6	To repeal and recreate Ag 10.01(29), Ag 10.04(5), and Ag 10.041,
7	and to create Ag 10.01(39) through (41), relating to the importation
8	of feeder swine into Wisconsin.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection

These rules change current rules related to the importation of feeder swine into this state. Feeder swine are swine, excluding boars, weighing less than 175 pounds and intended solely for slaughter and not for breeding.

Under prior rules, all feeder swine imported into this state were required to be accompanied by an interstate health certificate providing information about the identification and health of the The rules require an interstate health certificate, but also animal. require additional information including the age, sex, weight, and breed of the animal and the names and addresses of the persons shipping and receiving the animal. As under prior rules, the rules require the interstate health certificate to include a statement by an examining veterinarian that no pseudorables, swine dysentery, or transmissible gastroenteritis was diagnosed in the animal's herd of origin within 60 days prior to importation, and that no pseudorabies vaccine has been used. In addition, the rules require a statement that either the feeder swine was tested and found negative for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to importation, or that the feeder swine originated from a recognized pseudorabies-free area, a qualified feeder pig herd, or a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.

The rules provide that feeder swine imported from a recognized pseudorables-free area, a qualified feeder pig herd, or a qualified pseudorables negative herd need not be tested and found negative for pseudorables prior to entry into this state.

The rules establish procedures for testing qualified feeder pig herds for pseudorables. Under the provisions of the rules, a qualified feeder pig herd must be tested annually for pseudorables. Each test must include randomly selected representatives of all breeding groups in the herd. The number of animals to be tested depend upon the size of the herd. In herds with 25 or fewer breeding animals, all would be tested. In herds with 26 to 100 breeding animals, 25 animals would be tested. In herds with 101 to 200 breeding animals, 27 animals would be tested. In herds with more than 200 breeding animals, 30 animals would be tested.

The rules clarify the prior rule's requirement that imported feeder swine may be delivered only to a farm or a federally approved swine market. As under the prior rule, the rules require that imported feeder swine consigned to a farm be kept separate from breeder swine, and that the feeder swine may be removed from the farm only for slaughter. As under the prior rule, the rules provide that imported feeder swine consigned to a federally approved swine market may be delivered to a farm for finish feeding prior to slaughter. In addition, the rules allow imported feeder swine to be shipped directly to a slaughter establishment for slaughter.

Prior rules define the terms "federally approved swine market" and "feeder pigs." The rules redefine the term "feeder pigs" as "feeder swine," and define the terms "qualified feeder pig herd," "qualified pseudorabies negative herd," and "recognized pseudorabies free area."

The rules amend s. Ag 10.04(5), relating to certain exceptions to the requirements for importation of swine, to be consistent with the changes in the importation of feeder swine.

Pursuant to authority vested in the state of Wisconsin department
 of agriculture, trade and consumer protection by ss. 93.07(1) and
 (10), Stats., the department adopts, amends and repeals rules
 interpreting ss. 93.07(10), 95.23(4), and 95.27(2), Stats., as
 follows:
 SECTION 1. Ag 10.01(29) is repealed and recreated to read:
 Ag 10.01(29) "Feeder swine" means swine, excluding boars, weigh-

8 ing less than 175 pounds and kept for the sole purpose of feeding for 10 slaughter.

11 SECTION 2. Ag 10.01(39) through (41) are created to read:

Ag 10.01(39) "Qualified feeder pig herd" means a herd of breeding swine, used for producing feeder pigs, which is tested in accordance 1 with s. Ag 10.041(4), and determined to be negative for pseudorables.

Ag 10.01(40) "Qualified pseudorabies negative herd" means a herd of swine certified as being free of pseudorabies as provided in s. Ag 10.58.

Ag 10.01(41) "Recognized pseudorabies free area" means an
area recognized by the department as being free of pseudorabies.
SECTION 3. Ag 10.04(5) is repealed and recreated to read:
Ag 10.04(5) EXCEPTIONS. Subsections (1), (3), and (4) do not
apply to:

(a) Feeder swine imported in conformity with s. Ag 10.041;
(b) Healthy swine shipped directly to a slaughtering

12 establishment for immediate slaughter; or

13 (c) Healthy swine shipped directly to a federally approved14 swine market for sale to a slaughtering establishment.

