Analysis prepared by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation

<u>General summary of rule</u>. Section 347.485(1)(a), Stats., provides that no person who holds a motor-driven cycle instructional permit or who is under 18 years of age may operate or ride a motor-driven cycle without wearing a protective headgear. Section 347.485(1), Stats., has required that the protective headgear be of a type and be worn in a manner "approved by the [department of transportation]." In accordance with that statutory requirement, the Department of Transportation created chapter MVD 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, entitled "Protective Headgear--Standards and Specifications."

On February 21, 1984, the Legislature enacted 1983 Wisconsin Act 133. That Act amends section 347.485(1), deleting the language requiring headgear approved by the Department of Transportation and creating language requiring headgear meeting the federal standards set forth in 49 C.F.R. 571.218. Consequently, chapter MVD 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, is now unnecessary and should be repealed. That is the purpose of this administrative rulemaking: it repeals chapter MVD 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code.

Fiscal effect. This rule change will not have a fiscal effect upon the state, local governments or the private sector. It simply repeals a rule that the Legislature has already made superfluous.

Pursuant to authority vested in the Wisconsin department of transportation by ss. 110.06(1) and 227.014(2), Stats., the department of transportation repeals chapter MVD 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter MVD 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, is repealed.

The rule repeal shall take effect upon publication as provided in s. 227.026(1)(intro.), Stats.
