

CHAPTER 15.

[Published February 18, 1871.]

AN ACT to amend section one (1), chapter 128, general laws of 1867, entitled "an act to prevent minors from playing at billiards and on bowling alleys, and indulging in intoxicating drinks."

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :

Amended.

SECTION 1. Add to section 1 of chapter 128 of general laws of 1867, as follows: "And any person not a keeper of any such above described place for the sale of liquor, who for the purpose of enabling any keeper of such place or any minor to evade this act, shall vend, sell, give, deliver, convey, transmit or send any spirituous, ardent and intoxicating or malt liquor or drinks in any quantity whatsoever to a minor, or shall in any way deal or traffic therein with a minor, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor."

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 16.

[Published February 18, 1871.]

AN ACT to provide for the payment of fees to the witnesses for the defendant in criminal cases, the same as to the witnesses on behalf of the state.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :

Defendants'
witnesses to be
paid fees.

SECTION 1. Witnesses for the defendant in criminal cases, tried before the circuit court or a justice of the peace, shall be paid the same fees by the county in which such cases are tried, and in the same manner as witnesses on behalf of the state are allowed and paid: *provided, however,* witnesses on behalf of the defendant

in such cases shall only be paid such fees by the county where they have been summoned by the order of the judge of the circuit court or justice of the peace, as the case may be, as provided in the next section.

SECTION 2. The judge of the circuit court or a justice of the peace may, in any criminal case, order such witnesses to be summoned on behalf of the defendant, in his discretion as he may deem proper and necessary, on proof of such necessity by the affidavit of the defendant or his attorney.

Judge or justice may order witnesses to be summoned.

SECTION 3. This act shall be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 17.

[Published February 18, 1871.]

AN ACT to authorize the appointment of phonographic reporters for the circuit court of the several counties in the sixth judicial circuit.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be lawful for the judge of the circuit court of the sixth judicial circuit to appoint, from time to time, as the exigencies of business may seem to warrant, two phonographic reporters for the circuit court of each of the several counties in said circuit, who shall be sworn officers of the court for which they shall have been appointed, and who shall be skilled in the art of short-hand reporting, one of whom shall attend upon such court at each term thereof, when required by the court or judge thereof, and shall discharge such duties as the said court or judge may direct.

May appoint phonographic reporters.

SECTION 2. Such reporters shall be allowed such daily compensation as shall be fixed by the judge of the court, not exceeding ten dollars per day for each day's attendance upon such court, when required by the judge thereof to attend, which shall be certified,
