Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, voter registration is initiated by voters through a process administered by municipal election officials or online through the Wisconsin Elections Commission's (WEC) online voter registration portal. Under the proposed bill, the opportunity for voter registration would be extended to Wisconsin citizens when completing a transaction at the Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) such as a vehicle registration or a driver license application. Eligible voters who complete a transaction at the DMV will be automatically registered to vote unless they choose to "opt-out." Voter registration information collected by the DMV for Automatic Voter Registration (AVR) purposes would then be transmitted to the WEC. It is assumed that the WEC would then upload DMV AVR data into the statewide voter registration system, WisVote, as a pending voter registration record for approval by the appropriate municipal clerk. Once the pending voter registration is approved, it is assumed that the WEC would use the existing practice of sending a voter verification postcard to the newly registered voter.

It is assumed that the fiscal impact on the WEC to implement the AVR process would fall into four categories:

1) Train Municipal and County Clerks on AVR. Cost: \$2,016

2) IT Development Costs to Implement AVR. Cost: \$6,650

3) Update and Develop Agency Resources to Include AVR. Cost: \$2,520

4) Increase in Voter Registration and the Mailing of Verification Postcards \$0.28 per card or \$280 per 1000 cards. Initial estimated cost: \$12,600.

Based on these categories the total implementation cost is estimated to be \$23,786 plus the variable cost of printing and mailing verification postcards on annual basis.

These categories are more fully described as follows:

1) Train Municipal and County Clerks on AVR:

It is assumed that the WEC will be responsible for training municipal and county clerks on the AVR process. It is anticipated that WEC training staff would be required to dedicate an estimated 60 hours of time to create and update training materials for municipal and county clerks, at an average cost of \$33.60 per hour (\$25.85 wage + \$7.75 fringe), for a total cost of \$2016.

2) IT Development Costs to Implement AVR:

It is assumed that the WEC would be responsible for developing a technological process for uploading AVR records collected by the DMV into the WisVote system. It is anticipated that WEC IT development staff would be required to dedicate an estimated 70 hours of time, at an average cost of \$95 per hour to accommodate the import of AVR data from the DMV into the WisVote system, for a total cost of \$6650.

3) Update and Develop Agency Resources to Include AVR:

It is assumed that existing WEC agency resources, such as websites and voter outreach materials, would need to be updated to reference AVR. It is also assumed that the WEC would be responsible for creating new materials for the public that outline the AVR process. It is anticipated that WEC program staff would be required to dedicate an estimated 75 hours, at an average cost of \$33.60 per hour (\$25.85 wage + \$7.75 fringe), to update and create agency resources and materials to include AVR, for a total cost of \$2520.

4) Increase in Voter Registration and the Mailing of Verification Postcards: \$0.28 per card or \$280 per 1000 cards

For the purpose of this estimate, the WEC assumes that the number of voter registrations will increase with the introduction of the AVR process. If the number of voter registrations increases, the WEC would require funding for the cost of printing and mailing additional verification postcards. The WEC prints and mails voter verification postcards at a rate of \$.28 per postcard, or \$280 per 1000 postcards. The annual cost would vary based upon the number of qualifying transactions with the DMV, such as driver license, State ID, and vehicle registration applications. Assuming 150,000 qualifying transactions at the DMV annually, and that 30 percent of those transactions represent individuals who are not registered voters and wish to register, the cost of printing and mailing verification postcards is estimated to be \$12,600 per year.
