Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, individuals released on extended supervision, parole or probation are subject to conditions or rules of the release. If they violate the rules they may be subject to sanctions, including revocation. This bill specifically requires the Department of Corrections to recommend revoking extended supervision, parole or probation if the person is charged with a crime while on release.

Current law also prescribes the circumstances under which a person's criminal record may be expunged of a crime. This bill prohibits the court from ordering a record of conviction expunged if the person had previously been convicted of a crime, including a crime for which the record had been expunged.

Current law requires expungement order be made at sentencing, and expungement cannot occur until after the sentence is complete, and the person has neither been convicted of a subsequent offense or did not satisfy conditions of probation. The bill adds criminal charges as a prohibition from expungement as well as if the individual violated probation and one year has not elapsed since the violation.

There is no fiscal impact to the court under this bill; however, Judges would have to educated regarding the law changes in order to make decisions on eligibility for expungement, which would require additional staff time to complete.
