# ORDER OF THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION CREATING/AMENDING RULES

The state superintendent of public instruction hereby repeals PI 3.01 (42), subch.

XIII (title) to ch. PI 3, PI 3.66 and PI 3.67; renumbers PI 3.64 and PI 3.65; PI 4.06 (6)

- (a) 2, and PI 4.69; renumber and amends PI 3.01 (12), (14), PI 3.03 (2) (b) 2 c, PI 3.63, PI
- 3.64 (intro.), (1) (intro.), (2), and (3), PI 3.65 (intro.), PI 4.06 (6) (a) 1 and (3), and PI 4.69
- 2 (intro.); amends PI 3.01 (46), PI 3.03 (2) (b) 2 (intro.) and (d), PI 3.05 (7) (a) and (b), PI

#### ANALYSIS BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

Statutory authority: s. 115.28 (7), Stats.

Statute interpreted: ss. 115.28 (7) and 118.19 (1) and (3) (a), Stats.

Section 115.28 (7), Stats., requires the state superintendent of public instruction to license all teachers for the public schools and to make rules establishing standards of attainment for licensure. This section also requires the state superintendent to prescribe by rule standards and procedures for the approval of teacher preparatory programs leading to licensure in Wisconsin. Chapter PI 3 contains the rules which an individual must meet to be licensed in Wisconsin. Chapter PI 4 contains the procedures and standards for approval of professional education programs leading to licensure.

#### I. Administrative Licensure and Approved Programs

These proposed amendments to chs. PI 3 and 4 establish new license requirements for administrative licensure and create standards for approval of programs leading to administrative licensure. The rules were developed following receipt of the final report of the State Superintendent's Task Force on Administrative Leadership, Training and Licensure, and many of the provisions in this rule are related to the Task Force recommendations.

### The proposed rules would:

- 1. Make all administrative licenses prekindergarten through grade 12 licenses, except principal licenses which would be issued at the elementary/middle (PK-9) or middle/secondary (6-12) levels. Administrative licenses issued for specific grade levels before the proposed rules are effective would continue to be valid and renewable, although provisions are made for upgrading the older licenses to the new licenses, if the holder so desires.
- 2. Eliminate the administrative assistant license.
- 3. Create a new license for Director of Special Education and Pupil Services. The Special Education Supervisor Level A and B licenses would be eliminated, although persons holding the Level A license would be eligible for the new license, and persons holding the Level B license would be eligible for the new license if they complete requirements for the level A license by July 1, 1995. The proposed rules also permit any person who served as pupil services director for 5 years prior to July 1, 1991, to be issued the new license. The proposed rules also permit any person who served as a director in a specific pupil services area for at least 50 percent time for at least 3 years prior to July 1, 1991, to be issued a regular license as a director of that specific area.
- 4. Define "full-time teaching" as employment under contract as a classroom teacher for at least 180 days.
- 5. Specify standards for issuance of one-year administrator licenses for persons who are not fully-qualified as administrators. Such licenses must be requested by the employing school board and may only be issued to an applicant who is enrolled in an approved program leading to the license and who provides documentation that the program will be completed within 2 years.
- 6. Create a common core of 21 semester credits to be taken by all prospective administrators, including course work in human relations, oral and written communication, leadership, organization and operation of public schools, governance of education, supervision of instruction, evaluation of personnel, school law, school business administration and budgeting, and politics of education.
- 7. Provide specific license requirements for each administrative license: school district superintendent, elementary/middle level principal, middle/secondary level principal, director of instruction, director of special education and pupil services, school business administrator, local vocational education coordinator, and instructional library/media supervisor.
- 8. Require 3 years of classroom teaching experience or 540 hours of classroom teaching experience and 3 years experience as a school counselor, school psychologist or school social worker for any administrative license, except business administrator.

- 9. Create program approval standards for each administrator preparation program in Wisconsin institutions, which correspond to the course requirements in ch. PI 3.
- 10. Require that all faculty who teach and supervise the practicum or internship in programs leading to administrative licensure have at least 3 years of administrative experience in a public or private school district at the elementary, middle, secondary or administrative office level. Currently-employed faculty may meet this requirement by serving a practicum. Also require that every 5 years resident faculty in administrative programs serve a 180-hour practicum in a school district at the elementary, middle, secondary or administrative office level.
- 11. Require any person who enrolls in an administrative preparation program on or after July 1, 1992, to meet the new requirements; and any person applying from out-of-state on or after July 1, 1992, to have met the new requirements.

## II. Other Changes:

- 1. The proposed rules will permit equivalent credit toward license renewal to be earned while serving as a mentor or a cooperating teacher, and for employment which fosters exchanges of prekindergarten to grade 12 and post-secondary level faculty.
- 2. The proposed rules amend the effective dates of previously promulgated program approval rules to enable students who enroll before the new rules are implemented to complete the program in effect at the time of enrollment; and to make all effective dates for enrollment July 1 of the particular year and all effective dates for graduation August 30 of the particular year.
- 3. The proposed rules repeal the limit on the number of times an applicant may take the basic skills and subject area tests for licensure. The proposed rules also permit the institution to include persons who did not pass the basic skills test in the existing 10% allowable exceptions for admission to a professional education program. In addition, the proposed rules delay the implementation of the subject area tests for licensure until one year after the state superintendent provides notice to institutions that the tests will be required for licensure.
