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

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Agriculture,
Trade and Consumer Protection

Section 93.23, Wis. Stats., entitled "Local Fairs," provides authority for prescribing conditions for allocating and distributing state aid to counties and agriculture societies, associations or boards conducting local fairs. Pursuant to this authority, the department has adopted Chapter Ag 5, Wis. Adm. Code, which sets forth requirements for classes of exhibits which will be approved for the purposes of state aid; premium awards in such classes; and entry qualifications, fees and charges for exhibitors. From time to time, on the advice and recommendation of interested groups such as the Wisconsin Association of County and District Fairs, the chapter has been revised to bring various provisions and premium classes into conformance with trends taking place in the exhibit arena. Some of the current proposed revisions include redefining the goat classes in accordance with recommendations of the American Goat Association; the addition of 4 hitch classes to the draft horse department; the addition of several new projects in the junior fair division classes relating to dairy, horses, natural sciences, and plant and soil sciences; prescribing limitations on the number of animals which an exhibitor may show in certain classes; and the repeal of s. Ag 5.01(4)(f) relating to a restriction on junior fair exhibitors receiving state aid premiums at only one county or district fair in the same department.

4 Pursuant to authority vested in the state of Wisconsin
5 department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection by
6 ss. 93.07(1) and 93.23(1)(a)2, Stats., the department proposes to
7 repeal, amend and create rules interpreting s. 93.23, Stats., as
8 follows:

9 SECTION 1. Ag 5.01(1)(a), (2)(a), (3)(b), (4)(a) and (4)(d)
10 are amended to read:

1 Ag 5.01 (1)(a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by
2 county and district fairs shall ~~be in strict conformity~~ conform
3 with uniform premium lists and other requirements ~~as prescribed~~
4 set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net
5 premiums shall submit to the department, ~~30 days prior to the~~
6 ~~opening of the fair,~~ a printed copy of the premium list ~~to be used~~
7 at the fair, as required under s. Ag 5.08(3)(d).

8 (2)(a) Entry fees ~~may be charged~~ not in excess of 10% of the
9 purse offered on any specific article may be charged. When no
10 entry fee is charged, stall rents may be charged in the horse,
11 cattle, sheep, goat and swine departments. In the horse
12 department the rental shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall, or
13 animal and ,or \$3 for box stalls; in the cattle department \$1 ~~for~~
14 per single stalls stall or animal, and ,or \$2 per box stall; in
15 swine, goat and sheep departments \$2 per pen or 50 cents per
16 animal. A standard pen is approximately 64 square feet. In the
17 poultry, rabbit and pet stock department the charge shall not
18 exceed ~~25~~ 50 cents per head.

19 (3)(b) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals
20 actually on display in exhibit buildings or actually shown in the
21 show ring during the regular fair dates except as split dates are
22 provided for under sub. (6). State aid will not be paid on
23 D.H.I.A. records, transportation aids, production contests, or the
24 like, unless special approval is granted under s. Ag 5.02(8).

25 (4)(a) In the junior fair division, state aid will be paid
26 on prizes offered to exhibitors who are 8 through 19 years of age-
27 ~~on~~ on January 1 of the current fair year, except for exhibitors

1 under s. Ag 5.06 (35), who may be pupils of school age as defined
2 in s. 118.14, Stats. State aid will not be paid on prizes for club
3 parades, club floats, song contests, or any project which is not an
4 exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

5 (4)(d) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid
6 directly to the exhibitor making the exhibit and not to the school
7 or teacher, except for group premiums offered to interschool com-
8 petitive classes. A No aid may be paid on education department
9 premiums unless a complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of
10 judges' sheets for the education department, similar to those
11 required in other departments, shall be is filed with the depart-
12 ment. ~~No aid may be paid on education department premiums unless~~
13 ~~this is done.~~ All educational exhibits shall be on display at the
14 fair even though they are judged prior to the fair.

15 SECTION 2. Ag 5.01(4)(f) is repealed.

17 Ag 5.01(5)(a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23(1), Stats.,

21 mium aids from any fair which does not enforce the animal health
22 provisions required under s. Ag 10.54, for all classes of livestock
23 exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums
24 actually paid by bank check or draft.

25 (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded
26 an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open ~~class~~
27 division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits,

1 and no more than one premium in all other classes, including
2 poultry and rabbits.
