Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill requires the State Crime Laboratories to complete processing of a sexual assault kit 90 days after receipt if the victim has consented to testing.

Under current law, the crime laboratories are required to perform DNA analysis of evidence in a timely manner. The crime laboratories work closely with partners in the criminal justice system, including prosecutors, law enforcement agencies, judges, court officers, and defense attorneys, to establish priorities and realistic timelines for processing evidence. The crime laboratories use high throughput processing methods which result in the most efficient use of resources and, in aggregate, the shortest turnaround times for evidence processing. A typical turnaround time for a sexual assault kit is estimated to be approximately 70 days after the laboratory begins processing but more complex evidence or sexual assault kits requiring multiple cycles of testing will likely exceed 90 days using standard processing methods. In order to meet the 90 day deadline for all sexual assault kits, the crime laboratories will have to use less efficient procedures, including testing samples individually instead of in batches.

The decrease in processing efficiency to meet the 90 day deadline for sexual assault kits along with the change in the priority of evidence processing will result in longer turnaround times for the processing of evidence from other serious crimes by up to 18 months, including evidence related to homicides, attempted homicides and sexual assaults not collected during a sexual assault forensic examination. To avoid slowing the processing of other evidence submissions, a dedicated unit for testing sexual assault-related evidence must be established. Staffing the unit to process an estimated 2,000 sexual assault cases per year will require ongoing funding for 14 full-time equivalent (FTE) DNA Analysts, 6 FTE DNA Technicians and 2 FTE Forensic Science Supervisors. There will be additional one-time costs for facilities, equipment and training totaling at least \$10 million. In addition, it will take a minimum of two years to stand up a new DNA unit when accounting for recruitment, hiring, training and building/renovating a new facility.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

This bill will require ongoing funding for facility expansions at the State Crime Laboratories and an additional 22 FTE positions estimated at \$2,250,000 annually.
