The proposed rule would result in an increase for those business of between \$60 to \$450 per business annually depending on the size of business and quantity of chemicals. Approximately 94% of impacted businesses would have an increase between \$60 and \$145 per year.

Policy Problem Addressed by the Rule The fees were initially created to provide funding for the state, through the department of military affairs' emergency management division (WEM) to implement required federal regulations 42 USC 11000 to 11050. The current fee amount was set in 2010 and it is anticipated that the current fees will not be sufficient to cover WEM's costs of administering and ensuring compliance with the federal law and providing for grants under s. 323.61, Stats.

17. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Federal Government	

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There is no similar federal law or regulation to WEM 1.

18. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Neighboring States (Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota)

WEM is statutorily required to impose inventory fees for facilities submitting Tier II reports. Tier II reports convey specific information on hazardous chemicals present at a facility and are required by the US Environmental Protection Agency for facilities that are required to prepare or have available a Safety Data Sheet (also known as the Material Safety Data Sheet) under the regulations implementing the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970. Illinois, Iowa, and Michigan do not impose fees and therefore fund their programs from general state funds. Minnesota charges a \$500 fee for facilities that generate large quantities of hazardous waste (> 1,000 kg per month) and additional fees for toxic chemical releases (\$500 for releases < 25,000 pounds; \$0.02/pound for releases > 25,000 pounds).
