ORDER OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE
CREATING RULES

Pursuant to authority vested in the State Department of Public Welfare by Sections 46.014 (3) and 46.165, Wis. Stats., the State Department of Public Welfare hereby creates Rule FW-PA 20.22. (The Rule as created is attached hereto.)

RULE PW-PA 20.22 LIQUID ASSETS

(1) Aid to Dependent Children. Where a dependent child or children otherwise eligible for a grant of Aid to Dependent Children together with the parent or parents included in the grant of such aid have more than \$500.00 in liquid assets, including cash or loan value of insurance, eligibility for grant of Aid to Dependent Children does not exist.

(2) Aid to Totally and Permanently Disabled Persons. Where a dependent person otherwise eligible for a grant of Aid to Totally and Permanently Disabled has more than \$500.00 in liquid assets, excluding cash or loan value of insurance, eligibility for aid does not exist.

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
