After School Funding Draft Changes

Eligibility Criteria

Draft 1: "high quality after-school programs and out-of-school-time programs, including summer programs."

- "Eligible organizations must:
 - o Be an existing community-based organization or school (including choice, charter, traditional public)
 - o Provide a minimum of 25% demonstrated cash match
 - o Provide evidence based services to children and youth from ages 5 to eighteen.
 - o Demonstrate a successful history of public grant fiscal management through submission of:
 - A copy of the most recent financial audit
 - o Provide a weekly schedule of services that clearly demonstrates intent to deliver consistent and reliable programming for at least 2.5 hours daily in the afterschool hours. Summer service delivery is optional.

Use of Funds Limitations

Draft 1: "may use the grant moneys for transportation costs and other costs related to providing the program for which the grant is awarded."

Here, we tried to mimic some of the ESSA requirements surrounding eligible funds.

- May use the grant moneys for transportation costs and other costs related to:
 - Remedial education activities, and academic enrichment learning programs, including providing additional assistance to students;
 - Activities that enable students to be eligible for credit recovery;
 - Mathematics and science education activities;
 - o Arts and music education activities;
 - o Entrepreneurial education programs;
 - Tutoring services and mentoring programs'
 - o Programs for after school activities for limited English proficient students that emphasize language skills and academic achievement;

Hi Krista,

Can we have the following changes made:

- 1) Page 3, line 4: no need to define credit recovery in the bill.
- 2) Page 3, line 17: "the applicant will provide a demonstration of committed matching funds in an amount equal to at least 25% of the grant award amount."
 - a. We would also like to specify that the matching funds must be non-federal grant money. For example, an organization cannot use federal 21st Century CLC funds as their demonstrated matching funds in order to be eligible for the new funds under the bill.
- 3) Page 3, line 19: our intent is to ensure that applicants are currently providing evidenced-based services from kids between 5-18 years old. I think school-age pupils language is fine, but can we expand upon the P2 draft to ensure that only facilities currently providing evidenced based services are eligible?
- 4) Page 4, line 5: it's our intent that applicants under sub (2) (d) meet the audit standard.
- 5) Page 6, line 3: (7)(a): it's out intent for the RFP for organizations under sub 2(d) to look similar to other places in statute. "A private non-profit organization of demonstrated effectiveness, with local independent boards representative of a community, that provides educational evidence based services directly to youth from ages five (5) years to eighteen (18) years of age, utilizing statewide coordination, and possessing a documented capacity to raise significant independent private matching funds."
- 6) Page 6, line 6: we are okay authorizing DPI to promulgate rules.
- 7) Additionally, I'm not sure where in the bill language we need to include this, but it's our intent to ensure that a community based organization is able to apply for multiple sites, rather than just one. For example, the Boys and Girls Club's Milwaukee organization operates 44 sites. We would like that organization to be eligible across multiple sites. Do you have any suggestions on how to accomplish this goal?

I have one follow up question in response to your drafting instructions, below. For your comment #5, it appears that you are describing the types of organizations that you want to be eligible to receive grant moneys. If that is correct, I suggest adding that description to s. 115.449 (2) (d), as created in the bill (see page 3, line 13), which sets forth who is eligible to apply for a grant. In other words, under s. 115.449 (2) (d), the bill would delete:

(d) An established community-based organization.

...and replace it with:

- (d) A private, non-profit organization of demonstrated effectiveness that meets all of the following:
- 1. The organization has a local and independent board of directors representative of the community in which the organization operates.
- 2. The organization provides educational evidence-based services directly to school-age pupils.
- 3. The organization uses statewide coordination to provide the services described under subd. 2.
- 4. The organization has a documented capacity to raise significant independent private matching funds.



- (b) The department may not award a grant under par. (a) in an amount of less than \$50,000 or more than \$100,000. The department may provide that a grant awarded under par. (a) is renewable.
- (c) The department may award a grant under par. (a) to an applicant under sub.(2) for each physical location at which the applicant operates.
- (4) Use of grant moneys. The recipient of a grant under this section shall use the grant moneys to provide the after-school program and the activities that the recipient described in the recipient's application submitted under sub. (2) and to provide any other out-of-school-time programs and activities, including summer programs, that the recipient described in the recipient's application and for which the department awarded the grant. The recipient may use the grant moneys for transportation costs related to providing the programs.
