Summary of Rule's Economic and Fiscal Impact on Specific Businesses, Business Sectors, Public Utility Rate Payers, Local Governmental Units and the State's Economy as a Whole (Include Implementation and Compliance Costs Expected to be Incurred) The proposed rule would bring adoption assistance rule into conformance with current practice and align the methodology for determining supplemental payments with other department programs (subsidized guardianship and foster care). The result of the rule change is cost neutral.

Benefits of Implementing the Rule and Alternative(s) to Implementing the Rule The benefit of implementing the rule is to align with current practice and have consistency across DCF programs (subsidized guardianship and foster care) that use similar methodology. The alternative to implementing the rule would be the continued misalignment between rule and practice, and inconsistent methodologies across other DCF programs.	
16. Long Range Implications of Implementing the Rule This change will align rule with practice and affects the department and families who adopt a child from the public child welfare system. There are no expected negative consequences with long range implications.	
17. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Federal Government	

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The adoption assistance program is authorized under 42 USC 673. The program provides partial reimbursement to states to facilitate the timely placement of children whose special needs or circumstances would otherwise make it difficult to place them with adoptive families. 42 USC 673 (a) (3) provides that the amount of an adoption assistance payment shall be determined through agreement between the adopting parents and the state agency, which shall take into account the circumstances of the adopting parents and the needs of the child being adopted and may be adjusted periodically with the concurrence of the adopting parents.
