CHAPTER 85.

AN ACT to provide for the compensation of certain additional employes in the legislature for 1879.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The following additional employes of the senate and assembly, heretofore employed at the session for 1879, to wit: For the senate, two committee room attendants, one gallery attendant, and one janitor, at three dollars per day each, and one messenger at two dollars per day; and for the assembly, one committee room attendant and one janitor, at three dollars per day, and three messenger boys for the assembly at two dollars per day; each shall be paid said per diem respectively for the time during which they have been actually employed, but not longer than from the date of commencement to the adjournment of the legislature.

Number and compensation of employes.

SECTION 2. There is hereby appropriated from the state treasury, a sum sufficient to carry out the provisions of this act.

SECTION 3. This act shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 86.

AN ACT to legalize the official acts of Thompson Phillips, a justice of the peace in Monroe county.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The official acts of Thompson Phillips, in conveying real estate and taking acknowledgments of mortgages, are hereby legalized, and shall have the same force and effect as if said Thompson Phillips had properly filed his bond as justice of the peace with the clerk of the circuit court of Monroe county, within the time required by law.

Legalized.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
