Senator Fitzgerald Introduced Senator Lasee

"Senator Frank Lasee has represented the people of the 1st Senate District since 2011. Prior to his election to the senate in 2010, Senator Lasee served in the Assembly from 1995 to 2009, representing the 2nd Assembly District.

While in the Assembly, Senator Lasee earned a reputation as a Taxpayer Watch Dog and an outspoken fiscal conservative. He has continued that legacy in the Senate as the author and champion of numerous taxpayer protection proposals.

This session, Senator Lasee will chair the Committee on Insurance, Housing & Trade and serve as Vice Chair of the Committee on Natural Resources & Energy.

In the audience today is Frank's wife, Amy Joy."

Senator Shilling Introduced Senator Carpenter

"Senator Tim Carpenter represents the Third Senate District which covers the Southside of Milwaukee, West Milwaukee, and portions of West Allis and Greenfield.

Senator Carpenter is entering his fourth term in the State Senate. Tim is a lifelong resident of his district. He graduated from the Milwaukee Public School system. He earned a Bachelor's degree from UW - Milwaukee in Political Science & History and a Master's degree from the La Follette School of Public Administration and Public Policy.

Tim was first elected to the State Assembly in 1984 where he served nine terms. Counting years served in both the Assembly and Senate, Tim is now the 3rd longest serving Wisconsin State Legislator in the Senate, following Sen. Rob Cowles – who was first elected to the Assembly in 1982 – and Sen. Fred Risser – who was first elected to the Assembly in 1956. Tim wants to thank Sen. Risser for 58 years of public service.

Tim serves as ranking Democratic member of both the Senate Committee on Transportation and Veterans Affairs Senate and the Committee on Health and Human Services. Tim has enjoyed previously working on bipartisan legislation with the chairs of both committees, Sen. Jerry Petrowski and Sen. Leah Vukmir, respectively, and looks forward to productive committees this year as well."

Senator Fitzgerald Introduced Senator Vukmir

"This will be Senator Leah Vukmir's second term representing Wisconsin's 5th Senate District. A lifelong district resident, she previously served in the Assembly from 2003 to 2011.

Before her election to the Assembly, Senator Vukmir worked as a Registered Nurse and Certified Pediatric Nurse Practitioner. She brought her medical expertise and long record as a champion for children's health to the legislature, where she has been a leader in healthcare and education policy.

This session, Senator Vukmir will continue her work on healthcare issues as Chair of the Committee on Health and Human Services. She will also have the honor of joining the Joint Committee on Finance and will serve as Vice Chair of the Judiciary and Public Safety Committee.

Senator Vukmir would like to recognize her two children who are unable to be in attendance today: Elena who lives and works in New York City, and Nicholas who was just commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army—stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia."

Senator Shilling Introduced Senator Larson

"Senator Chris Larson represents the Seventh Senate District which includes communities on the eastern edge of Milwaukee County. This is an area that embodies Wisconsin's greatest values and traditions, including: higher education with UW-Milwaukee, Milwaukee Area Technical College, and Milwaukee School of Engineering; commerce and economic development with our state's premier airport, the Port of Milwaukee, and Downtown Milwaukee; artistic expression with the Milwaukee Art Museum; natural resources with the county park system near Lake Michigan; and cultural diversity with ethnic festivals at the Summerfest Grounds.

Senator Larson won his first re-election campaign to the State Senate this past November. In his first four years in the Senate, Senator Larson focused on strengthening public education and public transit, and supporting increased access to healthcare for all of Wisconsin's citizens. Senator Fitzgerald Introduced Senator LeMahieu

"Senator-elect Devin LeMahieu joins the legislature for the first time this session, representing the 9th Senate District. An Oostburg native and small business owner, Senator-elect LeMahieu has a long record of serving his community as a member of the Sheboygan County Board, Oostburg Chamber of Commerce, Oostburg Kiwanis Club, and more.

He brings his local government experience to the Senate this session as Chair of the Committee on Elections & Local Government, as well as Co-chair of the Joint Survey Committee on Tax Exemptions.

"Senator-elect Steve Nass joins the senate this year after a long career in the Assembly, where he served from 1991 to 2015. A Whitewater Native and veteran of the Wisconsin Air National Guard, Senator-elect Nass served in the Middle East in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. In the assembly, Senator-elect Nass won a reputation for his work on higher education issues as Chair of the Committee on Colleges and Universities.

He brings his long record of leadership to the Senate this session, where he will serve as Chair of the Committee on Labor and Government Reform, Co-chair of the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules, and Vice Chair of the Committee on Universities and Technical Colleges.

Senator Nass would like to welcome his daughter Ashleigh and her husband Steve Nordin, as well as Sheila Reiff, the Walworth County Clerk of Circuit Courts and future wife of Senator Nass.

The next two gentlemen joining Senator Nass today served with him in the 128th Air Refueling Wing during wartime and peacetime: Master Sergeant Dan Lewis and his wife Alice, and Senior Master Sergeant Ross Otto. Due to health issues, Korean War combat veteran Robert Gertsch was unable to attend. Master Sergeant Lewis, Senior Master Sergeant Otto, Sergeant Gertsch, and Chief Master Sergeant and Senator Nass --- thank you for your service to our nation and the great state of Wisconsin.

Also joining Senator Nass are guests from Jefferson County -Jim Schildbach and his wife Ellen, and Lee Pitzner and his wife Dianna."

Senator Shilling Introduced Senator Ringhand

"Senator Janis Ringhand represents the 15th Senate District which includes parts of Green, Dane, Rock, Walworth and Jefferson Counties. Senator Ringhand is entering her first term in the Wisconsin State Senate and previously served two terms in the Wisconsin State Assembly. Prior to that, she served as Evansville Mayor and Alderwoman.

In addition to owning her own business of making and selling her homemade beer mustard, for just over 17 years, she helped run the family small business, Ringhand Meat and Beverage in Evansville. our work during session possible, all of our work do to the people's business, our guests today.

Next, I want to make mention of the important people in my life, my family. My husband, Glenn, assisting his 94 year old father, Emil Lazich; a World War II veteran, a very important person in our life. My son Glenn and his wife Dana, and Autumn, Grayson, and Macie, their children, here today. My daughter Bernadine with her husband, John, here today. My daughter Rhonda, hopefully watching on Wisconsin Eye, because she is with her four daughters Kaytlyn, Mady, Ashley, Caroline, and her husband, Steve, stationed with the United States Navy. Family play important roles and make tremendous contributions to our success. I also mention guests here today, Howard and Georgene Fletcher, and Dave and Rick Meister. Thank you for joining

Next, and importantly, I am tremendously honored by the faith and trust placed in me by my colleagues to preside over this body. Within the Senate, the expectation is debate will be robust and orderly. My job as President is to ensure everyone is heard and the agenda is completed. I will do my best to be fair and uphold the dignity of this body.

I spoke with our dear friend Senator Alberta Darling this morning. She sends her very best wishes to everyone here today and misses us all tremendously. Please keep Bill, her husband, and Alberta and their family in your thoughts and prayers.

For the first 131 years of its history, the Wisconsin State Senate relied on the Lieutenant Governor and President Pro Tempore to preside over our debate. In the 36 years since the office of President of the Senate was created, there have been four other senators that served in the capacity. Senator Brian Rude, was our first Senate President, Senator Alan Lasee, Senator Mike Ellis, and sitting with us today Senator Fred Risser all served as Senate Presidents bringing dignity and honor to this body. As the first woman to hold this office, I plan to follow in their footsteps and their examples by leading the Senate in fair, open debates. And I look forward to all of your support to make that happen.

Your constituents have entrusted you with the great privilege and responsibility of representing their interests here in Wisconsin's statehouse, and I look forward to working with each and every member of this body, new and returning.

Over the most recent legislative sessions, we have conducted the difficult work of repairing our state. We balanced the budget, eliminated the deficit, and created a surplus. We shored up Wisconsin's Rainy Day fund to the largest balance in state history, reduced unemployment to the lowest level in six years, and put over \$2 billion back into the pockets of Wisconsin's taxpayers. We have worked to ensure that Wisconsin is moving forward—continually becoming a better place for workers, taxpayers, and businesses.

She helped to lay the groundwork for future black elected officials, through mentorship, guidance, and political support. Her tireless work at the city, county, state and national levels assisted in highlighting that African American contributions should be valued and supported. Polly was a devoted wife and mother; her children were her greatest priority, and she worked tirelessly to ensure that they would have a better life. Annette Polly Williams passed away last November in Milwaukee at the age of seventy-seven.

Senator Taylor, with unanimous consent, asked that when the Senate adjourns, it do so in honor of the career and memory of the late Geneva McGee-Harris. Geneva McGee-Harris, who was a lifelong Milwaukee resident and fully immersed herself in service to the community, understood the impact of segregationist laws on the quality of black life in every social indicator from civil rights to healthcare. Geneva had a close relationship with God, to direct her purpose in life, raise her four children, and equip her with the strength and resolve to be a voice and change agent for those in need or impaired by what she viewed as one of the greatest barriers to a quality life, access to health services. Geneva was inspired by the Black Panther Party and worked to improve health outcomes by opening "The Peoples' Free Health Clinic," in 1970 and some forty-five years later, now known as the Isaac Coggs Health Center, is still standing. Geneva's life work included co-founding and directing the Prescription Advocacy Referral Service and advocating for issues impacting the elderly. She married Hesakiah Harris in 2001 and continued serving others through her work at Mercy Missionary Baptist Church and has left a personal and family legacy of leadership and civic engagement. Geneva McGee-Harris passed away on December 30, 2014 in Milwaukee at the age of seventy-nine.

Senator Taylor, with unanimous consent, asked that when the Senate adjourns, it do so in honor of the late Dontre Hamilton. Last April, Dontre was shot in Red Arrow Park in Milwaukee. Dontre was sleeping on a park bench when he was awoken by an officer. After an improper pat down and physical altercation began, it ended with Dontre being shot 14 times. At the end of last year, the DA decided not to charge the officer involved in the death of Dontre. This news came at a time when nationally we were seeing, and continue to see, cases of black men being killed by police, with no justice. Dontre was not breaking the law and had a history of mental illness. His story highlights so many of the challenges that our state faces. Sky high black unemployment, the last of mental health services, and a mistrust in minority communities and government officials. Senator Taylor would like to adjourn today in the hopes that we reevaluate diversity and cultural training given to officers, in the hopes that communities come together to work on better strategies for police-community relations, in the hopes that mental health training is a requirement for all officers, and in the hopes that no individual is needlessly gunned down in our state again.

You have asked for the last day on which the Legislature may act to ensure that a proposed constitutional amendment can be placed on the ballot for the April 7, 2015 spring election. The Legislature must complete action on a proposed constitutional amendment no later than Tuesday, January 27, 2015.

By statute, all proposed constitutional amendments and any other measure or questions that is to be submitted to a vote of the people shall be filed with the official or agency responsible for preparing the ballots for the election no later than 70 days before the election at which the amendment, measure, or question will appear on the ballot. Wis. Stat. §8.37. Tuesday, January 27, 2015 is 70 days before the April 7, 2015 spring election.

In order for the legislative action to be filed in our office, it is sufficient for the chief clerks to notify our office by e-mail no later than Tuesday, January 27, 2015 that the Legislature passed the resolution. It is not necessary that we received the signed resolution by the close of business on Tuesday, January 27, 2015.

In order to facilitate preparation for the April 2015 spring election, I suggest sponsoring legislators contact the office of the Attorney General to make arrangements for the preparation of the explanatory statement required by Wis. Stat. §10.01 (2)(c). The explanatory statement is published in the paper by the county clerk immediately before the election. It is also posted at the polling place on Election Day.

Please make the appropriate arrangements to ensure that this information is communicated to the members of the Legislature. The Board Finds:

1. Marek & Stella Szymanski of Lake Delton, Wisconsin claim \$26,610.77 for lost income and property damage caused by flooding and road closures allegedly related to a DOT road project in Wisconsin Dells. The second phase of the project took place from March to July 2013. This phase completed the westbound lanes of USH 12, the east Frontage Road (FR) and other connections to USH 12. The claimants' restaurant and motel are located on the west side of the FR. The claimants state that they had to close their restaurant due for 12 days due flooding on 6/13/13 and again for 8 days due to additional flooding on 6/25/13.

The claimants allege that DOT miscalculated the potential stormwater runoff from the hill on the east side of the FR. They state that the project removed the drainage ditch formerly on the east side of the FR, so that stormwater no longer ran down the ditch, but instead crossed the FR and came onto their property. The claimants state that during construction, DOT completely blocked off the only catch basin and the storm sewer on the east side of the FR, which should have been left open to catch stormwater runoff. The claimants state that prior to the project, there were no curb/gutters on the west side of the FR. The project design included adding curb/gutters on the west side of the FR, so the claimants requested a curb cutout on their property so they could maintain street access for deliveries and moving dumpsters. The claimants point to the fact that they are not engineers and, because they were unaware of DOT's project design errors, could not have anticipated this cutout would increase the risk of flooding on their property.

From June 12-13, 2013, the Wisconsin Dells area received 3.2 inches of rain and the claimants' restaurant and the basement of their motel flooded. The claimants allege that sound engineering and construction practices would have accommodated this rainfall but that because DOT had covered up access to the drainage system, their property was damaged. The claimants point to the fact that after the flooding, DOT took multiple steps to correct the problem, including paying to clean the restaurant and replace flooring and damaged equipment, installing an additional catch basin and a drainage ditch on the west side of the FR, and replacing the curb cutout on the claimants' property with curb/gutter and an elevated concrete pad to accommodate the claimants' dumpsters. The claimants have not pursued a claim against the project contractor because they believe it was DOT's project design errors that caused the flooding problem.

The claimants dispute DOT's assertion that its employees observed no flooding or damage in the motel basement. The claimants state that two DOT employees inspected the motel basement and took pictures of the water and property damage

there. The claimants note that DOT has failed to provide copies of these pictures. The claimants also state DOT's allegation that the claimants never mentioned the loss of food/perishables in the restaurant is false and its analysis of how the loss occurred inaccurate. The claimants state that the cleaning company hired by DOT to clean the restaurant installed large fans with heating units to dry the space. Unbeknownst to the claimants, the fans/heaters were improperly calibrated by the cleaners and left on overnight. When the claimants returned the next morning, the heat in the restaurant was so high that the refrigerator/freezer unit broke down and the contents were lost. The claimants note that DOT paid to replace the broken fridge/freezer unit. The claimants believe it is ridiculous for DOT to accept fault for damage of the unit but not the contents therein. The claimants also state that a DOT employee took pictures of the food that was lost but again, DOT has failed to provide those pictures.

The claimants state that DOT's assertion that it reached some type of settlement/compromise with the claimants is false. The claimants point to the fact that DOT has provided no written documentation which shows that the initial repair and clean-up costs paid by DOT constituted a settlement of claim.

The claimants also request compensation for lost profits from May 2013, during which time they allege access to their property was severely limited by the construction project. The claimants discussed the lack of access with the contractor and steps were eventually taken to cure the entrance problems, but not before the business had been closed for 11 days due to lack of access.

The claimants state that they were unaware of the 120-day limit for filing a claim with DOT for additional damages. The claimants requested the necessary forms from DOT in September and received the forms approximately two-weeks before the expiration of the 120-day time limit. The claimants state that their claim to DOT was submitted late because they were unaware of the 120-day deadline and because it took more than two weeks to gather documentation to support their claim for the additional damages.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT denies that there were errors calculating the stormwater runoff and states that the project was reasonably designed and executed to handle historically average rainfall events. DOT states that, contrary to the claimants' assertions, the project had appropriate stormwater drainage and that access to the catch basin and storm sewer was never intentionally blocked. DOT states that, per DNR requirements, the contractor installed silt fencing to reduce the amount of fine material entering waterways but that during the unusually heavy rain event of June 12-13, the silt fencing became plugged. DOT notes that historically, the area receives an average rainfall of 4.69 inches for the entire month of June, therefore, the 3.2 inches that fell in the 24 hours prior to the flooding was an unanticipated amount of rain.

DOT does not dispute that the claimants' restaurant was flooded after this heavy rain event. DOT points to the fact that, despite the department's immunity protection, project staff agreed to assist the claimants with cleanup of the restaurant and replacement of damaged equipment. DOT states this was done as a goodwill effort to assist the

claimants' neighborhood business. DOT notes that the cost for these repairs and replacements was \$66,900.14. DOT states that this money was paid from road-project funds and did not go through the risk management process. DOT therefore believes the claimants have already been adequately compensated for their flooding-related losses. DOT believes the claimants' allegations of lost profits due to flooding have not been adequately documented.

DOT states that two DOT employees toured the property and found no similar flooding damage at the claimants' motel. DOT believes the claim for lost food/perishable items at the restaurant should be denied because it was the claimants' responsibility to ensure their freezers were working properly during the cleanup.

DOT also alleges that the claimants share some responsibility for the flooding because they requested DOT alter the original curb/gutter design on the west side of the FR to include a curb cutout. DOT states that if this cutout had not been added, the curb would have kept water away from the claimants' property and the flooding would not have occurred.

Finally, DOT believes the claimants have not proven their claim of lost profits due to restricted property access during the construction project. DOT states that any road project has an impact on traffic flow, but that access to the claimants' property was not completely closed at any point in the project.

DOT believes there was no negligence on the part of any DOT employee or contractor during this project and that the claimants have been reasonably compensated for appropriately documented damages caused by the June 13 flooding event. DOT states that the claimants' claim to DOT for additional damages was denied by DOT Risk Management because it was received after the 120-day limit for filing a claim had expired.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$10,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board finds that the claimants have shown negligence on the part of DOT and that DOT's failure to follow appropriate internal policies and risk management protocols exacerbated the issues surrounding this claim. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation § 20.395(9)(qh), Stats.

2. David Albino of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$\$3,748.97 for reimbursement of GI Bill tuition amount awarded by VA but later required to be paid back by claimant, allegedly due to UW's mistaken interpretation of federal and state law.

Claimant is a student at UW-Madison and is eligible for non-veteran Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits due to his father's military service. The claimant is also employed as a TA at UW. UW sent the claimant's information, including the cost of full tuition, to the VA for calculation of his GI Bill benefits for the fall 2013 semester. The VA remitted a benefit of \$3,965.22. From this amount, the claimant paid the \$565.04 balance he owed for segregated fees after his TA tuition remission reduced his fall 2013 tuition and fees to that amount. UW refunded to the claimant the remaining

\$3,400.18 on 9/9/13. The claimant used the refunded money to pay various living expenses.

In January 2014, UW contacted the claimant and told him they had erred in sending the full tuition amount to the VA and that they were resubmitting his tuition amount to the VA with his TA tuition remission subtracted from the full tuition. The VA responded with a corrected benefit amount of \$377.90 based on the information submitted by UW. UW told the claimant he had to reimburse the UW for the \$3,587.32 "overpayment" for his tuition. The claimant was required to reimburse UW before he could register for the spring 2014 semester. Because the money had already been spent, he took out a loan to cover the cost.

The claimant disputes UW's assertion that the TA tuition remission constituted a "tuition waiver" specifically designated for the sole purpose of defraying tuition and fees. The claimant notes that nowhere in state statute is the purpose of the TA tuition remission defined in this manner. The claimant states that the tuition remission is part of a TA's compensation package and, therefore, its sole purpose is not the defraying of tuition and fees. In support of this position, the claimant points to Negotiating Note No. 6 of the Agreement between UW and the Teaching Assistants' Association in existence prior to 2011 WI Act 10, which states: "[c]onsistent with legislative intent, the remission will achieve equity with counterparts at our peer institutions and will eliminate a serious impediment at UW Madison to attracting the highest quality graduate students. The contract terms, reflecting that legislative intent, establish a level of reasonable compensation and other benefits which were derived from comparisons with our peer institutions."

The claimant points to federal IRS regulations, which consider tuition reductions provided to an employee to be a form of compensation. The claimant notes that the only reason the IRS considers such compensation non-taxable is because graduate level tuition remission compensation is specifically exempted from taxable income under Chapter 26 U.S.C. § 117 as a "qualified scholarship." The claimant states that, despite this exemption, the IRS considers tuition remission as compensation. The claimant believes UW is deliberately ignoring federal law when making its argument. The claimant alleges that the UW has not contacted the VA to inquire as to whether the UW is correctly interpreting federal rules regarding this matter.

The claimant states that educational assistance under the Post-9/11 GI Bill (38 U.S.C. § 3313) is net of any tuition remission specifically designated for the sole purpose of defraying tuition and fees, which is clearly not the sole purpose of the TA remission. The claimant points to the fact that the VA pays full tuition benefits even when tuition is paid by Title IV funds (such as Pell grants or loans), scholarships, or other aid that is not designated specifically for the sole purpose of defraying tuition and fees. The claimant notes that under UW's definition of tuition remission, these funding sources would also be reportable as additional non-GI Bill funds even though the statute specifically excludes such funding from consideration.

Finally, the claimant states that this is not a matter of "simple overpayment" as alleged by UW. The claimant states that UW adjusted the tuition amount submitted to the VA in

error and that this error created a debt between UW and the VA. The claimant believes UW had no authority to transfer that debt—created by UW's own error—to the claimant.

UW recommends denial of this claim. UW states there is no merit to the claimant's argument that the TA tuition remission constitutes wages. UW states that TAs receive a separate stipend (the amount of which is determined based on a comparison of stipends at peer institutions) for their services, which constitutes their taxable wage. UW states that a separate state statute requires the university to also remit tuition for TAs in certain circumstances, but does not identify that remission as "wages." UW notes that it makes tuition remission available to other graduate assistants (such as research assistants) who are not considered UW employees. UW states that the sole purpose of this tuition waiver is defraying tuition and fees.

UW notes that, under IRS regulations, the tuition remission is considered a form of scholarship and therefore TAs are not taxed on the value of their tuition remission. UW states that it is not ignoring federal law but rather following the requirements of the IRS and other statutory regulations.

UW points to the fact that under the Post-9/11 GI Bill, the claimant received three awards, one for housing, one for books, and the amount disputed in this claim for tuition. UW states that it appears the claimant inappropriately spent his tuition benefit award on non-tuition related expenses such as housing and bills.

UW states that the tuition waiver provided to the claimant meets the definition under Section 103 of the Veterans Educational Assistance Improvements Act of 2010 for "waivers, scholarship, aid, or assistance provided directly to the institution and specifically designated for the sole purpose of defraying tuition and fees." Therefore, the amount of the tuition waiver needed to be reported to the VA for proper calculation of the claimant's VA benefit. UW states that the initial application for benefits included the full amount of tuition in error and that pursuant to federal regulations; UW was required to submit the corrected amount as soon as the error was discovered. UW notes that, although it is quite rare that corrections are necessary for students receiving Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits, it does occasionally happen. For example, if a student adds or drops a class, has a change in residency status, withdraws from UW, or has a change in other tuition restricted funds, UW is required to submit an adjusted benefit application to the VA.

UW believes that this is a simple case of overpayment and that, regardless of whether an overpayment is made to a student or an employee, that individual is not entitled to keep the funds. UW believes that the claimant's position—that he is entitled to receive both a tuition waiver from UW as well as funding from the VA to pay tuition—is untenable and would result in double dipping, which is neither logical nor allowed by the VA. UW notes that it has consulted with the VA regarding the issues involved in this claim because they have been raised in prior instances. Finally, UW states that because the claimant was the recipient of a benefit to which he was not legally entitled, the claimant is responsible for reimbursing that amount to the university. To require UW to bear this expense would unjustly enrich the claimant at the expense of other students and state taxpayers.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

3. Maxwell Verkuilen of Appleton, Wisconsin claims \$450,000.00 for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to \$775.05, Wis. Stats. The claimant requests \$450,000.00 for three years of wrongful imprisonment.

The claimant states that on 6/10/02, he was at a bar with friends in Appleton, WI, when Erin Schubert introduced herself. He states that when he left the bar in the early morning hours of 6/11/02, Ms. Schubert followed him from the bar and asked him for a ride. He states that during this conversation, Ms. Schubert twice lifted her skirt above her waist. After further discussion, the claimant brought Ms. Schubert to his residence—a room he rented from his sister and her husband. The clamant states that he and Ms. Schubert engaged in consensual sexual intercourse and then slept. The claimant states that after waking that morning, Ms. Schubert declined an invitation from the claimant's sister to stay for breakfast and gave the claimant her phone number.

On 6/12/02, the claimant was arrested and charged with two counts of 3rd degree sexual assault. Because of his arrest, a previous sentence that had been stayed was revoked and converted to nine months in jail. The claimant was therefore incarcerated from the time of his arrest until his case was overturned in February 2007. The claimant's father hired a private attorney but after his father's unexpected death, the claimant requested and received a public defender, Attorney John Norby. The claimant was found guilty on both counts of sexual assault and on 2/23/04 was sentenced to 3 years in prison and 6 years extended supervision for count 1, and 4 years in prison and 6 years extended supervision for count 2 (concurrent).

During the trial, the prosecution presented expert witness testimony from a trained Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE), who had examined the victim. The SANE nurse testified that the results of her examination showed the sex was non-consensual. The claimant states that Attorney Norby failed to call any witnesses to rebut the SANE nurse's testimony. He states that Norby also failed to call as witnesses the claimant's friends who were present at the bar where he met Ms. Schubert, and his sister and brother-in-law, who were home when the assault allegedly took place.

The claimant appealed his conviction and on 2/27/07 the Court of Appeals overturned the verdict and remanded the case back to the state. The Court of Appeals found that Attorney Norby's failure to call an expert to rebut the testimony of the SANE nurse "effectively stripped Verkuilen of any defense" and "essentially allowed the State to scientifically 'prove' its complaining witness was telling the truth." The claimant notes that ineffective assistance of counsel was the first of nine issues he raised in his appeal and that because the Court of Appeals found in his favor on this first issue, the court did not review the other eight issues.

When the case was remanded for a new trial, the Circuit Court granted a motion requiring Ms. Schubert to sign releases for her medical and mental health records but she refused to do so, which barred her testimony at trial. The state dismissed the charges against the claimant on 8/20/07.

On 11/5/08 the claimant commenced a civil action against Attorney Norby. On 2/3/10, the jury returned a special verdict finding by a preponderance of the evidence that the claimant was not guilty of the underlying crime and that Mr. Norby was guilty of legal malpractice. The claimant states that, contrary to the assertions of the Outagamie County DA's Office, the civil jury did not rely on the DA's dismissal of the charges in order to find the claimant not guilty of the crime that dismissal was not presented or discussed in the civil case. In fact, unlike the criminal trial, the civil jury heard testimony from two expert witnesses rebutting the testimony of the state's SANE nurse. The claimant notes that one of these rebuttal witnesses was another SANE nurse who had examined Ms. Schubert three days after the alleged assault and found no evidence of sexual assault. They also heard testimony from the individuals present with the claimant at the bar where he interacted with Ms. Schubert, the claimant's brother-in-law, who was present in the residence where the alleged crime took place, and the claimant's sister, who was both present in the residence where the alleged crime took place and who spoke with Ms. Schubert on the morning of 6/11/02, after the alleged assault.

The civil jury awarded a judgment of \$700,000 to the claimant. The court reduced that judgment to \$456,191.50, based on the jury's assignment of 35% causal negligence to the claimant. The claimant states that, contrary to the Outagamie County DA's Office's statement that this partial assignment of negligence weakens his claim of innocence, the apportionment of negligence in a civil claim is based upon a determination that both parties failed to exercise ordinary care. In other words, the civil jury determined that the claimant was partially negligent because, having seen Mr. Norby's failure to present adequate witnesses, the claimant failed to force a more reasonable presentation of his case. The claimant believes that even this partial assignment of negligence puts too large a burden on him, given that he was incarcerated from his arrest throughout the criminal trial, had no legal training, and had never previously been tried for a crime. The claimant states that it was not until after his conviction that he had any reason to believe Mr. Norby had acted inadequately in presenting his defense.

The claimant states that Attorney Norby did not have malpractice insurance and believes the Public Defender's Office should not have allowed Mr. Norby to represent him without that insurance. The claimant states that Mr. Norby declared bankruptcy and the claimant's civil judgment was extinguished in 2010 without payment by Mr. Norby.

The claimant has based the amount of this claim on the amount approved by the court in the civil case and requests reimbursement of \$450,000.00. The claimant states that at the time he was arrested, he had been working for a construction company for over 10 years and had risen to the level of foreman. He states he earned approximately \$50,000 per year, including unemployment compensation paid during the winter months. The claimant states that after his release from prison, it was very difficult to find housing and employment and that he is still owes money to family members for loans incurred for his defense. Finally, the

claimant states that his wrongful imprisonment was a traumatic experience and destroyed his relationships with several friends and family members. He requests reimbursement in the amount of \$450,000.00.

The Outagamie County DA's Office (DA) recommends denial of this claim. The DA states that the claimant's conviction was overturned for ineffective assistance of counsel, he was not exonerated. The DA points to the claimant's failure to provide DNA or other evidence which would truly serve to exonerate him. The DA notes that §775.05, Stats., requires the claimant to prove "he was innocent of the crime by clear and convincing evidence and that he did not, by his act or failure to act, contribute to the conviction and imprisonment." The DA does not believe the clamant has met his burden to provide clear and convincing evidence of innocence.

The DA states that a civil trial is very different than a criminal trial and has a much lower standard of proof. The DA also notes that the civil action was against Mr. Norby, not the state. Because the state was not a party to this action, no one from the DA's office testified at the civil trial or had any control over the manner in which evidence was presented. The DA presumes the civil jury relied upon the court's dismissal order when it found the claimant did not commit the offenses for which he was convicted. The DA notes that the civil verdict, specifically question three of the special verdict, does not constitute a finding of innocence, an exoneration, or a "not guilty" verdict. The DA further believes that the fact that the civil jury assigned 35% negligence to the clamant suggests that the claimant contributed to his own conviction and imprisonment. The DA states that when the case was remanded for a new trial, the Circuit Court ordered Ms. Schubert to sign releases for her medical and mental health records prior to the date of the offense. Ms. Schubert did not want to share this extremely private information and go through the jury trial process again and was satisfied that the claimant had served a considerable portion of his sentence. Therefore, after careful consideration, Ms. Schubert decided not to sign the release for her records, which barred her testimony at trial. Based on Ms. Schubert's inability to testify, the DA dismissed the charges against the claimant. The DA has every confidence that had Ms. Schubert signed the release and the case continued to trial a second time, the claimant would have been found guilty again.

Based on the written and testimonial evidence in this case, the Board concludes Mr. Verkuilen should be awarded compensation for three-years and one month wrongful imprisonment. The Board notes the unique circumstances of this case, in which a post-conviction civil jury found Mr. Verkuilen did not commit the offenses. In determining the specific amount of compensation, the Board notes that § 775.05, Stats., provides for innocent convict compensation in an "amount which will equitably compensate the petitioner, not to exceed \$25,000 and at a rate of compensation not greater than \$5,000 per year for the imprisonment. The Board concludes that equitable principles justify an award in the amount of \$15,416.76 to compensate Mr. Verkuilen for his three-year and one month imprisonment. In addition, the Board concludes that the compensation should include

\$9,600 for Mr. Verkuilen's post-conviction legal fees challenging his original conviction. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., that the total award of \$25,016.76 should be made from the Claims Board appropriation § 20.505.(4)(d), Stats.

4. Canadian Pacific Railway of Minneapolis, Minnesota claims \$500,715.13 for expenses incurred in 2009 and 2010 as part of the High Speed Rail project. The claimant states than beginning in early 2009, it expended substantial resources assisting DOT with an application for a Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) grant for high speed passenger rail service between Milwaukee and Madison. The claimant states that it is primarily a freight carrier and would not have undertaken this project on its own behalf and only did so at the insistence of then Governor Doyle, DOT, and the US Secretary of Transportation. The claimant states that DOT pushed to complete three-way negotiations between DOT, Amtrak, and the claimant prior to the 2010 election and that these negotiations resulted in the preliminary design documents and executed primary agreements necessary to fulfill the requirements of the FRA grant. The claimant states that in early December 2010, DOT abruptly terminated work on the contract. The claimant states that it invested substantial resources based on an oral contract with the state and that DOT assured the claimant it would be paid for its work. The claimant notes that neither the statute authorizing the project, nor Wisconsin law requires a formal, written contract. The claimant also believes it is entitled to reimbursement under the principle of equitable estoppel. The claimant believes its claim can be distinguished from that of WI & Southern Railroad (5/31/13 Claims Board meeting) by the fact that the claimant never had the opportunity to enter into a written contract with DOT, while WSOR did. WSOR's claim was limited to expenses it had incurred before entering into a written contract with DOT and WSOR could have addressed those expenses when negotiating the written contract. The claimant had no such written contract with DOT and therefore the claimant was unable to expressly contract for any of the expenses it incurred. The claimant states that its only agreement with DOT was the oral agreement evidenced by the project documentation and the claimant's successful completion of the duties requested by DOT. The claimant states that it "provided valuable services to the State... at the request of the State, for the benefit of the State and with the knowledge of the State." The claimant believes there are no grounds for the state to decline payment for those services.

DOT states that it has no statutory authority or obligated funds to pay this claim. DOT points to the fact that there is no written contract with the claimant. DOT also disagrees with the claimant's assertion that it had an oral contract with DOT. DOT states that a contract (written or implied) is based on a meeting of the minds and that the record shows that the state and the claimant never had such a meeting of the minds relating to the payment of the services that are the subject of this claim. DOT points to the fact that several of the documents provided by the claimant as proof of an implied contract do not authorize payment of the services claimed. Although the claimant has documented its involvement in the passenger rail project, the project was not pursued and the federal grant that was to pay for the project was withdrawn.

DOT notes that state law does allow for direct payment of invoices for occasional purchases but a written contract is required for a project such as this one. DOT states that although the "Direct Pay" memo referenced by the claimants was proposed for approval by the Secretary, DOT Legal recommended the memo not be signed because direct payment was not authorized by state law in this case. When the project was canceled, DOT did submit the claimant's expenses to the FRA for payment, however, payment was denied because the claimant had no contract with DOT. DOT states that, in view of the emphasis placed on rushing this project by the prior administration and the good faith efforts of the claimant, it is arguable that some of the claimed amounts could be paid by the state. DOT notes that the board may wish to consider equitable principles of law such as promissory estoppel in this claim, but that as a matter of law, these principles may well not be applicable to the state.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. The Board also concludes that, to the extent this claim involves unique theories of equitable recovery, those theories would best be pursued in a court of law. [Member Hagedorn not participating.]

5. Pastori Balele of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$5,661.30 for tax refunds allegedly denied by DOR due to racism. The claimant started a temporary job business in 2002. He states that he was a single father raising two children and was struggling financially. He states that he took a low-wage cashier job in 2004 and filed a W-4 form so that no state or federal taxes would be deducted from his paycheck. The claimant states that because of his low wages, he believed he would not owe taxes but be eligible for tax refunds. The clamant states that due to his financial difficulties and the struggles of being a single parent, he forgot to file tax returns for the years 2002-2010. The claimant states that in 2004, he noticed deductions taken from his paycheck by DOR. He contacted DOR and negotiated a lower amount for the garnishments. The claimant states that DOR again garnished his wages in 2011. The claimant states that he was not given notice of his right to a hearing before either of the garnishment actions. The claimant filed his 2002-2010 tax returns in 2011 and the filed returns showed he should have received refunds totaling \$5,661.30. The claimant states that DOR refused to give him the refunds. The claimant believes DOR denied the refunds because he is black and that DOR employees were motivated by racism. The claimant states he appealed the denial of his refunds to the Wisconsin Tax Appeals Commission (TAC) in February 2012, but his appeals were denied because the TAC did not have jurisdiction. The claimant filed suit in state court. The case was referred to federal court, which dismissed his claim. The claimant believes that §73.16(4), Stats., trumps the statute of limitations for issuing a refund. This section states that "The department shall not impose a penalty on a taxpayer...unless the department shows that the taxpayer's action or inaction was due to the taxpayer's willful neglect and not to reasonable cause." The claimant notes that DOR never gave him the opportunity to explain why he had not filed his tax returns and therefore violated §73.16(4), Stats. The claimant states that the personal hardships he went through from 2002-2010 constituted "reasonable cause" for him to not file his tax returns. He states that his failure to file the returns was obviously not "willful neglect" because he expected to receive tax refunds and no one expecting a tax refund would consciously decide not to file tax returns. The claimant believes DOR's treatment of his tax issues stems from racism and requests reimbursement in the amount of his 2002-2010 refunds.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that the claimant's 2002-2005 tax refunds were denied as untimely based on the statute of limitations set forth in §71.75(2), Stats. DOR states that it adjusted the claimant's refund amounts for the years 2006-2010 based on disallowance of the working families credit, which does not apply to taxpayers whose filing status is single if their income exceeds \$10,000. DOR states that the claimant received a reduced refund for 2009. DOR states that the claimant's 2010 earned income credit was reduced based on the allowed amount for federal EIC. This resulted in a small tax balance due for 2010, which was deducted from the claimant's 2011 tax refund. DOR states that the claimant appealed DOR's determinations for 2002-2008 to the TAC but only paid the filing fee for 2002. In April 2012, the TAC appeals for 2003-2008 were dismissed for failure to pay the filing fee. The TAC appeal for 2002 was dismissed by the TAC in November 2012 based on the statute of limitations and also on the grounds that the TAC had no jurisdiction to hear claims of racial discrimination. DOR states that the claimant's allegation that his wages were garnished without notice is without merit. DOR records indicate no judicial garnishments against the claimant. DOR did initiate two administrative wage certification actions within the last five years pursuant to §71.91(7), Stats., however nothing in that section requires notice and a hearing. DOR notes that the claimant had notice to appeal his adjustments. DOR denies that it discriminated against the claimant. DOR notes that all taxpayers, regardless of race, who make untimely claims for refund are denied refunds for those periods for which the statute of limitations has expired. In addition, DOR does not reopen cases for which the TAC has made a final determination, regardless of the taxpayer's race. DOR states that it provided all required notices and opportunities for hearing on the claimant's tax assessments before proceeding through administrative action to collect on those assessments. Finally, DOR notes that the claimant's allegations have been adjudicated before the TAC and in federal court and that his cases were dismissed in both instances.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. Charles Sheppard of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$110.00 for the cost of headphones allegedly broken by DOC staff (issue #1), and for reimbursement of \$74.63 taken from the claimant's inmate account for canteen items he states he

did not order or receive (issue #2). Regarding issue #1, the claimant states that on 6/1/12, while he was housed at Columbia Correctional Institution, he was placed in segregation and his property was packed and stored by DOC staff. Upon his release from segregation, the claimant's property was returned to him and his headphones were found to be broken. The claimant requests reimbursement of \$29 for the cost of his headphones.

Regarding issue #2, the claimant alleges that his inmate account was charged \$74.63 on 9/12/12 for canteen items he never ordered. The claimant states that he did not authorize this deduction from his account. In support of that assertion, he points to the fact that DOC is unable to produce either his signed trust account statement authorizing the charge, or a copy of the signed canteen order showing he received the items. The claimant states that both of these forms are required by DOC policies and procedures and he believes that DOC's failure to produce them is proof that he never authorized this order or received the canteen items. The claimant notes that DOC does not respond to this lack of documentation in their reply to his claim. The claimant believes that the DOC's sovereign immunity defense is absurd and notes that if the DOC is immune from any liability based on the doctrine of sovereign immunity, why did they agree to reimburse him for his headphones? Finally, the claimant states that DOC issued a conduct report related to the canteen order issue solely in order to cover up their own failure to produce any evidence that the claimant actually ordered the items.

