Jenny,

Below is the response I received from DSPS administrator Elizabeth Hizmi. Section 961.23, stats., covers the dispensing of Schedule V substances (cough syrup with codeine is Schedule V in WI). As stated below, this statute sets out quantity, %, and time frame restrictions and record keeping requirements on dispensing cough syrup with codeine. Additionally, the statute requires that only a registered pharmacist may sell cough syrup with codeine at retail and gives pharmacists discretion to decline to sell cough syrup with codeine OTC.

So, even though cough syrup with codeine can be sold OTC in Wisconsin, pharmacists are not required to sell it. It appears that states differ as to whether a prescription is required for purchase of cough syrup with codeine—Illinois appears to require a prescription, and I'll follow up with info on Iowa and Minnesota.

Your patience is greatly appreciated. Here is information provided from the Chair of the Pharmacy Examining Board:

You can purchase cough syrup containing codeine OTC. There are restrictions on the quantity, %, and time frame. The pharmacy must keep a log, like the one for pseudoephedrine.

Not many pharmacies do this, I provide the syrup from time to time for people who need a cough suppressant and going to urgent care to treat their cough is not practical. This is only after they have reported failing non-codeine cough preparations. I also require that I know the customer.

In terms of other states, they are all different.

Subject: Cough syrup with codeine

Steve and Mary,

I am told that in Wisconsin you can by cough syrup with codeine without a prescription. Some pharmacists are having issues controlling this with some clients and have asked us to look into requiring a prescription. They state that Iowa, Illinois and Minnesota all require a prescription.

I sent this out to some Dr.'s and here is the response I rec'd....

Codeine is kind of unique; its DEA schedule depends on its formulation. Codeine alone is Schedule II, Tylenol with codeine is Schedule III, and Robitussin with codeine is Schedule V. http://www.deadiversion.usdoj.gov/schedules/orangebook/c cs alpha.pdf

Dextromethorphan is chemically related to opioids (I think of it as a "cousin"). It has weak pain-relieving properties, reduces cough like opioids, and has NMDA blocking effects like methadone, Savella, ketamine, and several other medicines (a different kind of pain benefit). It is somewhat hallucinogenic, particularly when taken with antihistamine-containing cough medicines in very high doses (antihistamines can also cause hallucinogens in high doses). Coricidin D seems to be the OTC drug of choice for joy-riding high school kids. Dextromethorphan is not a scheduled drug, however.

All that being said, given that Robitussin with codeine is a scheduled opioid, I would strongly advocate that it be considered against the law for it to be dispensed without a prescription, assuming that it already is not.

Could you see if we really are the only state around that still distributes this without a prescription?
