Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill requires the Department of Administration (DOA) to issue a request for proposals to establish and maintain an opioid and methamphetamine data system to collect, format, analyze, and disseminate information on opioid and methamphetamine use. DOA would collaborate with and collect data from the Departments of Health Services (DHS), Children and Families, Corrections, Justice, and Safety and Professional Services. It is assumed the bill does not require the agencies to collect any new or additional data.

The bill enumerates the specific data to be collected in DOA's request for proposals for the opioid and methamphetamine data system, and this enumeration includes data the Department of Health Services (DHS) does not currently collect or have access to. Assuming the bill does not require DHS to collect, format, gather, analyze, or disseminate any new data on opioid or methamphetamine use that are not currently available in DHS data systems, DHS would be able to rely on its current staff and resources to collaborate with DOA regarding providing the data it has available, while adhering to state and federal regulations. DHS staff would collaborate with DOA to identify the data DHS can share as well as the data DHS does not have available.