Regarding issue #1, DOC recommends the claimant be awarded \$24, the depreciated amount of his headphones. DOC agrees that the headphones were under DOC staff control at the time they were broken. DOC notes that the claimant's receipt indicates he paid \$26.04 for the headphones, not \$29 as stated in his original claim. The headphones were received in February 2012; therefore, based on DOC's standard depreciation schedule, the claimant should be reimbursed in the amount of \$24.

DOC recommends denial of the second part of this claim. DOC states that it is not legally liable for tort damages due to the doctrine of sovereign immunity. DOC also believes that the facts do not support the claimant's allegations. DOC notes that on 9/12/12, the claimant received a conduct report for engaging in enterprise and fraud by placing and receiving a canteen order and then stating he never received the canteen. The claimant was found guilty of this offense and received discipline as a result. DOC states there is no basis in law or equity for award of the amount claimed in item #2.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$24.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Corrections appropriation § 20.410(1)(a), Stats.

7. Hortense Lewallen of Nekoosa, Wisconsin claims \$93.84 for cost of tire damaged by a road heave on Hwy.13 near Wisconsin Rapids in June 2014. The claimant states that she was south bound on Hwy. 13 and could not avoid driving over the heave due to oncoming traffic. The claimant's rear driver's side tire went over the heave, which slashed the tire. The impact with the heave also scratched and dented the

vehicle; however, the claimant is not requesting reimbursement for that damage. She requests reimbursement for the cost of replacing her tire, which was only 11 days old at the time of this incident.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT states that it has a maintenance and repair contract with Wood County, which covers the location where this incident occurred. DOT states that it has referred the claimant to Wood County for payment of her claim. DOT notes that incidents of pavement heaving are impossible to predict or prevent.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. Antonio Ferrer of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$500.00 for reimbursement of insurance deductible related to an 8/24/2012 accident on North Mayfair Road in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. The claimant states that he and a passenger were on his motorcycle going northbound on North Mayfair road when he struck a large chunk of concrete in the roadway, damaging his motorcycle. The claimant states that there was only one lane of traffic open at the time due to road construction. The claimant believes that the road construction contractor had a duty to keep the traffic lane safe and free from construction debris and failed to do so. He requests reimbursement for his \$500 insurance deductible.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT states that Payne and Dolan was the primary contractor for this road construction project. DOT notes that all state construction contracts have a hold harmless agreement by which the contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the state from all claims for damages received by any person on account of any act, omission, neglect or misconduct of the contractor. DOT believes the claimant should pursue his claim for damages with Payne and Dolan and that his claim against the DOT should be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

The Board concludes:

The Committee to wait upon the Governor appeared with his Excellency, the Honorable Governor Scott Walker, who delivered his message as follows:

STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

"Speaker Vos, Speaker Pro Tem August, President Lazich, Majority Leader Fitzgerald, Minority Leader Shilling, Minority Leader Barca, members of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Constitutional Officers, tribal leaders, members of the Cabinet, distinguished guests, members of the Legislature, most importantly, fellow citizens of the great state of Wisconsin, it is an honor to appear before you tonight.

Before we get started, I would like to introduce the First Lady of Wisconsin, my wife, Tonette. Also in the gallery are our sons, Matt and Alex, and my parents, Llew and Pat.

Sitting next to my wife is the Adjutant General of the Wisconsin National Guard, Major General Donald Dunbar. Last Friday, General Dunbar and I saw off 522 members of the 115th Fighter Wing here in Madison. They answered the call of our nation's Commander-in-Chief, while still being fully prepared to respond to needs right here in Wisconsin. This is the strength of the National Guard. When you go to bed tonight, I ask that you keep these men and women—as well as each of the other units deployed from Wisconsin—and their families, in your prayers until their safe return.

And how about those Packers? If there is one thing that can bring together Democrats and Republicans here in Wisconsin, it's the Green Bay Packers. Forgive me tonight if I'm a bit hoarse, but like most of the state, we spent a fair amount of time cheering on Sunday.

I had plenty of fun hugging owners in the stands at Lambeau. Best of luck to the man who should be the League MVP—Aaron Rodgers—and to the rest of the team.

Much like our military and the Packers, tonight, I am proud to report the state of our state is strong.

The source of our strength is our people. I see it when I tour factories and farms and small businesses; I see it when I visit schools and hospitals and places of worship all across this great state. The citizens of Wisconsin are decent and smart and hard-working—and they are strong.

Over the past four years, we put the power back into their hands. In turn, Wisconsin is more free and prosperous.

If you remember nothing else, remember this: more people are working, while fewer are unemployed. State government is more effective, more efficient, and more accountable, and the state's financial condition has improved. Budgets are set based on the public's ability to pay, instead of the government's hunger to spend. School scores are up and more students are graduating, and we are helping more of our fellow citizens to transition from government dependence to work.

The Wisconsin Comeback is working.

According to preliminary numbers from the Department of Workforce Development, there are now 7,600 more private sector jobs in Wisconsin than there were before the recession.

The unemployment rate that peaked at 9.2 percent in January of 2010 is now down to 5.2 percent. Trends show it will continue to drop this year.

While December job numbers for the states come out next week, the preliminary November data for Wisconsin shows we had the best monthly private sector job growth in more than two decades. Specifically, the year-over-year numbers show the creation of 51,000 private sector jobs—which is the best since the end of the 1990s.

Budget reforms over the past four years reduced the burden on the hard-working taxpayers of this state by \$2 billion, and we will continue to reduce that burden every year that I am in office

In particular, I am proud to say property taxes on a typical home were \$141 lower in December of 2014 than they were four years ago. That's right; property taxes are literally lower than they were in 2010. How many Governors can say that?

If property taxes had grown over the past four years at the rate they did between 2006 and 2010, a typical homeowner would have paid \$385 more in property taxes this past December. Over the last four years combined, the cumulative difference is more than \$800. That's real money.

We heard you loud and clear. Thanks for all of the nice notes and emails and calls to tell us how your property taxes went down. We heard from Mike and Sherry from Sheboygan, Clint from Markesan, and Tammy from Viroqua. There was Jon and Christine from Milwaukee, Karen from Portage, and Dale from Jefferson; Karen from Oregon, Diana from Elkhorn, and Louis from Marshfield. My pledge to you is that property taxes four years from now will be lower than they were in 2014.

We reduced income and employer taxes, too. And we started taking less out of paychecks for withholding last April, so you could keep more of your hard-earned money.

On top of our economic success, we empowered local school boards to hire and fire based on merit and pay based on performance, so they can keep the best and the brightest in the classroom. And it's working.

Over the past four years, graduation rates are up. Third grade reading scores are up. ACT scores are up—and Wisconsin now ranks 2nd in the country.

Our fiscal outlook is strong, too. We finished each year with a surplus, and we will again this year. Wisconsin's pension system is the only one fully funded in the country. The state's pension and debt ratio is one of the best. Our bond rating is positive. And the rainy day fund is the largest in state history—165 times bigger than when we first took office.

While the state of state is strong, we want it to be even stronger in the future. Tonight, I will layout parts of our legislative agenda for the future of this great state.

Our plan will help people get the education and skills they need to succeed. We want the opportunity to be as equal as possible with the outcome left up to each and every one of us. In other words, our plan is to help more people live their piece of the American Dream—right here in Wisconsin.

We will build off of our successes in worker training through the Blueprint for Prosperity we announced last year. So far, we helped put nearly 5,000 more students into classes at our 16 technical colleges throughout the state. Some of them are with us here tonight.

One of those is Amber Meads at Waukesha County

Technical College. Amber is 24 and was on a waiting list to get into the welding program. Our Wisconsin Fast Forward grant opened up a spot for her to start in the fall semester. Amber now knows she is getting the training she needs for a high-paying career that will support her and her 5-year-old daughter, Cheyenne, who is with her here tonight.

Last year, we announced a new program called A Better Bottom Line that was patterned after an idea from my friend, Delaware Governor Jack Markell, when he was chair of the National Governors Association. It is about helping employers identify the unique abilities of people who are defined, by some, as having a disability.

Tonight, I want to recognize some of the people who I met this year through A Better Bottom Line. Including Spencer Kletzien of Dickmann Manufacturing in Grafton, Mary LaPointe, who uses her computer skills at her job with Beyond Vision in Milwaukee, Peter Wenzel, who works at Mosinee Cold Storage, and Dan Blomgren, who I met at McGlynn Pharmacy in Stoughton.

As part of A Better Bottom Line, we expanded programs helping transition people with disabilities into the workforce in a way that matched their skills with the needs of prospective employers. For the first time in more than a decade, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation eliminated a waiting list for employment services for people with significant disabilities. We will continue to expand these programs in the coming year.

In addition, to worker training, we will ensure every child—regardless of background or birthright—has access to a quality education. We will continue to empower families to make the choice that is right for their sons and daughters.

Tonight, I call on the members of the state Legislature to pass legislation ensuring objective information is available for each and every school receiving public funds in this state. Provide the information and allow parents to make the choice.

No need for bureaucrats or politicians to make that choice—I trust parents. Give them access to objective information and they will make the choice that is best for their children.

And speaking of what is best for our students, I call on the members of the state Legislature to pass legislation making it crystal clear that no school district in the state is required to use Common Core standards. Going forward, I want to eliminate any requirement to use Common Core.

My sons graduated from outstanding public schools in Wauwatosa and my nieces are in public schools as well, so I have a vested interest, like parents all across the state, in high standards. But those standards should be set by people from within Wisconsin—and preferably at the local level.

Looking ahead, we are proposing bold reforms to make state government more effective, more efficient, and more accountable to the public.

We will consolidate several of our state agencies. While the mergers will provide savings in the next state budget, the real objective is to improve services, while being better stewards of the taxpayers' money.

Currently, the state has two different entities directly involved with economic development. One, the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC), was created four years ago to replace the old Department of Commerce. The other, the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) was created more than four decades ago.

Tonight, I ask the members of the state Legislature to pass legislation combining these two into one, so resources can be shifted from overhead into economic development. Our plan will put an even greater emphasis on working at the grassroots level with local, regional, and private sector partners on economic development.

There are also several agencies, which oversee financial institutions and professional services. Tonight, I call on the members of the state Legislature to approve legislation combining these agencies into a one-stop shop for professional and financial services. In addition, our legislative package will include several other consolidations within existing agencies—as well as further regulatory reforms. We want common sense solutions, not bureaucratic red tape.

Some in Washington believe government should play a growing role in our lives and rarely question its expanse. Others have such disdain for government that they attempt to keep it from working at all.

Instead, we have a chance to lead here in Wisconsin. I believe that government has grown too big and too intrusive in our lives and must be reined in, but the government that is left must work. As taxpayers, we should demand that the functions that government must reasonably do, it should do well. We should demand a government that is more effective, more efficient, and more accountable to the public.

Top-down regulations and mandates from the federal government get in the way of innovation and growth in Wisconsin and states like ours.

Therefore, I am working with our new Attorney General to prepare a lawsuit challenging the newly proposed federal energy regulations. These proposals could have a devastating impact on Wisconsin because we are so heavily dependent on manufacturing.

According to recent reports, we could lose tens of thousands of jobs in our region, and ratepayers could see an increase of up to 29 percent. We will fight to protect Wisconsin's hard-working families.

Instead of fighting with states like Wisconsin, the federal government should work with us to find reasonable alternatives. We can be both environmentally and economically sustainable.

These are just a few of our big, bold ideas to help move Wisconsin forward. In a few weeks, we will return to these historic chambers to share our state budget proposal.

As we close tonight, let's remember what unites us and makes us strong.

Here in Wisconsin, support for the Packers transcends political, religious, and personal differences. Heck, I was sitting a row ahead and a few seats over from a guy on Sunday who didn't care much for my policies. I told him we were all Packer fans there, and by the end of the game, we were high-fiving another Green Bay victory. Green and gold runs deep.

Here in America, support for our military transcends those same differences. That wasn't always the case, but thankfully, we learned from our past transgressions. We support our men and women in uniform and we thank our veterans. Red, white, and blue runs even deeper.

There is one more place where we must also stand united.

Last week, innocent people were targeted in France by terrorists. These cowards are not symbols of confidence. They are overwhelmed by fear. They are afraid of freedom.

They are afraid of those who have the freedom of the press.

They are afraid of freedom of speech. They are afraid of freedom of religion.

Tonight, we must stand together—Democrat and Republican—and denounce those who wish to threaten freedom anywhere in this world. We need to proclaim that an attack against freedom-loving people anywhere is an attack against us all. And we will not allow it. When we take a stand, we will make it easier to work for freedom and prosperity—right here in Wisconsin.

Thank you. God bless you. God bless the great state of Wisconsin. And may God bless freedom-loving people all over the world."

The Committee to wait upon the Governor appeared with his Excellency the Honorable Governor Scott Walker, who delivered his message as follows:

7:00 P.M.

"Speaker Vos, Speaker Pro Tem August, President Lazich, Majority Leader Fitzgerald, Minority Leader Shilling, Minority Leader Barca, members of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Constitutional Officers, tribal leaders, members of the Cabinet, distinguished guests, members of the Legislature, most importantly, fellow citizens of the great state of Wisconsin, it is an honor to appear before you tonight.

Before we get started, I would like to introduce the First Lady of Wisconsin, my wife, Tonette. Next to my wife is the Adjutant General of the Wisconsin National Guard, Major General Donald Dunbar. Next to him are Brigadier General Mark Anderson and Command Sergeant Major Bradley Shields.

As a kid growing up in Delavan, I started working as a dishwasher at the Countryside Restaurant. Later, I went on to flip burgers at McDonald's to save up for school. My mom was a part-time secretary and she raised my brother and me,

while my dad served as a pastor in our small town.

We didn't have much money, but the best thing my parents gave us was an understanding of the value of hard work. Mom was raised on a farm where they didn't have indoor plumbing until she went to junior high school. My dad's dad worked as a machinist at a factory for most of his life.

More than anything, my family ingrained in me the idea that anyone who worked hard could go as far as their dreams would take them. It was through their eyes that I got my first glimpse of the American Dream.

Today, however, I worry that too many of our fellow citizens feel that dream has become out of reach for them and their families. The budget plan we present tonight will help restore that America Dream right here in Wisconsin.

Our plan is based on growth and opportunity—which leads to freedom and prosperity for all. Secondly, our plan will use common sense reforms to create a government that is limited in scope and—ultimately—more effective, more efficient, and more accountable to the public. And finally, our plan will ensure a state where people are safe and sound in their homes and throughout their communities.

Our Freedom and Prosperity proposal is built to help working families like the VanDrisses from Pound—a small town in northeastern Wisconsin. Ken is a truck driver and Kelly works in maintenance. Like Tonette and me, they have two sons.

Trevor is studying to be a diesel mechanic in the John Deere Ag Tech program at the technical college here in town and he also works for the local dealership in Pound. Tanner is studying business communications at the University of Wisconsin in Marinette. The VanDrisses are here with us tonight.

Last year, the VanDrisses were happy to see their property tax bill go down. In fact, largely because of our reforms and the flexibility we gave to local governments, property taxes on a typical home in Wisconsin are \$131 less this year than they were in 2010.

Tonight, I am proud to say that our state budget will continue those reforms, so the property tax bill on a typical home will be even lower during the next two years. Just as I promised, property taxes by the end of 2016 will be lower than they were in 2014. That means lower property taxes for 6 years in a row.

Our budget will continue the tuition freeze for undergraduates from Wisconsin at each of the UW system campuses. And we will add a tuition freeze in our technical colleges for high demand areas. That's good news for students, like Tanner and Trevor.

In addition to helping working families and students, this budget will assist small businesses and farmers, as well as senior citizens. That's good news for people, like James Booker from Plymouth.

In December, I received a note from Mr. Booker that read:

"Dear Gov Walker,

I want to thank you! I am 68 years old and have owned various homes in Wisconsin since I was 20 years old. This is the first time that I have ever received a substantial reduction in the Property Tax! I have been very angry at Wisconsin for a number of years due to the huge property tax compared to other States and have been planning on selling our home and moving to a low tax State. We have had our home up for sale for a year and took it off the market for the winter. Now I plan on not re-listing in the spring and will wait to see what happens with Wisconsin property taxes."

Well, thank you Mr. Booker for the nice message. I'm glad to tell you that our budget will continue the property tax relief—which will make it easier for people like you to stay in Wisconsin.

And that's just some of the really good news happening in our state these days.

Last week, the federal government reported November was the best month for private sector job creation that we've had in Wisconsin since 1990. For that month, we rank 5th in the country and 1st in the Midwest for private sector job growth. We want that trend to continue as we grow the economy.

To help, our budget will merge two of our state entities that work on economic and housing issues into one highly effective organization called the Forward Wisconsin Development Authority. And the budget will add further investments into the successful Wisconsin Fast Forward program that helps people get the skills they need to succeed through technical college courses, apprenticeships, and training programs—as well as working on ways to help our military veterans find employment or even start a business of their own.

These effective worker training programs are actually economic development efforts. So many of our employers are looking for qualified workers. Increasing the ability to fill these positions will encourage employers to add more work—which obviously will lead to more jobs.

Maintaining a strong infrastructure system is another positive way to grow the economy— not only for the people who design, build, and maintain it—but because it is key to commerce in this state.

Under our Freedom and Prosperity proposal, we are investing in our transportation system, expanding broadband access, and continuing to improve the quality of health care throughout the state.

We want to grow the economy in cities, towns, and villages across Wisconsin—while not growing the size of state government.

To do more with less, we found more ways to reform government.

As I mentioned in our State of the State address, we propose that several agencies be merged and various programs be consolidated to provide better service to the customer, as well as better value to the taxpayers.

Here's a good example: for years, supporters of the University of Wisconsin system said freeing them of being directly under the state government bureaucracy would help reduce costs in multiple areas for the system. This budget includes a bold proposal to provide new governance through an authority, similar to the one used for the UW Hospital and Clinics.

Recently, some have raised concerns about this proposed reform. These are some of the same claims we heard four years ago when our Act 10 reforms were enacted. Today, our graduation rates are higher, third grade reading scores are better, and Wisconsin ACT scores are second best in the country.

With this in mind, I ask the legislature to give our bold reform idea a serious look. As the father of a UW student, I have a real interest in the success of our state system and I believe this will make the University of Wisconsin stronger in the years to come.

And speaking of education, our budget will increase state support for schools by providing more than \$100 million annually for the school levy tax credit and more than \$100 million in the second year of the budget for equalization aids—while maintaining revenue limits to ensure continuing property tax relief.

To help the needs of rural schools, we will provide additional aid for transportation and other costs. Thanks to Representative Rob Swearingen and other members of the Speaker's Task Force on Rural Schools for their leadership on this issue.

Overall, we want to provide the best education possible for every child in this state. For many, like my sons and me, it will be a traditional public school. For other families, it will be in a successful charter, private, virtual, or home school environment.

One of those families involves a wonderful mom named Dina Lein. Last year, I had an opportunity to meet Dina and her family in Appleton. She told me about how her son was in a local public school a few years ago, but it just wasn't working for him.

Back then, his grades were low, he was being bullied, and he didn't like school very much. Thankfully, Dina's family was one of the first to sign up for the school choice expansion after the last budget.

Dina introduced me to her family and I was thrilled to hear that her son Trace is now loving 6th grade. He's in the band and plays football. And his school scores have improved—dramatically. Dina and her husband, Michael, are here tonight along with their children— Coleton, Trace, and Alexxis.

Today, I am excited to announce our plans to lift the cap on vouchers so more families, like Dina's, can have the choice to find the best school for their children. Every child deserves the chance to succeed.

And every parent deserves the ability to see objective and comparable data about their child's school. Our budget includes the tools to provide that information to every parent

for any school that receives public funds. You see, I trust parents. Give them the facts and they will act in the best interest of their children.

In addition, our budget removes funding for the Smarter Balanced test, which is connected to Common Core. We also include legal language making it clear that no school district in the state has to use these standards, which are set by people from outside the state.

I want high standards—and those decisions should be made by school board members and parents and others at the local level.

Our reforms will also improve programs that provide assistance to people in times of need. Here in Wisconsin, we help folks facing financial challenges. For those who are able, however, these programs should be a temporary safety net—not a hammock.

With this in mind, our budget expands the requirement for able-bodied adults to be enrolled in an employment and training program in order to receive food stamps. Now, some might claim that we're making it harder to get government assistance. We're not. We're making it easier to get a job.

The next step is to require able-bodied adults without children to pass a drug test in order to get a welfare check. For those who fail, we will provide treatment, so we can help them get off of drugs.

Why are we doing this? Well, because we know that we can get people jobs. Each week, employers tell me that they have positions available—they just need individuals who can show up for work and who can pass a drug test.

Think about it, as of this afternoon, there were more than 72,000 job openings posted on our state website. We need more people to fill these jobs.

We want to help transition people from government dependence to true independence through the dignity of work. This will bring security to both taxpayers and—more importantly—to those who ultimately are able to take charge of their lives.

Overall, our Freedom and Prosperity proposal provides greater security for people all across Wisconsin.

This budget provides renewed financial security as it is balanced and the rainy day fund is the largest in state history—165 times bigger than when I first took office. Our retirement system is the only one fully funded in the country and our bond rating is strong.

In my predecessor's last budget, the total bonding level was \$3.6 billion. In this budget, the total level of bonding is

down to less than \$1.6 billion. This is the lowest it has been in a decade.

Security for our citizens is just as important. In this budget, we put more than \$600 million into Medicaid to provide health care for needy families, children, and seniors. Through our bold reforms, among the states that did not take the Obamacare expansion, we are the only state in the nation without a gap in coverage, according to the respected Kaiser Family Foundation.

Beyond Medicaid, we provide additional funds for programs that help victims of domestic violence and their families. Some of our partners in the fight against Domestic Violence are here with us tonight:

Patti Seger is the executive director of End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin. Teri Jendusa Nicolai is a domestic violence survivor, from Waterford. Roseanne Barber of Hayward is a member of the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, a survivor, and a longtime advocate for victims. Melissa Torres is a survivor of domestic violence from Madison. And Jessica Honish is an experienced domestic violence victim advocate who works at the Rainbow House in Marinette. Places like Rainbow House benefit from our investments in the fight against domestic violence.

In this budget, we also continue to improve mental health services in the state, provide more funds to help the victims of child sex trafficking, and maintain support for successful crime fighting programs, like ShotSpotter, to fight gun violence.

Earlier tonight, I introduced you to the VanDrisses. Our Freedom and Prosperity proposal is designed to help families like theirs. Our budget helps keep their property taxes down and their son's tuition frozen. Our budget reforms government, so we operate in a way that is more effective, more efficient, and more accountable.

And our budget provides more security to people like them all over the state.

Thank you. May God bless you. May God bless and protect our brave men and women in uniform. And may God continue to bless the great State of Wisconsin."

Senator Harris Dodd wants to also adjourn in the honor of the dozens of men and women that have lost their lives this year.

Motorcycles are much smaller than cars and can fall into blind spots more easily making them much harder to spot than other vehicles. Senator Taylor hopes that we can encourage motorists and motorcyclists alike to slow down, share the road, and be respectful to other drivers. We are all in this together, and together we can save lives.

On May 1st, two people from the same family, Montrell Burdine and his nephew, Damario Jones, were killed after a dozen shots were fired into a crowd of individuals. Robert Echols was just 30 years old when he was shot in the heart of the Senator's district on 29th and Burleigh. Lastly, a close family friend of Senator Harris Dodd's son, 24-year old Bradley Garrett, was tragically shot this past Sunday night. Her community continues to be torn apart by these tragic deaths and people in her district are working hard to try to change things. They are organizing block watch parties and community picnics. They are also engaging youth and creating positive community spaces. They need this State Legislature to stand up and take a stand against violence.

Senator Harris Dodd, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of her grandmother, Josephine Montgomery, who recently turned 80 years old and who was a leader for workers in Milwaukee in the 1970s. In 1973, after racial disturbances in the Harambee area, the UW-Milwaukee School for Workers called on labor leaders to develop planes to redevelop the area. Josephine was a member of Local 232 at Briggs and Stratton, and she answered the call to be a leader for the Harambee community. Her volunteer efforts, along with the efforts of other union leaders, led to the establishment of Harambee Revitalization Inc., whose mission was to help the Harambee community face its most pressing problems through grassroots advocacy, community collaboration, and direct service programs. Senator Harris Dodd is proud of the work that her grandmother did in shaping the labor movement in Milwaukee and of her dedication to restoring and investing in communities like the Harambee community.

Senator Marklein, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Wayne Hoffman of Spring Green, who lost his life December of last year while trying to save a stranger who has been swept into Lake Superior.

Senator Risser attributes his good health to never taking the elevator in the Capitol during his 599 years in the legislature.

Senator Nass, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Brianna Hay, who was the subject of Assembly Joint Resolution 34 earlier today, bringing attention to childhood apraxia

Senator Carpenter, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of the late Alderman Joe Dudzik, whose service to the south side of Milwaukee will be dearly missed.

Senator Carpenter, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of three year old Aiden Archer whose life was tragically lost.

Senator Harris Dodd, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of the individuals who lost their lives to violence in Milwaukee in the last few weeks. 67 lives have been taken in Milwaukee since January of this year. 12 of those lives were taken since she last stood before us on the Senate floor. Nearly every day in her district, a person is shot or injured as a result of violence. For the children of her district, there is nothing unusual about hearing the sound of gunshots in their neighborhood. It is not shocking to them when they find out that their friend's older brother was shot a few streets down or when they hear that another young man was killed who used to go to their school. We have to work to protect these children. We have to work to do to ensure that they do not grow up in a community where the sound of gunshots is a regular occurrence. Senator Harris Dodd stood today to challenge the State Senate again to take a stand against violence. She challenges everyone to work with her to reduce violence and build safer communities for our children.

James P. LaVenture of Frederic, Wisconsin claims \$4,154.36 for reimbursement of monies taken through DOR wage assessments for payment of an estimated assessment for 2003 income taxes. The claimant admits he is at fault for failing to file his 2003 tax return in a timely fashion, however, he believes an overpayment of over \$4,000 for the taxes actually due is excessive, even when penalties and late fees are assessed. The claimant states that he was in regular contact with a DOR employee, who assured him that any excess money taken through wage certification would be refunded by DOR and/or applied to outstanding federal taxes. The claimant states that because of this assurance, he did not believe he needed to appeal the assessment. The claimant filed his 2003 return in December 2013, with no taxes due. The claimant believes it is unjust for DOR to keep any monies in excess of actual taxes due, plus any appropriate penalties.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. The estimated tax assessment for failure to file 2003 income taxes was issued on 9/18/07 and the actual return was filed on 12/10/13. DOR states that on 1/30/08, the claimant called DOR to inform the collection agent that he was working on preparing his tax returns for 2003 and other outstanding years. DOR states that the claimant contacted DOR a number of times over the next four years but never followed through to resolve the estimated assessment. DOR notes that it sent over 30 notices to the claimant regarding his multiple years of late tax filings. DOR began certification of the claimant's wages in February 2012. The certification ended in December 2013 when the claimant filed the outstanding return. DOR points to § 71.75(5), Wis. Stats., which prohibits DOR from refunding the overpayment on the original assessment because no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Member Olsen dissenting.]

3. James P. LaVenture of Frederic, Wisconsin claims \$6,081.69 for reimbursement of monies taken through DOR wage assessments for payment of estimated assessments for 2005 and 2006 income taxes. The claimant admits he is at fault for failing to file 2005 and 2006 tax returns in a timely fashion, however, he believes an overpayment of over \$6,000 for the taxes actually due is excessive, even when penalties and late fees are assessed. The claimant states that he was in regular contact with a DOR employee, who assured him that any excess money taken through wage certification would be refunded by DOR and/or applied to outstanding federal taxes. The claimant states that because of this assurance, he did not believe he needed to appeal the assessments. The claimant filed his 2005 and 2006 returns in December 2013 with no taxes due for either year. The claimant believes it is unjust for DOR to keep any monies in excess of actual taxes due, plus any appropriate penalties.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. The estimated tax assessments for failure to file 2005 and 2006 income taxes were issued on 5/30/08 and the actual returns were filed on 12/10/13. DOR states that on 1/30/08, the claimant called DOR to inform the collection agent that he was working on preparing his tax returns for 2005, 2006, and other outstanding years. DOR states that the claimant contacted DOR a number of times over the next four years but never followed through to resolve the estimated assessments. DOR notes that it sent over 30 notices to the claimant regarding his multiple years of late tax filings. DOR began certification of the claimant's wages in February 2012. The certification ended in December 2013 when the claimant filed the outstanding returns. DOR points to § 71.75(5), Wis. Stats., which prohibits DOR from refunding the overpayment on the original assessments because no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Member Olsen dissenting.]

4. Willie Gavin of Riverdale, Illinois claims \$48,703.50 for innocent convict compensation related to his 1997 conviction for sexual assault. In April 1997 the claimant was charged with multiple counts of sexual assault of a child during 1993-1995. The claimant had no prior record as an adult or a juvenile. The alleged victim was the claimant's stepdaughter (S.H.) and her testimony was the only evidence against him. At the preliminary hearing the claimant pled "not guilty." The claimant states that he had a conversation with his minister, who expressed concern that the claimant would not receive a fair trial. The claimant states that he changed his plea to "no contest" because of this conversation. The claimant states that he has a learning disability and lacks the ability to read and write well. He does not recall ever discussing the possibility of entering an Alford plea with his attorney. Despite entering a "no contest" plea, he continued to maintain his innocence including during the plea hearing, his sentencing hearing, and throughout his incarceration. In November 1997 the claimant was sentenced to eight years in prison and 15 years of probation. The claimant served five years and three month in prison and was released in July 2002.

The claimant states that in 2001, when S.H. was 15 years old, she confessed to her minister that the sexual assault allegations were false. At her minister's instruction, S.H. made a written statement that the assaults never happened. She gave this written statement to her minister. S.H. stated that sometime during 2001-2004, she also told her aunts, a cousin, and her grandmother that the allegations against the claimant were false. S.H. stated that at the time she gave the false statements to the police, she felt pressured to say that something sexual had happened between the claimant and herself. S.H stated that her foster mother had questioned her extensively and that the more she was questioned, the more

she felt pressured to make the allegations, even though she originally told her foster mother that nothing had happened. S.H. stated that she later confessed to her falsehoods because she felt badly about the claimant going to prison because of her false statements.

After his release, the claimant contacted a number of attorneys seeking representation. He states that it took several years to find his current attorney, who contacted S.H. and discovered that she had recanted her testimony. In January 2013, the claimant's attorney filed a motion to withdraw the claimant's no contest plea and obtain a new trial. S.H. testified at the motion hearing, recanting her testimony and explaining why she had lied. The court found S.H.'s testimony credible, granted the claimant's motion to withdraw the no contest plea, and remanded the case for a new trial. In February 2014, the State dismissed the charges against the claimant.

The claimant takes issue with the State's position that a no contest plea represents an admission of guilt. (See <u>State v. Block</u> and <u>Williams v. Milwaukee</u>.) The claimant has maintained his innocence during this entire process and only changed his plea because he felt he would not get a fair trial.

The claimant states that, although the ADA responding to this claim alleges that S.H.'s recantation was not credible, the trial court judge found her testimony to be very credible. The claimant notes that S.H. would have no reason to fabricate this recantation many years later, especially because she ran the risk of being prosecuted for perjury. Finally, the clamant points to the fact that the State dropped all charges against him.

The claimant requests reimbursement in the maximum amount of \$25,000. He also requests payment of \$18,286.50 attorneys' fees for post-conviction representation, including this claim. Finally, the claimant requests \$,5417 for supervision and court fees related to his conviction.

The Kenosha County District Attorney's Office recommends denial of this claim. The DA believes the claimant contributed to his own conviction and has failed to provide clear and convincing evidence of his innocence.

The DA does not believe that S.H.'s recantation is credible. S.H. was 11 years old when she testified at the claimant's preliminary hearing and her testimony at that time was consistent with the original report of the assaults. The DA also finds it unbelievable that S.H. allegedly recanted her testimony to four adults between 2001 and 2004 but that none of those individuals ever took any action or contacted the authorities. The DA notes that the family members to whom S.H. allegedly recanted are related to the claimant's and therefore would have had some interest in seeing him freed if he had been unjustly convicted. (S.H.'s minister died in 2010.) The DA also points to the fact that, despite S.H.'s assertion that she felt guilty for making false allegations, there is no evidence she ever reached out to the police, probation, the DA's Office, or any other court official to remedy the claimant's allegedly unjust imprisonment.

The DA believes the letter allegedly provided by S.H. to her minister was fabricated. The DA notes that this man was also Mr. Gavin's minister and it is therefore unlikely that he would not have come forward on the claimant's behalf as soon as he received such a letter.

The DA also believes the claimant's assertion of innocence is not credible. The claimant alleges he contacted law firms for assistance, however, there is no evidence he made any effort to do so through his probation agent or via pro se letters. Finally, and most importantly, the DA believes the claimant contributed to his own conviction by entering a no contest plea. The DA states that the claimant's allegation that no contest pleas are an assertion of innocence is incorrect. The DA points to Lee v. Wisconsin State Board of Dental Examiners which states that a no contest plea "constitutes an implied confession of guilt for the purposes of the case to support a judgment of conviction and in that respect is equivalent to a plea of guilty." The DA notes that maintaining an assertion of innocence while entering a no contest plea is accomplished by way of an Alford plea. The claimant did not enter an Alford plea.

The DA believes the claimant has not met his burden to show clear and convincing evidence that he was innocent of the crime for which he was convicted and that he contributed to his own conviction and is therefore ineligible to receive compensation pursuant to § 775.05, Wis. Stats.

Based on the written and testimonial evidence in this case, the Board concludes Mr. Gavin should be awarded compensation for five years and three months wrongful imprisonment. The Board notes the facts of this case establish clearly and convincingly that Mr. Gavin was innocent of the crime for which he was imprisoned. Those unique facts and circumstances are based upon the following findings:

The only evidence linking Mr. Gavin to the crime was the testimony of S.H when she was 11 years old, and which S.H., fully recanted as an adult. There was no physical evidence produced at the time of the conviction or at the hearing to substantiate the original conviction. There was no credible reason for the recantation other than the fact that Mr. Gavin was innocent of the crime. In the official court record, Judge Milisauskas found S.H.'s recantation to be credible and that it constituted newly discovered evidence. Significantly, Judge Milisauskas specifically found that Mr. Gavin "was not negligent in seeking this evidence because he continued to maintain his innocence." Moreover, Judge Milisauskas found that the recanted testimony constituted a "manifest injustice" warranting the withdrawal of the no contest plea. Following withdrawal of the plea the case was dismissed.

In addition, the Board finds that Mr. Gavin did not by his actions or failure to act contribute to bring about his conviction. The Board historically has ruled that the entry of a "no contest" plea by a defendant constitutes substantial evidence that the defendant's own actions contributed to the conviction. We do not in this ruling seek to change this historic past practice, and absent unique and compelling circumstances the Board intends to continue this practice going forward. However, the specific facts of this case demonstrate that Mr. Gavin's entry of a no contest plea at the time of his conviction was a legal error and therefor the

Board cannot find that Mr. Gavin contributed to his own conviction. The unique facts supporting such a finding include: the fact that the defendant sought a withdrawal of his plea following his incarceration; the fact that he met the high legal standard to merit withdrawal in such circumstances; the fact that Judge Milisauskas expressly found that Mr. Gavin "continued to maintain his innocence"; and the fact that the claimant's educational level significantly contributed to his misunderstanding the difference between a no contest plea and an Alford plea at the time of original conviction.

The Board concludes that equitable principles justify an award in the amount of \$25,000 to compensate Mr. Gavin for his five years and three months wrongful imprisonment. In addition, the Board concludes that the compensation should include \$18,286.50 for Mr. Gavin's post-conviction legal fees and \$5,417 for supervision and court fees related to the original conviction. The Board further concludes, under authority of \$ 16.007(6m), Stats., that the total award of \$48,703.50 should be made from the Claims Board appropriation \$ 20.505(4)(d), Stats.

