CHAPTER 175.

AN ACT to authorize the erection of a dam across Red river, in Shawano county, Wisconsin, and to grant certain powers and privileges to persons therein mentioned.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. G. J. Huhn, J. H. Baum, John Marx, their heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered to erect, keep and maintain a dam, not exceeding sixteen feet in height, across the Red river, in Shawano county, Wisconsin, at a point in said river where is now located the Weed dam, being on the north half of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section two, township twenty-seven, range fourteen east.

G. J. Huhn et al., authorized to build dam across Red river near Shawano county.

SECTION 2. Said dam shall be erected and constructed for manufacturing and boomage purposes; provided, that said dam shall be provided and furnished with suitable slides or chutes so as to allow the free and unobstructed passage of sawlogs and timber through the same, and, provided further, that no charge for toll upon logs passing through said dam or said boom shall ever be collected or received by said parties aforesaid, their associates or assigns.

Slides and chutes.

SECTION 3. The control of said dam and slides shall belong to G. J. Huhn, J. H. Baum and John Marx, their associates, heirs and assigns, but subject to the provisions of chapter 318 of the laws of 1882, and the acts amendatory thereof; and the dam so erected shall be subject to all the provisions of chapter 146, of the revised statutes of 1878, and the acts amendatory thereof.

Provisions of chapter 318, laws of 1882, and chapter 146 R. S. 1878, shall relate to same.

SECTION 4. The legislature hereby reserves the right to alter, amend or repeal the franchises granted in this act, whenever in the judgment of the legislature it is necessary or proper to do so.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
