- A bill allowing dentists to administer vaccines in the state. This would ideally be similar to a bill in Oregon from earlier this year: https://www.ada.org/en/publications/ada-news/2019-archive/april/oregon-passes-bill-allowing-dentists-to-administer-vaccines20190426t142836. The idea is to allow children and adults to receive vaccines when they visit the dentist, assuming that is something most people do more regularly than they go to a doctor. Furthermore, I imagine it would be similar in scope to 2010 LRB-1365/1 & LRB 2140/1 regarding pharmacists and vaccines.
- A bill allowing 16-year-olds to make vaccine decisions for themselves, without parental consent. This would be similar to 2019 bill draft LRB-2543, but for 16-year-olds instead of that bill's 14-year-old age.
- A bill to make Wisconsin a universal purchase state with the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program (referenced here: http://www.ncsl.org/research/health/immunizations-policy-issues-overview.aspx under state policies) where WI would purchase all recommended vaccines for all children, including those who are fully insured, instead of just those financed by VFC. Thanks so much for checking in. To answer your questions:

- The reimbursement amount should be determined by fair market value. In other words, what they would have paid if the universal purchase program wasn't in place. Is there a way to codify that?
- The vaccines part of the program should be those that under state law a K-12 student must have a record on file for (or exemption, as the case may be), so the usual suspects -- MMR, etc. Not flu or others that are not mandated for children in schools.