Shana Zuhlke of Beaver Dam, Wisconsin claims \$687.53 for vehicle damage and lost wages. On 11/24/14, the claimant's son (Jacob Zuhlke) was driving her vehicle on Hwy. 16/60 (aka W. James St.) near Columbus, WI. Mr. Zuhlke exited a parking lot on Hwy. 16/60. intending on proceeding to the Hwy. 151 on-ramp. As he crossed Hwy. 16/60, the driver's side front and rear tires hit a pothole located near the ditch that divides the east/west traffic lanes. Mr. Zuhlke estimates his maximum speed was around 15 mph, since he had just exited the parking lot. Upon impacting the pothole, the left rear tire was immediately flattened. Mr. Zuhlke pulled the vehicle to a safe location and called AAA. While waiting for assistance, the left front tire also flattened. The claimant had to replace both tires and rims on the driver's side of the vehicle. The claimant requests reimbursement for the tires and rims in the amount of \$603.53. The claimant also requests \$84 reimbursement for her son's lost night of wages/tips. Mr. Zuhlke was scheduled to work that night but was not able to do so because the vehicle was not drivable.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT states that the State is liable for damages only in situations where it can be shown that its employees acted in a negligent manner. The claimant has provided no evidence of negligence on the part of any employee of the State. DOT notes that the area where this incident took place is on the border of Columbia and Dodge Counties. DOT has a contract with Columbia/Dodge County for maintenance of State and Interstate roads within the county. Therefore, DOT believes it is the responsibility of the Columbia/Dodge County Highway Department to investigate and address any claim for damage allegedly due to improper road maintenance.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Myron E. Edwards of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$449.26 for refund of monies seized from his inmate account for obligations allegedly discharged by a 2012 bankruptcy. The claimant states that he filed for Chapter 7 Bankruptcy in December 2011, and listed two DOC obligations on his Schedule E-Creditors Holding Unsecured Priority Claims (a \$53,449.68 court debt and a \$5,000 release fund debt). The claimant states that DOC was notified on 1/1/12 that they had until 3/30/12 to object to discharge of these debts but that DOC failed to do so. The claimant believes DOC did not file an objection because they do not take prisoner litigation seriously. The Bankruptcy Court granted a Discharge of Debtor Order on 4/13/12. The claimant alleges that because DOC failed to contest discharge of these two debts, that they were barred from further collection of those debts by the 2013 Discharge Order. The claimant states that despite this Order, DOC continued to deduct monies from his inmate account for payment of these two debts. The claimant disputes DOC's use of 11 USC § 523 (a)(19)(B)(ii) as a defense of their actions. The claimant believes that this code defines non-dischargeable debts as only those debts resulting from a violation of securities laws, and therefore does not apply to his debts. The claimant believes DOC's continued deductions from his inmate account for these debts are illegal. As of the dated this claim was filed (8/24/14), DOC had deducted \$449.26 towards these allegedly discharged debts. The claimant requests reimbursement of this amount, plus any additional amounts DOC deducts from 8/24/14 to the date this claim is decided by the Board.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that the two obligations referenced in this claim were not discharged as a matter of law. DOC points to the 2012 Discharge Order submitted by the claimant, which clearly notified him that some debts cannot be discharged, including "most fines, penalties, forfeitures [and] criminal restitution obligations." DOC also cites 11 USC § 523 (a)(19)(B)(iii), which states that a discharge under section 727 will not eliminate debt that results from any court or administrative order for any damages, fine, penalty, citation, restitutionary payment, disgorgement payment, attorney fee, cost, or other payment owed by the debtor. DOC states that the Bankruptcy Court did not discharge the claimant's court-ordered obligations because they are presumed non-dischargeable as a matter of law. DOC believes it has acted legally in continuing to deduct money from the claimant's inmate account for payment of these debts and recommends this claim be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

7. Darrell Otis of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$359.38 for a keyboard allegedly damaged by DOC staff. The claimant purchased a keyboard, power cord, and case in February 2009, while at Green Bay Correctional Institution. On 8/22/13, while at Oshkosh Correctional Institution

(OSCI), the claimant was placed in Temporary Lock-Up (TLU). Per procedure, all of his property was inventoried and packed by DOC staff upon his transfer to TLU. DOC procedures for TLU property handling require staff to lay out all property, check electronics for engraving and tamper evident seals, and ensure proper functioning of all electronics. DOC staff is also required to follow proper procedures for any property deemed contraband after this inspection. The claimant points to the fact that no damage was noted to the keyboard by DOC staff on the property inventory. He states he remained in TLU and therefore had no access to his keyboard between 8/22/13 and his transfer to Waupun Correctional (WCI) on 12/13/13. At the time of his transfer, OSCI staff again inspected, inventoried, and packed his property and again made no note of any keyboard damage on the outgoing property inventory. WCI staff then unpacked, inventoried and inspected his property and again made no note of any damage to the keyboard on the incoming property inventory (although other damaged property was noted). On 1/30/14 the claimant was notified by the WCI music room staff that they'd received his keyboard on 1/3/14 and that it was damaged (part of the chassis was broken off on the bottom) and therefore declared contraband. The claimant finds it highly unlikely that DOC staff at two different institutions inspected his keyboard on three separate occasions and somehow missed this damage, which is clearly visible if the keyboard is turned over. (He notes that the tamper resistant seals-which staff must inspect-are located on the bottom of the unit.) The claimant points to the fact that he had no access to the keyboard after he was placed in TLU on 8/22/13; therefore, it was impossible for him to have damaged the keyboard. The claimant states that DOC's arguments regarding the placement of the tamper resistant seals, and the missing broken piece are speculative, at best. He notes that if he had wanted to hide something in the keyboard, he would have removed all the tamper resistant seals, unscrewed the bottom of the chassis and then replaced the seals when the unit was reassembled. The claimant also notes that the missing broken piece could easily have been overlooked or discarded by DOC staff. He states that based on DOC's own property inventory records, the keyboard was undamaged when it was placed in DOC's custody on 8/22/13 and remained undamaged until after it was received at WCI. The claimant believes the evidence shows that the keyboard was damaged while under staff control and requests reimbursement for his damages.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that it is the claimant's burden to establish proof that DOC negligently handled his property and that he has failed to meet that burden. DOC states that, at best, the claimant has shown that DOC staff failed to inspect his keyboard closely enough to notice the damage. DOC notes that a close inspection of the keyboard shows that the damage was most likely not caused by staff negligence, but rather occurred in a deliberate attempt to tamper with the unit, probably to create a hiding space inside of the keyboard. DOC states that if the keyboard had been accidentally dropped by staff, the upper chassis would have also been damaged. DOC notes that the four tamper resistant seals on the bottom of the unit

are oddly located and that there is a sticky residue in one location, suggesting a seal had been removed. DOC also notes there are four distinct pry marks on the bottom of the unit, which is evidence of prior tampering. Finally, DOC notes that the unit was stored in a keyboard case, therefore, if it had been damaged by staff, the broken piece of chassis would have been found in the case. It was not.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Ralph H. Jurgens, III of Portage, Wisconsin claims \$12.76 for cost of postage and photocopies allegedly incurred because of improper mail handling by DOC staff. On 4/16/13, the claimant mailed an Affidavit of Indigence and a Petition to Terminate Parental Rights to the LaCrosse County Clerk of Courts. The claimant included a selfstamped envelope addressed, (SASE) correspondence so the court could return a date stamped copy of his petition to him. Receiving no response, the claimant wrote to the clerk on 5/6/13 to find out the status of his petition. After waiting several more weeks for a response, the claimant wrote the clerk again on 5/22/13. The claimant received no response therefore, on 6/24/13, he wrote to the Chief Judge of the district and lodged a complaint that he was being denied access to the courts. On 8/20/13, the claimant received a letter from the LaCrosse County Clerk which stated that they had received his petition and had returned a date stamped copy in the SASE on or around 4/23/13. The clerk stated that the SASE was returned to the clerk's office stamped "Refused by Addressee" on 5/1/13. The claimant states that DOC 310.09(4), requires that inmates attempt to informally resolve issues with institution staff prior to filing an inmate complaint. This policy also requires inmates to give staff 5 days to respond to all correspondence sent by the inmate during the informal resolution process. The claimant states that he made copies of the clerk's letter and all of his correspondence with the courts. He then contacted mailroom staff on 9/1/13 to ask why the letter was refused and why he was not notified of that refusal per DOC policy. He did not receive a response and contacted mailroom staff again on 9/5/13. The mailroom sergeant responded that he did not know who had refused the letter or why it was refused. Having attempted to resolve the issue with staff per DOC 310.09(4), the claimant filed an inmate complaint. DOC stated that the complaint was past the 14-day time limit and rejected it as untimely. The claimant states that he asked DOC how they had determined the start of the 14-day limit, because he had not received the clerk's letter until 8/20/13 and had followed the mandatory procedure set forth in DOC 310.09(4) but DOC refused to answer. The claimant believes that staff improperly rejected his SASE without notifying him they had done so, which caused him to incur unnecessary costs for copies and postage. The claimant rejects DOC's claim of Sovereign Immunity. He also rejects DOC's argument that he could have called a friend or family member

and had them contact the clerk's office. The claimant notes that parental rights actions are not open to the public (Ch. 48 Stats.). He also notes that it is not the responsibility of his friends and family to ensure proper processing of his court petitions and that he has a constitutional right to access the courts.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that it is not legally liable for tort damages due to the doctrine of sovereign immunity. DOC believes the claimant has presented no evidence that DOC staff rejected his SASE and notes that it may simply have been mis-delivered by the post office and was rejected by another party. DOC states that mailroom staff make note of all refused correspondence and have no record of refusing this letter. DOC believes that, even if the letter was rejected by DOC staff without properly notifying the claimant, DOC is not liable for his costs. DOC states that the claimant chose to write multiple letters to various court officials, when he could have simply called a friend or family member and asked them to check with the court, which could have been accomplished with little to no cost to the claimant. Finally, DOC notes that, because his inmate complaint was untimely filed, the claimant has failed to properly exhaust his administrative remedies.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

David Czapiewski of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$84.73 for the value of one pair of tennis shoes and one pair of sandals (shower shoes) allegedly lost by DOC. The claimant states that when he arrived at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI), he had 2 pair Adidas tennis shoes and 1 pair Reebok sandals. (He states his sandals were incorrectly identified as Adidas on his property inventory.) On 8/15/14 the claimant was transferred to Temporary Lock-Up (TLU) and was also taken to Waupun Memorial Hospital. The claimant alleges that he wore his Adidas tennis shoes to the hospital and that DOC staff allowed hospital personnel to throw them away. He also alleges that WCI staff did not pack up his property in a timely manner when he was transferred to TLU; therefore allowing someone to steal his Reebok sandals. When the claimant received his property inventory and realized the tennis shoes and sandals were missing, he filed an inmate complaint, which DOC denied. The claimant notes that the 9/2/14 receipt for sandals referenced by DOC was for replacing the Reebok sandals lost by DOC. The claimant rejects DOC's claim of sovereign immunity.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that it is not legally liable for tort damages due to the doctrine of sovereign immunity. DOC states that due to his placement in TLU, the claimant's property was packed and held for inventory on 8/15/14. DOC notes that inmates are not allowed to possess personal shoes while in TLU. Pursuant to this policy, all personal shoes owned by the claimant were packed and he was issued WCI boots. DOC notes that the claimant was wearing these WCI boots when he was taken to

Waupun Memorial; therefore it is not possible for hospital staff to have thrown away his personal tennis shoes. The claimant filed an inmate complaint related to his allegedly missing property. In response to this complaint, DOC staff reviewed the claimant's property file and found one receipt for Adidas tennis shoes dated 3/20/14, which indicated he exchanged the new pair of tennis shoes for an older one. DOC found no receipts for any other shoes or sandals dated prior to this incident. (DOC found one receipt for sandals dated 9/24/14.) DOC believes the evidence shows the claimant has owned and exchanged various pairs of tennis and shower shoes over time. DOC states that between the time he purchased the new tennis shoes (3/20/14) and his transfer to TLU (8/15/14), the claimant's shoes easily could have been lost, traded, sold, or stolen. DOC believes the claimant has not provided evidence that DOC staff is responsible for his allegedly lost shoes.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

10. Tony C. Franklin, Jr. of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$32.50 for restitution money deducted from his inmate account in an allegedly improper manner by DOC. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). He states that his February 2011 Judgement of Conviction indicates that he had to pay restitution as a condition of his extended supervision. In May 2011, DOC began deducting restitution payments from the claimant's inmate trust account. The claimant states that he contacted the WCI business office several times to inform them that the court had ordered restitution payments only as a condition of his extended supervision and that DOC did not have authority to deduct the payment from his inmate account. DOC continued the deductions and the claimant contacted the sentencing judge to clarify. The claimant points to the fact that the judge sent a letter to WCI on 10/19/11, supporting the claimant's assertion that restitution was only imposed as part of his extended supervision, not during the confinement portion of his sentence. WCI stopped deducting the restitution payments after receiving this letter. The claimant requests reimbursement for the amount deducted from his account.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that the claimant was found guilty of armed robbery and received a bifurcated sentence of 15 years confinement and 7 years extended supervision. The court ordered payment of \$210 restitution as a condition of his extended supervision. DOC began deducting restitution from the claimant's account on 5/19/11. DOC remitted all restitution payments to the claimant's victim. DOC stopped making restitution deductions from the claimant's account after 8/25/11 and inactivated the restitution obligation on the claimant's inmate account on 9/17/11. On 10/19/11, DOC received a letter from the court indicating that there was no requirement that restitution for the case be taken from the claimant's inmate

account. However, DOC states that it has broad authority permitting such deductions. Pursuant to § 301.31, Stats., DOC has control of inmate funds arising from wages and may take deductions from those funds to pay down inmate obligations. § 303.01(8)(c), Stats., gives DOC the authority to determine how inmate earnings are spent and allows DOC to distribute inmate earnings for court-ordered obligations. And § 301.32(1), Stats., provides that any funds gifted to an inmate are under the control of the warden and may only be used for the benefit of the inmate. DOC believes that making payments towards court-ordered obligations benefits an inmate by reducing his debt. In addition, DOC states that WI case law had determined that gifted monies can be considered an available resource of a defendant when the court calculates restitution. DOC believes it is permitted to make deductions from inmate accounts to satisfy an inmate's lawful obligations, including restitution. However, once DOC became aware the claimant's Judgment of Conviction stated that restitution was part of his extended supervision, DOC ceased the deductions. Finally, DOC notes that victims of crime in WI are granted an explicit constitutional right to restitution. The funds deducted by DOC have been passed on to the claimant's victim in furtherance of that constitutional right and are not being held for the benefit of the state.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

The Board concludes:

The Honorable, the Senate:

Senate Bill 21 as 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 is approved and deposited in the office of the Secretary of State.

Four years ago, Wisconsin faced a \$3.6 billion deficit after years of irresponsible budgeting practices and gimmicks. Our state was on the same unstable and untenable path as the federal government. Wisconsin's rainy day fund was depleted and the State had past due bills, including repaying illegal raids of segregated funds. During the four years before I was elected as Governor, Wisconsin lost over 134,000 jobs and the unemployment rate stood at 8.1 percent. Property taxes had increased 27 percent over the previous decade

While politicians in Washington continued down the path of excessive spending and crushing debt for the next generation, we chose a different path by making tough, but prudent, decisions to regain our financial footing and build the foundation for future growth. Despite continued poor national economic performance and empty rhetoric from Washington, we begin the new fiscal year with a balanced budget and without the accounting gimmicks of the past. In contrast to Washington's soaring debt, Wisconsin's fiscal house is in order. Because of our responsible budgeting, new bonding will be at the lowest level in 20 years. Moody's upgraded our outlook from "stable" to "positive." And our total outstanding debt level has gone down. Wisconsin has \$279 million in its rainy day fund, the highest balance ever, and 165 times larger than when I took office. Most importantly, we have reduced the unemployment rate to 4.6 percent, and Wisconsin continues to outperform the national average. Wisconsin workers are finding jobs – 2014 was Wisconsin's best year for private sector job growth in a decade. They are helping to grow our economy and enjoying growth in per capita personal income that exceeds the U.S. average. In addition, similar to my first two budgets, this budget continues to hold the line on property taxes, and in 2014 homeowners realized the first increase in equalized values since 2008. In total, through the three biennial budgets I have signed into law, we will have achieved six consecutive years of property tax reductions. No other state can claim this achievement.

Act 55 continues to invest in our priorities and create prosperity for all of Wisconsin's citizens. The budget I introduced on February 3, 2015, focused on our core themes of growing our economy, developing our workforce, transforming education, reforming government and investing in our infrastructure. It also continued to provide property tax relief while protecting our taxpayers from new taxes and unreasonable fees. My budget recommendations also contained significant reforms in both K-12 and higher compassionate entitlement reform education, accountability through a drug testing initiative, and additional opportunities for recipients of government assistance to transition to meaningful, family-sustaining employment. Beyond these reforms, my budget recommendations held state borrowing to historic lows, while ensuring a strong infrastructure and setting the stage for a once-in-a-generation \$1 billion investment in downtown Milwaukee.

In a highly-competitive, globalized economy, Wisconsin residents and businesses have consistently told us we need lower taxes, a capable workforce, a strong educational system centered on parental choice, and an efficient government in order for us to successfully compete and increase our

prosperity. They have not asked for a handout; rather, they have asked for the opportunity to achieve through initiative and independence. It is our job to create this environment and maximize these opportunities by creating jobs, expanding our economy and removing government barriers.

Throughout its deliberations, I worked collaboratively with the Legislature to improve upon the introduced budget. I am pleased the Legislature has returned a budget that achieves our shared goals of continuing to improve our economy, reforming education by putting parents and students first, and sound fiscal management. Specifically, the Legislature worked diligently to enhance funding for public schools while continuing to reduce property taxes.

This bill also reduces the marriage penalty, providing new relief to Wisconsinites. Additional tax relief is provided to teachers, job creators and the families of our neighbors with disabilities. These achievements continue our commitment to keep more money in the hands of Wisconsin taxpayers.

Furthermore, this budget invests an additional \$309 million into educational opportunities. This budget also provides parents with more choices, and more information, relating to their children's education, regardless of their zip code.

We are helping to make college more affordable for our state's working families. For the first time in history, University of Wisconsin System tuition will be frozen for four years straight. It was important to us to double down on our historic two-year tuition freeze from our last budget for our students and their families. This budget provides new flexibilities to the University of Wisconsin System to govern its own affairs and achieve significant savings and efficiencies. The budget also reinforces the link between education and employment opportunities by retaining performance-based funding for the Wisconsin Technical College System and dedicating further resources to our successful Fast Forward program. Combined, these investments expand economic opportunity to all.

While the budget provides new opportunities for Wisconsinites to achieve the American Dream, it also protects our most vulnerable neighbors and relatives. This budget maintains our commitment to preserve Medicaid as a safety net for our state's neediest by providing health insurance coverage for everyone living in poverty, despite the continued instability of the Affordable Care Act. It also includes a framework for establishing sustainability in our long-term care system and preserving the rights of families and patients to choose what works best for them.

The budget also includes accountability and opportunity for certain public assistance programs and unemployment insurance recipients by providing both drug testing and treatment. We want people to know the dignity that comes from work. These programs will encourage personal responsibility and workforce readiness. We have continued to reform these entitlement programs by including treatment for substance abuse for those truly trying to overcome the cycle of addiction, so they can provide for themselves and their families.

Further, we are continuing to make prudent investments in Wisconsin's infrastructure by prioritizing major highway projects and comprehensive upgrades to the maintenance of the state highway system. This will ensure the movement of manufacturing and agricultural products to market efficiently. We are also continuing to invest in our tourism industry, which was recently ranked number one in the Midwest. Similarly, this budget also invests in one of our greatest tourist attractions, our magnificent natural resources, by ensuring continued broad access to those natural resources for future generations.

This budget enacts many substantive government reforms, ranging from a shared agency services initiative designed to more efficiently deliver "back office" state agency functions, to consolidating and merging various functions in order to enhance customer service and taxpayer value. Combined, these efforts are reducing the size of state government and enhancing accountability.

Finally, in contrast to politicians in Washington who continue to expand the reach of the federal government, our reforms have put the hardworking citizens and taxpayers of Wisconsin back in control. This budget focuses on growth and opportunity for all with no new taxes, while implementing common sense reforms to ensure state government is more effective, more efficient and more accountable to the public.

The following is a brief summary of how this budget, including my vetoes, will continue to make Wisconsin more prosperous, more independent and more efficient:

Tax Relief

- Reduces property taxes to achieve an unprecedented success of providing six consecutive years of tax reductions for the median value home, a benefit that accrues to all homeowners.
- Reduces the burden of the Alternative Minimum Tax by conforming it to the federal tax code.
- Reduces the marriage penalty by increasing the standard deduction for married filers.
- Improves Wisconsin's business climate by simplifying Wisconsin's tax code and reducing the state's compliance burden on individuals and businesses.
- Newly establishes Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) accounts to empower the disabled community and their families to achieve greater independence and assist with various expenses.
- Provides tax relief to teachers who purchase supplies for their classrooms.

Growing Our Economy

• Completes the phase-in of the Manufacturing and Agriculture Credit to stimulate the development of Wisconsin's key economic sectors.

- Increases the cap on the Enterprise Zone Jobs Credit program to provide additional capacity for economic development incentives.
- Streamlines and consolidates the Economic Development Credit and Jobs Tax Credit into a single Business Development Tax Credit to incentivize job creation and investment in Wisconsin.
- Simplifies the Wisconsin tax code by adopting numerous updates to the Internal Revenue Code.

Developing Our Workforce

- Implements a drug screening, testing and treatment program to increase the workforce readiness of individuals receiving unemployment insurance and those receiving certain public assistance benefits.
- Reduces the time limit for participants in Wisconsin Works from 60 months to 48 months, with limited extensions, to encourage participant placements in jobs at a more rapid pace and reduce dependence on public benefits.
- Provides \$3 million to expand transitional jobs to other high-need communities, including Racine, Beloit and rural communities.
- Provides additional funding for GED test assistance and adult literacy grants to support adult literacy for TANFeligible individuals.
- Adds credit for prior learning for veterans who have military training to the performance measures for the Wisconsin Technical College System.

Transforming K-12 Education

- Increases state aid for schools by \$108.1 million in the equalization aid formula to offset the need for districts to levy property taxes, and \$84.1 million over the base in per pupil aid, thus providing districts with additional spending flexibility.
- Expands the ability of low-income parents across the state to access a wide variety of educational options through expansion and reform of the parental choice programs.
- Increases transparency in K-12 funding by having public funding follow the student for expansions in school choice, charter school authorization and special needs scholarships.
- Enhances student opportunity and rebuilds perennially underperforming schools in the Milwaukee Public School District by creating an Opportunity Schools and Partnership Program to facilitate innovative reforms to improve school performance.
- Increases local control by affirming the authority of school districts to choose their own academic standards, provides a pathway to offering multiple student assessment options and prevents the mandatory application of the national Common Core Standards.
- Expands independent charter school options for parents by designating four new charter school authorizers: the

University of Wisconsin System, the Waukesha county executive, tribal colleges and Gateway Technical College.

- Rewards high-performing independent charter school operators by granting authority to open additional schools if the operator's other schools receive four or five stars on the most recent school accountability report.
- Enhances private school accountability by increasing the qualifications for all teachers and administrators in choice schools and permitting independent researchers to access data at the Department of Workforce Development, Department of Children and Families and Department of Health Services to enhance research related to the efficacy of choice schools.
- Improves open enrollment programs by: (1) increasing the standard open enrollment transfer amount; (2) retaining the course options program; and (3) eliminating the ability of school districts to deny pupils with disabilities on the basis of undue financial burden.
- Provides additional resources for rural schools by increasing funding for the sparsity and high-cost pupil transportation categorical aid programs by \$13.4 million over the biennium, and by increasing the reimbursement rate under the pupil transportation aid.
- Creates two new avenues to teacher licensure, which assists rural school districts with staffing while ensuring teacher quality.
- Augments state support for special education by providing \$5 million in fiscal year 2016-17 for high-cost special education aid.
- Further assists families with special needs students by creating a special needs scholarship program.
- Requires Wisconsin high school students to pass a civics assessment in order to graduate.
- Simplifies the school accountability report through the establishment of a star rating system.
- Recognizes individual learning styles of students by permitting school districts to grant high school credits based on competency or a learning portfolio.
- Permits districts to choose their own reading readiness assessments.

Transforming Higher Education

- Ensures affordability of, and access to, a University of Wisconsin education for Wisconsin residents by extending the freeze on undergraduate in-state tuition.
- Modernizes the concept of tenure by authorizing the Board of Regents to enact such policies.
- Reforms shared governance to provide Chancellors with greater authority and accountability at individual campuses, while maintaining student oversight of student-set fees.
- Provides additional flexibilities to allow the University of Wisconsin System to maximize efficiencies while maintaining excellence in education and research.

Reforming Government

- Continues to protect property taxpayers by maintaining levy limits on counties and municipalities and limiting levy increases to the rate of growth due to new construction.
- Maintains the state's commitment to counties and municipalities by funding shared revenue at current levels.
- Consolidates all food safety, recreational facility, lodging and food protection activities into the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, creating efficiencies in regulation of these programs and reducing consumer confusion by assigning oversight to one agency.
- Reduces overtime, enhances security and modernizes security methods at adult correctional institutions with proven technology and strategic ground patrol.
- Permits members of certain religious sects to apply for a waiver from certain modern building code requirements when the requirement is contrary to their established religious beliefs.
- Reduces the risk of a data security breach by providing additional resources for information technology services.
- Realizes efficiencies by combining the Department of Administration's Division of Energy Services and Division of Housing, and by transferring most functions of the State Energy Office to the Public Service Commission.
- Capitalizes on existing expertise and increases efficiency by transferring Workers' Compensation adjudicatory functions to the Department of Administration's Division of Hearings and Appeals.
- Creates an Office of Marketing in the Department of Tourism to utilize the expertise of the department to provide centralized marketing services to state agencies.
- Authorizes the Department of Administration to provide Lean government consulting services to implement efficiencies across state government.
- Reduces offender recidivism by authorizing the Department of Children and Families to leverage social impact bonding in the city of Milwaukee.
- Reduces the size of government by eliminating numerous long-term vacant positions.
- Reduces state health insurance costs by modernizing health plan design and providing an opt-out option and corresponding stipend to state employees.

Investing in Infrastructure

- Invests a total of \$6.14 billion to support Wisconsin's transportation infrastructure.
- Provides \$415 million for continued construction of the Zoo Interchange and I-94 North-South Corridor. Maintains the scheduled completion date of the Zoo Interchange project.
- Invests \$16.8 million in the Hoan Bridge and \$13.2 million in the state's harbor system.

- Provides over \$1.5 billion for state highway rehabilitation and over \$485 million for major highway development.
 - Provides \$35 million for Freight Rail Preservation.
- Increases the state's investment in broadband expansion by providing up to \$1.5 million annually from the universal service fund for broadband expansion grants and providing up to \$18 million over the 2015-17 biennium for two grant programs to assist rural schools in financing information technology infrastructure improvements and training teachers in the use of educational technology.

Preserving Wisconsin's Heritage

- Provides a total \$21 million of Stewardship borrowing authority for land acquisition and \$9.75 million of borrowing authority for property development and local assistance in each year, beginning in fiscal year 2015-16 and ending in fiscal year 2019-20.
- Provides up to \$19.6 million of unobligated existing Stewardship borrowing authority for the Kettle Moraine Springs Fish Hatchery to continue the modernization of the facility.
- Protects the integrity of segregated natural resources funds by eliminating \$958,300 of earmarks for various organizations.
- Provides \$750,000 forestry SEG and authorizes the Department of Natural Resources to participate in the federal Good Neighbor Authority program, to initiate additional watershed restoration and forest management services on federal land.

Medicaid Entitlement Reform

- Preserves essential safety net programs, including SeniorCare and Medicaid, while implementing reforms to slow expenditure growth and maintain essential health care services.
- Expands the Family Care program statewide and improves the integration of long-term care and acute care services, while maintaining the self-direction option for long-term care benefits.
- Fully funds the FoodShare Employment and Training program to provide able- bodied adults with education, skills and work experience necessary to obtain employment and become self-sufficient.
- Strengthens support for senior citizens by providing additional funding and positions for ombudsmen at the Board on Aging and Long-Term Care.
- Provides resources to support dementia care specialists in selected aging and disability resource centers across the state
- Expands Medicaid coverage to the treatment portion of residential substance abuse treatment to ensure individuals with substance abuse disorders receive the appropriate level of care in the most appropriate setting.

- Expands the settings in which immunizations may be provided for Medicaid beneficiaries to include pharmacies.
- Improves program integrity in the use of personal care and other Medicaid services while ensuring members receive essential services on a timely basis.
- Provides \$30 million GPR for disproportionate share hospital payments to ensure access to care for low-income patients.
- Establishes a pilot program for pediatric and adult emergency dental care.
- Provides annual increases to the children's long-term support services and autism services programs, and utilizes excess funds for children's long-term care services or other children's programs.
- Increases Medicaid reimbursement for nursing homes through an acuity adjustment.

Investing in Wisconsin's Veterans

- Strengthens support for residents in Wisconsin veterans homes by providing additional funding for an ombudsman at the Board on Aging and Long-Term Care.
- Provides funding for equipment purchases and operational improvements at veterans homes.
- Waives fees for a Commercial Driver License for veterans who hold a military Commercial Driver License.
- Transfers the Veterans Grant Program from the Department of Workforce Development to the Department of Veterans Affairs to enhance program awareness and efficiency.
- Provides one-time funding from the veterans trust fund to the Wisconsin Technical College System Board to create a veteran grant jobs pilot program. Requires the board to create a competitive grant process to distribute grants to districts that request funding for veterans services and identify matching funds.
- Creates an appropriation under the Higher Educational Aids Board for payments to tribal colleges equal to the amount per student the tribal college has received or expects to receive from the Bureau of Indian Education in the federal Department of the Interior based on the number of Native American students who were enrolled in the previous academic year and the number of full-time equivalent Wisconsin resident students who were enrolled in the college in the previous academic year for whom the college will not receive Bureau of Indian Education funds.
- Provides an appropriation during the biennium for payments to towns, cities or villages that provide municipal services to state veterans homes and authorize the Department of Veterans Affairs to transfer unappropriated balances from other PR appropriations in state veterans homes to the appropriation.

Improving Mental Health Programs

- Redesigns the state's juvenile community supervision to provide services based on a juvenile's individual risk and needs.
- Expands existing drug addiction programming in the Department of Corrections by creating a voluntary pilot program for eligible offenders with an opioid addiction-related conviction. Provides \$836,700 GPR in each year for the program.
- Increases access to mental health care for our rural residents by providing resources to such services remotely.
- Provides financial assistance to counties to establish robust crisis services programs, pairing law enforcement with mental health professionals to create a best practice model.
- Improves response to mental health crises by requiring counties to provide community-based crisis assessment by a mental health professional prior to an emergency detention, while maintaining Milwaukee County's 24-hour rule for emergency detention.
- Extends the sunset date for the Milwaukee County emergency detention pilot program from May 1, 2016, to July 1, 2017.

Protecting Wisconsin's Citizens

- Improves access to breast and cervical cancer screenings for low-income women without insurance by increasing funding for the Wisconsin Well Women Program.
- Increases services for individuals with HIV or AIDS by increasing funding for Mike Johnson life care and early intervention services grants, which provides funding to AIDS service organizations.
- \bullet Provides an additional \$5 million for domestic abuse grant funding.
- Provides \$1 million over the biennium to the Wisconsin Trust Account Foundation for legal services to low-income families for cases related to domestic abuse, sexual abuse, restraining orders and injunctions for at-risk individuals.
- Provides \$2 million for residential and/or community-based services for child victims of sex trafficking.
- Increases Sexual Assault Victims Services to \$2.1 million in fiscal year 2016-17.
- Provides \$421,300 annually for additional global positioning system offender tracking for individuals convicted of serious child offenses and those who violate domestic abuse or harassment temporary restraining orders.
- Enhances services to abused and neglected children by providing \$160,000 over the biennium to the Wisconsin Court Appointed Special Advocates.
- Permits county boards to impose a \$20 surcharge on felony or misdemeanor convictions, and creates crime prevention funding boards to distribute such revenues to nonprofit organizations whose purpose is to prevent crime.

In exercising my constitutional authority, I have made 104 vetoes to the budget. These vetoes will reduce overall

spending, constrain earmarks, allow the executive branch to efficiently perform its statutory duties, and correct legislative errata. These vetoes increase the general fund balance by \$44,495,400 GPR over the biennium.

I commend the Legislature for delivering on our collective priorities: six consecutive years of property tax relief, four consecutive years of University of Wisconsin System tuition freezes, continued workforce development, compassionate entitlement reform, educational reform based on parental options, responsible infrastructure management and enhanced government efficiencies. These achievements demonstrate our commitment to preserving the freedom of our citizens, expanding opportunities to achieve the American dream, and meeting the competitive challenges of a globalized economy while overcoming the failed leadership of our federal government.

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A. GROWING OUR ECONOMY

1. Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation Funding to the Joint Committee on Finance Supplemental Appropriation

Section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.865 (4) (a)]

This provision provides a total of \$23,503,200 GPR in fiscal year 2015-16 and \$34,711,000 GPR in fiscal year 2016-17 to the Joint Committee on Finance's general purpose revenue funds general program supplementation appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (a). Of this amount, \$16,300,000 GPR in fiscal year 2015-16 and \$12,400,000 GPR in fiscal year 2016-17 were placed in the appropriation due to actions by the Joint Committee on Finance to reduce the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation's operations and programs appropriation and place these funds in the Committee's supplemental appropriation.

I object to the placement of these funds in the Committee's supplemental appropriation because this mechanism to hold these funds does not provide the greatest flexibility for the state's financial position or its policy options.

I am partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.865 (4) (a)] to reduce funding for the Committee's supplemental appropriation by \$16,300,000 GPR in fiscal year 2015-16 and \$12,400,000 GPR in fiscal year 2016-17 to remove those amounts placed in the appropriation by the Committee related to reductions for the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation and not otherwise allocated for another purpose so that these monies will improve the general fund balance during the biennium. Doing so strengthens the state's fiscal position and still allows these funds to be allocated by the By lining out the Legislature for future purposes. appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (a) and writing in a smaller amount that deletes these funds, I am vetoing the portion of the bill that holds these funds in the Committee's supplemental appropriation. I am also requesting the secretary of the Department of Administration not to allot these funds.

2. Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation Grants to Various Organizations

Section 9150 (5dc)

This section requires the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to make four grants to specified organizations for a total of \$750,000 GPR. The Mid-West Energy Research Consortium is to be granted \$250,000 GPR to support Wisconsin- headquartered private companies in the energy, power and control industries. Prosperity Southwest Wisconsin is to be granted \$250,000 GPR to develop a regional revolving loan fund program in the southwest region for regional development entrepreneurial start-ups. Northcentral Technical College is to be granted \$150,000 GPR for equipment for its culinary arts program and business incubator facilities. Finally, the Marathon County Economic Development Corporation is to be granted \$100,000 GPR for a revolving loan fund to support minority-owned businesses in Marathon County.

I am vetoing this section because I object to reducing the flexibility of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to make its own determinations as to which organizations should be given assistance. One of the purposes of the corporation was to have maximum flexibility in funding the most promising economic development opportunities. The funds that would have been used for these specified grants will instead remain with the corporation to be awarded for eligible purposes at its discretion. However, I encourage the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to collaborate with the Marathon County Economic Development Corporation and Prosperity Southwest Wisconsin to enhance economic opportunities in these regions.

3. Definition of Bona Fide Angel Investments

Sections 2191 and 9337 (4b)

These sections modify the definition of a "bona fide angel investment" under the angel investment credit program to include the purchase of a note or bond that is convertible into an equity interest beginning with tax year 2016.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to changing the purpose of the angel investment credit to potentially create an incentive for the purchases of secured debt instruments in companies in lieu of equity investments. Under current law, investors in such securities receive the credit when they convert their securities into an equity stake. This treatment is appropriate and should be maintained.

4. Conduit Revenue Bonds

Sections 1067b, 1969ab, 1969am, 1969b, 1969c, 1969e, 1969f, 1969g, 1969h, 1969i, 1961im, 1969j, 1969k, 1969L, 1969m, 1969n, 1969p, 1969pe, 1969q, 1969r, 1969s, 1969t, 1969u, 1969v, 2033b, 2037d, 2237d, 2238b, 2515j and 2524p

This provision modifies current law as it relates to the Public Finance Authority and its ability to issue bonds in an assortment of ways. These changes include broadening the authority's ability to own or operate property; allowing the authority to purchase bonds; and empowering the authority to create one or more nonprofit corporations to carry out, or assist the authority to carry out, all or part of the purposes or powers of the authority. In addition, the provision exempts the authority and related nonprofit corporations from having

to pay certain property and sales taxes and extends existing personal liability law exemptions to officers, employees and agents of the authority and related nonprofit corporations.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to broadening the powers of the authority and do not support the decreases in accountability that would result from enacting this provision or the loss of local control and loss of state tax revenue. Such sweeping changes to current law decrease transparency and could create unintended consequences, the full extent of which are unknown.

B. TRANSFORMING EDUCATION

5. Statewide Assessment System

Sections 3248b [as it relates to renumbering s. 118.30 (1) (a)] and 3248c

These sections require the State Superintendent to review and adopt a summative examination system to be administered beginning in the 2015-16 school year to pupils in grades 3 through 10 in the subjects of English, reading, writing, science and mathematics. The State Superintendent must ensure that each examination adopted or approved under the system satisfies the assessment and accountability requirements under federal law. Additionally, the State Superintendent must ensure that the summative examination system adopted or approved meets the following criteria: (a) the system is vertically scaled and standards-based; (b) the system documents pupil progress toward national college and career readiness benchmarks derived from empirical research and state academic standards; (c) the system measures individual pupil performance in the subject areas of English, reading, writing, science and mathematics; (d) the system provides for the administration of examinations primarily in a computer-based format but permits examinations to be administered with pencil and paper in certain limited circumstances; and (e) pupil performance on examinations adopted or approved under the system serves as a predictive measure of pupil performance on college readiness assessments used by institutions of higher education.

I am partially vetoing section 3248b as it relates to renumbering s. 118.30 (1) (a) and vetoing section 3248c in its entirety. This provision is unnecessary and would have codified assessment criteria in state law that are closely aligned with national standards I oppose and which local school districts should not be mandated to adopt. Ultimately, local school boards across Wisconsin should be able to determine what test they administer and what standards they adopt.

6. Participation in Athletics and Extracurricular Activities

Section 3245t [as it relates to school district membership in an athletic association]

This section requires a school board to allow home-based private educational program pupils residing in the school district to participate in interscholastic athletics or extracurricular activities on the same basis and to the same extent as pupils enrolled in a public school in the district. A

school district may not be a member of an athletic association unless the association requires member school districts to allow home- based private educational program students to participate in athletics in the district. Home-based private educational program pupils must provide the school board with a written statement that the pupil meets the school board's requirements for participation in interscholastic athletics based on age and academic and disciplinary records. No person may provide a false statement, and the school board may not question the accuracy or validity of the statement or request additional information. A school board charge participation fees to a home-based private educational program pupil participating in a district activity on the same basis and to the same extent as these fees are charged to pupils enrolled in the district.

I am partially vetoing this section as it relates to the prohibition of school district membership in an athletic association unless the association requires member school districts to permit home-based private educational program pupils residing in the district to participate in interscholastic athletics in the district. I object to this provision because I do not believe state statutes should stipulate the participation and membership requirements of a private athletic association.

7. Read to Lead Fund Deletion

Sections 65b, 568b, 720d, 723d, 1007b, 1031b, 1678m, 1678r, 1678s and 9406 (1q)

These sections sunset the Read to Lead segregated fund and related appropriations, effective June 30, 2017.

I am vetoing the sunset of the segregated fund and related appropriations because it unnecessarily limits the availability of potential resources to improve childhood reading in future biennia. With this veto, the Department of Children and Families and Department of Public Instruction would be able to continue to distribute reading funds, if they become available, beyond the 2015-17 biennium.

8. Independent Financial Audits for Parental Choice Program

Sections 3355c [as it relates to the treatment of long-term fixed assets] and 3382c [as it relates to the treatment of long-term fixed assets]

These sections require an independent financial audit of private schools participating in a parental choice program. Among the requirements of the independent financial audit is the audit must be prepared according to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) with allowable modifications for long-term fixed assets acquired before 2014.

I am partially vetoing these sections because the reference to 2014 is inappropriate. Participating private schools are transitioning to GAAP-based financial reporting for the 2015-16 school year. Given this transition timing, the reference to 2014 should be removed.

9. Appointment of Director of Office of Educational Opportunity

Section 9148 (4g)

This section requires the president of the University of Wisconsin System to appoint a special assistant to the president to serve as the director of the Office of Educational Opportunity within 120 days of the effective date of the budget bill.

I am vetoing this section in its entirety to remove the requirement that the special assistant be appointed within 120 days of the effective date of the bill because I object to an arbitrary timeline. I expect the University of Wisconsin System to conduct a thorough search for a dynamic and reform-minded individual to fill the role of director of the Office of Educational Opportunity, and such a search cannot be conducted under artificial deadlines.

10. Director of Office of Educational Opportunity Salary

Section 1207g

This section specifies that the Board of Regents shall set the salary for a newly-created special assistant to the president of the University of Wisconsin System, who shall serve as the director of the new Office of Educational Opportunity.

I am vetoing this section in its entirety because I object to the dissimilar treatment of this special assistant position and other special assistant positions in the system. Under current law, the Board of Regents sets the salaries for the top executive positions at the University of Wisconsin System, such as chancellors and vice presidents. Current law does not provide authority for the Board of Regents to set the salaries of any special assistant positions; these are addressed within personnel systems, and the director of the Office of Educational Opportunity should be treated similarly.

11. Custodian of Records for Opportunity Schools and Partnership Program

Section 3387n [as it relates to commissioner records custodian powers]

This section creates an Opportunity Schools and Partnership Program under the oversight of a commissioner. Among the powers of the commissioner is the power to designate one or more persons to be legal custodians of records on behalf of any authority defined in s. 19.32 (1), including state or local entities.

