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Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

District attorneys believe this legislation will increase prosecutor workloads due to the potential for litigation of additional felony complaints. Prosecutors in two rural counties estimated workload increases ranging from .1 to .15 FTE positions. The statewide impact is indeterminate.
