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Description Invasions of privacy and providing a criminal penalty					

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under Senate Bill 452, the penalties and severity of the crime are strengthened for certain invasions of privacy. Since these invasions are already subject to fines and forfeitures, it is not expected that changes to this law would substantially increase revenue collected nor would it cause increased costs to be incurred.