I am partially vetoing this provision because I object to the broad authority that the commissioner is given to designate the custodian of records for any state or local entity.

12. Contract for Study of Special Needs Scholarship Program

Section 3224m [as it relates to the requirement that the Legislative Audit Bureau contract for a study of the Special Needs Scholarship Program]

This section creates a Special Needs Scholarship Program for students with disabilities. Among the program requirements, the Legislative Audit Bureau must contract for a study of the program with one or more researchers who have experience evaluating school choice programs. The study must evaluate the following: (a) the level of satisfaction

with the program expressed by participating pupils and their parents; (b) the percentage of participating pupils who were victimized because of their special needs at their resident school district and the percentage of such pupils at their participating school; (c) the percentage of participating pupils who exhibited behavioral problems at their resident school district and the percentage of such pupils at their participating school; (d) the average class size at participating pupils' resident school districts and at their participating schools; and (e) the fiscal impact of the program on the state and on resident school districts. The contract must require the researchers who conduct the study to do all of the following: (a) apply appropriate analytical and behavioral science methodologies to ensure public confidence in the study; (b) protect the identity of participating schools and pupils; and (c) require that the results of the study be reported to the appropriate standing committees of the Legislature by January 9, 2019.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the Legislative Audit Bureau contract for a study and the related references to the contract. I object to the practice of contracting with outside researchers for this study. The Legislative Audit Bureau possesses the needed expertise to complete the study.

13. Special Needs Scholarship Program Eligibility Requirement

Section 9134 (6q) [as it relates to the child's attendance in public school for the 2015-16 school year]

section establishes alternative eligibility requirements for a child to be awarded a Special Needs Scholarship in the 2016-17 school year. Under this section, the child must meet the following conditions: (a) the child applied to attend a public school in one or more nonresident school districts under the open enrollment program in one of the previous five school years; (b) the child applied to attend public school in one or more nonresident school districts under the open enrollment program in the same year for which an application for a scholarship was submitted and the application was rejected without a successful appeal; and (c) the child will attend a public school in the state for the entire 2015-16 school year.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the word "entire" from the requirement that the child attend public school in the state for the 2015-16 school year because I object to the limitation this provision places on families that may move their child to private school for a portion of the school year in order to meet the child's needs.

14. Virtual Marketplace for Digital Educational Resources

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.255(1)(dt)], 560m and 3193s

These provisions create a virtual marketplace for digital educational resources and appropriate funding for a contract with a vendor or multiple vendors to develop and add educational content to a digital textbook marketplace and resource center. The marketplace would allow authorized personnel from public school districts, independent charter schools, private schools and home based private educational programs to purchase or license digital educational resources, including the following: (a) electronic textbooks; (b) individual sections or chapters from electronic textbooks; (c) supplemental resources, including worksheets, chapter reviews, quizzes or study sheets; and (d) other digital offerings, including videos, available from content providers or publishers. The Department of Public Instruction is required to host the marketplace, and content must be accessible to a range of computing and mobile devices and operating systems. Districts may license the content at a tiered rate for one year, three years or six years, or purchase content under a permanent license.

I am vetoing sections 560m and 3193s and partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (1) (dt)] because I object to duplicative avenues for the provision of electronic educational materials. The digital learning portal being developed and hosted by the department provides access to digital content. In addition, the bill creates and provides funding for a new digital learning collaborative for the delivery of digital content. I believe the provisions under current law and the new digital learning collaborative can be leveraged to adequately address the need for digital resources for schools and educational programs.

15. Performance Funding Formula

Section 1343m

This section specifies that the percentage of state aid distributed by the Technical College System Board under the performance funding formula under s. 38.28 (2) (be) would be 30 percent in fiscal year 2016-17 and each year thereafter.

I am vetoing this section because I object to a cap on the percentage of state aid distributed through the performance funding formula. As a result of this veto, the portion of state funding distributed through the performance funding formula would revert to zero in fiscal year 2017-18. The state should reassess whether 30 percent is an appropriate performance funding level as outcomes related to formula factors become increasingly available. I support a transition from the general aid formula to a performance based formula. This formula should be based upon each technical college district's performance on key state priorities to be achieved by increasing the percentage of state aid distributed through the performance funding formula each year and correspondingly decreasing the percentage of state aid distributed through the general aid formula.

16. Performance Funding Report

Section 9143

This section requires the Wisconsin Technical College System to review the performance-based funding formula and submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance that includes any potential changes to the formula and additional performance criteria to be included.

I am vetoing this section to remove the reporting requirement because it is administratively burdensome and

unnecessary. The system already reviews the funding formula and criteria in preparing its biennial budget request as required under current law.

17. Allocable Student Fees

Sections 1139g and 1142m [as it relates to responsibility for allocable student fees]

These provisions modify current law to specify that students at University of Wisconsin institutions and colleges would have the responsibility for recommending the disposition of student fees subject to the approval of the chancellor and final confirmation of the Board of Regents.

I am vetoing section 1139g and partially vetoing section 1142m [as it relates to responsibility for allocable student fees] because I object to removing the students' role in determining how segregated fees to support student activities and services are allocated. Students should retain the responsibility to decide the disposition of fees that they pay and that support campus student activities. As a result of this veto, the students will continue to work in consultation with the Chancellor, subject to the final confirmation of the Board of Regents, to determine the disposition of fees that support student activities.

18. Annual Financial Audit

Section 9148 (7i)

This section suspends current law requiring the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct annual financial audits of the University of Wisconsin System during the 2015-17 biennium. Instead, the Board of Regents is required to contract with an independent accounting firm to conduct the annual financial audit. The audit must be provided to the Board of Regents, Joint Legislative Audit Committee, Joint Committee on Finance and the Governor. It also allows the Legislative Audit Bureau to work with the independent accounting firm to conduct the audit.

I am vetoing this section because I object to this limitation of the Legislative Audit Bureau's role in maintaining effective oversight of the University of Wisconsin System. Since the University of Wisconsin System will remain a state agency, continued financial audits and program evaluations from the Legislative Audit Bureau are appropriate to provide the public with continued insight into the financial and management practices of the Board of Regents.

19. Energy Conservation Master Lease Program

Sections 29, 29m, 35m, 41m, 55m, 364m [as it relates to eligible energy conservation projects], 366m [as it relates to eligible energy conservation projects], 375m, 378t, 392g [as it relates to eligible energy conservation projects], 392r [as it relates to eligible energy conservation projects] and 1176m

These sections create a new program through which the University of Wisconsin System may use master lease financing for energy conservation projects. The president of the University of Wisconsin System would select qualified providers outside of current law regarding bidding procedures. In addition, the president would oversee the

implementation of these projects without Building Commission or Department of Administration oversight or approval. Eligible projects would be required to meet the following criteria: (a) the estimated cost of a project must be offset by the estimated savings after completion of the project; (b) all savings from the project must be guaranteed by the provider through a performance contract; (c) savings must be realized within 10 years; and (d) estimated savings for each project must be measured and verified in a manner established by the president. The system also would have the ability to continue to participate in the Department of Administration's energy efficiency program for project financing.

I am vetoing sections 29, 29m, 35m, 41m, 55m, 375m, 378t and 1176m in their entirety, and partially vetoing sections 364m, 366m, 392g and 392r [as they relate to eligible energy conservation projects], to eliminate the new master lease program. While I support the concept of using master lease financing to accomplish energy efficiency projects, I object to the lack of accountability in this proposal. The state is responsible for initial financing of any master lease project, and requires assets with bona fide value to secure what essentially is a loan to an agency. Therefore, a measure of accountability is needed for such a program. I am requesting that the system, Legislature and Department of Administration work together to craft a more judicious proposal that provides the system with additional financing opportunities while protecting taxpayers.

20. Investment of Certain Funds

Section 1162r

This section allows the Board of Regents to invest auxiliary enterprises revenues, gifts, grants, donations and segregated fees for building projects outside of the State Investment Fund. It also requires the Board of Regents to directly employ a financial manager, contract with the State of Wisconsin Investment Board or hire an investment firm to manage any investments outside of the State Investment Fund.

I am partially vetoing this section to allow the Board of Regents to invest only gifts, grants and donations outside of the State Investment Fund. Since the University of Wisconsin System will remain a state agency, I believe that revenues generated by University of Wisconsin institutions should remain in the state treasury and be invested in the State Investment Fund. Allowing the Board of Regents to invest gifts, grants and donations outside the State Investment Fund is consistent with the flexibility to conduct building projects funded with gifts and grants without Building Commission and Department of Administration approval and oversight.

21. Gift and Grant Funded Building Projects

Section 369t [as it relates the purpose of gifts and grants]

This section defines "UW gifts and grants project." This definition is utilized in two additional sections of the bill which collectively exempt University of Wisconsin building projects from Building Commission and Department of Administration approval and supervision if the project meets

the following requirements: (a) the project is funded entirely with gifts and grants made for the express purpose of funding the building project; and (b) the project is let by the University of Wisconsin System using the current law single prime contracting process.

I am partially vetoing this section to strike the language "for the express purpose of funding the construction project." I object to this language because the requirement that funds be specifically earmarked for a certain building project is overly restrictive and burdensome. I support providing the Board of Regents with more flexibility in the planning and execution of certain building projects. As a result of this veto, the Board of Regents may plan and execute building projects funded with any gifts and grants funds outside of the Building Commission's process.

22. Department of Administration Assessment for Program Revenue Funded Building Projects

Sections 365m and 9301 (3f)

These sections require the Department of Administration to assess the University of Wisconsin System on a fee-for-service basis for design and management of program revenue supported building projects. It also caps the amount the Department of Administration may assess the University of Wisconsin System at 4 percent of the total project cost.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to the vagueness of the concept of assessments using a "fee-forservice" model. I am directing the Department of Administration to develop a definition of "fee-for-service" within the context of project management and building construction. This will assist stakeholders in determining whether such a model should be employed. In addition, I object to the 4 percent cap on fees the Department of Administration may assess the University of Wisconsin System. Current law requires the Department of Administration to oversee all engineering, architectural and construction work and bid letting for University of Wisconsin System building projects supported by program revenue. Arbitrarily capping the rate at which the Department of Administration may assess for such work may prevent the department from recouping costs actually incurred on larger building projects, which may have negative impacts on other projects under the department's management.

23. Student Identification Numbers

Sections 1279, 4468e, 4468m and 4468s

These provisions repeal current law prohibiting University of Wisconsin institutions and private higher education institutions from using or incorporating a student's social security number as a student identification number.

I am vetoing these provisions in their entirety because the restrictions in current law are in the best interests of maintaining student privacy and protecting the integrity of student data.

24. Procurement

Sections 316p, 321, 322, 327d, 328, 355s, 1204m, 3578p, 9148 (2d) and 9448 (2d)

These provisions require the Board of Regents to develop policies for procurement and submit those policies to the Joint Committee on Finance. If the Committee approves the policies, current law relating to state agency purchasing would not apply to the University of Wisconsin System.

I am vetoing these sections because the segregation of university purchasing from the rest of state government may result in unintended consequences. The University of Wisconsin System constitutes a majority of state spending on procurement contracts and, therefore, any discussions to remove the University of Wisconsin System from state procurement contracts should include the Department of Administration to allow both organizations to properly analyze and prepare for any changes. In addition, current law under s. 16.71 (1m) provides the Department of Administration with the ability to delegate to the Board of Regents and the University of Wisconsin-Madison the authority to enter into any contract for materials, supplies, equipment or contractual services relating to information technology or telecommunications. Therefore, I am directing the Department of Administration to work with the Board of Regents and the University of Wisconsin-Madison to continue to improve upon existing delegation agreements and develop a framework that provides these entities with more flexibility in purchasing and procurement while balancing the need to maintain the state's purchasing power.

25. Aquaculture Specialist

Sections 806g, 806r and 9448 (5j)

These sections provide tribal gaming funding of \$100,000 annually for the Aquaculture Demonstration Facility, to fund a University of Wisconsin System-Extension aquaculture specialist position.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to the unnecessary use of tribal gaming funding for this purpose, and believe that if the University of Wisconsin System believes a position is needed to carry out the mission of the Aquaculture Demonstration Facility, it may reallocate system resources.

26. Minority Teacher Loan Program Eligibility

Sections 1372r and 9319 (3f) [as it relates to the requirement to student teach in Milwaukee]

Section 1372r sets forth eligibility provisions for a reformed minority teacher loan program. To be eligible for the program, students must be: (a) state residents enrolled at least half-time as sophomores, juniors or seniors in an institution of higher education; (b) individuals enrolled in a program of study leading to a teacher's license in teacher shortage areas; (c) individuals enrolled in a program of study that includes student teaching in the city of Milwaukee; and (d) individuals with a grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4-point scale or the equivalent.

I am partially vetoing these sections to delete the requirement that eligible individuals must be enrolled in a

program of study that includes student teaching in the city of Milwaukee. The Milwaukee Public School District certainly is in need of excellent teachers, and the loan forgiveness structure of the improved program encourages teachers to teach and remain in Milwaukee. As such, I object to this eligibility provision because it is unnecessary and overly restrictive.

27. Position Reports

Section 277m

This section modifies current law to require the Board of Regents to report annually, instead of quarterly, on the number of non-GPR full-time equivalent positions created or abolished by the Board of Regents in the previous 12-month period and specifies that the report be based on the October 1 payroll. It also deletes current law specifying that positions authorized for the University of Wisconsin System not be included in any state position report beginning on July 1, 2015.

I am partially vetoing this section to maintain current law that excludes University of Wisconsin System positions from state position reports. The University of Wisconsin System has transitioned to its own personnel systems (one for the University of Wisconsin-Madison and one for all other system employees), which simplify titling structures in a way that is specific to the university and establish a separate compensation structure. Therefore, it is inappropriate to include university employees in the same report as all other state government employees.

28. Academic Staff Appointments

Section 1210m

This section prohibits the Board of Regents from making probationary or indefinite academic staff appointments beginning July 1, 2015. In addition, all academic staff holding probationary appointments on June 30, 2015, are transitioned to a fixed term appointment, while indefinite appointments are made permanent.

I am vetoing this section in its entirety because I object to making these changes without additional study to determine whether there are possible unintended consequences, particularly on certain programs at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

29. Conservation Fund Appropriations

Sections 596g, 596r and 9448 (5k)

Section 596g specifies that, from the grants for forestry programs appropriation, in each year of the 2015-17 biennium, \$124,400 be provided to the University of Wisconsin- Stevens Point for the paper science program and \$10,100 (the remaining appropriation balance) be provided to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for the Center for Cooperatives. For fiscal year 2017-18, sections 596r and 9448 (5k) restore the prior funding levels for the paper science program and Center for Cooperatives of \$78,000 and \$56,500 (the remaining appropriation balance), respectively.

I am vetoing these sections in their entirety because I believe existing funding levels from the conservation fund are appropriate, and that the University of Wisconsin System can reallocate other funds if needed for the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point paper science program.

C. REFORMING GOVERNMENT

30. Group Insurance Board Appointments

Sections 105d, 136d and 9112 (1c)

This provision requires that the six members of the Group Insurance Board who are appointed by the Governor to two-year terms under current law be appointed with the advice and consent of the Senate. The terms of office of the current gubernatorial appointees would terminate on the effective date of the budget bill, but the appointees could continue until successors are appointed and qualified to assume the board positions.

In addition, this provision would expand the board from 11 members to 15 members and specify the following new members: (a) one Representative appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly; (b) one Representative appointed by the Minority Leader of the Assembly; (c) one Senator appointed by the Majority Leader of the Senate; and (d) one Senator appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate.

I am vetoing this provision in its entirety because it is administratively burdensome and unnecessarily adds a layer to the appointment process for the board. While the Legislature has a substantial role in setting statutory policy and establishing overall funding levels, the members of the board must develop significant expertise in health plan design and administration, while balancing the needs of the employers, employees and health plans. This is best achieved with the current composition of the board.

31. Review of Annual Proposed Changes to the State Group Health Insurance Program

Sections 1389r and 9112 (3j)

These sections require the Group Insurance Board to submit proposed changes to the state group health insurance program to the Joint Committee on Employment Relations by April 1 of each year. The committee must hold a public hearing and act by May 1 to approve, disapprove or modify the changes and then submit them to the Governor. The Governor is then required to approve or reject the changes in their entirety within 10 calendar days. An affirmative vote of at least six of the eight members of the committee would be required to override any rejection by the Governor.

For calendar year 2016, any changes must be submitted to the committee no later than 30 calendar days after the enactment of the budget and the committee must act within 30 calendar days of receiving the proposed changes.

I am vetoing this provision in its entirety because I object to having the committee infringe on the responsibilities of the board, which was created to set policy and oversee administration of the group health insurance plan for state and local employees, retirees and employers. The committee

already has a substantial role given its biennial review of the compensation plan for state employees. Additionally, health plans are already in the process of bidding for calendar year 2016, and requiring the board to submit changes to the committee after enactment of the budget will create a substantial and problematic delay in the rate setting process.

32. Agency Budget Requests

Sections 272d, 272h and 272i

These sections require state agencies, beginning in the 2017-19 biennium, to submit budget requests under three scenarios: (a) no increase in GPR, PR or SEG funding over base with the exception of sum sufficient reestimates and amounts required to comply with federal law; (b) the scenario under (a) modified to include cost-to-continue amounts as well as amounts due to caseload or population adjustments, and amounts necessary to fund previously enacted program commitments; and (c) the scenario under (b) modified to include any amounts requested for programmatic changes.

I am vetoing these sections in their entirety because I object to these restrictions on gubernatorial flexibility to establish budget instructions in a manner consistent with his or her fiscal and policy priorities.

33. Statutory Reserve and Budget Stabilization Fund

Sections 282m, 478d, 478g and 478h

Section 282m specifies that a revenue transfer from the general fund to the budget stabilization fund can only occur if the statutory reserve of 2 percent of GPR appropriations plus compensation reserves has been met in the general fund. Any general fund revenues in excess of 2 percent of GPR appropriations plus compensation reserves would then be subject to the current provision, which transfers to the budget stabilization fund 50 percent of the amount that actual deposits during the fiscal year exceed the amount projected to be deposited in the general fund during the fiscal year.

Under current law, each year, the Department of Administration secretary calculates the difference between the amount of moneys projected to be deposited in the general fund during the fiscal year that are designated as "Taxes" in the general fund summary of the biennial budget bill and the amount of such moneys actually deposited in the general fund during the fiscal year. Under sections 478d and 478g, the required statutory balance at the end of fiscal year 2015-16 would be \$65,000,000 plus the amount calculated by the secretary for fiscal year 2015-16; and in fiscal year 2016-17, the balance would be \$65,000,000 plus the amount calculated by the secretary for both fiscal year 2015-16 and fiscal year 2016-17.

Section 478h specifies that in fiscal year 2017-18, and in each fiscal year thereafter, the required statutory balance would be the prior fiscal year's required statutory balance plus \$5,000,000 and the accumulated amount calculated by the secretary for fiscal year 2017-18, and each fiscal year thereafter, but not to exceed 2 percent GPR appropriations plus compensation reserves.

I am vetoing sections 282m, 478d and 478g, and partially vetoing section 478h, because I object to reducing the amounts to be deposited into the budget stabilization fund in the future. The budget stabilization fund is an important tool that helps ensure the state's financial stability. I support increasing the required statutory balance each fiscal year, however, and am therefore retaining a portion of section 478h, which will add \$5,000,000 each year, beginning in fiscal year 2017-18, to the required statutory balance.

34. Utilization of Department of Administration Procurement and Purchasing Services

Sections 282s, 326q, 327b, 327d [as it relates to s. 16.745], 330n, 333r, 334c, 339n, 345b, 345d, 345f, 345h, 346p, 354p, 355b and 355s [as it relates to s. 16.745]

These sections specify that the Department of Administration may not require the Department of Employee Trust Funds to utilize the Department of Administration's procurement and purchasing services. These sections also establish statutory authority and a process for the Department of Employee Trust Funds purchasing function. The Department of Employee Trust Funds would be required to file all bills and statements of purchase with the Department of Administration secretary, who would then be required to audit and authorize payment of such bills and statements. Upon the Department of Employee Trust Funds' request, the Department of Administration would be required to make recommendations and provide assistance regarding purchasing procedures, as well as process requisitions for purchases and procure materials for the Department of Employee Trust Funds.

I am vetoing sections 282s, 326q, 327b, 330n, 333r, 334c, 339n, 345b, 345d, 345f, 345h, 346p, 354p and 355b, and partially vetoing sections 327d [as it relates to s. 16.745] and 355s [as it relates to s. 16.745] because I object to limiting the ability of the Department of Administration to create statewide efficiencies related to procurement. For Chapter 16 purchasing authority, the Department of Employee Trust Funds should be treated like other agencies and operate under Department of Administration procurement policies and contracts unless a delegation agreement is signed by both parties. I am directing the Department of Administration to work collaboratively with the Department of Employee Trust Funds on such an agreement.

35. Pay-for-Performance Contracting Reports

Sections 1785m and 9152 (1c)

Section 9152 (1c) requires all state agencies to review current programs and submit a plan that identifies existing government expenditures that could be decreased or programs that could be improved by using pay-for-performance contracts. The plan must be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance on or before December 1, 2015.

In addition, under section 1785m, the Department of Children and Families is authorized to issue a request for proposals for a pay-for-performance contract to reduce offender recidivism in the city of Milwaukee. The section specifies that after selecting a proposal, the department must

submit a written plan including certain information to the Committee under passive review.

I am vetoing section 9152 (1c) to remove the requirement that all state agencies review current programs and submit a plan to the Committee because it is unduly burdensome to those state agencies that do not have operations that are likely to be candidates for pay-for-performance contracts. With this veto, all state agencies would not be required to review and report as prescribed. However, I direct other cabinet agencies that do have the potential to use these contracts to review applicable programs and consider the use of this type of contracting.

I am partially vetoing section 1785m because I object to the department having to submit a report to the Committee. With this veto, the department would not need to submit the plan under passive review, but would be authorized to pursue the pay-for-performance contract to reduce Milwaukee offender recidivism.

36. Local Zoning Exception

Sections 44b and 44m

These sections exempt the structure or facility constructed for the benefit or use of the state that was enumerated under the state building program as the State Transportation Building Replacement – Madison (the Hill Farms facility) from compliance with municipal zoning ordinances.

Though well-intentioned, I am vetoing these sections because this exemption is unnecessary, as the city and state are working to ensure the project meets local standards and is constructed on schedule.

37. Building Commission Contracting Requirements

Sections 47b, 370, 373b and 374b

These sections clarify the authority of the Building Commission by separating two existing types of alternatives to state construction specified in the statutes.

I am partially vetoing section 47b and fully vetoing sections 370, 373b and 374b because I object to removing acquisition of facilities from the Building Commission's authority and adding a cross-reference that does not clarify the exemption of alternative state construction types from single prime contracting requirements. The intent of this veto is to retain current practice.

38. Health Insurance for Protective Services Employees

Section 1952c

This section specifies that if a first class city offers health care insurance to employees who are police officers, fire fighters or emergency medical technicians, it shall also offer to those employees a high-deductible health plan that has identical design features to the plan offered to state employees.

I am partially vetoing this section because I believe that the city of Milwaukee should be able to choose the specific design features of its high-deductible plan to best suit its overall benefit structure rather than being required to use the design of the state's high-deductible plan.

39. Information Technology Services for Certain Agencies and Shared Agency Services Pilot Program

Section 9101 (5n) (a)

Section 9101 (5n) requires the Department of Administration to consult with certain agencies to develop a plan for assuming responsibility for human resources, payroll, finance, budgeting, procurement and information technology services, to be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, 2016, for approval under s. 13.10, for implementation beginning July 1, 2016.

I am partially vetoing section 9101 (5n) (a) to remove the Board on Aging and Long-Term Care, Board for People with Developmental Disabilities, Office of the Secretary of State, Office of the State Treasurer, Office of the Governor and Office of the Lieutenant Governor from the list of agencies that are subject to the plan. These agencies already receive most, if not all, of the above services from the department. With this veto, the department can focus on plans to extend services to agencies currently receiving few or no services.

40. Energy Efficient Building Designer Tax Deduction Certification

Section 393p

This section directs the Department of Administration to provide any necessary certification for a person, who was the primary designer of an energy efficient commercial building property installed on or in state-owned property, to receive a federal energy efficient commercial buildings tax deduction.

I am vetoing this section because this requirement poses a significant administrative burden to the department for a tax deduction that has already been eliminated as of December 31, 2014. Significant department staff and resources would be needed to apply this requirement retroactively and to review past projects and ensure appropriate analysis and documentation is completed to justify and defend equitable allocations of the tax deduction among multiple designers for all state construction projects.

41. Time Allocation for Workers' Compensation Examiners

Section 2830e

This section requires the Department of Administration's Division of Hearings and Appeals to have examiners on its staff to decide and assist in effective adjudication of claims for workers' compensation. In addition, this section specifies that at least 18 administrative law judges must spend at least 80 percent of their time on workers' compensation issues.

I am partially vetoing this section because it unnecessarily limits the ability of the division to manage its caseload and workforce. I proposed this transfer to realize greater efficiencies due to the ability to cross-train staff and to utilize a larger pool of administrative law judges to manage unexpected increases in contested case hearings. While the workers' compensation expertise of current administrative

law judges is valuable and needs to be taken into consideration, the specific time allocation of division employees is a function best left to the discretion of the division administrator.

42. Duties of the Secretary of State

Section 1959e

This section creates a new method for certain towns contiguous to a third class city and certain towns contiguous to a village to incorporate without utilizing the Department of Administration's incorporation process if they meet certain criteria. These criteria currently only apply to the town of Windsor in Dane County and the town of Maine in Marathon County. In this section, the town clerk must certify the vote to incorporate and submit a fee to the Secretary of State, who would then issue a certificate of incorporation.

I am partially vetoing this section because I object to the Secretary of State retaining the responsibility to certify an incorporation vote for only these two incorporations. Going forward, the incorporation process will be administered by the Department of Administration. With this partial veto, the town clerk would certify the incorporation vote to the "secretary." The intent of this veto is to retain this function in the Department of Administration.

43. Alternative Telecommunications Utilities

Section 3528m

This section removes the Public Service Commission's authority to require alternative telecommunications utilities to obtain commission approval before abandoning or discontinuing a line, extension or service under current law. In approving a request, the commission must require the utility to remove, from the right-of-way, any pole at ground level or any other structure extending more than three feet above ground level that belongs to the utility at the time of abandonment. Further, if the commission approves such a request and the abandoned right-of-way is in a rural area and was obtained by the utility by condemnation, the utility shall be required to dispose of the right-of-way within three years of the date of approval.

I am vetoing this provision because I do not believe the commission's authority regarding alternative telecommunications utilities should be modified in this manner. These changes would shift responsibility for removing abandoned lines and poles to land owners and municipalities, which may create cost and safety issues. In addition, decisions by providers to abandon service may affect service to customers of interconnected providers. With this veto, the commission's current authority is retained.

44. Intervenor Compensation

Sections 510m, 3532k, 3532m and 3532n

These sections eliminate the authority of the Public Service Commission to make a grant to one or more nonstock, nonprofit advocacy corporations as well as reduce the compensation rate for consumer groups and

representatives to 50 percent of the cost of participating in a commission proceeding.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessarily prescriptive. Under current law, the commission has the flexibility to compensate for some or all of the reasonable costs of participation in commission proceedings. With this veto, the commission can continue to ensure only reasonable costs are reimbursed by its intervenor compensation appropriation and prescribe a match as it deems appropriate.

45. Extension of Municipal Water and Sewer Service Appeals Process

Section 1991m

This provision permits a dispute between municipalities concerning the extension of water or sewer service to first be appealed to the Public Service Commission. This provision subsequently permits a municipality involved in a dispute to appeal the decision of the commission to the Department of Natural Resources. The department must provide its decision within 45 days.

I am partially vetoing section 1991m to remove the Department of Natural Resources from the appeals process because it is unnecessary. Municipalities appealing a decision by the Public Service Commission concerning the extension of municipal water or sewer service should follow the existing appeals process for appealing a decision by the commission. Under the existing appeals process, an appeal is made to the circuit court in the county in which the municipality is located.

46. Universal Service Fund Revenues Report

Section 9136 (2u)

This section requires the Public Service Commission to report to the Joint Committee on Finance on causes of unencumbered balances in the universal service fund and changes that could be adopted to reduce future universal service fund balances. The report would be submitted to the Committee for its third quarterly meeting in 2015, and the commission could not revise provider contribution rates unless the report has been approved by the Committee.

I am vetoing this section in its entirety because it is unnecessary. The commission already has the ability to utilize universal service fund revenues when determining telecommunication provider rates for the coming year, as demonstrated in 2012. In addition, this section hinders the commission's statutorily-required duty to establish contribution rates by delaying the revision of rates until after the report is approved the Committee.

47. State Agency Lease Requirements

Sections 356q and 356r

This provision requires the Department of Administration to solicit lease options in counties other than Dane or Milwaukee before signing or renewing any lease. In addition, the department is required to prepare a cost-benefit analysis for each lease or renewal to determine whether there are potential savings to the state from moving the affected agency

outside Dane or Milwaukee County. The analysis would be provided to the affected agency head and the Joint Committee on Finance.

I am vetoing this provision because this function is already within the department's current law authority under s. 16.84 (5), and therefore, this type of analysis can be accomplished administratively. However, I am directing the department to further evaluate these processes and to consider opportunities where leases could be made in counties outside of Dane or Milwaukee.

48. Tourism Marketing – Earmark Study

Section 9144 (3i)

This section requires the Department of Tourism to conduct a study of the statewide benefits of current marketing earmarks. The study would also include possible alternative marketing expenditures that could be made with the funds. The department would be required to submit the study to the Joint Committee on Finance by January 1, 2017.

I am vetoing this section because it is administratively burdensome. By removing the study, the department can focus its resources where they will be most effective at increasing tourism in the state.

49. Surplus for Rate-Based and Rate-Regulated Providers

Sections 1471nb, 1471nc, 1471ne, 1471nf, 1471ng, 1471nh, 1471nj, 1471nk, 1471nn, 1471np, 1471nq, 1471nr, 1471ns, 1776n, 1776p, 1777fb, 1777fc, 1777fe, 1777ff, 1777fh, 1777fp, 1777fq, 1777fr, 4250c, 4250e, 4250h, 4250k, 9306 (3u) and 9406 (1v)

These sections modify contracting requirements for ratebased services and rate- regulated services purchased by the departments of Health Services, Children and Families, and Corrections, as well as certain county departments.

I am vetoing these changes to surplus retention limitations for rate-based and rate-regulated service providers in their entirety because the changes may have unintended consequences beyond the original intent. With this veto, changes would not be made to the current surplus retention structure. However, I am instructing the departments to consider the concerns raised by certain provider groups and to explore alternatives that could be presented in future legislation.

50. Ambulatory Surgical Centers Reporting

Section 3483t

This section requires the Department of Health Services to annually submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance summarizing the following information related to the ambulatory surgical centers assessment: (a) the total amount of revenue collected; (b) the total amount each center paid; (c) the amount any eligible managed care organization received; (d) the total amount each managed care organization paid; and (e) the total amount of revenue returned to eligible centers. The Department of Revenue is required to provide any information requested from the

Department of Health Services necessary to complete the report.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the creation of unnecessary reporting requirements. In addition, I object to the infringement on taxpayer privacy created by the requirement to include specific information that is subject to restrictions on disclosure of certain tax-related information.

51. Transfer of Regulation of Food, Lodging and Recreational Establishments

Sections 132m, 9102 (3q) and 9402

These sections relate to the transfer of the regulation of food, lodging and recreational establishments from the Department of Health Services to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. The provision prohibits the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, or local health departments that have been granted agent status, from modifying the fees in effect on the general effective date of the bill that apply to entities regulated under Subchapter II of Chapter 97 of the statutes, as created under the bill, related to food safety. In addition, this provision creates the Food Safety Advisory Council in the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, requires the secretary of the department to appoint council members and requires the council to meet quarterly.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to prohibiting the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection or local health departments from modifying current fees. The department and local health departments require the flexibility to ensure that fees are set at an appropriate level to sufficiently cover costs associated with the program. I also object to the requirement to create the Food Safety Advisory Council in the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection because it is unnecessary. The department already has the flexibility to create a council under current law.

52. Audiologist and Speech Language Pathologist Fees

Section 9138 (6c)

This provision sets speech language pathologist and audiologist credential renewal fees at \$75 biennially.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to the practice of singling out certain credential fees in statute. This provision prevents the Department of Safety and Professional Services from setting renewal fees according to the department's administrative and enforcement costs attributable to the regulation of these occupations, as is current practice.

53. Progressive Raffles

Sections 4546m, 4546p, 4546r and 4546t

These sections authorize a charitable organization holding a Class B raffle license to conduct a progressive raffle, which is a raffle in which a series of drawings is held and the money collected in ticket sales is carried over to the succeeding drawing if a winner does not select a prize card from among a set of cards.

I am vetoing these sections in their entirety because I object to the changes to raffles as it could threaten the exclusive rights of the Indian tribes to conduct Class III gaming in return for making revenue-sharing payments to the State, which is reflected in the compacts signed by the tribes and the State. The exclusivity clauses prohibit the State from substantively altering the charitable games authorized under state law.

54. Joint Committee on Finance Approval of Tax Reciprocity Agreements

Sections 2117e, 2226e and 2226em

These sections prohibit any income tax reciprocity agreement from taking effect unless approved by the Joint Committee on Finance under s. 13.101 and explicitly prohibit any new agreement with either the State of Minnesota or the State of Illinois unless approved in this manner. This provision would not apply to current agreements with the states of Kentucky, Illinois, Michigan and Indiana.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to reducing the flexibility of the Department of Revenue to manage these agreements.

55. Sales Tax Exemption for Amusement Device Proceeds

Sections 2515m, 2515n, 2524m, 2524n and 9437 (2u)

These sections specify that the taxable sales on the privilege of having access to the use of an amusement device include only the sales of playing time on the device. In addition, these sections specify that the current law provision that imposes the sales tax on the sale of or the right to use specified digital goods and additional digital goods (whether on a permanent or less than permanent basis and regardless of whether the purchaser is required to make additional payments for continued use) does not apply to specified digital goods or additional digital goods used on or as part of a device to the extent that playing time on an amusement device derives from playing specified digital goods or additional digital goods.

These sections further specify that certain playing time on an amusement device is to be excluded from the general taxability under the sales and use tax of admissions to amusement, entertainment or recreational events.

These sections also define "amusement device" as a pool table, video game machine, video gambling machine, dartboard, pinball machine, foosball table, air hockey table, shuffleboard table or jukebox.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to the overly broad exception it creates to the imposition of the sales and use tax on digital goods. Such a broad exception may have unintended administrative and fiscal consequences both in the short term and the long term in our increasingly technology-driven age.

56. Cigarette Tax Manufacturer's Discount

Section 3445p

This section increases the cigarette manufacturer's tax discount, from 0.7 percent to 0.8 percent, which manufacturers, bonded direct marketers and distributors receive on cigarette tax stamp purchases from the state.

I am vetoing this section because I object to this unnecessary adjustment. Wisconsin's cigarette tax discount is sufficiently in line with the discount provided by other states, and consequently, no increase in the discount is merited at this time.

57. Additional Auditor Reporting Comparison Requirements

Section 9137

This provision requires the Department of Revenue to submit an annual report to the Joint Committee on Finance related to the activities of the additional auditing positions provided under the bill. The report requires information on the actual or estimated amount of state tax revenues generated by the full-time additional positions and the expenditures associated with the positions. In addition, the report requires information on the number of audits, and the amount of revenue generated from those audits, that were performed on persons headquartered or residing outside Wisconsin compared to persons headquartered or residing in Wisconsin.

I am partially vetoing section 9137 to remove the requirement to report information on the number of audits and the revenue from those audits performed on persons headquartered or residing outside Wisconsin compared to persons headquartered or residing in Wisconsin. I am partially vetoing this section because release of this information may potentially violate the confidentiality standards to which the department must adhere to safeguard taxpayer privacy.

58. Sales Tax Exemption for Construction Materials

Sections 2524r, 9337 (4c) and 9437 (2c)

This provision creates a sales and use tax exemption for goods sold to construction contractors who, in fulfillment of a real property construction activity, transfer goods to Wisconsin elementary and secondary school districts, municipalities or nonprofit entities if the goods become a component of a facility in Wisconsin that is owned by the entity. This provision becomes effective on January 1, 2016.

I am vetoing this provision because the language as drafted is much broader than the scope of the intended legislation as it would apply to construction materials purchased by a contractor for any project. While I am vetoing this provision because of the broad scope of the provision as drafted, I support the intended provision and encourage separate legislation to enact the intended exemption. As such, I support a sales and use tax exemption for goods sold to a construction contractor, while fulfilling a real property construction activity, when the goods are transferred to Wisconsin elementary and secondary school districts, municipalities or nonprofit entities if such goods will be a part of a facility located within the state.

59. Implementation of Room Tax Modifications

Sections 1990ec, 1990ek and 1990ekf

These provisions change the definition of "tourism entity" to mean a nonprofit organization providing destination marketing staff and services that came into existence before January 1, 2016, except that if no such organization exists in the municipality on January 1, 2016, the municipality may contract with such an organization if one is created in the municipality. Under current law, a "tourism entity" must have come into existence before January 1, 1992.

These provisions also specify that if a municipality is subject to other provisions of the bill that require reductions in the amount of room tax revenue that is permitted to be retained for purposes other than tourism promotion and tourism development, the municipality may continue to utilize room tax revenues to satisfy the terms of a contract provided that contract is entered into before January 1, 2016.

I am partially vetoing the definition of "tourism entity" because I object to the period of time that is provided wherein a new tourism entity may first come into existence that is not created in the municipality. Under my partial veto, a "tourism entity" must either have come into existence before January 1, 1992, consistent with current law, or if no such organization exists in the municipality on January 1, 2016, be an entity that a municipality chooses to contract with that is created in the municipality and which provides destination marketing staff and services. As a result of my partial veto, the period of time wherein new entities that are not necessarily created in the municipality and which could be created to potentially divert funds from legitimate convention and visitor bureaus or chambers of commerce would be eliminated.

I am vetoing the provisions allowing use of room tax revenue for the satisfaction of a contract entered into before January 1, 2016, because I object to the additional time that the provisions allow wherein a municipality may enter into new contracts that utilize room tax revenues for purposes other than tourism promotion and tourism development. This additional time could be used to diminish the intent of the bill to require greater shares of room tax revenue to be devoted to tourism promotion and tourism development.

60. Layoff Procedures for Certain Employees

Section 9132 (3d)

This provision excludes the layoff procedures under s. 230.34 (2) (a) from applying to layoffs relating to education-related positions and science services positions in the Department of Natural Resources funded under certain appropriations during the 2013-15 biennium. The procedures would require the employees to be laid off on the basis of seniority or performance or a combination thereof, or by other factors.

I am partially vetoing this provision because I object to the narrow exclusion. The purpose of the provision was to ensure that, during the 2015-17 biennium, the department has maximum flexibility in reassigning or reducing staff without eliminating limited term or temporary employees who are critical to the department's operations. My veto restores the intent of the provision.

