Intent:

Draft would change voter identification requirements pertaining to university and technical college voter IDs as well as voter identification receipts. Draft would also change requirements for in-person absentee voting to align with court injunctions (One Wisconsin Now et al. v. Thomsen et al, 15-cv-324, 198 F. Supp. 3d 896). Eliminate the requirement that students using university IDs for voting show additional proof of enrollment, as written in s. 5.02(6m)(f). Extend expiration period for university IDs used for voting from two years to four years. Also require universities and technical colleges in the UW system to make all student identification cards issued on or after August 1, 2019 compliant with the voter ID requirements in s. 5.02(6m)(f). Revise the expiration dates for ID Petition Process voter receipts to conform to the court injunction. This would extend the expiration period from 60 days to 180 days. Revise inperson absentee voting statutes to comply with court injunction. Revision could be elimination of sentence containing the 14 day restriction in s. 6.86\(b).

ELECTIONS

Current law allows an individual to use as voter identification an unexpired identification card issued by a technical college, college, or university in this state. The card must have an expiration date that is no later than two years after the date it was issued, and the individual must establish proof of enrollment. This bill eliminates the proof of enrollment requirement and allows the use of a card that expires no later than four years after the issuance date. In addition, the bill requires each technical college, college, or university in this state to issue identification cards that comply with the provisions in the bill) no later than August 1, 2019.

Current law also allows an individual to use as voter identification an identification card issued by DOT. DOT may issue a receipt as a temporary identification card to use for voting and other purposes to an individual who is waiting for the permanent card. The receipt expires in 60 days. The bill extends the expiration date to 180 days.

Current law allows an individual to complete an absentee ballot in person (at) multiple locations no earlier than 14 days preceding the election and no later than the Sunday preceding the election. The bill eliminates the restriction on how soon a person may complete an absentee ballot in person and provides that a person may complete such a ballot no later than the Friday preceding the election.

The changes made in the bill are consistent with the federal court orders under

One Wisconsin Institute v. Thomsen, 198 F.Supp 3d 896 (2016).
