lified electors voting upon such question shall be in favor thereof, then the foregoing provisions of this act shall be in full forein said town, and it shall be the duty of the town board to enferce its provisions.

CHAPTER 535.

AN ACT to repeal chapter 68, laws of 1905, and sections 1494—21 to 1494—25, inclusive, of the statutes, relating to the registration and certification of pedigrees for horses and other animals used for breeding purposes.

CHAPTER 536.

AN ACT to repeal sections 513 and 926—16 of the statutes and create a new section 513 of the statutes, all relating to the eligibility of women to school offices.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sections 513 and 926-16 of the statutes are repealed.

Section 2. There is added to the statutes a new section to read: Section 513. Women of the age of twenty-one or more years who reside and for one year next prior to their election or appointment have resided in any school district, town, eity, or county, are eligible by election or appointment to the offices of director, treasurer and clerk of such district, director and secretary of the town school board, of the town school board of such town if under the township system, member of the school board or board of education of such city, town inspector of schools of such town and county superintendent of such county.