61. Unfunded Pension Liability Payments

Sections 293d, 293h and 293p

These sections seek to clarify that the secretary of the Department of Administration may require any state agency, including authorities, to make payments related to debt service payments on pension obligation bonds that were issued to cover unfunded pension liabilities. Section 293p explicitly states that the obligation related to unfunded pension liabilities for former University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics Board employees is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics Authority now that the board has been dissolved.

I am vetoing these sections because I do not believe that current law needs to be clarified. Consistent with the current law payment methodology as administered by the Department of Administration, the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics Authority should continue to honor its legal obligation to pay the board's unfunded pension liability obligation in order to avoid shifting these costs to other state agencies and authorities and therefore, unfairly and disproportionately, to state taxpayers.

62. County and Municipal Levy Limit Adjustment for Transferred Services

Section 1986j

This provision creates a new adjustment under the county and municipal levy limits allowing a municipality or county to make an adjustment to its levy limit authority related to savings realized as the result of a service transfer between political subdivisions. The amount of the adjustment is an increase of up to one-half of the amount of the savings realized, subject to an apportionment of those savings agreed upon by the political subdivisions. This adjustment first applies to levies set in 2015.

I am vetoing this section because I object to allowing counties and municipalities to turn savings from service consolidation into a property tax increase. While I support the objective of savings through service consolidation, those savings should be the incentive for consolidation and a benefit to the residents of the county or municipality, rather than an additional tax burden.

63. Alcoholic Beverage License Modifications

Sections 3432d, 3432e, 3432g, 3432i, 3432k, 3432m, 3432o, 3432q, 3432r, 3432s, 3432t, 3432u and 3432w

These sections permit a municipality that has reached its "Class B" alcohol license quota (for licenses for on-premises sales of liquor) to obtain another license by paying a nonrefundable fee of \$10,000 to a contiguous municipality that has not reached its quota. The transferred license would then remain under the jurisdiction of the receiving municipality.

These sections allow, but do not require, municipalities with available licenses to transfer a license. A municipality

that has not issued any "Class B" license would be prohibited from transferring a license under these sections.

These sections further specify that the \$10,000 fee paid for a reserve "Class B" license may not be rebated or refunded to the recipient of the reserve "Class B" license by the municipality that issued the reserve license.

In addition, these sections delete a current law provision that permits municipalities that have reached their liquor license quota to issue a "Class B" liquor license to a restaurant that seats at least 300 people.

Finally, these sections prohibit a winery from holding a Class "B" alcohol license which permits the on-premises consumption of beer unless it was issued a Class "B" license before the effective date of the bill.

I am vetoing these sections because they will have unintended consequences, including significant negative impacts on many tourist areas across the state. While some of these provisions may have merit, the Legislature should review the impact further and forward legislation when the full impact has been analyzed and such issues have been resolved.

64. Lafayette County Sheriff's Department

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.455 (2) (kd)] and 9126 (1q)

This provision appropriates \$50,000 PR in each year of the biennium to award a law enforcement grant to the Lafayette County Sheriff's Department.

I am vetoing section 9126 (1q) and partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.455 (2) (kd)] by lining out the amounts under s. 20.455 (2) (kd) and writing in smaller amounts that reduce the appropriation by \$50,000 in each year of the biennium because I object to providing a grant to one specific recipient. I encourage the Lafayette County Sheriff to work with the Attorney General to pursue funding to address law enforcement needs in the county.

D. INVESTING IN INFRASTRUCTURE

65. State Broadband Office Funding

Section 9136 (2q)

This section limits expenditure authority provided to the Public Service Commission for operations of the State Broadband Office to the 2015-17 biennium only. Funding would not be included in the base year for purposes of developing the 2017-19 biennial budget.

I am vetoing this section because I object to providing this funding on a one-time basis. The work of the State Broadband Office is ongoing; therefore, its funding should be as well. The office continues to perform duties vital to broadband expansion in this state, including maintenance of the state's broadband map, coordination with telecommunications providers, and outreach to communities and other stakeholders. With this veto, the office can continue to perform these important duties.

66. Environmental Impact Statement – East Arterial Highway

Section 2551u

This section requires the Department of Transportation to conduct an environmental impact statement in the 2015-17 fiscal biennium for a proposed major east arterial highway that begins at the intersection of STH 54 and STH 73 in the village of Port Edwards and extends to the intersection of STH 54 and CTH W in the city of Wisconsin Rapids with funding from the department's major highway development program. This section requires the department to conduct the environmental impact statement notwithstanding the current law requirement that the Transportation Projects Commission recommend the preparation of an environmental impact statement or environmental assessment for a proposed major highway development project before the department undertakes such an action.

I am vetoing this section because this requirement is premature. The conditions to be evaluated by the environmental impact statement may change significantly before the project is enumerated. Consequently, a second environmental impact study may be needed before the project advances, leading to unnecessary and inefficient department expenditures.

67. State Highway Program Audit

Section 9145 (1d)

This section requests the Joint Legislative Audit Committee to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct a performance evaluation audit of the Department of Transportation's state highway program and provide a report of its findings by January 1, 2017. The audit would be required to examine and provide recommendations on topics including: evaluating the department's traffic forecasting methodologies; assessing the processes and factors the department uses to select the timing, type and scope of highway improvements; determining if the department can reduce safety-related highway expenditures without significantly decreasing public safety; evaluating the department's compliance with federal and state minimum highway design and construction standards between fiscal year 2005-06 and fiscal year 2014-15; and auditing the department's compliance with state bidding laws between fiscal year 2005-06 and fiscal year 2014-15.

I am vetoing this section because the Joint Legislative Audit Committee already has the authority to request such an audit under current law.

68. Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities on State Highway Projects

Section 9345 (6j)

This section specifies the initial applicability of provisions in the bill that change the requirements for constructing bicycle and pedestrian facilities on state highway projects. Under the bill, current law is replaced with a requirement that the Department of Transportation give due consideration to establishing bicycle and pedestrian facilities

on all new highway construction and reconstruction projects using state or federal funds. Under one of the provisions, the department is prevented from constructing bicycle or pedestrian facilities using state funds in whole or in part unless it received approval from each municipality in which a highway project is located.

I am partially vetoing this section so that the requirement for municipal approval to expend state funds on bicycle and pedestrian facilities does not apply to projects that are already underway. I object to the potential delay of these existing projects that applying the new process of municipal approval may create.

69. Rail Fixed Guideway Transportation Systems

Section 2574 [as it pertains to counties with a first class city]

This provision directs that a county with a first class city may not incur any direct or indirect expenses, or forfeit revenue, related to the operation or accommodation of a rail fixed guideway transportation system in the first class city unless those expenses or revenues are reimbursed by the first class city.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the phrase "or accommodation" because I object to the inclusion of ambiguous language that may have unintended consequences. I am also removing this phrase because it is unnecessary as the intention of the provision may be achieved without the inclusion of this ambiguous phrase.

70. Freight Optimization Modeling Consultant Contract

Sections 481 [as it relates to ss. 20.395 (4) (bk) and 20.865 (4) (a)], 655e, 2547d and 9145 (4f)

These provisions allocate \$1,600,000 GPR in the Joint Committee on Finance's general purpose revenue funds general program supplementation appropriation in fiscal year 2015-16 for the purpose of funding a consultant contract for freight optimization modeling services and establish a new Department of Transportation GPR appropriation to expend these funds. Prior to any such expenditures, the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation and the department are required to conduct a joint study of the effects of freight optimization modeling on economic development and transportation infrastructure prioritization and submit a report by June 30, 2016, to the Joint Committee on Finance. The department may submit a s. 13.10 request along with the report to supplement the new GPR appropriation to contract with a consultant for freight optimization modeling. If the request is approved by the Committee, the department may amend an existing contract without needing a request for proposal or may issue a new request for proposal.

I am vetoing these provisions because they infringe on the authority of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation and the department to determine the appropriate use of resources related to their statutory duties. In addition, I am partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (4) (bk)] to delete the GPR appropriation for freight optimization modeling. In addition, by lining out the

appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (a) and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$1,600,000 in fiscal year 2015-16, I am vetoing the portion of the bill that funds these provisions. Finally, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

71. Amortization Schedule for Commercial Paper

Section 239r

This section requires the Department of Administration to establish a planned amortization schedule for the repayment of principal on the State's short-term, general obligation commercial paper programs, so that a uniform portion of the principal amount of such obligations is planned to be retired annually. This section defines the short-term commercial paper program as a short-term debt obligation issued in lieu of long-term state general obligation debt.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary and will impede the ability of the executive branch to administer state government debt management in the most efficient and effective way possible. The department will ensure that the State's general obligation commercial paper program continues to be administered consistent with current practices and in the best interest of the State's overall debt management.

72. General Transportation Aids Appeals Process

Sections 648r and 2595k

Section 2595k establishes an appeals process for counties and municipalities to challenge general transportation aid payments if a county or municipality believes that a reporting error resulted in an incorrect aid payment. If an error under this appeals process is substantiated, section 648r gives the Department of Transportation the authority to make a corrected aid payment out of the existing sum sufficient appropriation for correction of transportation aid payments. Section 2595k also requires the department to promulgate administrative rules that establish submission requirements and arbitration procedures for the appeals process.

I am partially vetoing section 648r and vetoing section 2595k in its entirety because this provision is unnecessary and redundant. The department already has procedures in place for local governments to request a corrected aid payment from the existing sum sufficient appropriation.

E. REFORMING HEALTH CARE ENTITLEMENTS

73. Family Care and IRIS Programs

Section 9118 (9)

Broadly, this provision requires the Department of Health Services to submit two waiver requests to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. The first waiver expands Family Care statewide by January 1, 2017, or upon approval of the waiver, whichever is later. The second makes a variety of reforms to the Family Care and Include, Respect, I Self-Direct (IRIS) programs, including requiring integrated health agencies to offer to long-term care participants both

acute care and long-term care services. Integrated health agencies are required to offer all of the services currently offered in the current IRIS program to maintain a self-direction program for consumers.

In addition, the provision requires the waiver to meet certain benchmark requirements and the department is required to hold a specified number of public hearings and to consult with stakeholders in the waiver development process. Further, the department is required to report to the Joint Committee on Finance with progress reports as well as for approval or disapproval of the final waiver package.

Further, the provision requires the department to include in its 2017-19 biennial budget request, any proposed statutory changes necessary to conform statutes to the approved waiver or state plan amendment.

I believe these reforms to our state's long-term care programs will help improve outcomes for the state's elderly and disabled residents by offering consumers integrated health, behavioral and long-term care under a single provider. These reforms not only improve outcomes for the state's most vulnerable residents, but help to ensure that these vital safety net programs are run in a more efficient, equitable and sustainable manner.

However, I am partially vetoing this provision to make several common sense changes in order to best serve the consumers of long-term care services. First, I am vetoing the requirement that there be no less than five long-term care regions because I object to creating a fixed number of regions. Allowing the department to define the number of long-term care regions in the state gives it the flexibility to create the number of regions that makes the most sense for consumers.

Secondly, I am vetoing the requirement that rates paid to integrated health agencies are set through a separate actuarial study because it is unnecessary. The state and federal government already require the rates paid through the long-term care programs be actuarially sound.

Lastly, I am partially vetoing the requirement that the open enrollment period coincide with the Medicare open enrollment period because I object to specifying the timing of the open enrollment period in the bill. The department will set an open enrollment period which makes the most sense for Wisconsin consumers as part of its waiver submission.

74. Labor Region Methodology Study

Section 9118 (4u)

This provision requires the Department of Health Services to study the labor region methodology used to assist with the determination of Medical Assistance reimbursement rates. The department is also required to propose, to the Legislature no later than July 1, 2016, any necessary changes to the methodology such that the proposed labor region methodology results in adjustments to direct care costs that reflect labor costs for nursing homes in each county. This section also prohibits the department from implementing any

proposed changes to the methodology without enactment of legislation.

I am vetoing this provision to eliminate the labor region methodology requirements, as these requirements are administratively burdensome and duplicative. The department already regularly evaluates the labor region methodology and may recommend changes if needed.

75. Dispute Resolution Process Relating Health Insurance Coverage of Chiropractic Treatment

Sections 4590r and 9122

The provision requires the Commissioner of Insurance to promulgate rules that provide for an independent process for resolving disputes related to insurer conduct with respect to statutory requirements for chiropractic coverage, access and reimbursement. The provision also specifies the criteria that must be included in the rules and authorizes the Commissioner of Insurance to promulgate emergency rules for the period before the effective date of permanent rules without being required to provide evidence that an emergency rule is necessary for the preservation of public peace, health, safety or welfare, or being required to provide a finding of emergency.

I am vetoing this provision because it would establish a unique method for dispute resolution for a single profession, which may result in administrative challenges and consumer confusion.

76. FoodShare Employment and Training Drug Testing

Section 1833

This provision requires the Department of Health Services to promulgate rules to develop and implement a drug screening, testing and treatment program that incorporates the provisions of 2015 Assembly Bill 191, as passed by the Assembly, that relate to screening and testing of FoodShare Employment and Training participants who are able-bodied adults without dependent children and are subject to FoodShare work requirements.

The department is required to include the following elements in its administrative rules: (a) only participants for whom there is a reasonable suspicion of use of a controlled substance without a valid prescription may be subject to testing; (b) if a person tests negative for use of a controlled substance, or tests positive but possesses a valid prescription, the individual will have satisfactorily completed the requirements of the provision; (c) if a participant tests positive and does not have a valid prescription, the individual must participate in state-sponsored substance abuse treatment to remain eligible for the employment and training program; and (d) while participating in state- sponsored treatment, the individual must submit to random testing in order to remain eligible for the employment and training program, and if an individual tests positive, the individual may begin treatment again, one time, and remain eligible for the program.

Subject to the promulgation of rules, the department shall screen and, if indicated, test and treat participants in an employment and training program who are able-bodied adults for illegal use of a controlled substance without a valid prescription for the controlled substance.

I am partially vetoing this provision in two ways. First, I am partially vetoing the requirement that treatment be state-sponsored because I object to requiring the state to cover all treatment costs, if the person has other coverage. This partial veto provides access to treatment while ensuring that the state is the payer of last resort.

Further, I am vetoing the requirement that testing is based on reasonable suspicion because I object to limiting the department's ability to determine which program participants will be screened and, if indicated, tested for illegal use of a controlled substance.

77. Grants to an Organization that Provides Advanced Life Support Training

Sections 481 [as it relates to appropriation s. 20.435 (1) (ch)], 668r, 668s, 9118 (3q) and 9418 (7q)

These provisions appropriate \$20,000 GPR in each year of the 2015-17 biennium for a grant to an entity that provides or facilitates advanced life support training to doctors, physician's assistants, nurse practitioners, registered nurses and paramedics who work in rural areas in Wisconsin. The provisions specify that the funding is only to be provided in the 2015-17 biennium.

I am partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (1) (ch)] and vetoing sections 668r, 668s, 9118 (3q) and 9418 (7q) because I object to earmarking these funds. By lining out the appropriation under s. 20.435 (1) (ch) and writing in smaller amounts that delete \$20,000 in each fiscal year, I am vetoing the part of the bill that funds this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

78. Repeal Health Care Provider Fees for Data Collection and Dissemination

Section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.865 (4) (a)]

This provision establishes the funding level for the Joint Committee on Finance general purpose revenue funds general program supplementation appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (a) for the 2015-17 biennium. Included in that amount is an unreserved amount of \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2015-16, which was placed in the appropriation through the Committee's actions which required the Department of Health Services to lapse \$1,000,000 from the program revenue balance of the general program operations; health care information appropriation to the general fund in fiscal year 2015-16.

I am partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.865 (4) (a)] by lining out the amount under s. 20.865 (4) (a) and writing in a smaller amount that reduces the appropriation by \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2015-16 because I object to increasing the Committee's supplemental appropriation without sufficient detail as to how these funds are intended to be used. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

79. County-to-County Nursing Home Bed Transfers

Section 9118 (7g)

This section requires the Department of Health Services to develop a policy that specifies procedures for applying for, and receiving approval of, the transfer of available, licensed nursing home beds among counties and requires the department to report to the Joint Committee on Finance no later than July 1, 2016.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary. Current law already specifies the requirements that must be met for a transfer of licensed beds. However, I am directing the department to review current procedures and prepare a plan to address any issues that arise from that review.

80. Exempt Institutions for Mental Disease and County-Operated Nursing Homes from Bed Assessment

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (2) (a)], 1875d, 1875e and 1875f

This provision exempts county government-owned institutions for mental disease and state-only licensed facilities from the nursing home bed assessment, unless the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services determines that exempting these facilities would not be permissible under federal statutes or rules relating to state health care provider assessments.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to exempting county-owned and state-only licensed institutions for mental disease from the nursing home bed assessment. This provision creates an additional financial burden on private facilities, thus risking access to care for some of our most vulnerable citizens. By lining out s. 20.435 (2) (a) and writing in a smaller amount that reduces the appropriation by \$320,300 in each fiscal year, I am vetoing the part of the bill that funds this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

81. Nonemergency Medical Transportation

Section 9118 (11f)

This provision requires the Department of Health Services, to the extent permitted by contract, to modify the current nonemergency medical transportation contract and exclude the following counties: Jefferson, Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Walworth, Washington and Waukesha. In addition, the provision requires that, if the contract is modified, the department must make alternative arrangements with counties, health maintenance organizations or transportation providers to provide nonemergency medical transportation services to Medical Assistance recipients who reside in the excluded counties, no later than January 1, 2016.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to excluding specific counties from the current nonemergency medical transportation contract. All counties should be served by the same contract in order to provide uniform, equitable and cost-effective transportation services under the Medical Assistance program to all eligible program recipients.

82. Healthy Aging Grants

Sections 703r and 9118 (4f)

This provision provides one-time funding in each year of the 2015-17 biennium for grants to a private, nonprofit entity that will use these funds to conduct the following activities: coordinate the implementation of evidence-based health promotion programs in healthy aging; coordinate with academic and research institutes regarding research on healthy aging; serve as a statewide clearinghouse on evidence-based disease prevention and health promotion programs; provide training and technical assistance to the staff of county departments, administering agencies and other providers of services to aging populations; collect and disseminate information on disease prevention and health promotion in healthy aging; coordinate public awareness activities related to disease prevention and health promotion in aging; and advise the Department of Health Services on public policy issues concerning disease prevention and health promotion in aging. In addition, the provision creates an annual GPR appropriation, entitled "Healthy aging; evidence-based training and prevention" among the department's programs for disability and elder services.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the overly restrictive grant administration requirements. Instead, I am allowing the department more flexibility to best address healthy aging issues.

83. Enhanced Dental Services Reimbursement Pilot Program

Sections 1798 [as it relates to setting the rates in statute, specifying the length of the pilot program, and requiring an evaluation and report to the Joint Committee on Finance] and 9318 (2)

This provision requires the Department of Health Services to request a waiver from the federal government to conduct a pilot program to provide an enhanced Medicaid payment for pediatric and adult emergency dental services in Brown, Polk, Racine and Marathon counties. The reimbursement is specified at 80 percent of the median fee for each procedure, or the usual and customary charge, whichever is less. In addition, the department is required to work collaboratively with the American Dental Association's Health Policy Institute to prepare an evaluation of the pilot program on a quarterly basis, beginning at the end of the first quarter in which the pilot program becomes effective. Further, the department is required to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance regarding dental care utilization, the number of Medicaid participating dentists in the state, the fiscal impact of the pilot program, a comparison of the pilot program as administered under a fee-for-service system and under a health maintenance organization system, and the impact of the pilot program on oral health outcomes.

These requirements apply to claims by providers for services provided on or after the effective date of the waiver or state plan amendment. Lastly, the pilot program is discontinued on the first day of the 37th month after the enhanced reimbursement rates take effect.

While I believe this dental reimbursement pilot program will allow eligible Medicaid recipients to have greater access to vital dental care, I am partially vetoing the provision in several ways. First, I am vetoing the inclusion of specific rates in statute because I object to limiting the department's ability to negotiate the rate methodology with the federal government.

I am also vetoing the requirement that the department work collaboratively with the American Dental Association's Health Policy Institute and the requirement to submit quarterly evaluation reports to the Committee. While I understand the importance of program evaluation and ensuring the effectiveness of this pilot program, I object to the overly prescriptive requirement placed on the department. The department should have flexibility to determine the appropriate timing of reports and the appropriate entities with whom to consult on a review of the pilot program to ensure it is an effective use of taxpayer funding.

I am vetoing the discontinuation of the pilot program on the first day of the 37th month after the enhanced reimbursement rates take effect because I object to specifying the length of the pilot program in statutes.

Lastly, I am vetoing the requirement to apply these changes to claims by providers for services provided on or after the effective date of the waiver or state plan amendment because I object to limiting the department's ability to negotiate the parameters of this dental reimbursement pilot program with the federal government.

84. BadgerCare Plus Coverage for Childless Adults

Section 1797

This section requires the Department of Health Services to submit two reports to the Joint Committee on Finance regarding changes to the BadgerCare Plus coverage for childless adults. The first report must be submitted to the Committee prior to submitting a waiver amendment to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and must summarize the provisions of the waiver and estimate the fiscal impact of any changes. The second report is required to be submitted to the Committee summarizing any provision approved by the federal government and must estimate the fiscal impact of those approved provisions.

I am partially vetoing this section because I object to these administratively burdensome requirements. In addition, these requirements may have the unintended consequence of limiting the administration's ability to negotiate the waiver amendment with the federal government.

85. Consolidate Community Mental Health Programs

Section 9118 (1q)

This section requires the Department of Health Services to consult with the Wisconsin Counties Association and mental health stakeholders before developing a method for distributing community mental health services funds from a new consolidated community mental health program in 2016 and beyond. In addition, this provision requires the department to submit the proposed distribution to the Joint

Committee on Finance under 14-day passive review and use the proposed distribution method as approved, or modified and approved by the Committee.

I am vetoing this section because it is overly prescriptive and unnecessarily limits the flexibility of the department to balance the interests of counties and other stakeholders while providing services in the most programmatically and financially sound manner.

86. Children's Community Options Program Technical Modification

Section 1535

This section defines which individuals are eligible for the newly created Children's Community Options Program as a person under 22 years of age who is not eligible to receive services in, or be on a waiting list for, an adult long—term care program.

I am partially vetoing this section because the language, as drafted, could lead to uncertainty regarding eligibility for the program. My partial veto clarifies that individuals up to 22 years of age, as long as they are not otherwise able to access services through the adult long-term care system, are eligible for the newly created Children's Community Options Program.

87. Division of Medicaid Services

Sections 3665r, 3665s and 9418 (7p)

These sections reduce the number of division administrator unclassified positions authorized for the Department of Health Services to reflect the newly created Division of Medicaid Services.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to reducing the current number of unclassified positions in the department at this time. Staffing levels will continue to be reviewed by the department as the new division is implemented and these changes to the unclassified position authority are premature.

F. PROTECTING WISCONSIN CITIZENS AND OUR MOST VULNERABLE

88. Pedestrians Crossing Railroads

Section 3527m

This section allows a person to walk directly across the tracks or right-of-way of any railroad without being considered to be trespassing on the railroad property.

I am vetoing this section because I am concerned that allowing people to walk across railroad tracks outside of a designated crossing impairs public safety.

89. Expanded Payday Lender Authority

Sections 3443f, 3443h, 3443j and 3443m

These sections expand the types of financial products and services a payday lending company may provide to include sales of insurance, annuities and related products, and any financial or consumer financial services subject to regulation by statute or rule. These sections also specify that a payday loan licensee may conduct, or permit others to conduct, at the place of business specified in its license, services commonly offered by a currency exchange. Finally, these sections allow a payday loan licensee to sell merchandise and conduct other business provided it possesses any applicable license, permit or other approval required by law.

I am vetoing these sections because the expanded scope of business provided for payday lenders is overly broad and significantly exceeds that of any other financial institutions. In addition, the expanded scope could create regulatory ambiguity and consumer uncertainty. Changes of this magnitude should be addressed as separate legislation where the implications can be more carefully explored.

90. Nonprofit Voluntary Host Families Report

Section 9106 (2e)

This section requires the Department of Children and Families to establish a plan for engaging and utilizing nonprofit volunteer programs to place, with temporary host families, children whose parents or guardians have agreed to participate as an alternative to foster care. The department must submit a report on this plan to the Joint Committee on Finance on or before November 1, 2015.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that a report be submitted because it is unnecessary. The department will evaluate the proposal and determine how to best serve the children involved.

91. Increase Part-time District Attorneys to Full-time

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.475 (1) (d)], 4735d, 4735r, 4740e, 4740n and 9410 (1c)

This provision provides \$83,500 GPR and 1.2 FTE district attorney positions for Florence, Buffalo and Pepin counties on January 2, 2017, which will be the first day of the new four-year term of office. Currently, Florence County has a 0.5 FTE district attorney position, Buffalo County has a 0.5 FTE district attorney position and Pepin County has a 0.8 FTE district attorney position.

I am vetoing sections 4735d, 4735r, 4740e, 4740n and 9410 (1c), and partially vetoing section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.475 (1) (d)] by lining out the amount under s. 20.475 (1) (d) and writing in a smaller amount that reduces the appropriation by \$83,500 in fiscal year 2016-17 because I object to the inclusion of these positions when there is not a uniform demonstrated need across all three counties. With this veto, I am reducing the 1.2 FTE positions in the appropriation under s. 20.475 (1) (d) in each year of the biennium. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds or authorize the additional position authority.

92. Reference to the Department of Children and Families

Section 4699f

This section would allow the Department of Corrections or the Department of Children and Families to review and inspect certain court records concerning a juvenile who is required to register as a sex offender. It would further allow the Department of Corrections to disclose certain information obtained.

I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the reference to the Department of Children and Families because the department was erroneously included. Only the Department of Corrections should be authorized to make a request to review and inspect these records.

G. SUPPORTING OUR VETERANS

93. Commercial Driver License Fee Waiver

Section 4334t

This section waives the fees, at the point of initial issuance, for a commercial driver license for persons holding a military commercial driver license.

I am partially vetoing this section because I object to limiting the commercial driver license fee waiver for a person with a military commercial driver license to the initial issuance of these licenses. By partially vetoing this section, I am ensuring that the fee waiver will apply to the fees for initial license issuance as well as the fees for license renewal.

H. PRESERVING WISCONSIN'S HERITAGE

94. PECFA Program Sunset

Section 4213 [as it relates to s. 292.63 (3) (ac)]

This provision requires the Department of Natural Resources to deny any claim for PECFA reimbursement if the department has not been notified of the discharge of petroleum and potential claim before July 1, 2017. The provision also specifies that the department must deny reimbursement of a PECFA claim if the claim is not submitted by July 1, 2020. Finally, the provision requires that a claim for reimbursement must be submitted within 180 days after incurring the eligible costs, or by the first day of the seventh month after the effective date of the budget, whichever is later.

I am partially vetoing this provision to specify that notification must be received by the department before July 20, 2015, because I object to further extending the amount of time for claimants to submit notices of claims to the department. The program was intended to pay for removal of petroleum tanks installed before 1991 that did not meet certain federal standards and cleanup petroleum discharges from these tanks. The program was extended to include cleanup of discharges from certain tanks installed before 2001. The program has existed for sufficient time that its primary purpose has been completed.

95. Frank Lloyd Wright Heritage Trail

Sections 641m, 641n, 1422m, 2564m and 2595g

Section 2564m requires the Department of Transportation to create a Frank Lloyd Wright Heritage Trail commencing at I-94 in Kenosha County at the Illinois state border; extending through STH 30, USH 151 and USH 14 in Dane County; extending though USH 14 West in Iowa County;

extending through USH 14 West in Sauk County; and ending at the junction of USH 14 West and CTH Q in the city of Richland Center in Richland County. Section 2564m also requires the department to erect signage at various points along the route denoting the Frank Lloyd Wright Heritage Trail, and section 2595g gives the department the authority to erect additional markers to denote specific buildings designed by Frank Lloyd Wright along the route.

In addition, sections 641m and 1422m require an additional \$500,000 GPR be provided to the Department of Tourism in its tourism marketing; general purpose revenue appropriation under s. 20.380 (1) (b) to be spent on promoting the trail in the 2015-17 fiscal biennium, and section 641n exempts this amount from the spending requirements for the appropriation under s. 20.380 (1) (kg).

I am vetoing these sections because I object to requiring the Department of Transportation to mark a Frank Lloyd Wright Heritage Trail, thus circumventing the established application and administrative process for determining the placement and approval of highway signage. I further object to the addition of another specific spending earmark to be made from the Department of Tourism's marketing appropriations. Rather than a statutory earmark, I am directing the Department of Tourism to include, as part of the statewide marketing strategy, promotion of buildings constructed or designed by Frank Lloyd Wright that are open to the public throughout the state.

96. 100th Anniversary of the State Capitol

Section 9127

This section requires the Joint Committee on Legislative Organization to appoint a 100th Anniversary State Capitol Commemoration Commission composed of nine members with one member each nominated by: the Speaker of the Assembly, Minority Leader of the Assembly, President of the Senate, Senate Minority Leader, Governor, Supreme Court, Secretary of the Department of Administration, State Capitol and Executive Residence Board, and Director of the State Historical Society.

The commission is required to plan events, including educational programs for children and students, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the State Capitol. The commission may request individuals and entities with knowledge of the history, construction and renovation of the Capitol to assist the commission.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary. While I support the intent, the Legislature has the authority to create this commission without requiring it in this bill. The 100th anniversary of the State Capitol is an important milestone in Wisconsin's history and should be celebrated.

97. Proceeds from Sale of Stewardship Lands

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (7) (iv)], 639m, 640d. 980b and 980bm

This provision specifies that the net proceeds (after repayment of debt on the specific parcel, applicable federal law compliance or other restrictions) of Department of Natural Resources land sales from land required to be offered for sale under current law be used as follows: (a) 50 percent to pay principal on outstanding public debt issued under the Stewardship Program; and (b) 50 percent to be deposited in a new, continuing, conservation fund SEG appropriation to be used for the department to acquire land in the manner specified under s. 23.09 (2) (d), with priority given to the current law Stewardship purposes.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to using proceeds from land sales for additional property acquisition. Rather, these proceeds should be utilized to reduce existing debt related to the acquisition of property.

98. Northern State Forests Master Plans

Sections 9132 (4vw) and 9132 (4vx)

This provision requires the Department of Natural Resources to update master plans for all the northern state forests, except for Governor Knowles State Forest, by March 1, 2017. The provision also requires that the department propose a statewide variance to all northern state forests master plans by June 30, 2016, not including Governor Knowles State Forest. The provision further requires the department to change the percentage of forest land open for timber harvest from 66 percent to 75 percent, except in the Governor Knowles State Forest.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the required dates because I object to limiting the flexibility of the department to perform a thorough review of the master plans. Instead, I am directing the department to update the master plans and propose the variance no later than June 30, 2017.

99. Audit of the Forestry Account

Section 9132 (3f)

This provision requests that the Joint Legislative Audit Committee require the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct an audit of the forestry account of the conservation fund.

I am vetoing this provision because the Legislature does not need statutory authority to direct one of its own service agencies to conduct a study.

100. Car-Killed Deer Report

Section 9132 (1q)

This provision requires the Department of Natural Resources to conduct a study to be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance, the Governor and appropriate standing committees by January 1, 2017, on the cost-effectiveness of the car-killed deer program, the number of deer collected and any program recommendations.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The department will continue to work with the counties and other stakeholders to appropriately manage the program.

101. Snowmobile Supplemental Trail Aids Requests to Joint Committee on Finance

Section 4359m

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to submit a request to the Joint Committee on Finance for the distribution of supplemental snowmobile trail aids from the departments appropriation under s. 20.370 (5) (cr), in excess of the available trail pass revenue. It also limits the appropriations from which the department may pay supplemental trail aids to the appropriations under s. 20.370 (5) (cr) or (cs). The request would be subject to 14-day passive review under s. 16.515.

I am vetoing this section because it is overly prescriptive and unnecessary. Section 350.12 (4) (br) provides a process to allow for payments of supplemental trail aids in excess of available trail pass revenue and ensures that supplemental snowmobile trail aids are distributed in a timely fashion.

102. Grants to Nonprofit Conservation Organizations

Section 481 [as it relates to ss. 20.370 (5) (at), (aw), (ax), (ay), (bw), (cx), 20.370 (6) (ar), (aw), and 20.370 (9) (mu)]

This provision funds grants to various nonprofit conservation organizations, as follows: section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (at)] provides \$66,800 annually to the Ice Age Trail Alliance; (b) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (aw)] provides \$124,500 annually to the Gathering Waters Conservancy and \$75,700 to the Natural Resources Foundation; (c) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (ax)] provides \$75,000 annually to the Great Lakes Timber Professionals Association for a Master Logger program; (d) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (ay)] provides \$66,800 annually for urban forest protection; (e) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (bw)] provides \$50,000 annually for up to 50 percent of costs of dues to the Wisconsin County Forest Association; (f) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (cx)] provides \$297,000 annually for off-road safety programs; (g) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (6) (ar)] provides \$180,000 annually to Wisconsin Lakes; (h) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (6) (aw)] provides \$62,300 annually to the River Alliance of Wisconsin; and (i) section 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (9) (mu)] provides \$22,800 annually for the Wild River Interpretive Center.

I am lining out the amounts under ss. 20.370 (5) (at), (aw), (ax), (ay), (bw), (cx), 20.370 (6) (ar), (aw), and 20.370 (9) (mu) and writing in smaller amounts because I object to earmarking these funds for specific conservation organizations without requiring accountability in the use of the funds. With this veto, I am reducing the appropriations by a total of \$1,020,900. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

103. Areawide Water Quality Management Plan

Section 4203m

This provision makes a number of changes to the areawide water quality management process for Dane County. The changes include utilizing a statewide water quality standard for Dane County, establishing limits on the ability of Dane County to require information on proposed revisions to the plan, setting a timeline for applications and revisions to the Dane County water quality management plan, and establishing the conditions under which Dane County or

any of its subunits may develop or provide advisory services relating to the areawide water quality management plan. Further, the provision prohibits the Governor from designating, under 33 USC 1288 (a) (2), Dane County or any of its subunits, including the Dane County Lakes and Watershed Commission, to develop the areawide water quality management plan for Dane County, or to review proposed revisions to the plan.

Under federal law, the Governor is required to designate a single representative organization, including elected officials from local governments or their designees, capable of developing effective areawide water quality management plans for an area. In addition, the Governor may identify any additional area (or modify an existing area) for which he determines areawide water quality management to be appropriate, designate the boundaries of such area, and designate an organization capable of developing effective water quality management plans for such area.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the restriction on the Governor's designation authority because I object to the infringement on gubernatorial powers and duties. In addition, the prohibition on the Governor designating Dane County or any of its subunits to develop the areawide water quality management plan for Dane County,

or to review proposed revisions to the plan, may prevent the Governor from complying with federal law.

104. Well Compensation Grant Appropriation

Sections 481 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (6) (cr)], 639g and 9232 (1q)

This provision specifies that the Department of Natural Resources must lapse \$320,000 from the balance of the environmental aids – compensation for well contamination and abandonment appropriation under s. 20.370 (6) (cr) to the segregated environmental fund. The provision also converts the environmental aids – compensation for well contamination and abandonment appropriation from continuing to biennial. Finally, the provision deletes \$76,000 SEG annually from the appropriation, to reduce the appropriation level to \$200,000 annually for grants.

I am partially vetoing this provision because I object to requiring this appropriation to lapse funds at the end of each biennium on an ongoing basis. Costs related to well compensation fluctuate over time and allowing the appropriation to remain continuing will allow the department to reserve funds for times when grant payments are higher than expected.

Senator Hansen, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of University of Wisconsin – Green Bay's 50th Anniversary on September 2, 2015 and University of Wisconsin – Marinette's 50th Anniversary this fall.

Children are dying in her district. 13 year-old Giovonnie Cameron was coming back from a prayer vigil when he was fatally shot. The prayer vigil was for his 14 year-old fried, Tariq, who died after being shot after a fireworks

show near the 4th of July. 17 year-old Breanna Eskridge was shot on a porch near the end of July, making her the 3rd teenager to die in a span of just a few weeks. Sadly, children in her district are not surprised by the sound of gunshots on their block. They are no longer phased by prayer vigils and peace walks and their friends dying. For children in her district, every day is a war zone. Every day is another day where they could be shot or their family member could be shot. Senator Harris Dodd challenges the Senate to work with her to reduce violence and build safer communities for our children.

Senator Wanggaard, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of the Burlington Little League 12U All-Star Baseball Team. This year, they earned the titles for 2015 District Champions and 2015 State Champions on their way to the Little League World Series, becoming only the second team in state history to advance to the regional title game. Unfortunately, they didn't reach their final goal of making it to the World Series this season. However, the Burlington 12U team has won the state championship six years in a row, and they will surely have another promising season next year. Senator Wanggaard would like to honor their sportsmanship, teamwork, and tremendous talent they demonstrated throughout their journey and congratulate them on their successful season that made Wisconsin history.

Senator Wanggaard, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Kyle Koenen, his former committee clerk, on his recent engagement.

Senator Darling, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Charlie Kubly and his parents Dr. and Sally Kubly. Charlie was a victim of depression and took his own life. A foundation has been formed in his memory to help others affected by depression.

Mr. Ingman served in the United States Army and was one of five Wisconsinites to receive the Medal of Honor for his valor on the Korean War. The four others were awarded posthumously. On February 26, 1951, after taking over command of two squads when the squad leaders were injured, he single-handedly attacked a machine gun which was firing on his men, tossing a hand grenade into the emplacement and killing the crew with his rifle. He then attacked a second machine gun, killing the crew while losing part of his left ear after a grenade exploded near his head and taking a bullet to the face. Einar continued fighting, killing the remaining Chinese soldiers with his rifle and his bayonet until falling unconscious. His men went on to capture the objective and forced the opposing troops to retreat. On July 5th, 1951, Einer Ingman Jr. was presented the Medal of Honor by President Harry Truman. After the Army, he worked for a paper company for 32 years and married Mardelle Goodfellow, having seven children. Sergeant Ingman Jr. passed away on September 9, 2015, at the age of eighty-five. Today he will be laid to rest with full military honors after a funeral service in Tomahawk, WI. Flags are being flown at half-staff in his honor.

Senator Tiffany, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Jennifer Esser, his Chief of Staff. Today is her last session day as his Chief of Staff. She has taken a new position outside of the legislature after 16 years of service with the state legislature. Senator Tiffany would like to express his sincere gratitude for her dedication and passion for her job over the years. There are many friends and colleagues of hers in the legislature that wish her the best of luck in her future endeavors.

The March highlights the critical need to adopt a policy agenda that protects the lives of Americans, jobs of our citizenry, the people's right to vote, and addresses the need for public school and criminal justice reform. Senator Erpenbach would like to commend the Wisconsin NAACP Conference of Branches for standing on the principles of the Journey for Justice March and placing these critical issues at the fore of our current policy discourse.

Senator Risser, with unanimous consent, asked that the Senate adjourn in honor of Anne Nicol Gaylor, who passed away June 14, 2015. She had a long and distinguished career as a pioneer, activist, and reproductive rights advocate. Anne was editor and owner of the Middleton Times-Tribune. In 1974, Anne cofounded the Women's Medical Fund and in 1976 became principal founder of the Freedom from Religion Foundation. She received numerous awards and honors before she retired after 40 years in volunteer work in the spring of 2015.

