An Acr to cede the Jurisdiction of the State of Wisconsin over certain Lands to the United States.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of the State of Wisconsin Jurisdiction over such tract or parcel of land situate in the city of United States. Madison, the capitol of the State, not exceeding two acres, as shall be acquired or purchased by the United States, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining thereon a court house and post office, is hereby ceded to the United States of America, and shall be forever free from taxation, by or under the laws of this State, while the United States shall hold the title thereof; *Provided*, That nothing herein contained shall be so Proviso. construed as to interfere with or prevent the service of process issued out of any of the courts of this State upon such tract of land, or to interfere in any way with the jurisdiction of this State to punish crimes and offences against the laws of this State committed thereon.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

An Acr to amend Chapter 48 of the Session Laws of 1856, in relation to Lumber drifted on Lands.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
