ADOPTING, AMENDING OR REPEALING RULES

1

To repeal Ag 10.02(1)(a)5, relating to a requirement that

2 interstate health certificates for imported bovine animals contain

3 a statement concerning absence of exposure to paratuberculosis.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection

The repeal of s. Ag 10.02(1)(a)5 eliminates the requirement for an accredited veterinarian issuing an interstate health certificate to make and execute a statement which declares that no known exposure of the imported animals to paratuberculosis (Johne's disease) has occurred. The effect of this change is to allow cattle which are vaccinated for Johne's disease, those cattle from disease control herds and cattle whose status is unknown to enter the state. The statement was difficult for certifying veterinarians in other states to make, as quite often those veterinarians would not be knowledgeable of the herd of origin for a particular animal. The statement gave a false sense of security to livestock owners purchasing such cattle.