With respect to the claims, the Board finds:

Wasserstrass Farms, Inc. of Monroe, Wisconsin claims \$2,579.70 for value of milk that could not be sold, allegedly due to retaliation by a DATCP inspector. The claimants state that inspector Jennifer Barker wrote up their farm for violations related to their Delaval robotic milking system. The claimants believe that Barker did not have sufficient training for the Delaval system in order to properly inspect it. The claimants also state they had the system inspected by a DATCP equipment expert, who verbally told them it was working properly (he did not file a written report). The claimants state Ms. Barker told them she had experience inspecting Delaval systems at other farms. The claimants state that they called all the other farms in the area with a Delaval system and found that Ms. Barker had not inspected any of them. The claimants state that they made three requests to DATCP for list of other Delaval systems inspected by Ms. Barker but that DATCP never provided that information. The claimants believe Ms. Barker lied to them about her experience with the Delaval system. They believe her suspension of their license on 12/2/14, was retaliatory because they had questioned Ms. Barker's experience and accused her of lying to them. At hearing, the claimants stated that the Delaval system computer notified them whenever they needed to perform routine maintenance and that they had always performed that maintenance "as best they could." The claimants stated that a prior inspector had told them he

would like them to update their computer software but that they had not done so. The claimants also stated that they made no changes to the milking system, other than performing routine maintenance, between the time they failed inspection and when they passed the reinstatement inspection.

DATCP recommends denial of this claim. DATCP notes that the claimants' farm has had repeated problems with its Delaval milking system. DATCP states that inspections found that the robot sometimes failed to find and properly attached to the teats and would fall off onto the ground, where it became dirty. DATCP also notes that Ms. Barker is one of two DATCP inspectors who do nothing but farm inspections and that she has the necessary training to appropriately inspect Deleval robotic milking systems. After repeated failed inspections, DATCP sent the claimants a warning letter on 1/28/14. DATCP held an administrative conference with the claimants after another failed inspection on 3/3/14. DATCP states that another inspection on April 22 found the same problems. Another administrative conference was held on 5/8/14, during which Mr. Wasserstrass signed a stipulation and consent order placing conditions on his license. These conditions included a mandatory summary suspension of his license if the Delaval system was again found to be not working properly. DATCP notes that any suspension of a conditional license continues until a successful inspection. On 10/2114, Ms. Barker and a DATCP supervisor inspected the system and found it was not working properly. DATCP sent a notice of summary suspension to the claimants on 12/1/14. The procedure for requesting a reinstatement inspection were included with the suspension notice, however, the claimants waited until 12/8/14, to request reinspection. The reinstatement inspection was successfully conducted on December 12, and the claimant's license was immediately reinstated. DATCP notes that the claimants are requesting reimbursement for milk loss between 12/3 and 12/13/14. DATCP believes this loss was not the result of improper behavior by DATCP employees, but rather by the claimants own delay in seeking the reinstatement inspection. At hearing, DATCP stated, and the claimant agreed, that the routine maintenance mentioned by the claimant (replacement of hoses and rubber parts) could easily have made the difference between the failed October inspection and the subsequent successful reinstatement inspection.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

2. Mark Bernhardt, Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin claims \$783.00 for refund of money overpaid due to an estimated tax assessment. The claimant states that in February 2015 he hired H&R Block to file his late annual sales tax returns. The claimant states that H&R Block did not go back far enough and neglected to file returns for 2010. The claimant states his business was not active in 2010. In March 2011 DOR issued an estimated assessment for 2010 sales taxes. DOR levied \$594.24 from the claimant's business

account in September 2011 for the 2010 assessment. In February 2015 the claimant received a letter from DOR stating that they had applied his 2014 individual income tax return of \$181.00 towards the assessment. The claimant filed his 2010 sales tax return, which showed he did not owe any 2010 sales taxes and he then called DOR. The claimant states that if he had called DOR the day before he filed the returns instead of the day after, he would have received his refund. The claimant requests reimbursement of his 2014 tax refund (\$181) because he feels it was H&R Block's error that caused DOR to seize this refund. The claimant believes it is unfair that a taxpayer only has 2 years to claim a refund, while DOR has no restriction regarding how many years back they can pursue a taxpayer. The claimant also requests reimbursement of the \$594.24 levied by DOR in 2011, since he was able to prove that he did not owe any 2010 sales taxes.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR issued an estimated assessment for 2010 sales taxes on 3/22/11. DOR levied monies in September 2011 and also applied the claimant's 2014 income tax refund towards the assessment. The claimant's actual 2010 sales tax return was filed on 2/4/15. DOR points to § 77.59(4)(b), Wis. Stats., which prohibits DOR from refunding the overpayment on the original sales tax assessment since no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

3. Cedar Road Meats of Iron Ridge, Wisconsin claims \$423.80 for cost to replace a septic control box damaged by a DATCP inspector. On 4/29/15, while parked in an undesignated area, a DATCP inspector accidentally backed into a PVC pipe containing the equipment. The claimant requests reimbursement for the cost of replacing the equipment.

DATCP recommends payment of this claim in full. DATCP agrees that an inspector accidentally backed her vehicle over the equipment as alleged by the claimant.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$423.80 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection appropriation § 20.115(1)(a), Stats.

4. TRC Engineers, Inc. of Windsor, Connecticut claims \$918.00 for refund of an alleged overpayment of fees due to an error on the claimant's Foreign Corporation Annual Report for 2015. The claimant states that its 2015 Wisconsin assets should have been reported as \$0 but were mistakenly reported as \$902,855. The claimant states that this error resulted in DFI calculating fees of \$1,008 instead of the correct amount, \$65. The claimant requests reimbursement for the overpayment.

DFI recommends denial of this claim. DFI notes that it has no means by which to verify the accuracy of the information provided by the claimant, because the claimant has exclusive control over the information on which the

Annual Report's calculations are based. DFI points to the fact that there was no error by DFI or any of its employees. DFI notes that the Claims Board has a history of denying similar claims and recommends that the board deny this claim as well.

The Board defers decision of this claim at this time in order to seek additional information from DFI.

Michelle Milstein of Shorewood, Wisconsin claims \$14,803.36 for damages related to an allegedly improper termination from an instructor position at UW-Milwaukee. On 8/8/14 the clamant was offered and accepted a full-time position for fall 2014 as an ESL instructor. The claimant began working for UWM on 8/19/14 and was told her salary would be \$17,137.50 for teaching two ESL sections for the Fall 2014 semester. The claimant taught her first two classes on 9/3/14. On 9/5/14, after teaching her first class, she was informed that she was being terminated due to low enrollment in the ESL program. The claimant attempted to find a teaching position at another institution but was unsuccessful because the semester had already begun. The claimant notes that prior to her acceptance of the UWM position, she had been contacted by MATC regarding moving forward in the hiring process for a part-time instructor position. That position was no longer available when she was terminated by UWM.

The claimant believes she is entitled to the remainder of her salary for the fall 2014 semester. She states that she had a valid oral contract with UWM beginning 8/8/14 and that at no time did UWM inform her that the terms of that contract included the ability to terminate her due to low enrollment. The claimant disputes UWM's assertion that a written contract dated 9/3/14 was in effect when she was terminated. The claimant notes that she never signed that contract, which was not even mailed to her until five days after her termination.

The claimant believes it was reasonable for her to rely on UWM's promise of employment for the full fall 2014 semester. The claimant notes that acceptance of full-time employment at UWM would naturally preclude her from employment at other institutions. The claimant states that she is familiar with academic hiring practices and that the fact that lecturers are not eligible for tenure does not mean lecturers cannot be issued contracts for fixed terms, such as one or more semesters.

On 10/15/14 the claimant filed a Notice of Claim against UWM. The claimant alleges that this NOC contained two distinct claims, a breach of contract claim related to her termination and a wage claim related to UWM's failure to pay her for work already performed. On 11/24/14 UWM sent her a paycheck along with a letter explaining that the payment was "in satisfaction of wages owed...for the period of August 18, 2014 through and including September 5, 2014." The claimant states it is clear from UWM's letter that they understood the claimant had two distinct claims and that the payment only satisfied her wage claim. The claimant also alleges that, by law, a wage claim cannot be satisfied in exchange for a settlement of other claims.

UWM recommends denial of this claim. The offer made to the clamant on 8/8/14 was for a Lecturer position

(\$17,137.50 per semester). Upon the claimant's acceptance of the offer, the ESL Department contacted the College of Letters & Science to obtain a written employment contract. The College informed the ESL Department that based on her experience; the claimant could only be employed as an Associate Lecturer (\$13,537.50 per semester). UWM notes that all ESL lecturers are issued written employment contracts and that UWM made it clear to the claimant that she would have a written contract. UWM alleges the claimant clearly understood this because she inquired about the status of the written contract on several occasions. UWM states that due to a beginning of semester backlog in the College, the written employment contract was not finalized until 9/3/14.

UWM states that even if the written contract is not controlling as the claimant alleges. UWM had a right to terminate under the oral contract. UWM notes it never at any time represented to the claimant that her employment was guaranteed for the full semester. Although the claimant argues that UWM never told her it could terminate her due to low enrollment, UWM never told the claimant that it could not do so. In the absence of a promise by UWM of guaranteed employment for the full semester, the claimant is not allowed to invent such a promise, simply because it is in her favor. UWM also notes the claimant has not provided proof that she forewent other employment. The alleged MATC employment offer was not an official job offer, but only an invitation to move to the "next step" in the hiring process. UWM also notes that this was a part-time position and that the claimant has provided no salary information regarding MATC's alleged offer.

UWM states it has a well-established past practice of terminating lectures due to low enrollment and a legitimate business need to do so, as reflected by the standard language in the written contract. Pursuant to UWM policy, the claimant was terminated because she had been the most recently hired ESL lecturer. UWM argues that the possibility of enrollment related termination should not be a surprise to anyone familiar with academic employment and that it was not reasonable for the claimant to assume her employment was guaranteed for the full semester.

UWM received the claimant's NOC on 10/20/14. Because UWM recognized that the initial verbal offer made to her was for the position of Lecturer, not Associate Lecturer, UWM paid the claimant for the work she performed at that higher Lecturer rate. The letter UWM sent with this payment clearly references the NOC, stating "with this payment, UWM considers its obligations regarding Ms. Milstein's employment to be satisfied." UWM notes that the doctrine of accord and satisfaction does not prevent UWM from discharging more than one claim with a single payment. Furthermore, UWM notes the payment was issued on 11/11/14, fourteen days before the claimant filed her wage claim with DWD. UWM believes the claimant accepted discharge of her claims when she cashed the check sent by UWM.

UWM does not believe it owes the claimant any amount beyond what it has already paid her under any legal theory and recommends denial of the claim in its entirety.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers,

agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Fred Plummer of Moreno Valley, California claims \$18,670.66 for reimbursement of estimated tax assessments based on allegedly faulty information for tax year 1995. In 2011 DOR began to garnish the claimant's wages for unfiled income taxes for the years 1993-1995. The claimant contacted DOR a number of times to explain that he had no income in 1995. He states that DOR required proof but that he did not understand how to prove that he had no income. The claimant also states there were "other issues" regarding his residency between 2004 and 2012. In July 2013 the claimant hired a tax service to resolve the dispute with DOR. In June 2014 the claimant's tax preparer submitted his missing returns and social security records proving the claimant had no income during the years in question. DOR accepted the records as proof and ceased collection of the tax assessment. The claimant does not understand why DOR insisted he had income during the years in question, since he never received any W-2s or 1099s for those years. The claimant states that DOR garnished \$18,670.66 between 2011 and 2014 and requests reimbursement of that amount.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. On 3/17/97 DOR issued an estimated assessment for failure to file income tax returns for 1993-95. In July 2011 DOR began collecting on the assessment through wage certification. DOR received 37 payments through certification and also intercepted the claimant's 2011-2013 income tax refunds. Documentation substantiating the claimant's lack of income for 1993-95 was submitted to DOR on 6/17/14. Section 71.75(5), Wis. Stats., prohibits DOR from refunding the overpayment on the estimated assessment because no refund was claimed within the prescribed four-year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Mark B. Brown of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$21.09 for value of blue jeans and deodorant he alleges were improperly destroyed by DOC. The claimant was transferred to Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). On 8/6/14 he was informed by WCI staff that his jeans and deodorant were contraband and not allowed. The clamant filed an inmate complaint on 8/8/14 regarding these items. The claimant alleges he was told by a WCI corrections officer that if the grievance was dismissed, the claimant would be able to mail the items to his family. The claimant states that he told the officer he wanted to mail out the items if his grievance was denied and that the officer replied "I'll remember and you'll have time to mail it out." The claimant states that he received notice of the final disposition of his complaint on 11/4/14 and that he sent a letter to the property room the next day requesting that they mail the jeans and deodorant to his family. The claimant states that two days later he was notified that the property had been destroyed. The claimant states that he followed the rules and procedures set forth by DOC and that DOC improperly destroyed the items.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC notes that the property items in question were preserved during the pendency of the claimant's inmate complaint. DOC also notes that despite having almost 90 days to do so, the claimant failed to communicate his preference for disposal of his jeans and deodorant to WCI Property staff. The claimant's complaint was dismissed on 10/31/14 and his property was destroyed on 11/4/14 consistent with DOC policy. DOC believes there was no negligence on the part of DOC employees and that the claim should be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Mark B. Brown of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$184.56 for value of a radio, TV antenna, 2 magazines, and a catalog allegedly destroyed or stolen by DOC staff. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). He states that on 8/22/14, while housed in the Step 3 segregation unit at WCI, he was taken by WCI officers to a doctor's appointment. The claimant alleges the officers used excessive force against him, beat him up and took him to a new cell in Step 2 segregation. He alleges that while he was in the new cell one or more of the WCI officers went to his old cell and stole or destroyed some of his property. The claimant states that he had all of his electronics and four magazines in his Step 3 cell and that DOC is lying when it says otherwise. He also alleges that DOC forged DOC Attachment #2 to make it appear that the claimant did not own a radio. The claimant alleges that the WCI officers who stole his property also destroyed the paperwork relating to his radio. The claimant states that he had four magazines while in his Step 2 cell and that it is not possible for inmates in segregation to dispose of or discard magazines because they are on 24-hour lockdown. The claimant believes that WCI officers have a grudge against him due to the excessive force incident and that DOC is lying to cover up their actions.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that despite the claimant's assertions otherwise, it is his burden to establish his claim by showing that DOC staff negligently handled his property and that he has failed to do so. DOC notes that much of the property claimed is not allowed while inmates are in segregation and that the claimant has provided no proof that these items were actually in his cell on the day in question. DOC points to WCI records, which indicate that the claimant had two magazines in his Step 3 cell, not four as he alleges. DOC believes there is no evidence to support the claimant's allegation that staff destroyed or improperly handled his personal property.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

9. Mark B. Brown of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$176.20 for value of radio, extension cord, sweatshirt, and two T-shirts allegedly lost or stolen by DOC personnel, or by other inmates due to DOC negligence. The claimant was an

inmate at Fox Lake Correctional Institution (FLCI) from 12/19/12 to 5/21/14. He alleges he was deliberately injured by FLCI officers on 3/23/14. The claimant alleges DOC guards attacked him before he was placed in segregation. The claimant states that while he was in segregation no one challenged his ownership of his sweatshirt and two T-shirts and that he received a property inventory sheet showing he owned those items. He also states that while he was in segregation, the FLCI property officer verbally told him that he had seen the claimant's radio with his other property in the property room. The clamant alleges that another inmate told him DOC officers left some of the claimant's property in his old cell when he was moved to segregation, which would have allowed other inmates to steal it. The claimant also alleges FLCI officers lost or destroyed many of his property receipts, including the receipts for his sweatshirt and two T-shirts. On 5/22/14 the claimant was transferred to the Wisconsin Secure Program Facility (WSPF). He states that when WSPF officers gave him his property in June 2014, he realized that items were missing. The claimant states WSPF staff also told him that his radio was with his other property in the property room. The claimant believes DOC officers are retaliating against him by deliberately destroying or stealing his property.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The claimant arrived at FLCI on 12/19/12. He was sent to FLCI segregation on 3/24/14 and transferred to WSPF on 5/21/14. DOC states that when packing his property for transfer, staff discovered the claimant did not have receipts for one sweatshirt and two T-shirts. Per DOC policy, inmates must maintain receipts for all property and property in an inmate's possession without receipts is considered contraband. DOC states the sweatshirt and T-shirts were deemed contraband, removed from the claimant's property and destroyed per DOC policy. DOC notes that although the claimant may have owned a radio at one time while at FLCI, the 3/24/14 inventory shows that he no longer did. DOC also points to the property inventory completed on 5/21/14 upon the claimant's transfer to WSPF. This inventory clearly shows the claimant did not possess a radio or an extension cord. DOC believes it is likely the claimant lost, sold, had stolen, or threw away these items. DOC believes the claimant has provided no evidence that his personal property was improperly handled by DOC staff and therefore recommends denial of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

10. Ricky Grandy of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$42.94 for three magazines allegedly lost by DOC personnel. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). The claimant alleges he had four books and six magazines when he was moved to the segregation unit at WCI. While in segregation, the claimant requested his books and magazines. WCI property responded that he only had three magazines in his property but could not possess any magazines until he was moved to Step 3 segregation. The

claimant filed an inmate complaint regarding the missing magazines. He states that he did not have a copy of his property inventory at the time and therefore mistakenly said 8 magazines were missing in his initial complaint. He filed a second complaint with the correct number of magazines. Both of the claimant's complaints were denied. The claimant requests reimbursement for his three missing magazines.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC believes the claimant has provided no evidence that his magazines were improperly handled by DOC staff or that they were ever missing at all. The clamant was moved into segregation on 9/22/13 and ultimately was released on 11/14/14. DOC notes that a 3/11/14 property inventory reflects that the claimant's property contained a total of 10 books and magazines. While in segregation, the claimant was allowed to have his four books, leaving a total of six magazines, which the claimant was not allowed to access while in segregation.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Mark S. Hickles of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$381.48 for return of restitution money deducted from the claimant's inmate account by DOC. On 7/9/05 the claimant received a conduct report at Racine Correctional Institution (RCI) for fighting, disruptive conduct, and permitting another inmate to enter his quarters. The claimant was found not guilty of fighting, however, RCI deducted money from his account for half the cost of medical treatment for the other inmate. The claimant believes that because he was found not guilty of fighting, it was improper for DOC to charge him restitution. He requests return of the money taken from his account by DOC.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that on 7/9/05 the claimant allowed another inmate to enter his quarters and engaged in horseplay, which resulted in injury to the other inmate. The claimant was found guilty of disruptive behavior and allowing another inmate to enter his quarters, both of which are violations of DOC rules. As a consequence of these rule violations the claimant received 180 days of disciplinary segregation and was required to pay half the cost of the other inmate's medical treatment. DOC began deducting this restitution from the claimant's inmate account on 8/7/06. The claimant filed an inmate complaint regarding the restitution on 10/1/13, well beyond the 14 day time limit and his complaint was denied. Pursuant to Wis. Admin. Code s. 303.72(5) effective 2001, an inmate found guilty of violating disciplinary rules may be subject to a penalty, including restitution. DOC notes that the claimant never sought the available certiorari review of the disciplinary decision and that the decision was never reversed. DOC believes the claimant's request for reimbursement more than 9 years later is an impermissible collateral attack on a final disciplinary decision and should be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Robert Morrison of Fox Lake, Wisconsin claims \$19.71 for money deducted from the claimant's account for canteen items he never received. On 9/2/14 the claimant ordered items from the Dodge Correctional Institution (DCI) canteen. The claimant was housed in Unit 7 when he placed the order. DCI deducted \$19.71 from his account for the canteen items. On 9/5/14 the claimant was transferred to another institution and therefore did not receive an inmate account statement for two weeks. When he received his account statement, he realized that DCI deducted the money for items he never received. The claimant filed an inmate complaint which was denied because it was filed past the 14 day time limit.

DOC recommends payment of this claim based on equitable principles. DOC records indicate the claimant placed his canteen order while housed in Unit 7 at DCI. Shortly thereafter the claimant was transferred to Unit 12 at DCI and then to another institution. DOC has no evidence that the claimant ever received the items he purchased and therefore does not dispute his claim.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$19.71 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Corrections appropriation § 20.410 (1)(a), Stats.

The Board concludes:

The Committee to wait upon the Governor appeared with his Excellency, the Honorable Governor Scott Walker, who delivered his message as follows:

STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

"Speaker Vos, Speaker Pro Temp August, President Ellis, Majority Leader Fitzgerald, Minority Leader Larson, Minority Leader Barca, members of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Constitutional Officers, tribal leaders, members of the Cabinet, distinguished guests, members of the Legislature, most importantly, fellow citizens of the great state of Wisconsin, it is an honor to appear before you tonight.

The state of our state is strong. We are moving Wisconsin forward.

Think about these simple facts:

There are more people working in Wisconsin than at nearly any other point in our history; state finances are stable; our school students are doing well overall; college tuition is frozen; and property and income taxes are down from 2010.

The Wisconsin Comeback is real.

When I was running for re-election just over a year ago, I said we would ensure everyone who wanted a job could find a job. So, what kind of progress have we made in the past year?

Well, the most recent unemployment rate in our state is the lowest it has been since March of 2001. Let's put that into perspective: my son, Alex, is a junior at the University of Wisconsin and my son, Matt, is a senior at Marquette University. The last time the unemployment rate was this low, they were 5 and 6 years old.

Late last year, we saw the largest monthly jobs gain since April of 1992. That's nearly 24 years ago, back before Tonette and I even went on our first date.

The percentage of people working in Wisconsin, the Labor Force Participation Rate, is 67.8 percent. This is 5.3 points better than the national rate and puts us in the top ten states in America.

According to the federal government's current employment statistics and local area unemployment statistics, more people were working in Wisconsin in 2015 than at any time in the past 20 years.

That's right. While so many in the media seem to obsess with negative stories, these facts from the federal Department of Labor show more people were working during this past year than at any time in the past two decades.

Last year, initial weekly unemployment claims averaged the lowest level since 1989. The facts show that fewer people are filing for unemployment and more people are working.

People like Sam Critzer of Madison who was hired as a Certified Nursing Assistant at St. Mary's and Brian Schuster from Lodi who got a job working as an Architectural Designer at Sullivan Design Build.

Not only are more people working, new business formations were up 3.6 percent last year. The economic impact of tourism increased 5.5 percent.

To continue this kind of growth in jobs and commerce, employers want stability. That's why we work so hard to get our fiscal house in order. It also ensures that the government will not be a burden on future generations.

I am proud that Wisconsin finished the fiscal year with a \$135.6 million budget surplus.

The state's rainy day fund is the largest in our history—165 times bigger than when we first took office.

Wisconsin is one of only two states with a fully funded pension system. While our neighbors to the south have a pension that is not even half funded, we are covered. This fact provides peace of mind to our retirees and gives businesses part of the certainty they need to hire people in Wisconsin.

Our per capita debt—which includes pension and longterm health obligations—is among the lowest. That means we are one of the top ten best states in the country.

Bonding levels in the current state budget are the lowest in 20 years.

And we continue to weed out waste, fraud, and abuse to make government more effective, more efficient, and more accountable to you—the hard-working taxpayers.

In 2012, I launched the Lean Government Initiative. Here's one example: this past year, the Department of Safety and Professional Services used lean to save nearly \$38,000 annually by switching to electronic documents for some of its panels. Thankfully, our employees realize that every dollar counts.

To put this in perspective, the money saved from this reform is enough to pay for 43 students to go through a youth apprenticeship. Tonight, Janie Brischke, a state employee who was the sponsor of that lean project, is here with us. Thank you, Janie.

Let me repeat, our goal is to ensure that everyone who wants a job can find a job. One of the best ways to get people the skills they need to succeed is through a great education. Thankfully, we have some of the best schools in the country here in Wisconsin.

The graduating class of 2015 had the 2nd highest ACT scores in the country. And thanks to our efforts to prepare all students for college and career, the class of 2016 will be the first to be given the opportunity to take the ACT free of charge; helping overcome financial barriers and close achievement gaps.

In our state, 4th and 8th grade reading scores went up again in 2015.

According to the most recent report, Wisconsin's high school graduation rates are also up again—to third best in the country. Here with us tonight are students from Kewaunee and Fennimore high schools. In the most recent report, these two high schools graduated 100 percent of their senior classes.

Let's give a big round of applause to them and to their teachers and parents—and to all the others like them across Wisconsin. Thank you!

And speaking of students, we helped make college more affordable at our University of Wisconsin campuses as we froze tuition—for the first time ever—four years in a row. As a parent of two sons in college, I know how important it is to keep costs down for students and for the families who support them.

During the ten years before our freeze, the average annual increase in tuition within the University of Wisconsin System was over 8 percent. That was a 118 percent increase over a decade.

Compared to the previous trend, our tuition freeze saves the average student more than \$6,000 over four years. That's real money, and it helps make school more affordable to college students and working families.

With us tonight are a few UW students who have benefitted from our tuition freeze. Please welcome Erin Larson from Greenleaf, Michael Daniels from Appleton, and Sarah McQuade from Hartland.

We're also making it easier to get a great education at any of our excellent technical colleges within the state. Through our Blueprint for Prosperity initiative, we helped our technical colleges enroll another 5,000 students into high-demand career programs.

And we increased the number of youth apprenticeships and adult apprenticeships over the past four years. Our Youth Apprenticeships have more than doubled and our adult apprenticeships have increased by more than 30 percent.

You see, good-paying careers typically require more than a high school diploma. We need our young people to have as many excellent higher education options as possible to prepare for the workforce needs of the 21st century.

It also means changing our perspectives. We must value our students who choose to be highly skilled welders, IT technicians, or certified nursing assistants as much as we do those who choose to be doctors or lawyers. Each of these professions is vitally needed for a strong economy in Wisconsin.

Tonight, we are joined by Fox Valley Technical College students, Grant Richman from Madison, Sarah Dernlan from Appleton, Monica Stinski from Menasha, Emily Rohde from Neenah, and their instructor, Elizabeth Rath. They are all finishing their training as CNAs this week.

In addition, we are helping working families, senior citizens, small business owners, and family farmers afford to live, work, play, and retire here in Wisconsin. Tonight, I am proud to say that property and income taxes are down from where they were when we took office.

We didn't just slow the rate of increase; we actually reduced the tax burden from where it was five years ago.

Tonette and I used to grumble when our property tax bill showed up each December. In fact, we often let it sit for a few days before we opened it up because we were afraid to see the increase. Now, it is great to hear the stories of so many people who have a sigh of relief when they open their bills.

Property taxes on a median-valued home in Wisconsin were \$116 lower this past year than they were in 2010. Over the past five years, that homeowner saved \$1,227 from where property taxes were headed versus how they've gone down under our reforms collectively between 2010 and 2015.

And it's not just property tax relief—we've cut income taxes, too. A median income family will see a four-year income tax reduction of \$916. That's real money for hardworking taxpayers all across Wisconsin.

We also helped farmers and manufacturers in our state with a production tax credit that is phased in through this year. This helps some of our most important industries.

And we helped lower the tax burden on small businesses. Our reforms help them invest more into their companies and to expand their workforces.

One of the common things I hear from employers all across the state is that they have job openings, but that they cannot find qualified workers to fill these positions. That's why we've invested millions more into worker training programs. Still, we need more people in the workforce. We cannot afford to have anyone on the sidelines.

I am so proud that we helped transfer 8,334 people from government dependence to true independence. You see, the State of Wisconsin now requires able-bodied adults without children in the home to be enrolled in a job training program before they can get food stamps. We believe in helping people get the training necessary to find rewarding careers.

That's good for the taxpayers as it reduces the number of people on government programs. It's good for employers as many are looking for skilled workers. Best of all, it is good for each and every individual who now is able to find employment and control his or her own destiny.

People like Jessica who enrolled in our program last June. In August, she got a job in housekeeping at a local hotel. She now works full-time at a wood flooring mill. Along the way, she also received help to finish her studies at Northcentral Technical College to be a certified nursing assistant. She took her final exam for certification on January 8th. Congratulations, Jessica!

In the spring of 2015, Rebecca joined our program. Through job classes, she worked on interview skills and made a resume. Rebecca searched for work and successfully gained employment at Wal-Mart in the deli department. Rebecca has been employed now for more than five months and is grateful for the experience she received with our program.

Thomas sought our help last June. Within a month, he got a job. In December, he was hired by Harley-Davidson as a full-time warehouse employee.

For too long, government programs have entrapped individuals like this into extended dependency. Our reforms help people get the training they need to get back up on their own feet.

When we first proposed these reforms, some in this Capitol argued that we were making it harder to get government assistance. The truth is: we're making it easier to find a job.

You see, true freedom and prosperity do not come from the mighty hand of the government. They come from empowering people to live their own lives through the dignity that comes from work. When I was a kid, my first job was washing dishes at the Countryside Restaurant. Later in high school, I flipped hamburgers at McDonald's in my hometown of Delavan.

These jobs taught me the importance of hard work. Tonette and I made sure our sons worked similar jobs at a pizza place and a custard stand. Traveling the state, I've heard many people tell me stories of their first jobs. It is in our nature as humans to want to be productive and contribute to our families and to our communities.

Think about it. No one signs a high school year book saying, "good luck becoming dependent on the government." Instead, we aspire to be able to support ourselves and our families and to provide a good life for future generations.

That's why our focus in state government is simple: everyone who wants a job can find a job. Helping people identify a meaningful career is worth far more than a paycheck. It's really about helping people achieve true independence. It's about living the American Dream.

In 2016, we want to help more people live that dream here in Wisconsin.

As mentioned, people across this state constantly tell me about job openings in their areas. To fill these positions, we need to work with students at a younger age to get them ready for the many exciting careers available in our state.

In the fall, 25 school districts will be part of an Academic and Career Plans pilot. We provided funding, so every child in the state between grades 6 and 12 can have access to a plan beginning in the 2017 school year. This will prepare students to think about their interests so they can take courses in junior high and high school that will prepare them for their future occupations.

We have some of the best schools in the country, but we need to do more for our students to succeed in the 21st century. In the past, we enacted major reforms that helped schools reward great teachers, improve curriculum, and balance budgets.

Now, we need to do more to reform state government and put those savings into public education. One area to consider for real reform is the way we administer health insurance for state employees, which some experts believe could save tens of millions of dollars.

Tonight, I commit to investing every penny of savings to the general fund from these specific reforms to support public education. People tell me that they appreciate our efforts to get the state's fiscal house in order and that now is the time to use savings to help our students prepare for the future.

Even before the next budget, we want to put more resources into public education. Tonight, I am pleased to announce we will provide an additional \$3 million for dual enrollment programs in our schools through the Wisconsin Fast Forward program. These grants will help districts to partner with local technical colleges, so our students can get a jump-start on their career plans.

We are also excited to work with the University of Wisconsin System to explore providing a three-year degree that would start in our high schools and continue on many of our UW campuses. This would help reduce costs and move people into the workforce sooner.

As we mentioned this past week, student loan debt has increasingly become a burden for young professionals. The best way to tackle this issue is to keep the costs down in the first place. That is why we worked together to freeze tuition for four years.

Still, there are many young people who took out loans before our freeze or did so at private institutions. So we have a package of ideas to help offset the price of college and reduce the costs of student loan debt. We believe that these measures can garner bipartisan support in this legislative session.

Thank you to Representative Dave Murphy, as well as Senator Howard Marklein, Senator Sheila Harsdorf, Representative John Macco, and Representative Dave Heaton, for working with us to put together these plans:

First, we will allow for the full deduction of student loan interest on state income taxes.

Second, we will increase Wisconsin grants for technical colleges to help another 1,000 students, which is on top of the more than 5,000 students we added under our Blueprint for Prosperity.

Third, we'll expand the emergency grants program for students at technical colleges and two-year UW Colleges.

Fourth, we'll increase internships within the UW System to help prepare students for future careers.

Fifth, we look to expand transparency by sending information to students each year about their current and projected student loan debt levels and education costs.

Tonight, I call on lawmakers in both parties to pass this legislative package as soon as possible to help lower the cost of higher education and to ease the burden of student loan debt.

In addition, I look forward to working with UW System President Ray Cross and Board of Regents President Regina Millner and Vice President John Behling to strengthen and promote programs to allow students to graduate on time, to explore a three-year degree, and to expand the UW Flex Option to a number of students equal to a new UW campus. We want a quality education to be affordable in Wisconsin for college students and their families.

You see, we now compete in a global economy. Education will drive success, as will technology. That is why I am glad that we tripled the amount of funding in our budget dedicated this year for broadband access across the state.

People can do business anywhere in the world, but they need access to high-speed internet connections. Our program partners with local investments to install a fiber network. Once completed, a private company provides the service.

Without our assistance, rural areas would be deprived of quality internet access because private companies could not justify the rate of return on investment. Our program helps small businesses, family farmers, tourism attractions, and public schools across the state.

While these investments are great, investing in our people is even more important. Today, we are assisting people with disabilities prepare to enter the workforce by helping employers understand their unique abilities.

In 2015, the state Division of Vocational Rehabilitation assisted nearly 5,000 people with disabilities reach their employment goal. This was the highest rate in 15 years.

We are also helping people with disabilities in high school get ready for careers through something called Project SEARCH. Here in Wisconsin, the program has a success rate of 85 percent—higher than the national rate.

Last year, we grew Project SEARCH to 16 total employer sites. Tonight, I am pleased to note that our funding will help add three more employer sites in 2016.

Helping to keep valuable employees in the workforce is also important. For example, many don't know that the majority of caregivers for people with dementia and Alzheimer's disease are employed beyond their roles as caregivers.

With this in mind, we have a new kit for employers to use to help their valued employees who are caring for a loved one. Tonight, I invite you to get more information about this at dhs.wisconsin.gov/dementia.

The idea for the kit came from former Wisconsin Governor Marty Schreiber whose wife, Elaine, has Alzheimer's disease. He worked with my Secretary of Health Services, Kitty Rhoades, on the project. Governor Schreiber is traveling tonight, but we're grateful to him and to Secretary Rhoades for their hard work on this issue.

Helping people deal with their health care needs—including mental health—is another way to retain top talent in the workplace. We need to break the stigma and assist people to get the help that they need. I am proud that we put more resources into mental health services than any Wisconsin Governor in the past 25 years.

In 2013, I pronounced that no man or woman who served our country in the Armed Forces should return home and not be able to find employment.

Here in Wisconsin, I am proud to say that we lowered the unemployment rate for veterans in 2014, and again, in 2015. Our state now has one of the lowest unemployment rates for veterans in the nation, significantly below the national unemployment rate for veterans.

Our goal is to see it drop again this year. We owe it to our returning heroes.

All of these different initiatives are designed to increase independence while helping people get the education and skills they need to succeed in the workforce.

As I said at the onset of this address, the state of our state is strong.

There are more people working in Wisconsin than at nearly any other point in our history; state finances are stable; overall, our school students are doing well; college tuition is frozen; and property and income taxes are down from where they were before I took office.

Looking ahead, we have an aggressive plan over the next year to ensure that everyone who wants a job can find a job. We will enact this plan by helping the people of this state improve the economy and by investing in K-12 education, higher education, and worker training.

Still, we need to do more. We need to prepare for the future.

As we think about the next 20 years, I want to hear from you about your hopes and dreams—for your families, your communities, and your state.

With this in mind, I am proud to announce that we are going to visit every part of the state to hold listening sessions throughout 2016. So far, we have held sessions in Seymour, Prairie du Chien, Milwaukee, Osseo, Kewaunee, Sturgeon Bay, and Ashwaubenon... and we plan on coming to a community near you soon.

So far, participants have included principals, farmers, small business owners, local government officials, retirees, veterans, teachers, construction workers, union members, parents, high school students, nurses, charitable organization leaders, superintendents, insurance agents, ministers, college students, machinists, law enforcement, and a librarian.

This is personal for me, as I think the best way to plan for the future is to hear from people all over the state. We need a shared vision for the future. This is why I want to hear from you.

I call it our 2020 Vision Project. The idea is to bring together a diverse mix of people in small group settings all across the state. I want to hear from you about what makes Wisconsin great, where we want our state to be in the next two decades, and how we should measure success.

Now, more than ever, it is important to consider the kind of state our children and grandchildren will inherit. We need to think more about the next generation than just about the next election.

The founders of our state and our country had that kind of long view of the world. Their founding principles were able to overcome partisan and political differences. We can do the same as we think about the kind of state we want to become over the next 20 years and beyond.

On July 4th, we will observe the 240th birthday of this great country—a nation built on the principle of freedom. As we celebrate, let us remember that our rights are endowed by our Creator, defined by our Constitution, but defended each and every day by the men and women who wear the uniform.

They and their families deserve our praise—and more importantly—our prayers. May God bless each and every one of them. May God bless the great State of Wisconsin. And may God bless the United States of America."

The Board Finds:

1. TRC Engineers of Windsor, Connecticut claims \$918.00 for refund of an alleged overpayment of fees due to an error on the claimant's Foreign Corporation Annual Report for 2015. The claimant states that its 2015 Wisconsin assets should have been reported as \$0 but were mistakenly reported as \$902,855. The claimant states that this error resulted in DFI calculating fees of \$1,008 instead of the correct amount, \$65. The claimant requests reimbursement for the overpayment.

DFI recommends denial of this claim. DFI notes that it has no means by which to verify the accuracy of the information provided by the claimant, because the claimant has exclusive control over the information on which the Annual Report's calculations are based. DFI points to the fact that there was no error by DFI or any of its employees. DFI notes that the Claims Board has a history of denying similar claims and recommends that the board deny this claim as well.

The Board concludes the claim should be denied based upon statements made at hearing by DFI that the clamant will receive a credit towards future fees in the amount of the overpayment and the claimant's statement that they would not have pursued this claim if they had been aware of the credit. [Member Ignatowski not participating.]

2. Robert Steinway of Minong, Wisconsin claims \$10,000 for value of a boat motor damaged while in DNR custody and other expenses. In July 2011, a boat owned by the claimant's company was involved in a serious accident on the Chippewa River. Both boats involved in the accident were badly damaged. At the time of the accident, DNR took custody of the claimant's boat and retained custody for several years. The claimant states that he made a number of attempts to determine whether DNR had winterized the boat while it was in storage but that he was given conflicting information. DNR also denied his request for return of the boat. When the boat was finally released to the claimant in 2015, he discovered that the motor, which had not been damaged in the accident, had a cracked engine block because DNR had not winterized the motor and the fluids inside had frozen.

The claimant believes DNR should be held responsible for not properly storing his property while it was in DNR custody. He again notes that the motor was not damaged in the accident and would have been salvageable but for DNR's negligence.

The claimant alleges that purchase of a new engine would cost in excess of \$20,000. He plans to fix the motor and has received an estimate of \$9,948.04 for the repair. The claimant states that the motor is a current model and, once repaired, has value far and above the repair costs. The claimant states that DNR's argument that full payment should not be made

because the repairs have not yet occurred does not negate DNR's obligation to pay for their negligence. The claimant also notes that it is reasonable for him to wait for the claim to be paid rather than advancing his own money for the repair.

