
- (c) Upon receipt of a properly executed report by a committee, the appropriate filing officer shall suspend the requirement imposed upon that committee by this chapter to file periodic reports. A suspension under this paragraph is effective only

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1	for the calendar year in which it is granted, unless the committee alters its status
2	before the end of such year or files a termination report under sub. (2).
3	(4) In no case may a candidate committee file a termination or suspension
4	report covering any period ending sooner than the date of the election in which the
5	candidate committee is participating.
6	(5) If a committee files a termination report under sub. (2) or a suspension
7	report under sub. (3) and within 60 days thereafter receives and accepts an
8	unanticipated contribution, the committee shall do one of the following within 60
9	days after receipt of the unanticipated contribution:

14	not intentional.
15	(b) Return the contribution to the contributor or donate the contribution to the
16	common school fund or to a charitable organization.
17	11.1004 Disbursements; form. Every disbursement which is made by a
18	committee registered under this chapter from the committee's depository account
19	shall be made by negotiable instrument.

SUBCHAPTER II

CANDIDATE COMMITTEES

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11.2000 Registration; treasurer and depositories. (1) Each candidate may either appoint a treasurer of his or her candidate committee to comply with the registration and reporting requirements under this subchapter or shall serve as the treasurer and comply with the registration and reporting requirements under this subchapter. If the candidate appoints a treasurer, the candidate and the candidate's treasurer shall cosign the registration statement of the candidate's committee.

- (2) The treasurer shall ensure that all funds received are deposited in the candidate committee depository account.
- (3) No disbursement may be made or obligation incurred by or on behalf of a candidate committee without the authorization of the treasurer or a designated agent.
- 11.2001 Registration; timing; candidate committee required. (1) Time OF REGISTRATION. (a) Every individual shall file a registration statement with the appropriate filing officer giving the information required under s. 11.2002 no later than the time he or she qualifies as a candidate under s. 11.1000 (1).
- (b) A candidate who receives no contributions and makes no disbursements shall file the registration statement as provided in this subsection, but need not designate a campaign depository account until the first contribution is received or disbursement made.
- (2) CANDIDATE COMMITTEE REQUIRED. (a) Except as provided in par. (b), no candidate may accept contributions or make expenditures except through a candidate committee registered under this subchapter.
- (b) A candidate does not violate this subsection by taking any of the following actions:

1. Accepting a contribution and making a disbursement in the amount required
to rent a postal box, or in the minimum amount required by a bank or trust company
to open a checking account, prior to the time of registration, if the disbursement is
properly reported on the first report submitted under s. 11.2003 after the date that
the candidate committee is registered, whenever a reporting requirement applies to
the candidate committee.

- 2. Accepting a contribution and making a disbursement required for the production of nomination papers.
- (c) Except as provided in par. (d), no candidate may establish more than one candidate committee. A candidate committee may have subcommittees provided that all subcommittees have the same treasurer and that treasurer is the candidate or candidate's campaign treasurer.
- (d) An individual who holds a state or local elective office may establish a second candidate committee under this subchapter for the purpose of pursuing a different state or local office.

\*\*\*\*Note: How long may an individual maintain two candidate committees?

\*\*\*\*Note: When must the candidate terminate the second candidate committee? Would the candidate simply follow the termination procedures under s. 11.1004 (1) and (4) or did you want to require the candidate to follow a different procedure?

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11.2002 Registration; required information. (1) REQUIRED INFORMATION.

The statement of registration shall include all of the following, where applicable:

- (a) The name and mailing address of the candidate committee.
- (b) The name and mailing address of the campaign treasurer and any other custodian of books and accounts. Unless otherwise directed by the treasurer on the registration form and except as otherwise provided in this chapter or any rule of the

- board, all mailings that are required by law or by rule of the board shall be sent to the treasurer at the treasurer's address indicated upon the form.
  - (c) In the case of a candidate committee of an independent candidate for partisan office or a candidate for nonpartisan county or municipal office, a list of the members of the committee, in addition to those specified in par. (b), if any, whom the filing officer shall recognize as eligible to fill a nomination vacancy if the candidate dies before the election.
  - (d) The name and address of the depository account of the candidate committee and of any other institution where funds of the committee are kept.
