INTRODUCTION

Purpose and Structure

The legislature, by section 35.93 and chapter 227, Wis. Stats., 1955, directed the publication of the rules of administrative agencies having rule-making authority in a loose-leaf, continual revision system known as the WISCONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE. The code is kept current by means of new and replacement pages. The pages are issued monthly, together with notices of hearings on proposed rules, emergency rules, new rules, instructions for insertion of new material, and other pertinent information. This monthly service is called the WIS-CONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE REGISTER, and comes to the subscriber after the 25th of each month.

Availability

The complete code and the upkeep service are distributed to the county law libraries; to the libraries of the University of Wisconsin Law School and Marquette University Law School; to the State Historical Society; to the Legislative Reference Bureau and to the State Law Library, and to certain designated public libraries throughout the state.

The sale and distribution of the code and of its parts is handled by Department of Administration, Document Sales and Distribution, Room B 237, State Office Building, 1 West Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53702.

History Notes

Each page of the code as it was originally filed and printed pursuant to the 1955 legislation, is dated "1-2-56". A rule which is amended or created subsequent to the original printing date is followed by a history note indicating the date and number of the REGISTER in which it was published and the date on which the amendment or the rule became effective. The absence of a history note at the end of a section indicates that the rule has remained unchanged since the original printing in 1956. The date line at the bottom of the page indicates the month in which the page was released.

In some instances an *entire* code has been repealed and recreated subsequent to the original printing date. When this occurs a history note has been placed at the beginning of the chapter to contain this information. A separate history note appears after each section indicating the date when the revision became effective.

Med 1.01 Requirements. All applicants for license to practice medicine and surgery by examination must meet:

(1) PRELIMINARY REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by examination must present satisfactory evidence of a preliminary education equivalent to graduation from an accredited high school of this state, and of having completed the premedical course of the university of Wisconsin or its equivalent.

(2) PROFESSIONAL REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by examination must also present a diploma from a reputable professional college approved and recognized by the medical examining board. This board approves and recognizes as reputable professional colleges the medical schools recognized and approved by the council on medical education and hospitals of the American medical association at the time of the graduation of the applicant therefrom.

(3) LICENSING EXAMINATION. Each applicant for license by examination is required to present to the board with his application for examination, certified photographic copies of:

(a) Diploma representing at least 3 years of pre-medic work, or a certified statement of credits, equivalent to the premedical course

at the university of Wisconsin. (b) Diploma from a reputable medical/college, having a required course of at least 4 years, or a shorter 3 year course approved by (c) A certificate showing completion of a 12 months internship in a reputable hospital. Or approved residency.

(d) A certificate of registration in the basic sciences.

(e) An unmounted, recent photograph of the applicant taken not more than 60 days prior to date of application to be approximately 31/2"x5", and signed by the applicant. A statement by a notary public should be made on the reverse side that it is a true photograph of the applicant.

Med 1.02 Character references. In addition to the requirements of section Med 1.01, each applicant must present character recommendations by two reputable physicians, whose full names and addresses must be given.

Med 1.03 Language of examinations. Examinations are conducted only in the English language, and are both written and oral. History: Cr. Register, June, 1969, No. 162, eff. 7-1-69.

Med 1.04 Regular examinations. Regular examinations are held on the second Tuesday in January at Madison. The board also meets at least 3 other times during the year in such places and at such times as it determines.

Med 1.05 Passing grades. An applicant must receive an average grade of 75 in all subjects upon which he is examined; if he falls below an average grade of 75 in all subjects or below a grade of 70 in more than 2 subjects, he must retake the entire examination with satisfactory grades in order to be eligible for license.

Med 1.06 Regulations during conduct of examination. Applicants shall not be permitted to bring books, compends, notes, or other similar helps into the examination room or to communicate by word or sign with other examinees while an examination is in progress, nor shall any applicant leave the examination room during such time or otherwise withdraw from the sight of the examiner or proctor without permission. Social engagements between the examinees and any member of the board, or a proctor, or other person assisting in the examination prior to the completion thereof, are prohibited.

Med 1.07 Numbering of applicants. At the opening of the examination, each applicant will be given a numbered card upon which he shall enter his name, post-office address, and the name of the county in Wisconsin in which he intends to practice. The number thus issued to the applicant shall be used by him on all examination papers and neither the name of the applicant nor any other mark identifying him shall appear on any such paper.

Med 2.01 General requirements. Any medical practitioner holding a license from a state in which the requirements for license are equivalent to those of Wisconsin or a full diplomate of the national board of medical examiners/may be admitted to practice of the station grades state by endorsement or reciprocity. As a part of his application he must furnish the statement of the examining board of the state in which he is licensed listing the professional subjects in which he was examined by such board and the grade received by him in each subject. Each applicant must appear personally before the board and submit to an oral examination in which he must receive an average grade of 75.