The claimant believes that the discussion as to the existence or nonexistence of insurance is not a defense to the admitted negligence of DNR. The claimant stated at hearing that his insurance claim was denied by his boat dealer's policy but that he received payment for the value of the boat under his general liability policy, minus a \$5,000 deductible. However, the claimant argues that this fails to take into account the value of the engine, which would have remained a viable asset if not damaged by DNR's negligence. The claimant states that "his insurance coverage was based on what was left of the boat" and that "DNR's position would be viable if a trailer was included" (it was not).

Finally, the claimant notes that he has incurred \$2,500 in attorney's fees attempting to recover costs for damage caused by DNR. The claimant believes that \$10,000 is a reasonable settlement for DNR's negligence.

DNR recommends payment of this claim in the reduced amount of \$1,000. DNR recognizes its responsibility to properly store evidence but never thought to drain water from the boat because it was "totaled" and no longer usable. Moreover, DNR took possession of the boat as part of a multi-agency investigation of a very serious accident involving four deaths. There were concerns regarding chain of custody issues if this important piece of evidence was moved to a marina for winter storage. DNR also notes that the agency was at one point negotiating with the claimant to retain the boat for training purposes but that negotiations fell through.

DNR points to the Claims Board's own website, which indicates the Board makes awards on claims for "out-of-pocket" damages; however the claimant has not actually incurred any costs to repair the motor. DNR notes that the purpose of the Claims Board is not to compensate individuals for mistakes allegedly made by the state, or to punish agencies for those mistakes, but to reimburse individuals for actual expenses. DNR admits it inadvertently damaged the motor—but in an already wrecked boat. DNR notes that it is highly unlikely that a motor from a wrecked boat will be reused.

DNR points to the fact that the claimant has not definitively answered the agency's questions regarding insurance: Was the boat insured for collision? Was an insurance claim made and paid? If so, what payment did the claimant receive? DNR finds it difficult to believe that the claimant would not have insured this expensive business asset (which was brand new at the time of the accident) for comprehensive/collision coverage. DNR points to the Claims Board's longstanding history of not making awards for damages covered by insurance, regardless of whether or not the claimant filed a claim with their insurer. If the claimant received compensation from his insurer for the full value of the boat, that payment would have included the value of engine. An additional award would be contrary to Claims Board precedent and would constitute unjust enrichment.

The Board concludes that to the extent the claimant suffered any damages due to the actions of DNR, it appears he was made whole by his insurer. The Board thinks the claimant's insurer could have been the proper claimant because Mr. Steinway failed to prove or provide any documented losses. The Board further concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

3. Regenial Hoskins of Fitchburg, Wisconsin claims \$352.00 for tire damage incurred on 10/15/14. The claimant was traveling eastbound on Hwy. 12/18 when he struck a piece of concrete that had broken out of the roadway, causing a large hole in the road. The claimant states that four vehicles struck the piece of concrete and there was no way to avoid it due to the traffic volume and the way it was sticking out. He requests reimbursement for his \$250 insurance deductible and the \$102 charge he had to pay out of pocket to obtain 2 new tires instead of used ones. The claimant states that his insurance company contacted Dane County and was told that DOT was the responsible party.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT has a contract with Dane County for maintenance of interstate roads within the county. This contract has a hold harmless agreement which says that Dane County will indemnify and save harmless the State from all claims brought because of damages received by any person on account of any act, omission, neglect or misconduct of Dane County employees. Pursuant to that contract, DOT believes this claim should be brought against the Dane County Department of Transportation.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

4. Sandra Klemm of Hubertus, Wisconsin claims \$375.22 for vehicle window shattered by an object thrown by a riding mower. On 6/19/15, the claimant was traveling on Highway 13 at Roche-a-Cri State Park. As she passed the DNR employee mowing the grass in front of the park, an object shattered the rear passenger window of her vehicle. The claimant stopped to speak to the employee, who taped up her window and provided her with forms to file a claim. The claimant's vehicle is insured for liability only and she requests reimbursement for the cost to fix the window.

DNR recommends payment of this claim. DNR spoke to the employee who was operating the mower at the time of the incident. The employee stated that a road crew's recent work in the area "churned things up a bit" and theorized that the mower could have picked up a rock or other object which caused the damage. DNR notes that, although the claimant does not have comprehensive insurance coverage for her vehicle, if she had, the deductible would likely be above the amount being claimed. DNR believes there is no evidence of negligence on the part of its employees but that the claim should be paid based on equitable principles.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Members Finkelmeyer, Ignatowski, and Olsen dissenting.]

5. Reinaldo Acosta, Jr. of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$245.00 for value of a television allegedly damaged by DOC. The claimant was transferred to the Wisconsin Secure Program Facility (WSPF) on 6/12/14 and initially housed on an intake unit. On 7/7/14, he was moved to a permanent cell where he was allowed to have his TV. The claimant alleges that when he arrived at his permanent cell, the TV was already there. The claimant states that this violates DOC rules, which require that all electronics must be checked into an institution in front of the inmate in order to prove they are in working order. The claimant alleges that his TV was working when he transferred to WSPF but that when he arrived in his permanent cell on 7/7/14, the TV would not work. The claimant states that Corrections Officer Key witnessed that the TV did not work when the claimant arrived in his permanent cell. The claimant filed an inmate complaint, which was denied. The claimant appealed the denial, alleging that DOC never contacted CO Key, but his appeal was denied. The claimant requests reimbursement of \$245, the cost of the TV.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that on 7/7/14, prior to moving the claimant to his permanent cell, DOC staff delivered the TV there, plugged it in and found it to be in working condition. DOC states that staff had no further contact with the claimant's television until he reported it was malfunctioning. DOC believes there is no credible evidence that DOC staff damaged the claimant's TV and that this claim should be denied.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$245.00 based on equitable principles due to DOC's apparent failure to follow its own policies. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Corrections appropriation § 20.410(1)(a), Stats.

6. Elbert Compton of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$400.00 he alleges he was awarded by the court due to an incorrect Judgment of Conviction (JOC). In the claimant's original 2004 JOC, the court imposed: \$80 court costs, \$280 crime victim/witness assistance surcharge, \$20 crime lab assessment, \$20 drug assessment, and a \$250 DNA surcharge. In 2008, the court vacated the \$250 DNA surcharge and DOC reimbursed that money to the claimant's inmate account. In March 2011, the court amended the claimant's JOC to: \$120 court costs, \$420 crime victim/witness assistance surcharge, and \$30 in other obligations. The claimant filed a motion with the court challenging the increase in the crime victim/witness assistance surcharge. The court agreed the surcharge had been calculated incorrectly and amended the JOC to reflect the correct surcharge of \$280. The claimant alleges that DOC should have reimbursed \$400 to his account to reflect the corrections to his JOC but that DOC failed to do so.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that it never changed the obligations attached to the claimant's inmate account to reflect the increased crime victim/witness surcharge. As a result, the claimant was never charged by DOC for the erroneous crime victim/witness surcharge. DOC states that the amount deducted from the claimant's account never exceeded the original \$280 surcharge originally imposed by the court. DOC does not believe the claimant should be reimbursed for an amount he never paid. In addition, DOC notes that in April 2011 institution staff notified the claimant that it had incorrectly entered an additional court cost amount as \$2600, rather than \$100. Upon discovery of this error, DOC immediately corrected the amount. DOC notes that this was a harmless error because, at the time it was discovered, the claimant had only paid \$97.12 towards that additional court cost.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

7. Jerome T. Walker of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$45.61 for cost of hobby supplies allegedly improperly destroyed by DOC. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution. He was sent to temporary lock-up (TLU) on 4/26/14 and his hobby property was sent to the Hobby Department for inventory because he could not possess it while in TLU. DOC staff inventoried his hobby property on 5/1/14. A portion of his pink and light lavender yarn was declared excess/contraband and was destroyed. The claimant states that he is allowed to have a total of 160 oz. of varn and that he only had 157.5 oz. at the time of the 5/1/14inventory. The claimant also states that he has receipts to prove that he purchased the pink and light lavender varn. The claimant alleges that the prior inventory on 3/18/14 shows a "pink/lt lavender – started on project" which was a blanket that he decided not to finish. The claimant states that between 3/18/14 and 5/1/14 he undid that project and that is how he obtained the allegedly "excess" pink and light lavender yard. The claimant also alleges that the project listed on the 5/1/14 inventory as "It lavender/pink project (crocheted) started" proves that the project started at the time of the 3/18/14 inventory was more substantial and almost completed by the time of the 5/1/14 inventory. The claimant believes his receipts prove that he purchased the yarn and requests reimbursement for the cost of the varn as well as photocopy and postage costs to pursue his claim.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. On 3/16/14 the claimant was sent to TLU and Hobby staff inventoried his property on 3/18/14. The claimant was transferred back to his regular cell and his property returned on 4/4/14. The claimant was again sent to TLU on 4/26/14. When Hobby staff inventoried his property on 5/1/14, they discovered he had 14.4 oz of pink yarn and 23.2 oz. of light lavender yarn in excess of what was shown on the 3/18 inventory. The claimant had no receipts showing he had purchased additional yarn between 4/4 and 4/26. Therefore, DOC staff determined he must have obtained the yarn through unauthorized means and declared it contraband. Pursuant to DOC policy, the contraband yarn was destroyed. DOC

disputes the claimant's allegation that he obtained the yarn by ripping out the project started at the time of the 3/18 inventory. The 5/1 inventory clearly shows the claimant was still working on the same project. DOC states that staff properly seized and disposed of the yarn because it was contraband and obtained by the claimant though unauthorized channels.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Member Ignatowski dissenting.]

8. Jerome T. Walker of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$51.95 for property allegedly improperly seized and destroyed by DOC staff. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution. On 11/4/14, DOC staff searched his cell and confiscated a number of canteen items. The claimant alleges that DOC staff took the items because they believed he had not purchased them but that he was able to produce receipts for 98% of the items. The claimant alleges that after he produced the receipts, DOC told him the items had been confiscated because they were "past their 6 month consumption time." The claimant states there is no DOC rule requiring that canteen items be consumed within 6 months of purchase. The claimant filed an inmate complaint, which was denied. He appealed that decision but was again denied. The claimant states that he was not over the possession limit for any of the items and that DOC should not have seized them. He also believes that he should have been allowed to mail the allegedly contraband items to his family, rather than them being destroyed by DOC.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC notes that canteen purchase limits for inmates are also canteen possession limits. DOC states that inmates are informed of this rule and are responsible for ensuring they do not exceed the allowed number of canteen items. DOC states that the cell search turned up numerous canteen items in excess of the possession limits and a number of items for which the claimant could not produce receipts. Because the items were in excess of allowable canteen limits, the items were declared contraband and destroyed. DOC notes that, per DOC policy, inmates are not allowed to mail out canteen items to family members. DOC believes the excess canteen items were correctly classified as contraband and properly destroyed.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one with the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

9. Raynard R. Jackson of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$25,000.00 for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to \$775.05, Wis. Stats., related to a 2004 conviction. The claimant states that he was framed by officers of the Milwaukee Police Department and that he is innocent of the crimes for which he was convicted.

The claimant states that on 3/25/03 he and a companion, Morris Rash, saw a police car pass them as they entered a store. When they exited the store, the squad turned around

and followed them as they walked down the sidewalk. The claimant states that he and Rash ran from the officers because they were both subject to outstanding warrants. The claimant states that Officer Lough chased him but that he was apprehended by Officer Dodd. Officer Awadallah apprehended Morris Rash. The claimant states that he did not have a gun.

The claimant states that this encounter involved a "rogue" group of District 3 officers: Awadallah, Lough, Dodd, and Dineen, who had a history of framing individuals for crimes and other misconduct. The claimant notes that the prior District 3 Captain had been relieved of command for sending a memo that encouraged officers to make "the thugs" lives "even more miserable than before" after a District 3 officer was transferred out of the district due to misconduct. The claimant alleges that these four officers planted a gun at the scene of his arrest and conspired to falsify reports in order to frame him.

The claimant alleges that the officers lied about many elements of the arrest. He states there is no record of the "drug dealing complaint" to which the officers said they were responding. He states the officers saw him and Rash enter and leave the store; therefore, they were clearly not loitering. The claimant notes that Officer Lough wrote contradictory reports, one indicating that he picked up the gun as he pursued the clamant and one indicating that he went back for the gun after he apprehended the claimant. The claimant points to the fact that the gun the officers claim he discarded was the exact same type and caliber issued to police officers, that it was not registered or reported stolen, and that it did not have the claimant's fingerprints on it. The claimant notes that Officer Lough testified at trial that he inventoried the gun into evidence, but police records show that it was Officer Awadallah who checked in the gun, more than five hours after claimant was arrested. The claimant states that Officer Lough also reported that he was present for both the claimant's and Rice's arrests, even though the claimant and Rice fled in different directions and were arrested in different locations. The claimant alleges that, contrary to the reports he filed, Officer Lough did not have any contact with him, and that Officer Dodd arrested him. The claimant alleges that Officer Dodd struck him while he was handcuffed, and took his watch and money, neither of which was ever inventoried.

In February 2005, the claimant was convicted of possession of a firearm by a felon, carrying a concealed weapon, and resisting an officer.

The claimant's initial postconviction counsel, Attorney Lucius, filed an appeal in September 2005. In March 2005 Officer Awadallah was charged in federal court for threatening to plant evidence on a suspect in an unrelated case. Despite the fact that the charges against Officer Awadallah were prominently reported in multiple Milwaukee-area and statewide media sources while the postconviction motion was still pending, Lucius failed to raise the issue in the motion.

In addition, in 2006 while the claimant's appeal was pending, the court of appeals released its decision in State v. Missouri. The court granted a new trial to Missouri due to the trial court's refusal to admit evidence of other acts of

misconduct involving Officers Awadallah Lough, Dodd, and Dineen. Despite the fact that these were the same four officers involved in claimant's arrest, Lucius failed to amend his motion. The claimant's postconviction motion was denied by the trial court.

In 2007, the claimant's new attorney, Mr. Gould, filed a postconviction motion for ineffective assistance of counsel based on Lucius's failure to raise issues related to the Missouri decision and newly discovered evidence—Officer Awadallah's conviction on federal civil rights charges. This motion was also denied by the trial court.

Attorney Gould appealed the denial and in December 2008, the court of appeals ordered a hearing on the issues. In the July 2009 hearing, the court found that attorney Lucius's failure to bring up Officer Awadallah's prosecution and the Missouri decision constituted ineffective assistance of counsel. The court vacated the two gun-related convictions and remanded those charges for a new trial. In August 2009, the State dismissed the gun-related charges.

The claimant states that the officers involved in his arrest have no credibility, which has been proven by Awadallah's conviction and reversals of numerous other individuals' convictions based on the same type of misconduct by the officers involved in his arrest.

The claimant states he would have only served 9 months for the obstruction conviction and requests the maximum reimbursement for the six years and three months he spent in prison.

The Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office (DA) recommends denial of this claim. The DA states that neither the court proceedings nor the claimant's submissions establish that he was actually innocent of the crimes for which he was convicted, and that the State's decision to dismiss the gun-related charges was not based on a determination that the clamant was innocent of those charges.

The DA notes that the court of appeals did not find that there was merit to the claimant's underlying claim, but only that his motion was sufficient to warrant a hearing. At the July 2009 hearing, Judge Martens found that Awadallah's conviction and the Missouri decision "at least as it relates to Awadallah" created a reasonable probability that the trial result would have been different due to Awadallah's role in the chain of custody of the recovered gun. Judge Martens vacated the gun-related charges and ordered a new trial on those counts; however, the obstruction charge was not overturned.

The DA points to the fact that Judge Martens' ruling was limited to Officer Awadallah and the chain of custody issue. Significantly, Judge Martens 1) did not find that the claimant was innocent in fact; 2) did not find that any officer engaged in misconduct; 3) did not find that the evidence would be insufficient to establish guilt at retrial; and 4) did not determine that Missouri evidence was admissible to any officer other than Awadallah.

The DA states that it moved to dismiss the gun-related charges because the evidence would not have been as strong

at retrial, since Awadallah was not available to establish chain of custody. That, and the possibility that Missouri evidence would be admitted, raised the question of whether the State could prove the charges beyond a reasonable doubt. In addition, the claimant had served most, if not all, of his maximum sentence. Therefore, the state moved to dismiss the outstanding charges.

The DA believes the claimant has failed to meet the standard of providing clear and convincing evidence that he was innocent and recommends denial of this claim.

The Board defers decision of the claim at this time so that the claimant can be made available to attending a hearing.

These were sons, daughter, sisters and brothers;

fathers, mothers, aunts uncles, and cousins. They had families who loved them, who cared about them, who will never get a chance to say goodbye. Last spring, Senator Harris Dodd made a promise to each of you that she would stand up here most session days and adjourn in honor of lives lost to violence and she will keep standing up and speaking out until she gets every member of this body to join her in trying to save lives. Across the nation and in our state, last year was filled with tragedies that shook our core. We cannot sit on the sidelines any more. I have approved **Senate Bill 434** as 2015 Wisconsin Act 358 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto in section 52.

Senate Bill 434 requires the Department of Natural Resources to send by certified letter or electronic mail a decision of approval or denial of a cutting notice to the owner

of managed forest law property no later than the end of the business day following the day the department decides on the notice. I am partially vetoing this provision because I object to the costs imposed on the department by requiring approval notices to be sent via certified mail. Additionally, the partial veto of this provision accomplishes the original intent of the bill's authors.

Historically the department has received approximately 3,000 cutting notices annual. Currently, the department has access to the email address for only six percent of managed forest land owners. Sending an approval or denial in response to every notice at a rate of \$6.74 per contact would cost \$20,200. Assuming the number of email contacts grows to 50 percent, contacting the remaining 1,500 land owners would cost approximately \$10,100. By partially vetoing the provision and limiting the certified mail requirement for denials of cutting notices, the cost would drop to between \$300 and \$600 annually.

I am vetoing **Senate Bill 87** in its entirety and am returning it to the Senate because I object to the regulatory burden that the bill would place on individual homeowners and the cost it would impose on state and local government.

The bill would require the Department of Safety and Professional Services to promulgate rules that require an inspection of an addition to, remodeling of, improvement to or other alteration of a one- or two-dwelling that exceeds 20 percent of the dwelling's assessed value. The bill would also allow local units of government to require an inspection of a dwelling when the remodeling, improvement or other alteration does not exceed 20 percent of the dwelling's assessed value.

This legislation would add unnecessary regulatory burdens, costs and delays for homeowners who are trying to remodel or otherwise improve their homes. In addition, the bill would increase administrative costs for the Department of Safety and Professional Services, as well as for local units of government. I am committed to fostering private property rights and restoring the balance between private property owners and the government. I believe that this bill would contradict those efforts.

The Board Finds:

1. Clontech Laboratories, Inc., of Mountain View, California claims \$38,909.00 for refund of an alleged

overpayment of fees due to an error on their 2011 Foreign Corporation Annual Report. The claimant states that the amount of capital representation in Wisconsin reported on the form was taken from its 2010 Wisconsin tax return, based on advice from its accountant. The clamant later realized that the amount reported on its tax return included other state assets and revenue, resulting in a significant over-reporting of capital on the 2011 Annual Report. The claimant alleges the representation capital should have approximately \$850,000 but the incorrectly reported amount was in excess of \$12 million. The claimant was charged a fee of \$33,909 based on the incorrect capital representation. The claimant was also charged the maximum penalty of \$5,000 for transacting business without a Certificate of Authority because the size of the penalty is based on the amount of capital representation. The claimant understands this overpayment could be taken as a credit against fees for future annual reports, however, it does not anticipate sufficient annual growth in its Wisconsin capital to utilize the credit in a reasonable amount of time.

DFI recommends denial of this claim. DFI notes that it has no means by which to verify the accuracy of the information provided by the claimant, because the claimant has exclusive control over the information on which the Annual Report's calculations are based. DFI points to the fact that there was no error by DFI or any of its employees. DFI notes that the Claims Board has a history of denying similar claims and recommends that the board deny this claim as well

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$4,770.00 (the amount of the increased penalty caused by the incorrect capital representation) based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Financial Institutions appropriation

§ 20.144(1)(g), Stats. [Member Ignatowski not participating.]

2. Craig S. Geiger of Oregon, Wisconsin claims \$3,407.96 for overpayments and refunds related to 2003, 2009, and 2010, late filed income tax returns. Claimant states that he was homeless during the years in question, surviving with the help of family and friends, and receiving EBT benefits. He incorrectly assumed that he did not have to file taxes for those years due to his lack of income. The claimant also states that he believed that his settlement with the IRS included any state tax obligations. The claimant states that he was unaware there was a statute of limitations to claim refund of any

overpayments. The claimant filed the missing returns in April and June of 2015 with the assistance of an accountant. He requests reimbursement for the amount overpaid for 2003 and the refunds denied for 2009 and 2010.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that multiple notices were issued to the Claimant regarding the missing returns, including Requests to File, Notices of Estimated Tax, Notices of Overdue Tax, and Notices of Intent to Offset federal refunds. DOR states that all of these notices warned of the consequences of not filing the missing returns. DOR issued estimated assessments for 2003 on October 9, 2007, and for 2009 and 2010 on June 26, 2013. DOR records indicate the claimant informed his DOR agent that he would pick up forms to file the returns on March 20, 2014, and was provided with forms and information about volunteer income tax assistance sites. The 2009 and 2010 returns were filed on April 27, 2015, and the 2003 return was filed on June 27, 2015. DOR states that § 71.75(5), Wis. Stats., prohibits DOR from refunding the overpayment for the 2003 assessment because no refund was claimed within four years of the assessment date. DOR also points to § 71.75(2), Wis. Stats., which prohibits DOR from allowing the refund claimed on the 2009 and 2010 returns because the returns were not filed within four years of the original unextended due dates.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

3. Donna Cvetan of Sheboygan, Wisconsin claims \$6,487.12+ for return of amounts garnished from her wages for a tax liability for which the claimant believes she is not liable. The claimant and her husband entered into a Marital Property Agreement in 1994, which clearly states that D&M Plumbing & Heating, which claimant's husband owned for many years prior to the marriage, was his individual property. The claimant points to Section 4.1.b. of the Agreement, which provides that "without any obligation or liability on the part of the other" party, each party is responsible for "debts, obligations, taxes, assessments, and expenses at any time incurred...relating to the acquisition, holding, disposition, operation, management, or administration of his or her solely owned property." The claimant states that during a routine audit of D&M, it was discovered that some sales and use taxes had inadvertently not been paid. The claimant states that she has never had any involvement whatsoever in D&M and points to Section 4.4. of the Agreement, which states that "each party shall have full and exclusive powers of management and control over the property classified as his or her individual property...free from all rights, claims, or property interests of the other..." The claimant points to the fact that the Agreement also provides "that the classification of [her husband's] W-2 wages as marital shall not constitute a 'mixing' of marital and individual property" (Section 2.1.a.). D&M Plumbing & Heating closed in February 2015. DOR began garnishing 25% of the claimant's wages in June 2015 to recover the sales and use taxes owed by D&M. The claimant believes that the Marital Property Agreement clearly states that she is not responsible for payment of these taxes. She requests reimbursement of all monies garnisheed by DOR and that DOR cease any further garnishment of her wages for payment of this debt. As of the date this claim was filed, October 28, 2015, the DOR garnishment totaled \$6,487.12.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR points to section 4.6.b. of the Marital Property Agreement, which states that W-2 wages earned by both parties "shall be owned equally by both parties." DOR takes the position that since W-2 wages are not classified as individual property, they are considered marital property under § 766.31, Wis. Stats.

The Board defers decision of this claim at this time so that additional information may be obtained from DOR.

4. Susan Roloff of Stillwater, Minnesota claims \$673.31 for car damage allegedly caused by a road defect in St. Croix County. On October 4, 2015, the claimant was traveling on Hwy. 35/64 towards the Stillwater Bridge. The claimant states that the area was under construction and traffic was limited to one lane, moving about 48-53 mph., when her vehicle hit a large pothole. The claimant states that the vehicle's ABS and Trac Off warning lights came on shortly thereafter. The next day the claimant brought her vehicle to a mechanic, who had to replace the left front ball joints, replace a hub bearing, and do a front-end alignment. The claimant states that she contacted St. Croix County and DOT, but that each entity assumed the other was handling her claim. The claimant has a \$500 insurance deductible. She requests reimbursement for the damage to her vehicle.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. The area where this incident occurred was under construction as part of a project related to the St. Croix Crossing. As part of that project, traffic was shifted to STH 35/64. DOT states that it has a contract with St. Croix County for maintenance of state highways, including STH 34/64. DOT notes that when the county was notified about the pothole, they responded in a timely manner to fill it and continued to make repairs as needed. DOT states that because of the severity of the pothole, it was decided to use the project construction contractor to remove and repave the asphalt shoulder in the area where the incident occurred. This work was added to DOT's existing construction contract for the project, which contains a clause relieving the state of any responsibility for damages.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

5. Terry Miller of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$5,982.00 for lost wages due to an allegedly excessive and unlawful sentence. In 1985, the claimant was sentenced to 12 years imprisonment for Burglary, Party to a Crime. The claimant points to the fact that this charge was a Class C felony and that the penalty for a Class C felony is "imprisonment not to exceed 10 years" pursuant to § 939.50(3)(c), Wis. Stats. The

claimant believes his sentence exceeded the statutory maximum and requests reimbursement for lost wages during the two additional years he served in prison.

The Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office (DA) recommends denial of this claim. The DA points to the fact that the claimant was charged and convicted of burglary as a habitual criminal. The habitual criminality penalty enhancer allowed for a sentence up to 16 years, therefore, the 12 year sentence was not excessive. The DA notes that the claimant's original judgement of conviction did not reflect the habitual criminality enhancer, which was corrected in 2014 by the court.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Mekious D. Bullock, Sr. of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$40.48 for the cost of a Norelco razor allegedly damaged by DOC staff. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). He alleges that WCI property staff routinely invent reasons for seizing property they either don't want inmates to have or that inmates can no longer purchase. He alleges that when staff inventoried and inspected his property in June 2015, his razor was in good working condition. However, WCI staff seized the razor as contraband, declaring it altered because the trimmer blades would not stay in the trimmer. The claimant contacted property staff to get more details regarding what was wrong with the razor and staff then responded that the trimmer blades were "missing." The claimant believes that the fact that WCI staff gave two different answers regarding the trimmer blades proves that staff was negligent in handling his property. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint regarding the razor on June 19, 2015. The claimant states that DOC rules require a response within 20 working days, however, DOC did not respond to his complaint until November 3, 2015, almost four and a half months later. The claimant believes this shows that DOC does not follow its own rules and that WCI staff likely broke his razor and then lied about it. He requests reimbursement for the cost of the razor.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC records indicate that during an inspection, WCI staff found that the razor's trimmer blade would not stay in the trimmer. DOC denies that staff mishandled the razor; when staff opened the trimmer, the trimmer blade simply popped out because it was not secure and would not stay in place. DOC notes that if staff had inadvertently damaged the razor, they would have written an incident report, which they did not. DOC policies state that altered or damaged property items are deemed to be contraband and must be either disposed of or sent out by the inmate. Finally DOC points out that the claimant did not appeal the institution's decision regarding his complaint and has therefore failed to exhaust his administrative remedies. DOC believes the claimant has submitted no evidence that WCI staff damaged his property and requests denial of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

David W. Orr of Waupun, Wisconsin claims \$280.25 for value of property allegedly lost due to DOC negligence. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution. On February 19, 2015, the claimant was moved from the general population to temporary lock up (TLU). Upon transfer to TLU, DOC staff is responsible for inventorying and packing an inmate's property. The claimant alleges that his property was properly stored in his locked footlocker at the time of his transfer to TLU. He believes DOC staff did not take custody of his property in a timely fashion, thus allowing his cellmate to steal some of his property. The claimant states that it is common knowledge among inmates that there is often a delay of hours or days before staff packs up property when an inmate goes to TLU, therefore, those who wish to steal another inmate's property have ample opportunity to do so because of DOC's lax protocols. The clamant believes that DOC staff has a duty to compare the property in an inmate's cell with the Property Inventory Form when packing an inmate's property. This form would show what property the inmate possessed when he arrived at the institution, allowing staff to document any property subsequently received by the inmate. The claimant states that DOC staff failed to do this when they packed his property. Finally, the claimant refutes DOC's allegation that he has failed to exhaust his administrative remedies. The claimant filed an inmate complaint, however DOC took no action on his complaint until four or five months after he had filed this Claims Board claim. Rather than appeal DOC's decision, the claimant chose to simply continue with this claim. Because the Claims Board is not a court of law, the claimant does not believe he is required to exhaust his administrative remedies prior to filing a claim with the Claims Board. He requests reimbursement for items he believes were stolen by a third party due to DOC's negligence.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. When inmates are placed in TLU, their property is taken under staff control, packed, and sent to the institution's property department for inspection and inventory. DOC points to various property inventory forms which show what property was in the claimant's cell when he was transferred to TLU, what he was wearing when transferred, and the items in his cell at the time of his transfer that were designated contraband and destroyed. DOC states that any property not listed on those forms would not have been under staff control. DOC notes that the claimant admits that his own cellmate stole the property before it was under staff control. DOC believes it cannot be held liable for the actions of an inmate who steals another inmate's property. DOC notes that the claimant did not appeal the institution's decision of his inmate complaint, and therefore has not exhausted his administrative remedies. DOC believes the claimant has presented no evidence of negligence on the part of DOC staff and recommends the claim be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. Cornelius R. Reed of Stanley, Wisconsin petitions the board for a rehearing of his Innocent Convict Compensation claim, previously denied by the board on December 15, 2015.

The Board concludes that the petition for rehearing fails to meet the criteria for granting a rehearing under § 227.49(3)(a)-(c), Wis. Stats., and is therefore denied.

STATE OF WISCONSIN CLAIMS BOARD CLAIM OF: MAURICE J. CORBINE CLAIM NO. 2015-047-CONV

Decision

The Claims Board considered this matter on March 16, 2016. Claimant, Maurice J. Corbine, did not request a hearing. The Claims Board reviewed the written materials submitted by Corbine. The Sawyer County District Attorney's Office declined to submit a written response to this claim.

Background

This is a claim for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to § 775.05, Wis. Stats. The claim relates to Corbine's 2011 conviction for Operating While Intoxicated (5th) and Operating While Revoked (2nd). Corbine states he is innocent of this crime. He requests \$90,000 for the three years he spent in prison.

Claimant's Facts and Argument

Corbine states that on September 28, 2007, he was a passenger in a truck driven by his cousin, Rodney. He states that Sawyer County/Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Officer, Twyla Dailey, pulled in behind the truck approximately 10-15 seconds after Rodney parked it in the parking lot of a local tavern. Officer Dailey arrested Corbine for OWI. Officer Dailey's report stated that she followed the truck into the parking lot because she had observed it speeding and that she pulled in immediately after the truck. Officer Dailey also reported that she observed Corbine exit the driver's side door, walk around the front of the truck and up to the passenger side door. Corbine alleges that he had already exited the vehicle and was approaching the tavern when Officer Daily arrived and that he had walked back to the passenger side of the truck because he did not have a driver's license.

Corbine alleges that both he and Rodney told Officer Dailey that Rodney had been driving the truck, not Corbine, who admits that he was intoxicated at the time. Corbine states that Officer Dailey informed him that her in-car camera was recording the incident. Officer Dailey transported Corbine to the Sawyer County Jail, where he saw her insert a DVD into the booking room recording equipment. Corbine states that Dailey again told him the interview was being recorded. Corbine alleges that during the entirety of his interaction with Officer Dailey, both in the parking lot and at the jail, he repeatedly told her that he was not the driver of the vehicle but she persisted in arresting him. Corbine believes that Officer Dailey targeted him personally because she is corrupt.

Prior to his trial, Corbine's attorney requested copies of the in-car and booking room videos from the night of the arrest, however, the Sawyer County District Attorney's Office did not produce the videos, claiming that they could not find them. Corbine was convicted in 2011 and sentenced to 3 years in prison and 3 years supervision.

In 2013, Corbine appealed his conviction based on ineffective assistance of counsel because his trial attorney

(Hoffman) had failed to adequately investigate the failure of Sawyer County to produce the jailhouse video recording. The court of appeals remanded to the trial court for a Machner hearing. After the Machner hearing, the trial court ruled that Hoffman had adopted a reasonable strategy by not pursuing the video recording because it would have shown Corbine intoxicated and behaving aggressively and that the recording would likely not have changed the outcome of the trial. Corbine appealed the trial court's ruling.

On February 10, 2015, the court of appeals reversed his conviction. Corbine was released on that same day, having completed serving his sentence. The court pointed to Hoffman's testimony at the Machner hearing that he had relied on a description of what was on the jailhouse video based on a conversation he had with an unknown individual at Sawyer County. The court found: "Hoffman acknowledged he did not know the identity of the person who had allegedly viewed the video and therefore had no basis on which to determine whether that person was reliable...Further, Hoffman testified that his belief that the video portrayed Corbine in a poor light as based upon his review of the police report—not from something the unidentified person may have said. Finally, Hoffman testified he took no further steps to locate the DVD after he was told it was missing, and he never considered further action such as filing a motion." In addition, the court also found that Hoffman was deficient by failing to ask Corbine at trial whether he denied being the driver, which would have been "highly relevant to the credibility of the defense theory."

Corbine states that the DVD recording which Sawyer County failed to provide would have supported his defense that he was not the driver and that he had repeatedly denied being the driver during his interactions with Officer Dailey. Corbine believes the Sawyer County District Attorney intentionally withheld the DVD, which would have proven his innocence.

DA's Response and Argument

The Sawyer County District Attorney's Office (DA) declined to respond to this claim.

Discussion and Conclusion

Under the standards of Wis. Stat. § 775.05(3), the Claims Board must determine whether or not the evidence is clear and convincing that the petitioner was innocent of the crime for which he was imprisoned.

The Board concludes and finds that it is unable to determine whether the evidence is clear and convincing that Clements was innocent of the 2011 conviction for Operating While Intoxicated (5th) and Operating While Revoked (2nd) for which he was imprisoned. Accordingly, the Board further concludes that the Sawyer County District Attorney's Office shall file a written response to this claim and make itself available for appearance at a future hearing on this matter. *Vote: 4-0*

STATE OF WISCONSIN CLAIMS BOARD CLAIM OF: RAYNARD R. JACKSON CLAIM NO. 2014-080-CONV

Decision

Senate Finance Committee

The Claims Board held a hearing on this matter on March 16, 2016. Claimant, Raynard R. Jackson, appeared by phone. The Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office appeared by phone in opposition to Jackson's claim.

Background

This is a claim for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to § 775.05, Wis. Stats. The claim relates to Jackson's 2004 conviction for Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Carrying a Concealed Weapon, and Obstruction of an Officer. Jackson states he is innocent of the weapons-related charges. He requests the maximum reimbursement of \$25,000 for the six years and three months he served in prison.

Claimant's Facts and Argument

Jackson states that on March 25, 2003, he and a companion, Morris Rash, saw a police car pass them as they entered a store. When they exited the store, the squad turned around and followed them as they walked down the sidewalk. Jackson states that he and Rash ran from the officers because they were both subject to outstanding warrants. Jackson states that Officer Lough chased him but that he was apprehended by Officer Dodd. Jackson states that he did not have a gun. Officer Awadallah apprehended Morris Rash.

Jackson alleges that this encounter involved a "rogue" group of District 3 officers: Awadallah, Lough, Dodd, and Dineen, who had a history of framing individuals for crimes and other misconduct. Jackson notes that the prior District 3 Captain had been relieved of command for sending a memo that encouraged officers to make "the thugs" lives "even more miserable than before" after an officer was transferred out of District 3 due to misconduct. Jackson alleges that these four officers planted a gun at the scene of his arrest and falsified reports in order to frame him.

Jackson states that the officers lied about many elements of the arrest. He specifically alleges: 1) there is no record of the "drug dealing complaint" to which the officers said they were responding; 2) the officers saw Jackson and Rash enter and leave the store; therefore, they were clearly not loitering; 3) Officer Lough wrote contradictory reports, one indicating that he picked up the gun while pursuing Jackson and one indicating that he went back for the gun after he apprehended

Jackson; 4) the gun the officers claim Jackson discarded was the exact same type and caliber issued to police officers, was not registered or reported stolen, and did not have Jackson's fingerprints on it; 5) Officer Lough testified at trial that he personally inventoried the gun into evidence, but police records show that it was Officer Awadallah who did so, more than five hours after Jackson's arrest; 6) Officer Lough reported that he was present for the arrests of both Jackson and Rice, even though the two men fled in different directions and were arrested in different locations; 7) contrary to Officer Lough's report, Jackson was arrested by Officer Dodd, and Lough had no contact with Jackson; 8) Officer Dodd struck Jackson while he was handcuffed, and took Jackson's watch and money, neither of which was ever inventoried.

In February 2005, Jackson was convicted of possession of a firearm by a felon, carrying a concealed weapon, and resisting an officer.

Jackson's initial post-conviction counsel, Attorney Lucius, filed an appeal in September 2005. In March 2005 Officer Awadallah was charged in federal court for threatening to plant evidence on a suspect in an unrelated case. Despite the fact that the charges against Officer Awadallah were prominently reported in multiple Milwaukee-area and statewide media sources while the post-conviction motion was still pending, Lucius failed to raise the issue in the motion.

In addition, in 2006 while Jackson's appeal was pending, the court of appeals released its decision in *State v. Missouri*. The court granted a new trial to Missouri due to the trial court's refusal to admit evidence of other acts of misconduct involving Officers Awadallah, Lough, Dodd, and Dineen. Despite the fact that these were the same four officers involved in Jackson's arrest, Lucius failed to amend his motion. Jackson's post-conviction motion was denied by the trial court.

In 2007, Jackson's new attorney, Mr. Gould, filed a motion for ineffective assistance of counsel based on Lucius's failure to raise issues related to the *Missouri* decision and newly discovered evidence—Officer Awadallah's conviction on federal civil rights charges. This motion was also denied by the trial court.

Attorney Gould appealed the denial and in December 2008 the court of appeals ordered a hearing on the issues. In July 2009, the court found that attorney Lucius's failure to bring up Officer Awadallah's prosecution and the *Missouri* decision constituted ineffective assistance of counsel. The court vacated both gun-related convictions and remanded those charges for a new trial. In August 2009 the State dismissed the gun-related charges.

Jackson believes that the officers involved in his arrest have no credibility, which was proven by Awadallah's conviction and the reversal of numerous other convictions based on the same type of misconduct by the same officers involved in Jackson's arrest.

Jackson points out that he would have only served 9 months for the conviction for obstruction and requests the

maximum reimbursement for the six years and three months he spent in prison.

DA's Response and Argument

The DA believes Jackson has failed to meet the standard of providing clear and convincing evidence that Jackson was innocent and recommends denial of this claim.

The DA states that neither the court proceedings nor Jackson's submissions establish that he was actually innocent of the crimes for which he was convicted, and that the State's decision to dismiss the gun-related charges was not based on a determination that he was innocent of those charges.

The DA notes that the court of appeals did not find that there was merit to Jackson's underlying claim, but only that his motion was sufficient to warrant a hearing. At the July 2009 hearing, Judge Martens found that Awadallah's conviction and the *Missouri* decision "at least as it relates to Awadallah" created a reasonable probability that the trial result would have been different due to Awadallah's role in the chain of custody of the recovered gun. Judge Martens vacated the gun-related charges and ordered a new trial on those counts; however, the obstruction charge was not overturned.

