

Legislature reserves the right to amend or repeal this act.

subject to all the provisions of chapter 146, of the revised statutes, and all acts amendatory thereto, as far as the same may be applicable, the legislature reserving the right to alter, amend or repeal this act, whenever in its judgment the public interest shall so require.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 281.

AN ACT to authorize the construction of a dam across the north branch of the Embarrass River, Shawano county, Wisconsin, by John Sieber and Wm. Dumke.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Authorize John Sieber and William Dumke to erect dam.

SECTION 1. John Sieber and William Dumke, their assigns, are hereby authorized to erect and maintain a dam across the north branch of the Embarrass river, at a point on the east half of the southwest quarter, of section fifteen, town twenty-seven, range thirteen east, and to erect a mill, machinery, and necessary appendages, to enable them to use the water of said river for hydraulic and booming purposes; provided, that said dam shall not raise the water to exceed sixteen feet.

Construct suitable slides.

SECTION 2. The aforesaid persons and their assigns shall build and maintain suitable slides and chutes in said dam, so as to allow the free passage of logs and timber over said dam, and shall have full control over said dam, at all times except for flooding and driving purposes; and provided, that they shall be subject to all of the provisions of chapter 146, revised statutes, and acts amendatory thereto, so far as applicable hereto. The legislature reserves the right to alter, amend or repeal this act whenever in its judgment the public interest shall so require.

Right to amend or repeal this act reserved by legislature.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
