

ORDER OF THE
STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION
AMENDING AND CREATING RULES

1 To amend PI 3.07(4)(g)32 and to create PI 3.07(4)(g)46 relating to
2 certification of teachers of social studies.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Public Instruction

The proposed amendments to the certification code provide additional options for obtaining licensure in the area of social studies.

The proposed rule will allow teachers holding the Broad field Social Studies license to obtain additional certification in any social studies discipline in which they hold a minimum of 15 semester credits. In addition, a new license will be created which will allow a licensed elementary teacher or licensed secondary teacher with a major or minor in a social studies discipline to teach social studies in grades 7, 8, or 9 by completing additional coursework.

These proposed licensing options will provide school districts with more flexibility of assignment of teachers and teachers with broader options to teach in more disciplines. This proposed amendment will also limit the need to issue provisional licenses to marginally qualified teachers.

3 Pursuant to the authority vested in the State Superintendent of Public
4 Instruction by s.115.28(7), Stats., and interpreting s.115.28(7), Stats.,
5 the State Superintendent hereby amends and creates rules as follows:
6 SECTION 1. PI 3.07(4)(g)32 is amended to read:
7 PI 3.07(4)(g)32. 701 Broad field social studies. Effective July 1,
8 1972, a regular broad field social studies license may be issued to teach
9 only the fusion courses, which are those drawn from several of the social
10 studies disciplines and, therefore, require a composite preparation, e.g.,
11 American problems, area studies, civics, social problems, vital issues,

1 etc. The broad field social studies preparation includes eligibility for
2 additional endorsement(s) for the Approved Program major(s) and minor(s)
3 completed within the program for which a regular license may be issued.
4 To be eligible for these licenses an applicant must have completed:

5 a. Fifty-four semester credits to include:

6 1) A minimum of a 34 semester credit major in one of the following
7 subjects:

12 and a minimum of 20 semester credits distributed over at least 2 of the
13 other social studies subjects listed above; or

15 studies subjects listed above and a minimum of 32 semester credits distributed
16 over at least 3 of the other social studies subjects listed above.

17 b. Effective July 1, 1984, persons holding the 701 Broad field Social
18 Studies license based upon the certification requirements effective July 1,
19 1972, shall be licensed in any social studies discipline in which they hold
20 a minimum of 15 semester credits.

21 SECTION 2. PI 3.07(4)(g) 46 is created to read:

22 PI 3.07(4)(g)46. 703 Social Studies. Effective July 1, 1984, an applicant
23 who holds a secondary license in a social studies discipline and who has
24 completed the program listed in a. below shall be issued a regular license
25 to teach social studies in grades 7, 8, and 9. An applicant who holds an

1 elementary education license to teach grade 8 and who has completed the
2 program listed in a. below shall be issued a regular license to teach social
3 studies through grade 9. Licensed elementary teachers may teach social
4 studies at those grade levels for which they are licensed.

5 a. 30 semester credits to include:

- 6 1. 9 semester credits in history;
- 7 2. 6 semester credits in geography; and
- 8 3. A minimum of 3 semester credits in each of the following:
 - 9 a. economics;
 - 10 b. political science;
 - 11 c. sociology;
 - 12 d. anthropology; and
 - 13 e. psychology.

14 The rules contained in this order shall take effect on July 1, 1984.

These changes will not affect permanently licensed teachers and will not mandate that regularly licensed teachers earn additional credits at a cost to them or their employers. Current teachers working to obtain new licenses or choosing to meet new certification requirements may incur additional costs.

These changes would affect a teacher training institution inadequately staffed to handle course requirements. Such an institution could adjust to the new certification rules by reallocating resources.
