Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill allows legislators to request fewer than the 50 highway service maps currently required by statute and fewer than the 500 folded maps currently required by statute.

Laminated highway services maps cost \$1.33 each.

Folded highway maps cost 15 cents each.

The current cost per legislator is \$141.50 [66.50 (50 x \$1.33) for laminated maps; \$75 (500 x \$1.35) for folded maps], for 132 legislators the total cost is \$18,678, for the 72,600 maps.

This bill also eliminates the 300 folded maps currently mandated to be sent to the legislative bureau and the 1000 folded maps sent to state officers. $(1300 \times 1.15 = 195)$

By statute there is no charge for requests for additional folded maps.

The savings will be dependent upon the actual order.

The department places two orders for maps per biennium.

The first order placed is for one million maps. The legislative allotment is distributed from this order.

For the second order, the department coordinates with the Department of Tourism to determine the need beyond what in current inventory to cover the needs of the traveling public. The second order is typically 250,000. The second order may be reduced as a result of greater inventory should fewer maps be ordered by the Legislature.
