## FINAL REPORT CLEARINGHOUSE RULE 20-071 CHAPTER PI 34 EDUCATOR LICENSES

#### Analysis by the Department of Public Instruction

Statutory authority: s. 115.28 (7) (a), Stats.

Statute interpreted: s. 115.28 (7) (a), Stats.

The Department proposes to amend its rules with respect to completion standards by entities that use measures of performance other than grade point average as a condition for receiving educator licensure.

#### 5. Clarity, Grammar, Punctuation and Plainness:

a. The department currently does not collect this data as this information rests with the educator preparation programs that use alternative measures of performance for individuals seeking licensure. The department provides technical assistance to

educator preparation programs on alternative measures as needed. The department does not anticipate a large overall increase in the number of candidates being accepted for licensure using measures of performance other than grade point average. However, among candidates in the state that are seeking a career change, entities that use alternative measures of performance may experience an increase in the number of candidates who could be accepted for licensure. b. The state superintendent's ability to approve alternative measures of performance is not new. Therefore, the section has been restated to clarify that the rule's alternative measures of performance will be approved by the state superintendent.
