

## CHAPTER 829.

[Published April 21, 1864.]

AN ACT to authorize the county of Douglas to raise an extra road and bridge fund.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :*

Bonds to amount of \$15,000 may be issued for building of roads and bridges.

SECTION 1. The county board of supervisors of the county of Douglas, are hereby authorized to make and execute contracts to the lowest bidders, for opening, improving, building and superintending roads and bridges in said county, and to liquidate the indebtedness of the county thereby incurred, by issuing the bonds of said county, payable at the pleasure of the county at any time within fifteen years from and after the date or dates of said bonds, with annual interest at the rate not over seven per cent. per annum: *provided*, that the aggregate amount of said bonds shall not exceed twenty-five thousand dollars.

Tax for interest.

SECTION 2. The supervisors of said county shall cause to be levied and collected annually, a sufficient sum of money, by tax, to pay the interest upon said bonds, issued as provided by section one of this act.

Delinquent taxes set apart as a sinking fund.

SECTION 3. So much of the proceeds of the delinquent taxes now due, or which may hereafter become due or be received into the treasury of said county, from such taxes, pursuant to the laws in such cases made and provided, as may be necessary to meet the payment of said bonds, as they shall become due, shall be set apart by said board of supervisors, and held as a sinking fund for the purpose of meeting said payments; and said board of supervisors are hereby requested [required] to provide for any deficiency which the amount of the proceeds of said delinquent taxes is not sufficient to pay, by causing to be levied and collected, during the year next preceding the time said bonds shall become due, a sufficient sum, by tax, to pay said deficiency.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
