Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under this bill, a city, village, town, or county would be permitted to enact, administer, and enforce a local ordinance regulating hours of labor, overtime, and wage claims between employers and employees in their municipalities, provided their ordinances also meet the minimum threshold described by state and federal labor standards.

The fiscal effect for the Department of Workforce Development and local governments is currently indeterminate.

The bill does not remove or change current state law relating to hours of work, overtime, or wage claims between employees and employers. State and federal laws would remain in place and provide a minimum standard, under which local governments could enact an ordinance to create a higher standard. During investigations of complaints, the department could encounter minimal additional costs due to the need to identify local ordinances related to the complaint, but the department is unable to estimate the number of complaints that would result from local ordinaces. Therefore, the fiscal effect is currently indeterminate.

The number of local governments that would enact ordinances under this bill to establish higher labor standards in their respective municipalities related to hours of labor, overtime, and wage disputes between employers and employees, and the costs of those local ordinances, cannot be determined by the department at this time. Therefore, the fiscal effect for local governments is currently indeterminate.
