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Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Current law, with certain restrictions, makes most of individual state park properties open to hunting and trapping with proper licensing, permitting and other Department approvals, whereas the bill would prohibit those activities.

FISCAL EFFECT: The Department would incur minimal, one-time costs to comply with the provisions of the bill. These costs would include labor and supplies to update park signage related to hunting and trapping, and to remove hunting and trapping maps from our web site and mobile applications.
