DFI-CU 72.02 to reflect changes to the definition of "member business loan" set forth in the federal Economic Growth, Regulatory Relief, and Consumer Protection Act, which Congress enacted in 2018, and accompanying rules governing credit unions. DFI-CU 72.02's definition of "member business loan" tracked the federal definition prior to those 2018 changes, and this amendment will ensure that the rule language continues to conform to federal law. This revision is definitional, and other proposed revisions are nonsubstantive. The proposed revisions in this rule do not require credit unions or other businesses to assume any new duties, change existing practices, or incur new costs. 10. Admin. Code s. 77.02. In particular, in 2018</li> <li>Congress amended 12 U.S.C. s. 1757a to exclude loans secured by 1- to 4- family dwellings from the definition of</li> <li>"member business loan." (Previously, the law only excluded such loans if the dwellings were owner-occupied). Wis.</li> <li>Admin. Code s. 77.02 has not yet been revised to reflect those recent federal changes. The other policy goals of the rule are to fix erroneous cross-references to state or federal rules or statutes and to modify the structure of existing rules in nonsubstantive ways to be consistent with modern drafting practices of the legislative reference bureau and the form and style requirements of the bureau and the legislative council staff</li> <li>12. 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Governmental Units and the State's Economyas a Whole (Include Implementation and Compliance Costs Expected to be Incurred)

As mentioned above, the rule's estimated econonomic and fiscal impact on businesses, local governments, and the state's economy as a whole is expected to be negligible because the changes contained in the rule do not require credit unions or other businesses to assume any new duties, change existing practices, or incur new costs.

15. Benefits of Implementing the Rule and Alternative(s) to Implementing the Rule

The benefits of implementing the rule include making the definition in DFI-CU 72.02 consistent with federal law, updating cross-references and other provisions that have become obsolete, repealing provisions that have become unnecessary, and modifying the struccture of existing rules to conform to current Wisconsin drafting practices.

16. Long Range Implications of Implementing the Rule

The long range implications are to keep Wisconsin's MBL rules consistent where possible with federal MBL rules so as to provide parity between federal- and state-chartered credit unions. This allows Wisconsin's state-chartered credit unions to remain competitive with the products offered by federally-chartered credit unions.

17. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Federal Government

The National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) regulates federally-chartered credit unions. NCUA's commercial and member business loan (MBL) rule may be found at 12 C.F.R. Part 723. NCUA made revisions to its rule which became effective January 1, 2017. The proposed rule would update Wisconsin's rules to reflect nearly all of the recent revisions NCUA made to its MBL rule.

18. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Neighboring States (Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota) Credit unions chartered under the laws of Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, and Minnesota are federally insured and apply the federal definition of "member business loan" set forth in the Economic Growth, Regulatory Relief, and Consumer Protection Act and accompanying rules. See 12 C.F.R. 723.8(b) (excluding from the definition of "member business loan" any loan that is "fully secured by a lien on a 1- to 4-family dwelling"); 38 Ill. Admin. Code §§ 190.165(b)(2) & 190.165(h)(2) (same).
