I am looking to get a p-draft for Sen. Cowles of a Senate Joint Resolution to establish November 1st as Electa Quinney Day in Wisconsin.

First, we wanted to check to make sure that a day such as this can be proclaimed to commemorate and recognize a person for more than just one year. I looked at a couple of handfuls of SJRs from 2017-18, and it appeared that it was possible to dedicate a day/week/month for more than one specific year in those where the year wasn't mentioned, but if this is not possible or if you have any questions, please let me know.