Med 2.02 Application for license by reciprocity. Applications must be fully completed and submitted on forms provided by the board at least 2 weeks before the date of the meeting of the board of which same is to be considered, and must be accompanied by:

An unmounted photograph of the applicant (another is pasted to the application blank), taken not more than sixty days prior to date of application, to be approximately 31/2"x5", and signed by the applicant. A statement by a notary public should be made on the reverse side that it is a true photograph of the applicant.

(2) NOTARIZED PHOTOGRAPHIC OR PHOTOSTATIC COPIES OF: (a) Diploma representing at least 3 years of pre-medic work, or a certified statement of credits, equivalent to the premedical course at the university of Wisconsin, as of the date of his matriculation into medical school.

(b) Diploma from a reputable medical or osteopathic college, having a required course of at least 4 years, or a shorter three year course approved by $Deans_A \circ f_{American} medical schools a 12 months intern$ ship in a reputable hospital or approved residency.

(d) License by examination in the state from which the applicant is seeking reciprocity or a certificate from the national board of medical examiners., or the holder of a federated licensing examination certificate grades acceptable to the medical examining board. (3) CERTIFICATE. A certificate of registration in the basic sciences.

(4) CHARACTER. Satisfactory evidence of good moral and professional character.

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Med 2.03 Reciprocity with armed forces service. An honorably discharged surgeon of the army or navy or the federal health service may be licensed without written examination upon filing a sworn and authenticated copy of his discharge in lieu of a license in another state, and compliance with the other provisions relating to the granting of licenses, providing such discharge was within one year of the date of application.

Med 3.01 Application procedure. A person licensed in Wisconsin to practice osteopathy and surgery may obtain a license to practice medicine and surgery in the following manner:

(1) Filing an application on form provided by the board setting forth the date the applicant was licensed to practice, the number of years and place or places in which he has practiced.

(2) Completion of refresher course in materia medica and pharmacology; a refresher course which meets the statutory requirements, or a regular course offered in an approved medical or osteopathic college, will be accepted.

(3) Pass an examination given by the board in materia medica and pharmacology.

(4) Payment of fee in the amount of \$25.

(5) Surrender of old license.

Note: We occasionally have inquiries as to why applicants are required to re-write in some of the basic science subjects (Anatomy, Physiology, Pathology and Diagnosis) when the Wisconsin basic science board examines in these specific subjects and issues a certificate in recognition of their proficiency in them. In past reciprocal relations with, other state boards, we have learned that some states will not grant reciprocity to applicants who have written a state board examination which does not include the basic science subjects. Wilsconsin has, therefore, included some of these subjects so our licentiates will have less difficulties when seeking reciprocity in other states.

Med 4.05 Passing grades in examination. A minimum general average of 75 in all subjects and a grade of 70 in each subject is required. If applicant falls below an average of 75 in all subjects or below a grade of 70 in 3 or more subjects it constitutes a failure and he must retake the entire examination with satisfactory grades in

order to be eligible for license. If applicant receives an average grade of 75 or more in all subjects and falls below 70 in 2 subjects, he is conditioned in those subjects and may retake the examination in those subjects in which his grade fell below 70 with subsequent issuance of license, if a grade of 70 or more is received, providing application is complete in all respects. Conditions or failures may be removed within one year without additional charge. However, all examinations subsequent to the second require a new application and an additional fee of \$45. Med 6.01 General requirements. A foreign graduate who wishes to be licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Wisconsin, either by reciprocity or written examination, must possess the following requirements in order to be considered among-the-50-applicants and year-that may be accepted for licensing under this board. by this board.

(1) He must have in this office one or more letters requesting his services in a community, clinic or institution in this state where he plans to practice if licensed.

(2) He must hold the standard E.C.F.M.G. certificate or present evidence of certification by one of the A.M.A. approved 19 specialty boards.

(3) He must have served a year's internship or residency in a hospital approved by the council on medical education and hospitals of the American medical association at the time of his service therein. Accelerated war-time internships, usually of 9 months duration, are accepted subject to board approval if supplemented by armed forces service or certain other types of service.

(4) He must possess his first-papers (declaration of intention) at the time of consideration by the board.

Med 10.02 Requirements for written examination. All applicants for a hospital resident license to practice medicine and surgery by written examination must meet:

(1) PRELIMINARY REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for a hospital resident license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by examination must present satisfactory evidence of a preliminary education equivalent to graduation from an accredited high school of this state, and of having completed the premedical courses of the university of Wisconsin or its equivalent.

(2) PROFESSIONAL REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for a hospital resident license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by examination must also present a diploma from a reputable professional college approved and recognized by the medical examining board. This board approve**6** and recognizes as reputable professional colleges the medical schools recognized and approved by the council on medical education and hospitals of the American medical association or the American osteopathic association at the time of the graduation of the applicant therefrom.