15 SECTION 4. Ag 10.041 is repealed and recreated to read:

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Ag 10.041 FEEDER SWINE; IMPORTATION.

17 (1) INTERSTATE HEALTH CERTIFICATE. No person may import a feeder
18 swine into this state unless the feeder swine is accompanied by a
19 valid interstate health certificate executed no more than 30 days
20 prior to the date on which the feeder swine is imported into this
21 state. The interstate health certificate shall comply with s. Ag
22 10.225, and shall include all of the following information:

(a) Specific identification of the feeder swine. Identification
shall refer to an ear tag or other permanent identification approved
by the department.

(b) The age, sex, weight, and breed of the feeder swine.(c) The names and addresses of the persons shipping and

1 receiving the feeder swine.

2 (d) A report of a negative test result for pseudorables, unless
3 the feeder swine originates from one of the sources specified under
4 sub. (2).

5 (e) A statement that the feeder swine has been examined by the 6 veterinarian who executed the interstate health certificate. The 7 statement shall specify that:

8 1. No pseudorabies, swine dysentery, or transmissible 9 gastroenteritis has been diagnosed in the herd of origin within the 10 past 60 days.

11 2. No pseudorables vaccine has been used in the feeder swine.
12 3. The feeder swine originates from one of the sources specified
13 in sub. (2), or has been found negative for pseudorables, in a test
14 approved by the department, at least 30 days prior to entering this
15 state.

16 (2) PSEUDORABIES STATUS; TESTING; HERD OF ORIGIN. No person
17 may import a feeder swine into this state unless the feeder swine
18 has been found negative for pseudorabies, in a test approved by
19 the department, at least 30 days prior to entering this state.
20 This does not apply to a feeder swine which originates from one of
21 the following sources:

22 (a) A recognized pseudorables free area.

23

(b) A qualified feeder pig herd.

24 (c) A qualified pseudorabies negative herd under s. Ag25 10.58.

26 (3) DESTINATION. No person may import a feeder swine into
27 this state unless the feeder swine is consigned directly to a farm

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1 or a federally approved swine market.

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(4) QUALIFIED FEEDER PIG HERD; PSEUDORABIES.

No herd of swine may be considered a qualified feeder pig 3 4 herd under sub. (2)(b) unless the herd is annually tested and 5 found negative for pseudorabies. Annual testing shall be per-6 formed on a representative sample of swine selected from the entire breeding herd. Each test sample shall include randomly 7 8 selected representatives of all breeding groups within the herd, 9 and shall include boars and recent additions to the herd. In herds with 25 or fewer breeding swine, all breeding swine in the herd 10 11 shall be tested. In herds with more than 25, but no more than 12 100, breeding swine, the test sample shall include at least 25 In herds with more than 100, but no more than 13 breeding swine. 200, breeding swine, the test sample shall include at least 27 14 In herds with more than 200 breeding swine, the 15 breeding swine. 16 test sample shall include at least 30 breeding swine.

17 (5) FEEDER SWINE CONSIGNED TO FARMS. Imported feeder swine 18 which are consigned to a farm, either directly upon import or from 19 a federally approved swine market, shall at all times be kept separate from breeder swine on the farm. Imported feeder swine 20 may not be removed from the farm except for slaughter. Imported 21 22 feeder swine under this subsection include swine which are commingled with imported feeder swine at a federally approved 23 24 swine market in this state.

(6) FEEDER SWINE CONSIGNED TO A FEDERALLY APPROVED SWINE
MARKET. Imported feeder swine consigned to a federally approved
swine market in this state may not be removed from the livestock

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1 market except for direct shipment to slaughter, or for direct 2 shipment to a farm for purposes of finish feeding for slaughter. 3 Imported feeder swine under this subsection include swine which 4 are commingled with imported feeder swine at a federally approved 5 swine market in this state.

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6 SECTION 5. The rules contained in this order shall take 7 effect on the first day of the month following publication in the 8 Wisconsin Administrative Register, as provided in s. 227.026, 9 Stats.
