

JOINT RESOLUTIONS
OF THE
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY,

OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN—SESSION OF 1857.

No. 1.

JOINT RESOLUTION of instructions to the Senators and Members in Congress from this State.

Resolved, by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin, That our Senators and Members of Congress be requested to use their earnest endeavors to obtain payment to the State of the five per cent. of the proceeds of the sales of lands by the United States within this State, and the Governor of this State is hereby required to forward a copy of this resolution, immediately after its passage, to each of said Senators and Representatives.

No. 2.

RESOLUTION instructing Senators and Representatives in Congress to oppose reduction of duty on Lead and Copper.

Resolved, by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That our Senators in Congress be instructed, and our Repre-

sentatives be requested, to oppose any reduction of the present rates of duty on Lead and Copper.

Resolved, That the Governor be requested to communicate the foregoing resolution to each of our members of Congress respectively.

Approved, February 20, 1857.

No. 3.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS instructing Senators in Congress and requesting Representatives in relation to duties of Sugar and Molasses.

Resolved, by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin, That our Senators in Congress be instructed, and our Representatives requested, to use their influence for the passage of an act repealing all duties on Sugar and Molasses.

Resolved, That the Governor be requested to forward a copy of this resolution to each of our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

No. 4.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS relating to Slavery, the Slave trade, Polygamy and the security of the Territories of the United States.

Resolved, by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin, That our Senators in Congress be and they are hereby instructed, and our Representatives requested, First—To oppose the passage of any act for the government of any Territory now belonging to the United States, or which may hereafter be acquired, unless it shall contain a provision forever prohibiting the introduction of slavery or involuntary servitude into said Territories, except as a punishment for crime.

Second.—To oppose the admission of any more Slave States into the Federal Union.