(3) LICENSING EXAMINATION. Each applicant for a hospital resident license by examination is required to present to the board with his application for examination, certified photographic copies of:

(a) Diploma representing at least 3 years of pre=medical work or a certified statement of credits, equivalent to the premedical course at the university of Wisconsin. or osteopathic

(b) Diploma from a reputable medical/college, having a required course of at least 4 years or a shorter 3 year course approved by Deans of American medical schools.

(c) A certificate showing completion of a 12 months internship in a reputable hospital, or approved residency.

(d) An unmounted, recent photograph of the applicant taken not more than 60 days prior to date of application to be approximately $3 \ 1/3 \ x \ 5$, and signed by the applicant. A statement by a notary public should be made on the reverse side that it is a true photograph of the applicant.

Med 10.03 Requirements for reciprocity. An applicant for a hospital resident license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by reciprocity must meet:

(1) PRELIMINARY REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for a hospital resident license to practice medicine and surgery in this state by reciprocity must present satisfactory evidence of a preliminary education equivalent to graduation from an accredited high school of this state, and of having completed the premedical courses of the university of Wisconsin or its equivalent. (2) PROFESSIONAL REQUIREMENTS. (d) License by examination in the state from which the applicant is seeking reciprocity or a certificate from the national board of medical examiners of the holder of a federated licensing examination certificate with grades acceptable to medical examining board.

Med 10.04 Hospital certification. The resident must submit proof that he has been accepted for residency training in a hospital approved for said training.

Med 20.01 General requirements. (1) PRELIMINARY REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for registration to practice physical therapy must present satisfactory evidence that he is at least 20 years of age, of good moral character, and holds a diploma from a recognized high school or can present evidence of an equivalent education.

(2) PROFESSIONAL REQUIREMENTS. An applicant for registration to practice physical therapy in this state must present satisfactory evidence of graduation from a school of physical therapy with standards of education and training substantially equivalent to that of the university of Wisconsin.

Note: (The board approves and recognizes those schools of physical therapy which are approved by the American Physical Therapy Association from 1928 to 1936 and by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association beginning in 1936.)

vided on application blank. The school seal is required. If there is no school seal, certificate of professional education must be *notarized* by school signing the certificate.

(f) Complete transcript or transcripts of pre-professional and professional credits each bearing the seal of school of issuance. Transcripts are to be sent directly to the secretary of the physical therapy examining committee from the school of issuance.

(2) The examination shall be both scientific and practical and shall be conducted by an examining council of 3 physical therapists selected by the medical examining board. The applicant shall present himself for examination at the first board meeting at which examinations are held following the submission of his application.

(3) Examinations must be written in ink and applicants are advised to bring fountain pens for their own convenience.

(4) Conditions may be removed within one year without additional charge. This likewise pertains to outright failures. A general average of 75% is required for passing. 70% is required in each subject for passing. One grade below 70 constitutes a condition; more than one mark below 70 requires rewriting the entire examination.

(5) Examinations are conducted only in the English language, and are both written and oral.

Med 40.03 Federally operated institutions. A doctor practicing in a federally operated institution is also exempt from registration. A doctor practicing in such an institution shall return the application card, without a fee, giving us his present address and reason for exemption.

Med 40.04 Retired. A very small percentage of our licentiates are retired for various reasons, but still living in Wisconsin. They are exempt from registration. They shall notify us of their inactive status and their registrations will be placed in the "Retired" file until further notification of their resumption of active practice. If they treat any patients whatsoever, they shall comply with annual registration for their own protection.

Med 40.05 Wisconsin register of doctors. Regardless of the above exemptions, doctors' names are not included in the WISCONSIN REGISTER OF DOCTORS unless they send us the required fee set for that year. This REGISTER is published yearly after March 1, and contains a list of all physicians who have complied with annual

registration by February 1, as required by statute. The board, in its discretion, may make copies of the registry available for general distribution at a charge of \$1 per copy.

Med 40.06 First registration for those licensed before 1944. A doctor licensed before 1944, who has subsequently conducted his practice entirely outside of Wisconsin, shall register if he wishes to return to Wisconsin to conduct his practice, or if he intends to remain out-ofstate but wishes to register in order to be listed annually in the WISCONSIN REGISTER OF DOCTORS. An original "Application for Annual Registration" shall be returned to this office with the required fee for that year and an "Application for Re-Registration." However, no physician practicing out-of-state is required to complete even this first registration; his license remains valid and operable without annual renewal during that time.

Med 40.07 Practice in Wisconsin. Any licentiate of this board who practices medicine in Wisconsin in a civilian capacity, regardless of the length of time, with the exception of those in federally operated institutions, must register annually by February 1. If he begins his practice subsequent to February 1, he should write this board at once and request an application for re-registration for the current year. This regulation includes residents. If a doctor intends to practice in Wisconsin for only a week or two, perhaps in a locum tenens capacity, he is still required to register.

Med 40.08 Notification of change of address. Any doctor who changes the location of his practice, either in Wisconsin or out-ofstate, shall notify this office of his new address as soon as possible. History: Cr. Register, June. 1969. No. 162. eff. J-1-69.
