- 2. The construction and inspection of one-family and two-family dwellings, commonly called the "uniform dwelling code."
- 3. The use of building materials, methods, and equipment in the manufacture and installation of modular homes for use as dwellings or dwelling units.

This bill requires DSPS, in promulgating those rules, to require the use of radon-resistant construction materials and techniques in new construction of public buildings, places of employment, one-family and two-family dwellings, and modular homes.


