## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill provides a mandatory period of 5 years confinement for homicides by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle. A court may order less confinement if the decedent was a passenger in the defendant's car. Data is not readily available as to how frequently the decedent was a passenger in the defendant's automobile.

Generally, the District Attorneys believe that introduction of a mandatory minimum will result in more defendants electing to go to trial rather than plea. Trials are more resource and time intensive than plea hearings. However, creating a mandatory minimum may have a deterrent effect on drunk driving and result in fewer OWI homicides per year. As such, the fiscal effect of this legislation is indeterminate.

## **Long-Range Fiscal Implications**

It is likely that more OWI homicide cases will go to trial, but there may be a reduction in total OWI homicide cases statewide. Long range fiscal impact is indeterminate.
