IN THE MATTER OF a Rule to AMEND Trans 276.07(3) and CREATE Trans 276.08, Wis. Admin. Code. relating to allowing the operation of double bottoms and certain other combination vehicles greater than 60 feet in overall length on the specified highways.

ORDER ADOPTING RULE

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Analysis Prepared by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation

STATUTORY AUTHORITY:

ss. 85.16(1) and 348.07(4), Stats.

STATUTES INTERPRETED:

ss. 348.07(2)(f), (fm), (gm), (gr), 348.07(4) and

348.08(1)(e), Stats.

General Summary of Rule. This rule amends s. Trans 276.07(3), Wisconsin Administrative Code, and creates s. 276.08, Wisconsin Administrative Code, to provide that when a designated highway is closed and detoured the designation follows the detour, and to add the following segment of highway to the designated highway system established under s. 348.07(4), Stats.:

State Trunk Highway 13 from U.S. Highway 2 west of Ashland to Bayfield in Bayfield County.

The long trucks to which this rule applies are those with 53-foot semitrailers, double bottoms and the vehicles which may legally operate on the federal National Network but which exceed Wisconsin's regular limits on overall length. Generally, no person may operate any of the following vehicles on Wisconsin's highways without a permit: a single vehicle with an overall length in excess of 40 feet, a combination of vehicles with an overall length in excess of 60 feet, a semitrailer longer than 48 feet, an automobile haulaway longer than 66 feet plus allowed overhangs, or a double bottom. Certain exceptions are provided under s. 348.07(2), Stats., which implements provisions of the federal Surface Transportation Assistance Act in Wisconsin.

The effect of this rule will be to extend the provisions of ss. 348.07(2)(f), (fm), (gm) and (gr), and s. 348.08(1)(e), Stats., to the highway segment listed above. As a result, vehicles which may legally operate on the federal National Network in Wisconsin will also be allowed to operate on the newly designated highway. Specifically, this means there will be no overall length limitation for a tractor-semitrailer combination, a double bottom or an automobile haulaway on the affected highway segments. There also will be no length limitation for a truck tractor or road tractor when operated in a tractor-semitrailer combination or as part of a double bottom or an automobile haulaway. Double bottoms will be allowed to operate on the affected highway segment, provided neither trailer is longer than

28 feet, 6 inches. Semitrailers up to 53 feet long may also be operated on this highway segment, provided the kingpin to rear axle distance does not exceed 41 feet. This distance is measured from the kingpin to the center of the rear axle or, if the semitrailer has a tandem axle, to a point midway between the first and last axles of the tandem. Otherwise, semitrailers, including semitrailers which are part of an automobile haulaway, are limited to 48 feet in length.

These vehicles and combinations are also allowed to operate on undesignated highways for a distance of 5 miles for less from the designated highway in order to reach fuel, food, maintenance, repair, rest, staging, terminal or vehicle assembly or points of loading or unloading. After loading or unloading, these vehicles and combinations may also be operated on an undesignated highway for up to 5 miles in order to obtain access to a designated highway.

Designation of a highway under this proceeding affects only the length of vehicles which may be operated on the highway. It has no effect on the width of vehicles which remains at 8 feet 6 inches maximum, the height of vehicles which remains at 13 feet 6 inches maximum or the weight of vehicles which remains at 80,000 pounds maximum. The statutes, however, contain certain exceptions to these maximum widths, heights and weights which apply regardless of whether or not a highway has been designated in this rule.

For some time a question has existed concerning whether a detour, established under s. 84.02(10)(b), Stats., of a highway designated under s. Trans 276.07, may be used by the longer vehicles which could use the designated highway. The effect of this rule also creates s. Trans 276.08 to clearly state the Department's current interpretation that the longer vehicles may use such a detour.

<u>Final Regulatory Flexibility Analysis.</u> The provisions of this rule adding a highway segment to the designated system and to provide that when a designated highway is closed and detoured the designation follows the detour have no direct adverse effect on small businesses and may have a favorable effect on those small businesses which are shippers or carriers using the newly-designated routes.

<u>Fiscal Estimate</u>. The Department estimates that there will be no direct fiscal impact from this rulemaking upon the state and anticipates no effect upon the fiscal liabilities or revenues of any county, city, village, town, school district, vocational, technical and adult education school district or sewerage district.

operated under ss. 348.07(2)(f), (fm), (gm), (gr), 348.07(4) and 348.08(1)(e), Stats., may be operated on the detour until the regular route of the highway is reopened to traffic.
