I'm wondering if it "any" would fit better than "all" medications. It could even just say "...medication-assisted treatment, including medications approved by the FDA for treating opioid addiction." If the provision reads "including all medications..." it means that the program is required to provide every last medication approved by the FDA for opioid addiction regardless how expensive or how difficult to obtain. If that is what is intended, then that's fine, but it would be unusual.