The DA points to the fact that Judge Martens' ruling was limited to Officer Awadallah and the chain of custody issue. Significantly, Judge Martens: 1) did not find that Jackson was innocent in fact; 2) did not find that any officer engaged in misconduct; 3) did not find that the evidence would be insufficient to establish guilt at retrial; and 4) did not determine that *Missouri* evidence was admissible to any officer other than Awadallah.

The DA states that it moved to dismiss the gun-related charges because the evidence would not have been as strong at retrial, since Awadallah was not available to establish chain of custody. That, and the possibility that *Missouri* evidence would be admitted, raised the question of whether the State could prove the charges beyond a reasonable doubt. In addition, Jackson had served most, if not all, of his maximum sentence. Therefore, the State moved to dismiss the outstanding charges.

When asked about the current status and credibility of Officer Lough, the DA reported that Officer Lough was still working as an officer with the Milwaukee Police Department. The DA also reported that Officer Lough's credibility had never been contested like Officer Awadallah nor had Officer Lough ever been charged with similar crimes.

Discussion and Conclusion

Under the standards of Wis. Stat. § 775.05(3), the Claims Board must determine whether or not the evidence is clear and convincing that the petitioner was innocent of the crime for which he was imprisoned.

The primary evidence provided by Jackson in support of his petition was that the court of appeals vacated the gun related charges due to ineffective assistance of counsel. However, based on long-standing precedent, the Claims Board does not automatically equate such a vacation with innocence. A claimant like Jackson must prove his innocence by clear and convincing evidence, whereas in order to obtain a vacation based on ineffective assistance of counsel he only had to make a showing that there was a reasonable probability that the trial result would have been different if he had had more effective counsel. These are two very distinct standards with different burdens of proof and cannot be conflated. Therefore, the vacation, standing alone, does not mean that a claimant has proven his innocence by clear and convincing evidence.

Aside from the vacation noted above, Jackson cites the significant credibility problems and bad acts of Officer Awadallah, as evidence to substantiate that he was innocent of the charges and that essentially the gun charges were entirely fabricated. While it is true that Officer Awadallah has severe credibility problems and based on the record should not be believed, it was really Officer Lough who was the primary officer on the arrest. The DA stated that Officer Lough was still working as an officer with the Milwaukee Police Department, his credibility had never been contested like Officer Awadallah's, and Officer Lough had never been charged with similar crimes. As such, and based on the record before this Board, there is insufficient evidence to establish the conspiracy alleged by Jackson that all four officers engaged in a deliberate fabrication of his gun charges. In the absence of such evidence, the Board has no factual basis on which to find Jackson innocent of the charges to a clear and convincing standard.

Based on the above, and after hearing the evidence on the petition and reviewing all of the written submissions, the Board concludes and finds that the evidence is not clear and convincing that Jackson was innocent of the 2004 conviction for Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Carrying a Concealed Weapon for which he was imprisoned. Accordingly, the Board further concludes that no compensation shall be awarded. *Vote: 4-0.*

STATE OF WISCONSIN CLAIMS BOARD CLAIM OF: MARVIN D. CLEMENTS CLAIM NO. 2015-039-CONV

Decision

The Claims Board considered this matter on March 16, 2016. Claimant, Marvin D. Clements, did not request a hearing. The Claims Board reviewed the written materials submitted by Clements. The Milwaukee County District

Attorney's Office did not submit a written response to this claim

Background

This is a claim for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to § 775.05, Wis. Stats. The claim relates to Clements' 2000 conviction for two counts of Knowingly Violating a Domestic Abuse Order and one count of Bail Jumping-Misdemeanor. Clements states he is innocent of this crime. He requests the maximum reimbursement of \$25,000 for the 9 months he spent in prison plus an additional \$15,000 for his three years of probation.

Claimant's Facts and Argument

In 1999, Clements was charged with two counts of Knowingly Violating a Domestic Abuse Order (KVDAO) and one count of Bail Jumping-Misdemeanor because of phone calls he made to the mother of his children, who had a restraining order against him. During the jury deliberation phase of Clements' trial, the jury sent two questions to the court, the second of which was "does the defendant's intention matter in this case?" The court called the jury back into the courtroom and stated, "With regard to Jury Instruction 2040, violating a temporary restraining order or an injunction, the answer to the question does the defendant's intention matter in this case, no, it does not." This statement by the court was incorrect. The court then reread a portion of the jury instructions, stating, "Again, the parties have stipulated that the defendant knew that the injunction had been issued. As to whether or not he knew that his act violated its terms, that's a question for the jury." This statement by the court was correct. The court gave correct instructions to the jury regarding the bail jumping charge.

Clements appealed his conviction, arguing that "the court's clearly erroneous oral instructions effectively relieved the State of its burden of proving the mens rea required by each offense beyond a reasonable doubt." Clements' sole defense at his trial was that, "he did not know he was violating the restraining order, injunction, or the terms of his bond because he had been trying to contact his children, not Valisha Walker, who was the mother of his four children," and who was the person with whom he had been ordered to have no contact. The court of appeals reversed Clements' convictions for violating the KVDAO, finding, "it is impossible to tell whether the jury followed the correct instruction on intent, or the incorrect one that allowed for conviction on the charges under Wis. Stat. § 813.12 even though 'intention' did not 'matter." The appeals court found that the trial court's instructions regarding the bail jumping charge were correct and upheld that conviction. The appeals court remanded the KVDAO violation charges for retrial.

Clements was released in September 2000, after serving his sentence. In September 2001, the State declined to retry Clements because he had already served his time.

DA's Response and Argument

The Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office (DA) did not respond to this claim.

Discussion and Conclusion

Under the standards of Wis. Stat. § 775.05(3), the Claims Board must determine whether or not the evidence is clear and convincing that the petitioner was innocent of the crime for which he was imprisoned.

The primary evidence provided by Clements in support of his petition was that the court of appeals remanded the KVDAO charges due to improper jury instructions. However, based on long-standing precedent, the Claims Board does not automatically equate such a remand with innocence. A claimant like Clements must prove his innocence by clear and convincing evidence. The remand, standing alone, does not automatically mean that a claimant has proven his innocence by clear and convincing evidence. The remand does not address actual innocence inasmuch as it demonstrates that there was an error at trial. These are two very different standards.

Moreover, the record also appears to show that Clements clearly had in fact been contacting Valisha Walker in actual violation of the domestic abuse order. While there appears to be some question as to whether Clements knew that such acts were illegal, it is Clements' burden in this forum to prove by clear and convincing evidence that he did not know such acts were illegal. Unfortunately, on this point Clements has not carried his burden and can point to no facts in the record to support his lack of knowledge. The only fact he points to is the erroneous jury instruction. This error, however, does not constitute actual facts supporting his lack of intent on the KVDAO crime.

Based on the above, and after hearing the evidence on the petition and reviewing all of the written submissions, the Board concludes and finds that the evidence is not clear and convincing that Clements was innocent of the 2000 conviction for Knowingly Violating a Domestic Abuse Order and Bail Jumping for which he was imprisoned. Accordingly, the Board further concludes that no compensation shall be awarded. *Vote: 4-0*

The Board Finds:

1. Monroe & Weisbrod of Austin, Texas, claims \$24,000.00 for monies allegedly owed for recruitment services performed by the claimant for the UW. In October 2013, the UW contracted with the claimant to provide psychiatrist recruitment services for two positions at UW-Madison University Health Services (UHS). The search began in November 2013. In December 2013, the claimant began discussions with Dr. Claudia Reardon regarding one of the positions. Because Dr. Reardon worked elsewhere at the UW, the claimant contacted UHS to clarify that Dr. Reardon would be considered a "hire" under the contract. Dr. Van Orman at UHS confirmed that Dr. Reardon would be

considered a new hire even though she already worked at the University. In February 2014, Dr. Reardon declined one of the positions and removed herself from consideration. As part of its recruitment work, the claimant sent a series of "autodrip" emails to Dr. Reardon regarding whether she had reconsidered accepting the position. Auto-drip emails were sent in May, August, and November of 2014, and February of 2015. During this period the claimant successfully recruited two psychiatrists for UHS. Later in 2015, the claimant saw on UHS's webpage that Dr. Reardon had been appointed to a part-time position at UHS. The claimant contacted Dr. Van Orman at UHS regarding whether the hire of Dr. Reardon was covered under their contract with UW. Dr. Van Orman agreed that Dr. Reardon's hire was conducted under that contract and told the claimant to send an invoice for the placement fee. The claimant's placement fee for a single hire is \$24,000 and the claimant sent an invoice in that amount to the UW. In December 2014, the UW informed the claimant that it could not pay the invoice because the purchase order related to their contract was closed and that they could not issue payment without a purchase order. The claimant states that the UW has received the benefit of the claimant's work recruiting Dr. Reardon but the claimant received no payment for their work. The claimant believes they are due this money under the theories of quantum meruit and unjust enrichment. The claimant states that it reasonably relied on the assurances made by Dr. Van Orman that Dr. Reardon's recruitment was legitimate work under the contract and that her eventual hire was related to the contract. The claimant believes the UW has been unjustly enriched and requests payment of its single hire fee of \$24,000.

The UW recommends denial of this claim. The UW points to the terms of the contract, which called for a 12 month search to fill two positions. Under the contract the claimant was paid a \$10,000 flat fee, two \$17,000 placement fees, and approximately \$2,000 for expenses. UW notes that the search began in November 2013; therefore, the contract expired in November 2014. The UW states that Dr. Van Orman misinterpreted the contract when she stated that Dr. Reardon would be considered a "new hire." Because Dr. Reardon already worked for the UW, her eventual appointment to a part time position at UHS was, in fact, a partial transfer, not a new hire. In addition, UW points to the fact that neither Dr. Van Orman nor anyone else at UW ever agreed to extend the terms of the contract past one year and Dr. Reardon's transfer occurred after the expiration of the contract. Dr. Van Orman was not authorized to modify the terms of the contract and the purchase order clearly stated that no modifications could be made without the authorization of UW purchasing services. The UW also believes it is unreasonable to interpret the contract as allowing the claimant to indefinitely lay claim to individuals the claimant contacted during the original search. The claimant made contact with a number of individuals during the search who were not hired. Are they forever to be considered as falling under the claimant's contract simply because the claimant continues to send them "auto-drip" emails? UW also points to the fact that the theories of quantum meruit and unjust enrichment do not apply when there is a valid contract in place. And even if they did apply, the claimant has provided no evidence of any work done in addition to the work completed under the contract, for which the claimant has already received \$46,000. The claimant's discussions with Dr. Reardon were performed under the original contract which has been paid in full. The claimant's only additional contact with Dr. Reardon after the original recruitment was in the form of two automatically generated emails. The claimant cannot justify a fee of \$24,000 for sending two emails. Finally, UW notes that \$24,000 placement fee requested by the claimant is 7,000 more than the placement fee negotiated under the original contract. UW believes that the claimant has presented no evidence that the partial transfer of Dr. Reardon to UHS after the expiration of the contract, was included in the original contract terms, or that it was a separate search conducted by the claimant in addition to the original contract, for which additional payment is due.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

2. Ronald Fouts of Madison, Wisconsin, claims \$48,637.73 for monies allegedly owed by DOA in relation to a 2008 flooding event in the City of Beaver Dam. The claimant owned four buildings that were flooded. The claimant states that his buildings were not damaged by the flood and passed inspections after they were cleaned up. The claimant alleges that the city wanted to create a TIF district for a condominium project and that the only way they could do so was by falsely labeling his buildings and others as blighted. The claimant alleges that the city and DNR made public announcements that the buildings were going to be torn down and that because of these announcements; he was unable to rent his buildings. The claimant states that the city told him he must either sell his buildings or be forced to tear them down at his own expense. He denies that the sale was voluntary or that he approached the city about selling the buildings. The claimant believes this was an unjust taking of his property. The claimant hired an attorney to protect his rights but was forced to sell the buildings to the city in 2009 at the 2008 appraised value. The claimant states that he was never informed of the availability of federal relocation funds. In 2012, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) contacted DOA, the claimant alleges, to correct DOA's illegal actions. The claimant notes that DOA's own staff person told them that what they were doing was illegal. DOA hired a contractor to determine if the building owners were eligible for federal relocation and acquisition funds. The claimant disputes DOA's assertion that this person was "independent," noting that he was paid money by DOA. Finally, the claimant points to HUD's 6/15/16 letter to DOA, which he alleges proves that DOA broke state and federal law.

DOA recommends denial of this claim. DOA states that following the June 2008 flooding, a group of building owners, including the claimant, approached the city regarding selling their flood-damaged buildings. The city agreed to purchase the buildings at the appraised value. In June 2009, the city received a grant which included federal monies to be used (in part) to reimburse the city for the

property purchases. In December 2012, HUD informed the state that because the city received federal money, they should have made payments to the property owners pursuant to the Uniform Relocation Act (URA). In response to this information, DOA hired an independent contractor to determine what additional monies were due to the building owners under the URA. Based on the contractor's work, DOA approved the maximum for all payments that were justified under the URA. The claimant received an additional \$20,000. DOA states that the current claim is for payment of expenses which the contractor determined to be ineligible. The claimant appealed this determination and the appeal was denied. The claimant could have petitioned for judicial review under Ch. 227 but failed to do so. DOA believes this claim exemplifies the old saying "no good deed goes unpunished." Had the city refused to purchase the flooddamaged properties, it would never have been obligated to pay relocation benefits to the claimant. DOA states that the claimant has received the full, pre-flood fair market value of his properties, plus all additional monies required by law. Finally, DOA points to HUD's 6/15/16 letter, which states "HUD is very pleased with the State's continued diligence in addressing the Beaver Dam acquisition and relocation project deficiencies. Actions taken by DOA to resolve the Findings have been excellent."

The Board defers decision of this claim at this time so that additional information may be obtained from the claimant and DOA. [Member Green not participating.]

3. George and Sharon Thuecks of Nekoosa, Wisconsin, claim \$7,500.00 for the collateral value of a motorcycle allegedly lost due to a title error by DOT. On 8/30/13 the claimants entered into a contract to sell a motorcycle to Gina Langridge for the amount of \$7,500. On 9/4/13 a title application was submitted to DOT with Ms. Langridge listed as the owner and the claimants listed as lienholders. Ms. Langridge made the agreed payments on the motorcycle until 2/19/15. Sometime prior to 3/31/15, Ms. Langridge sold the motorcycle to a new owner. Upon not receiving payments, the claimants discovered that Ms. Langridge had sold the bike, which was now registered in Illinois with a clean title. The claimants requested a copy of the Wisconsin title for which Ms. Langridge applied on 9/4/13 and discovered that, despite the fact that the claimants were listed as lienholders on the title application, DOT had not added them as such when it issued the title. The claimants state that Ms. Langridge would not have been able to sell the motorcycle had DOT not issued an incorrect title. The claimants state that but for DOT's error, they could have recovered the bike and resold it when Ms. Landgridge stopped making payments. Because DOT has admitted the title error, the claimants believe they should be reimbursed for the full sale value of the motorcycle, which they lost due to DOT's error.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT acknowledges an error was made when an employee failed to list the claimants as lienholders on the title issued to Ms. Langridge. However, DOT believes the primary cause of the claimants' damages is Ms. Langridge's failure to make the payments required by the contract. Ms. Langridge then sold the motorcycle with full knowledge that she still owed the remaining payments to the claimants. DOT notes that at the

time of default, the remaining balance for the bike was \$1800 with \$200 in late fees. DOT states that it is not the state's responsibility to enforce the contract between the claimants and Ms. Langridge. DOT also notes that the claimants have been awarded a \$2000+ judgment against Ms. Langridge for the remaining payments and fees. When Ms. Langridge pays the court-ordered judgement, the claimants will be made whole. Awarding an additional \$7500 would make the claimants better than whole as they would be paid twice for the motorcycle, once by Ms. Langridge and once by the state. Finally, DOT notes that, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 342.19, lien holders receive a copy of an issued title. Being lienholders, the claimants would have known this information and should have contacted DOT when they did not receive a copy of the title back in September 2013. DOT regrets the titling error but does not believe it was the primary cause of the claimants'

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$2,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of § 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation § 20.395(5)(cq), Stats.

4. Donna Cvetan of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, claims \$6,487.12+ for return of amounts garnished from her wages for a tax liability for which the claimant believes she is not liable. The claimant and her husband entered into a Marital Property Agreement in 1994, which clearly states that D&M Plumbing & Heating, which claimant's husband owned for many years prior to the marriage, was his individual property. The claimant points to Section 4.1.b. of the Agreement, which provides that "without any obligation or liability on the part of the other" party, each party is responsible for "debts, obligations, taxes, assessments, and expenses at any time incurred...relating to the acquisition, holding, disposition, operation, management, or administration of his or her solely owned property." The claimant states that during a routine audit of D&M, it was discovered that some sales and use taxes had inadvertently not been paid. The claimant states that she has never had any involvement whatsoever in D&M and points to Section 4.4. of the Agreement, which states that "each party shall have full and exclusive powers of management and control over the property classified as his or her individual property...free from all rights, claims, or property interests of the other..." The claimant points to the fact that the Agreement also provides "that the classification of [her husband's] W-2 wages as marital shall not constitute a 'mixing' of marital and individual property" (Section 2.1.a.). D&M Plumbing & Heating closed in February 2015. DOR began garnishing 25% of the claimant's wages in June 2015 to recover the sales and use taxes owed by D&M. The claimant believes that the Marital Property Agreement clearly states that she is not responsible for payment of these taxes. She requests reimbursement of all monies garnisheed by DOR and that DOR cease any further garnishment of her wages for payment of this debt. As of the date this claim was filed, October 28, 2015, the DOR garnishment totaled \$6,487.12.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that, pursuant to § 71.10(6)(c), Wis. Stats., "no provision of a marital property agreement...adversely affects the interest of

a creditor unless the creditor had actual knowledge of that provision when the obligation to that creditor was incurred." DOR did not receive a copy of the claimants' MPA until well after the sales tax debt was assessed against Mr. Cvetan. Therefore, the MPA had no impact on the tax obligation. DOR notes that, even had the MPA been timely filed with DOR, the MPA categorizes Ms. Cvetan's wages as marital property, not individual property. DOR points to § 71.91(3), Stats., which provides that all tax obligations incurred during a marriage by a spouse are incurred in the interest of the marriage and may be satisfied under Wis. Stat. § 766.55(2)(b). § 766.55(2)(b) provides that an obligation incurred by a spouse in the interest of the marriage may be satisfied from all property of the incurring spouse and all marital property. DOR states that it has appropriately followed the law with regards to this matter and recommends denial of the claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

5. Thomas Hetzel of Kenosha, Wisconsin, claims \$38,377.67 for refund of overpayment of taxes for 2004. Prior to 2002, the claimant's only sources of income were non-taxable SSDI and a non-taxable disability pension from the Veterans' Administration. In 2002, the claimant received a sizeable inheritance from his mother's estate. The claimant states that he used this money to engage in options and day trading in the stock market over the next several years. The claimant states that he eventually lost all of the inheritance money through this activity. The claimant states that, because he incurred more losses than gains and had no other taxable income during these years, he knew there would be no taxes due and did not file income taxes for any of the years involved. Despite the fact that he had no net capital gains during these years, the 1099-B forms reported to DOR only showed the amount of the sale and not the related cost basis. The claimant alleges that despite the fact that DOR was aware there would be a cost basis involved, the department issued a tax assessment based on the total amount of the sale reported on the 1099-B forms. The claimant alleges that DOR knew this would grossly overstate the amount of reportable income. DOR levied \$38,713.64 from the claimant's accounts. The claimant states that he asked DOR to release the levy in March 2014 because he was in the process of preparing the missing tax returns but that DOR refused to release the levy. All three levies issued by DOR were applied to tax year 2004. When filed, the 2004 return resulted in a tax due of \$108, resulting in an overpayment of \$38,377.67. The claimant notes that DOR is adopting federal regulations, which allow for refund of income tax overpayments if the request is made within two years of the date the payment is made, even if the tax year is outside the statute of limitations. The claimant believes DOR has been unjustly enriched by the overpayment and requests reimbursement.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR points to § 71.75(5), Wis. Stat., which prohibits the department from refunding the overpayment because no refund was claimed within four years of the original assessment. The estimated

assessment for tax year 2004 was filed in February 2010. The claimant appealed the assessment to the Wisconsin Tax Appeals Commission, which ruled in DOR's favor in June 2011. DOR levied the claimant's bank accounts in August 2013 and February 2014. In March 2014, the claimant's Power of Attorney advised DOR that he needed sixty days to file the 2004 return. DOR waited ten months before levying the claimant's account again in March 2015. The claimant's 2004 return was filed on 3/5/15.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. Larry E. Jones of Sturtevant, Wisconsin, claims \$9,307.60 for reimbursement of overpayments related to latefiled 2004 and 2005 income tax returns. In 2008, DOR issued an estimated tax assessment for the missing returns and began garnishing the claimant's wages. In 2015, the claimant hired an accountant to assist him with filing the late returns. The returns were filed in February 2016. The 2004 return showed a refund of \$300 and the 2005 return showed a refund of \$252. The claimant realizes that he should have filed his taxes on time. However, he alleges that he was repeatedly told by the DOR agent assigned to his case that regardless of when he filed the returns, he would receive any refunds owed. The claimant alleges that DOR never told him about the statute of limitations. The claimant now realizes he is not able to get the 2004 and 2005 refunds due to the statute of limitations, however, the \$9,307.60 garnished by the state from 2008 to 2015 has caused him financial hardship. Because the garnishment continued into 2015, the claimant requests reimbursement for the monies garnished from his wages. The claimant does not believe it is fair that when taxpayers owe money to DOR, the state can come after that money no matter how much time has passed, however, when DOR owes money to the taxpayer, a statute of limitations is imposed.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR issued estimated tax assessments for failure to file 2004 and 2005 returns in March 2007. DOR issued a wage attachment in March 2010 to collect the estimated tax assessments and other outstanding tax liabilities. The returns were filed in February 2016. In an effort to be fair and equitable, DOR compromised \$3,298.14, the claimant's balance due for 2006, 2007 and 2009. Finally, DOR points to the numerous notices sent to the claimant which notified him that claims for refund of payments made to estimated assessments can only be granted within 4 years of the assessment date.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

7. Renee Miller of Somerset, Wisconsin, claims \$3,524.44 for vehicle damage allegedly related to DOT road construction on Hwy 35/64 in St. Croix County. The claimant states that on 9/28/15, she was traveling west on Hwy 35 when she hit a sink hole in the construction area. The claimant states that the roadway she was traveling was a temporary pavement constructed to re-route traffic from the

old Hwy 35 to the new Hwy 35 and that the hole was located where the temporary pavement met the old Hwy 35. The claimant states that she contacted DOT and was told that the hole was repaired after her accident but that it reopened the next day, damaging additional vehicles. The claimant believes the temporary pavement was poorly constructed, which led to the sink hole. The claimant is aware of at least nine other drivers who hit the same hole and suffered tire and vehicle damage. The claimant states that DOT referred her to St. Croix County for reimbursement but that the county referred her to DOT. She requests reimbursement for vehicle and tire damage, roadside assistance cost, and lost wages.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. The state has a contract with St. Croix County for maintenance of state and interstate roads within the county. This contract has a hold harmless agreement which provides that the county will indemnify the state for damages related to maintenance of these roads. When St. Croix County was notified of the hole, they responded in a timely manner to repair the roadway. Because of the severity of the pothole, it was decided that the contractor working on the Hwy 35 project should remove and replace the pavement in the area. This work was completed as part of a change order to DOT's contract with the road contractor, H. James and Sons. DOT believes that its contracts with St. Croix County and H. James and Sons absolve the state of any responsibility for the claimant's damages and that she should pursue her claims for reimbursement against these parties, not the State of Wisconsin.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. Bill Ross of Greenfield, Wisconsin, claims \$3,286.00 for monetary damages allegedly caused by errors of DOT employees. The claimant's son is disabled and receives government assistance. The claimant established a trust with his son as the beneficiary in order to protect his son from his own poor decisions. In 2012, the claimant purchased a 1999 Honda and titled it in the name of the trust so that his son would have a vehicle he could drive that he would not be able to sell. In November 2013, the claimant's son applied for a replacement title in his own name. DOT employees made multiple errors during this transaction including not requesting a required form and not scanning a driver's license. With the new title, the claimant's son was able to obtain a \$1000 loan using the vehicle as collateral. He gambled away the \$1000. The claimant notified DOT of the errors they had made. In 2015, the claimant titled a 2004 Toyota in the name of the trust. In December 2015, the claimant's son applied for a new title to the Toyota. Again, multiple errors were made by DOT employees when processing the title application: a required form was missing the signature of the trustee, no driver's license was scanned, and the signature and the purchaser's name did not match. The claimant's son was again able to obtain a title in his own name and obtained a \$3000 loan using the vehicle as collateral. The claimant's son gambled away the \$3000. The claimant's son has very little income and is therefore unable to pay back the loan. In order to keep the vehicle from being repossessed, the claimant paid off the loan taken by his son. The claimant states that it was only due to errors by DOT employees that his son was able to obtain new vehicle titles not once, but twice. The claimant requests reimbursement for the \$3,286 spent paying off the loan against the 2004 Toyota.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. The claimant's son is the sole beneficiary of the trust. He filed an application to retitle a car titled to the trust into his own name and in doing so, made falsified applications to DOT. DOT believes these falsified applications may be a criminal offense. DOT notes that as the sole beneficiary of the trust, the claimant's son only harmed himself by deceiving DOT and the lenders from whom he obtained loans. DOT notes that the claimant was under no legal or moral obligation to pay off the loan taken out by his son and was therefore not harmed by DOT's actions. Regarding the errors made by DOT employees, the department does its best to establish practices that reduce the risk of fraud, however, those systems are not really set up to prevent individuals from stealing from themselves, as occurred in this case. DOT believes that any shortcomings in DOT's handling of the paperwork did not cause any injury to the claimant, it was the fraud committed by his son which caused the problem. Therefore, DOT considers this to be a civil matter between a father and son and recommends denial of the claim.

The Board defers decision of this claim at this time so that additional information may be obtained from DOT.

9. DeAndre Johnson of Green Bay, Wisconsin, claims \$199.00 for the value of a television set allegedly damaged by DOC personnel. The claimant is an inmate at Green Bay Correctional Institution. The claimant states that on 11/29/15, he returned to his cell after work and found his TV screen shattered. He was told that an officer had conducted a cell search while the claimant was at work. The claimant filed an inmate complaint regarding the broken television. His complaint was denied based on the fact that the officer who searched the cell stated that he did not recall knocking anything over. The claimant states that officers are notorious for breaking property during cell searches and believes that DOC is covering up their negligence. He requests reimbursement for his damaged television.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC points to the fact that the claimant told staff his TV had been on top of a shelf with multiple magazines on it but that when he returned to his cell, it was sitting upright on top of a desk. DOC believes it is unlikely that the TV would have landed in an upright position had it been knocked off the shelf. DOC states it is more likely that the TV was already broken or that it fell prior to the cell search and was placed upright on the desk by the claimant. The officer who searched the claimant's cell clearly stated that he did not recall knocking anything over and did not hear anything fall as he left the cell. DOC does not believe the claimant has presented evidence showing negligence on the part of DOC staff and that the claim should therefore be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

10. Izelia Z. Golatt of Waupun, Wisconsin, claims \$18.88 for the value of fan allegedly broken by DOC staff. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). On 6/11/15 he was transferred to Temporary Lock Up (TLU). DOC staff inventoried the claimant's property at the time of his transfer to TLU. The claimant points to the fact that DOC staff would have tagged his fan as contraband if it had been broken at the time of the inventory. They did not do so. The claimant notes that he had no access to the fan while in TLU; it was completely under control of DOC staff. The claimant was released from TLU and his property was returned on 8/13/15. The claimant states that when he received his property back, his fan did not work at all. The claimant alleges that he verbally informed a DOC sergeant that same day that his fan came back broken from the property room. He states that the sergeant told him to write to the property room and that he did so. The claimant filed an inmate complaint on 8/19/15. The claimant alleges that the only reason for the delay in filing this complaint was that he was waiting for the property room to reply. The claimant's inmate complaint was denied. The claimant believes DOC's suggestion that he broke his own fan is absurd because the only person harmed by the broken fan is the claimant himself. He requests reimbursement for the value of the fan.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC believes the claimant has failed to provide any evidence that DOC staff is responsible for breaking the fan. DOC notes the claimant waited six days before filing his inmate complaint and believes the fan could have been broken during that time. In addition, the claimant alleges that a crack on the leg of the fan was what rendered it inoperable. DOC's inspection of the fan showed that the crack, which had debris in it, was not new and furthermore, would not have impacted the functioning of the fan. DOC notes that the fan was over 2 years old and had been moved many times because of the claimant's movement within WCI. DOC believes the fan simply stopped working due to age and recommends denial of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Mark Brown of Redgranite, Wisconsin, claims \$19.93 for the value of a fan allegedly broken due to DOC negligence. The claimant was an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). In August 2015, he was transferred to Redgranite Correctional Institution (RGCI). His property was packed in preparation for the transfer. The claimant states that on the day of the transfer DOC staff told him there was no room for his property box in the van and that they would come back for it. The claimant received his property the next day and noticed the knob on his fan was loose and that the fan no longer worked. The claimant states that he immediately notified WCI staff about his broken fan. He also filed the appropriate inmate complaints, however, they were dismissed. The claimant points to the fact that if the fan had been broken either before transfer at WCI or upon

receipt at RGCI, the corresponding property inventory sheets would have made note of that and he would not have been given the fan. The claimant believes DOC was negligent by leaving his property unattended during his transfer. He requests reimbursement for the value of his broken fan.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC points to the fact that neither the outgoing WCI nor incoming RGCI property inventory sheets note any damage to the fan, which suggests it was damaged after receipt by the claimant at RGCI. DOC also notes there is no sign of damage to the box in which the fan was transported, which might have indicated rough handling during transport. DOC states that inmates are encouraged to thoroughly inspect their property upon receipt before leaving the property room and that the claimant failed to do so. DOC believes the claimant has presented no evidence that DOC staff was negligent in the handling of his property and recommends the claim be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Antonio D. Manns of Waupun, Wisconsin, claims \$220.00 for the value of a television allegedly lost by DOC. The claimant is an inmate at Waupun Correctional Institution (WCI). He states that he used to own a 13" Zenith TV. He alleges that in December 2012, he was released from segregation and that his Zenith TV was missing when his property was returned to him. He also alleges that a DOC officer gave the claimant a 13" RCA TV to replace the lost Zenith. He states that DOC engraved his name and ID number on the RCA. In November 2015, the claimant was sent to segregation and a new property inventory list was completed. WCI staff confiscated the RCA because it was not listed in the computer as the claimant's property. The claimant states that he explained to WCI staff how he had been given the RCA by a former employee, however, DOC told him that the proper forms had not been completed, therefore the RCA was contraband. The claimant filed a complaint but it was denied. The claimant states that DOC destroyed the RCA before he could pursue his appeal and thereby denied him the opportunity to show that his name and ID were properly engraved on the TV, which only DOC staff has the ability to do. The claimant states that it is not his fault that the officer who gave him the RCA failed to fill out the required paperwork and he does not feel he should be penalized for the officer's mistake. The claimant notes that the officer no longer works at WCI and is therefore not available as a witness. The claimant disputes DOC's assertion that he somehow altered his original property inventory form. He notes that inmates sign the form right in front of the property officer and that inmates are only given a copy of the form, not the original. The claimant requests reimbursement for the value of a new television. He also requests reimbursement for the coaxial cable and headphones which were used with the TV, since DOC confiscated those items when they took the RCA television.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that the claimant was released from segregation in September of 2012 and that the property inventory form filled out at the time show that the claimant received his Zenith television. DOC notes that if the television had been lost, an incident report would have been filed and there is no incident report on record. DOC also notes that, had the claimant been given a replacement television, another form would have been completed, showing why he was given the TV and recording the serial number. DOC states that the claimant could have disposed of his Zenith through inappropriate channels and acquired the RCA by the same means. DOC notes that on the property form showing an RCA television, "RCA" is written in a different handwriting than that used on the rest of the form. DOC therefore believes the claimant altered the property form. Finally, DOC notes that there is no record of headphones or a coaxial cable being confiscated from the claimant. DOC does not believe the claimant has submitted evidence of any negligence on the part of DOC staff and recommends denial of the claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

The Board concludes:

STATE OF WISCONSIN CLAIMS BOARD CLAIM OF: MAURICE J. CORBINE CLAIM NO. 2015-047-CONV

Decision

The Claims Board considered this matter on March 16, 2016. Claimant, Maurice J. Corbine, did not request a hearing. The Claims Board reviewed the written materials submitted by Corbine. The Sawyer County District Attorney's Office declined to submit a written response to this claim.

Background

This is a claim for Innocent Convict Compensation pursuant to § 775.05, Wis. Stats. The claim relates to Corbine's 2011 conviction for Operating While Intoxicated (5th) and Operating While Revoked (2nd). Corbine states he is innocent of this crime. He requests \$90,000 for the three years he spent in prison.

Claimant's Facts and Argument

Corbine states that on September 28, 2007, he was a passenger in a truck driven by his cousin, Rodney. He states that Sawyer County/Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Officer, Twyla Dailey, pulled in behind the truck approximately 10-15 seconds after Rodney parked it in the parking lot of a local tavern. Officer Dailey arrested Corbine for OWI. Officer Dailey's report stated that she followed the truck into the parking lot because she had observed it speeding and that she pulled in immediately after the truck. Officer Dailey also reported that she observed Corbine exit the driver's side door, walk around the front of the truck and up to the passenger side door. Corbine alleges that he had already exited the vehicle and was approaching the tavern when Officer Daily arrived and that he had walked back to the passenger side of the truck because he did not have a driver's license.

Corbine alleges that both he and Rodney told Officer Dailey that Rodney had been driving the truck, not Corbine, who admits that he was intoxicated at the time. Corbine states that Officer Dailey informed him that her in-car camera was recording the incident. Officer Dailey transported Corbine to the Sawyer County Jail, where he saw her insert a DVD into the booking room recording equipment. Corbine states that Dailey again told him the interview was being recorded. Corbine alleges that during the entirety of his interaction with Officer Dailey, both in the parking lot and at the jail, he repeatedly told her that he was not the driver of the vehicle but she persisted in arresting him. Corbine believes that Officer Dailey targeted him personally because she is corrupt.

Prior to his trial, Corbine's attorney requested copies of the in-car and booking room videos from the night of the arrest, however, the Sawyer County District Attorney's Office did not produce the videos, claiming that they could not find them. Corbine was convicted in 2011 and sentenced to 3 years in prison and 3 years supervision.

In 2013, Corbine appealed his conviction based on ineffective assistance of counsel because his trial attorney

(Hoffman) had failed to adequately investigate the failure of Sawyer County to produce the jailhouse video recording. The court of appeals remanded to the trial court for a Machner hearing. After the Machner hearing, the trial court ruled that Hoffman had adopted a reasonable strategy by not pursuing the video recording because it would have shown Corbine intoxicated and behaving aggressively and that the recording would likely not have changed the outcome of the trial. Corbine appealed the trial court's ruling.

On February 10, 2015, the court of appeals reversed his conviction. Corbine was released on that same day, having completed serving his sentence. The court pointed to Hoffman's testimony at the Machner hearing that he had relied on a description of what was on the jailhouse video based on a conversation he had with an unknown individual at Sawyer County. The court found: "Hoffman acknowledged he did not know the identity of the person who had allegedly viewed the video and therefore had no basis on which to determine whether that person was reliable...Further, Hoffman testified that his belief that the video portrayed Corbine in a poor light was based upon his review of the police report—not from something the unidentified person may have said. Finally, Hoffman testified he took no further steps to locate the DVD after he was told it was missing, and he never considered further action such as filing a motion." In addition, the court also found that Hoffman was deficient by failing to ask Corbine at trial whether he denied being the driver, which would have been "highly relevant to the credibility of the defense theory."

Corbine states that the DVD recording which Sawyer County failed to provide would have supported his defense that he was not the driver and that he had repeatedly denied being the driver during his interactions with Officer Dailey. Corbine believes the Sawyer County District Attorney intentionally withheld the DVD, which would have proven his innocence.

DA's Response and Argument

The Sawyer County District Attorney's Office (DA) recommends denial of this claim. The DA points to the sworn testimony of Officer Dailey that she never lost sight of the vehicle and was therefore clearly able to identify the claimant as the driver when he stepped out of the car. The DA notes that the jury heard the sworn testimony of Officer Dailey, the claimant, and Rodney Corbine, and apparently found Officer Dailey's testimony more credible.

The DA also notes that the claimant has presented no evidence to support his allegations that Officer Dailey targeted him personally and lied under oath. In order to find in favor of the claimant, the board would have to completely ignore Officer Dailey's report and sworn testimony, without any evidence to justify doing so.

The DA states that the claimant has also failed to provide any proof of evidence tampering on the part of Officer Dailey or the DA. Although the claimant alleges there was a dash cam video, there is no reference to such a video in the Officer's report. In addition, his allegation that the DA somehow orchestrated the disappearance of the jail house tape is without merit. In fact, the DA believes the state would have benefited from use of the tape at trial, because it would have shown the claimant's level of intoxication and aggressive behavior at the time of his arrest. The DA notes that, while the tape may have supported the claimant's allegation that he told Officer Dailey he was not the driver, it would not have proven that he was not the driver.

Finally, the DA disputes the claimant's assertion that the DA did not pursue a second trial because it could not prove its case. The DA notes that there were good public policy reasons not to retry the claimant—the costs simply outweighed the benefits. The claimant had already served the maximum sentence, so no additional jail time could be ordered. In addition, regardless of a second trial, the claimant's next OWI conviction would be a felony. There was simply no benefit to the state that justified the cost of a second trial.

The DA believes that the claimant has not presented clear and convincing evidence that he was not the driver of the vehicle and that his claim should therefore be denied.

Discussion and Conclusion

Under the standards of Wis. Stat. § 775.05(3), the Claims Board must determine whether or not the evidence is clear and convincing that the petitioner was innocent of the crime for which he was imprisoned.

The primary evidence provided by Corbine in support of his petition was that the court of appeals reversed his conviction due to ineffective assistance of counsel. However, based on long-standing precedent, the Claims Board does not automatically equate such a reversal with innocence. A claimant like Corbine must prove his innocence by clear and convincing evidence, whereas in order to obtain a reversal based on ineffective assistance of counsel he only had to make a showing that there was a reasonable probability that the trial result would have been different if he had had more effective counsel. These are two very distinct standards with different burdens of proof and cannot be conflated. Therefore, the reversal, standing alone, does not mean that a claimant has proven his innocence by clear and convincing evidence.

Aside from the reversal noted above, Corbine cites the missing jailhouse video tape as evidence to substantiate that he was innocent of the charges. While it is true that the tape may have supported Corbine's allegation that he told Officer Dailey he was not the driver, Corbine presented no evidence that the tape would have proven that he was not the driver.

Based on the above, and after reviewing all of the written submissions, the Board concludes and finds that the evidence is not clear and convincing that Corbine was innocent of the 2011 conviction for Operating While Intoxicated (5th) and Operating While Revoked (2nd) for which he was imprisoned.
