## CHAPTER 9.

AN ACT to amend chapter 303 of the laws of the state of Wisconsin for the year 1880, entitled "an act to authorize Thos. J. La Flesh, his associates and assigns, to build and maintain certain dams on the east fork of Black river, in the counties of Wood, Clark and Jackson."

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

Amended. SECTION 1. Section 1 of chapter 303 of the laws of the state of Wisconsin for the year 1880, is hereby amended by adding to the end of said section the following words: One dam on section twenty-five, (25) township twenty-four, (24) north, of range No. two (2) east.

Amended. SECTION 2. Section 4 of said chapter 303 of the laws of 1880, is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 4. On the completion of said dams by the said Thomas J. La Flesh, his associates and assigns, they shall be empowered and are hereby authorized to receive and collect from the owners of all logs, timber and lumber put in said stream between the north line of township No. twenty-four (24) north, of range No. two (2) east, and a point on said stream where Turner's creek empties into the east fork of Black river, the sum of twenty-five (25) cents per thousand feet, board measure, as a compensation for keeping up and maintaining such dams; and the said Thomas J. La Flesh, his associates and assigns, shall have a lien on all logs, timber and lumber put in as aforesaid, until said charges are paid: provided, they shall at all times comply with the provisions of section 2 of this act, and provided they shall conform to all the conditions of chapters 70 and 146 of the revised statutes of 1878, so far as the same may be applicable.

Fees.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

NOTE BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE.—The foregoing act having been presented to the governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the legislature in which it originated, within the time prescribed by the constitution of the state, has become a law without his approval.
